

HELP SAVE STANSTED LIBRARY

Essex County Council (ECC) proposes saving 0.2% of its annual budget by closing half its libraries, including Stansted's, reducing library provision to a small number of hubs. This will not work in our rural area with poor transport links and a significant number of people who do not have the money to buy books or travel to libraries further afield. Since our old library was demolished, user numbers have been lower than usual, with only an intermittent visiting mobile library; more recently the library has been using a small room in the Council Offices, with many previous users unaware of the library's continued existence. However, with Stansted's new community hub due to open soon, the library can once again become a much-loved and well-used community resource, which is needed more than ever with the increasing population from new housing developments.

Over 1,000 people have signed the **change.org petition** protesting against the closure of Stansted Library. However, ECC have stated that what *will* influence their decision are responses to the consultation survey at https://libraries.essex.gov.uk/libraries-consultation/ The deadline for completing the survey is 20th February.



We even have local author, Jojo Moyes, on board! Whilst waiting for my appointment at the dentist, Jojo spotted me reading one of her books in which, coincidentally, the main character is fighting the proposed closure of her local library. Jojo said: "This is the first time in 16 years that I have seen someone reading one of my books" and took this photo to share on social media. She was shocked to hear about the proposed library closures, signed the petition and will complete the consultation survey. Jojo also offered to sign my book, but I declined as it was a library book!

MY STANSTED An Interview with Marion Pretty



How long have you lived here? For 86 years.

What brought you to Stansted? The stork – I was born in the village.

Why do you enjoy living here?

Because I grew up in Stansted I know a lot of people and I think it's a really friendly place. I couldn't imagine living anywhere else.

Is there anything you don't like about the village?

All the shops closing and not having a bank here anymore. When I was growing up you used to be able to buy everything you needed in Stansted, down to a pair of braces: most of it from just one shop, Green's Stores on the Cambridge Road.

How does Stansted compare with other places you've lived?

I lodged in Dunmow when I went to Chelmsford Technical College at the age of 13. It was only for about four years and I found Dunmow a bit big. I liked Chelmsford because of all the shops, although we college students were banned from going into Marks and Spencers or Woolworths!

What was your profession?

I trained as a nursery nurse and applied to work for what was then called Dr Barnardo's, but my friend and I were turned down because we had no siblings. I went to work at a family-owned chemist shop in Bishop's Stortford called Speechley and Millbank: a job I enjoyed so much that I stayed there after I was married and until I had my eldest daughter.

How do you spend your leisure time?

I was a founder member of the Stansted WI over 50 years ago serving as President twice; I was on Stansted Parish Council for about 12 years and practised Tai Chi for many years. Now I just go to the WI meetings.

What is the most memorable thing that's happened during your time in Stansted?

There have been a few memorable events. I was on the Parish Council when the Space Shuttle came to Stansted

Airport and was lucky enough to see the huge shuttle at close quarters, which was really exciting. But the thing that sticks in my mind most is the sight of the lights shining through the coloured glass windows of *Savages* in Lower Street at the end of the war when the blackout was finally over. To me at 11 or 12 years old that seemed such a magical thing.

STANSTED'S COMMUNITY HELPLINE HERE FOR THOSE IN NEED

Receiving even more requests for help than the previous year, 2018 was another very busy, if sometimes testing time for Stansted's voluntary community care service. As ever Helpline's small band of volunteers rose to the challenge and successfully fulfilled the majority of all requests. A huge thank you to them; without volunteers freely giving of their time Helpline would cease to exist. When Helpline was established over 30 years ago, our drivers operated under what was known as the Social Car Scheme, when volunteers could claim petrol allowances from local authorities. Under the scheme we were encouraged to take residents to visit friends or relatives, take them shopping or to the hairdressers but were positively discouraged from giving them lifts to hospital appointments; that was seen as 'poaching' customers from the ambulance or hospital car service. How times have changed! Now it is not unusual for Helpline to receive calls from local hospitals or surgeries requesting transport for their patients to attend appointments at their clinics. We are now members of Uttlesford Care Network, an organisation which encourages communities to harness the goodwill that exists in their town or village to help and support those in need.



Our meeting on 3rd January was a well-attended meeting that consisted of some fascinating presentations by members.

Ralph Phillips: 'Sally Arsenic'

Sally Arsenic was the nickname given to Sarah Chesham from Saffron Walden. She and her husband had six children. In January 1845 two of her boys had severe stomach pains and died of 'English Cholera'. Eighteen months later another family's child died. Sarah was questioned and held at Springfield jail. Her two sons were exhumed and tested by Guys Hospital, which proved arsenic had killed them. Sarah was tried for the three deaths but was acquitted due to lack of evidence. After her husband died in 1850 an autopsy revealed traces of arsenic in his stomach, from the flour she had been feeding him. She confessed to the murders and went to Chelmsford prison for execution. On 25th March 1851 she was hanged in front of 7,000 spectators. Sarah was the last woman to be hanged in public and her activities brought in legislation for the controlling and selling of arsenic.



Ian Poole: RAF Debden

Construction of RAF Debden started in 1935 and it officially opened on 22nd April 1937 with 85 Sqn flying the new Gloster Gladiators. During the Battle of Britain, Debden was part of the 11 group with Debden operations room controlling the southern half of East Anglia, and several squadrons all flying Hurricanes. With the war operations turning offensive, the Debden wing was formed, flying Spitfire operations over Europe with US pilots who volunteered before the USA entered the war to fight the Nazis. After the war, the Empire radio school operated with Ansons, Oxfords, Spitfires and a Halifax. Then in 1960 it became an RAF Police depot, an Air Cadet Gliding HQ, and on 25th April was transferred over to the Army as Carver Barracks.

IN MEMORIAM

BOB STODDART

22nd June 1922-12th November 2018



Born in Potterspury, Northamptonshire, the eldest of two children, Bob ioined the Northampton Co-operative on leaving school in 1936. He started in the greengrocery department, which at that time involved a horse and cart and calling on customers. He remained employed by the Co-operative movement for all his working life, in stores in London, Bishop's Stortford, Cambridge,

Royston and Saffron Walden, rising through the ranks to Store Manager, Bob's army call up came in 1941, serving in the 3rd Carabiniers Tank Regiment in Burma and the Far East. He met his future wife, Elsie, at the Victory Parade in London, where Bob was representing his Regiment. They married in 1947 and settled in London, where they had two children, Martin and Mary. In 1958 they moved to Stansted Mountfitchet and remained there until, sadly, Elsie's dementia led to the decision to move into residential care. Not wishing to be parted, in June 2016 they both moved to Suffolk, where they could also be nearer to their grandchildren and great-granddaughters. Bob enjoyed all sports, but particularly cricket; he played for Stansted Cricket Club for many years, before turning to coaching the younger players, when injury ended his playing days. He still sponsors a Cup for the Under 15s. Bob was also involved in the Scout movement in Stansted, and with Elsie regularly delivered *meals on wheels* and helped at the Day Centre. He also raised funds for Support 4 Sight, a charity close to his heart. Bob was a talented artist and particularly enjoyed calligraphy and painting watercolour landscapes. He was a staunch member of the British Legion and could be found, with Elsie, selling poppies at Stansted Airport at the beginning of November for many years. He is survived by his widow Elsie, two children, and his extended family.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

The other day I saw a very small child on the bus. He or she was at the point in their development where they were trying to talk. They were repeatedly making a "mm mm mm" sound. It was not hard to imagine them saying their first word; probably "mama". How extraordinary is the human gift of speech! Our brains have evolved to the point where acquiring language is natural to us. We have the ability to describe the world around us, to conduct our relationships and to give meaning to our lives through words. Our highly complex language skills are one of the expressions of our heightened human sense of consciousness. We should celebrate the gift of language and thought and all who help us see the potential and the fruits of them; poets, philosophers and scientists.

Experiencing that child, so vigorously trying to speak, took me back to a study day I had attended a few days

before. One of the themes we had explored was how do we express our faith in God? We recognised that we are often trying to express the inexpressible. Yet, it seemed to me that, if language is the extraordinary gift we have as humans, we cannot withdraw from trying to express our faith in words and concepts. One of the titles for Jesus is that he is 'the Word made flesh'. This is often taken to mean that Jesus embodies the purpose of God and articulates that purpose for us. In the search for the deepest meaning of our lives, Christ is the way into exploring and expressing it. All religions share this same quest. The search for meaning is so intrinsic to our human existence. So let us give thanks for the gift of language and let us never give up the search for a deeper understanding of what truly is the meaning of our lives.

SAVE OUR LIBRARY

THE FACTS – a potted history:

2011-2017 Essex County Council (ECC) initiated discussions with the Parish Council about a new community hub

building to accommodate a new Library, Parish Council office and other community services. Architects appointed and spent considerable time with ECC agreeing their requirements and incorporating into the design of the new building. Following protracted discussions ECC agree to sign up to a 10-year Lease. Old library demolished and building work commenced on community hub. Suspended for approx. 15 months due to legal issues and no fault of ECC. Work resumed. Further discussions with ECC who requested the draft Lease and meetings held to discuss the detailed aspects

of the move into the new building.

1 Nov 18 Site visit with Library officers to the new building and a further request for the Lease.

14 Nov 18 Stansted Parish Council alerted via social media to a possible consultation regarding the future of

Essex Libraries and established that our library was on a potential "hit-list" for closure.

Jan 2019 No direct communication with us has yet been initiated by Essex County Council.

IS THE COUNTY COUNCIL ABOUT TO RENEGE ON THIS DEAL? IT SEEMS SO BUT THEY MUST NOT GET AWAY WITH THIS

We need everyone to play their part now and respond to the official consultation. Signing a petition is not as effective. This will affect everyone in our community; even if you are not a library user, you are sure to know someone who is. Key reasons for objecting include:

- **DEPRIVATION** Stansted's child poverty is the highest in the district but we have the highest youth membership of the district's four public libraries
- ➤ USAGE The usage figures quoted are from the period after demolition of the old library when it was housed in the mobile van and then in the Council Offices. Prior to that, usage of the library was high.
- ➤ ACCESS If the number of libraries in Uttlesford is decreased from four to two, the district would have one library per 42,000 people. If the population goes up 15,000 over the next decade due to the creation of new communities, there will be one library per 50,000. This would be the worst library density in England.

PHARMACY UPDATE

Work continues to progress a review of the 2018 Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment to enable us to promote the registration of a dispensing pharmacy in the south of Stansted. Our recent efforts to convince the Essex Health and Wellbeing Board that their assessment process was flawed has not been accepted by them. We are, however, not giving up and have proof that not all of the agreed consultees actually received the documents; they were therefore unable to respond to the consultation.

We are asking the Essex HWB to review their processes, to visit us and meet with and listen to the residents here, and hear their issues; to look at the demographic increases locally and the impact on the Stansted Surgery and the existing registered and unregistered pharmacies, as well as the access issues.

We will need support if a visit is agreed – watch out for updates in the social media pages and the Parish Council website.

THE MOUNTFITCHET EXCHANGE

As we write, work has recommenced following the Christmas break and is still on schedule to be completed by the end of February. Uncertainty about the future of the Library service in the village is obviously a huge concern, and if the Library service were to renege on the understanding we have with them in regard to their financial contribution, it could potentially have a significant impact on our budget.

We hope to be operating Parish Council services from the new building soon after handover. For the first time Stansted residents will be able to access some Uttlesford District Council services "face to face" in the village by calling into the Exchange building. It will also be possible to make contact with our Police Community Support Officer and access Citizens Advice Bureau services.

TREE WARDEN'S REPORT

Tree Warden Daniel Brett writes:

In the foreword to "Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy", Douglas Adams wrote: "This planet has – or rather had – a problem, which was this: most of the people living on it were unhappy for pretty much of the time... Many were increasingly of the opinion that they'd all made a big mistake in coming down from the trees in the first place." Certainly, a world without trees would be an unhappier place. Our community is a better place for the trees in our gardens and public places. These fasci-



nating plants are central to global ecology and, despite our species' technological prowess, are crucial to our survival: regulating the climate, storing carbon, preventing soil erosion, providing a habitat to most animals on our planet and giving millions of people materials for shelter and food to eat.

Trees have always been a part of my life and past generations of my family, so I was delighted to be invited to become Stansted's volunteer tree warden last May.

Land owned by Stansted Parish Council contains hundreds of trees of a variety of mostly indigenous species, of varying maturity. However, on amenity land trees cannot be a danger to life or property and that's where a tree warden comes in handy.

My first job was to examine a diseased Norway maple on the Recreation Ground. Trees in decline are fascinating from an ecological perspective. Just 10 per cent of a healthy tree is living tissue: three per cent of its mass is leaves, five per cent is inner bark and two per cent is the ray cells in sapwood. But a tree in advanced decay is more living than it has ever been. Rotting wood is a megacity of fungus and insects with more living tissue than it ever was as a "living" tree, gently transforming a tree's dying body into fertile matter and contributing to nature's rich cycle of rebirth.

The maple on the Rec was alive with a bacterial infection oozing out of the bark and fungal fruiting bodies erupting from the exposed sapwood, which also had countless holes of boring insects. Yet, a tree so rich in pathogens and creatures is a potential danger on amenity land and I recommended it be felled during winter, giving it a chance to have its last burst of leaf.

Ash die-back is a less romantic fungal disease. It is set to kill at least 90 per cent of ash trees in the UK. When the Parish Council asked me to inspect Newman's plantation, a small section of woodland between Walson Way and Forest Hall Road, I counted over 130 trees (excluding shrubs), of which 62 per cent are ash with varying stages of the disease. The disease is slow to progress and for the time being the trees are not a problem to people or property, although I will inspect them for any potential dangers. As they decline, other

trees and shrubs will seed themselves in the copse: field maple, horse chestnut, oak, sycamore, hawthorn and hazel.



Aggressive, fast-spreading diseases such as ash dieback and sudden oak death are symptomatic of manmade climate change. It is up to all of us to look after our ecology at a time of great stress for our local trees, so that our community and planet can become a happier and healthier place for future generations. Take some time to appreciate our community's trees and the life and joy they provide.

MEMORIAL GARDENS

We are pleased to announce that the funding has now been secured for the final phase of the Memorial Gardens make-over. The hard landscaping work was completed over a year ago and the flower beds adjacent to the pathway have been replanted. The borders on the boundary of the gardens were tidied up prior to the WWI Armistice Commemoration events, but they have been neglected for some time and many of the plants have either died or suffered from a lack of attention. Affinity Water have awarded us a grant of £2,050 which means that we can replant the areas with plants that are more eco friendly and cope better with drier summers. Once the worst of the winter weather is over our gardening contractors will start work and we will see the benefits over the summer months.

POLICING

A PCSO has now been recruited for Stansted, Elsenham and Henham. Pre-employment checks are taking place and training commences on January 28th for six weeks. The PCSO will then be integrated into an established team to embed procedures and will start with us in March. Stansted Parish Council is covering 50% of the cost of the PCSO so we expect to see a visible police presence in the village for roughly 50% of their allotted hours (we have to allow for travelling time from Saffron Walden where they have to sign-in before starting duty!). There is an understanding that only if there is a really significant incident requiring a heavy police presence will the officer be taken off their duties in the village. If you have an issue you want the police to be aware of, you will be able to make contact with the PCSO in the Exchange Building.

What can you expect our PCSO to be doing?

- Go on highly visible solo foot patrols
- Make house visits to gather intelligence and offer public reassurance after minor crimes or anti-social behaviour
- Get involved with community groups and local businesses.
- Provide low-level crime prevention and personal safety advice
- Carry out low-level missing person enquiries
- Act as professional witnesses, attending court when needed
- Engage with young people
- Interact with schools

NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Cllr Farthing writes:

As I write this on 27th December to meet the deadline of 4th Jan, Christmas has passed and we can look forward to the new year. Let us hope that it brings us all good health and prosperity.

It has been a great honour and privilege to be one of the district councillors for the past four years. However as my mum used to say, "Terry it's time for someone else to have a turn now".

Looking back, I hope I have helped to make a difference for the better for the residents of Uttlesford. Among other things, the one that stands out most was being able to support Aspire, the company UDC started to enable us to make investments to try and ensure we could fill the gap in funding from central government cuts. I am delighted to say that in the first 12 months our investment in Great Chesterford science park has contributed £2 million to the council coffers. I just hope that once I have left that the council will continue in the same entrepreneurial spirit. A good example of this is Stansted Airport, which is owned in part by local authorities in Manchester generating many millions in dividends for the benefit of residents in Manchester.

The local plan still marches on and, although may not be perfect, gives local people a say in what is built and where. The bottom line is we need more houses and they need to be built somewhere. All parties agree this to be the case and indeed try to out do one another as to how many more they would build if elected. We need to take our share, and without a plan the government will dictate what is to be built and where.

The biggest disappointments for me are the threat to the library at Stansted and the ridiculous on-going situation that the pharmacy next to the new doctors surgery is still unable to dispense medicines due to bureaucratic gobbledegook. All district councillors are trying to help the campaign to save the library.

I have been made aware of the new campaign from Keep Britain Tidy aimed at irresponsible dog owners, who fail to clean up after their pets in public areas. Although the campaign is supported by the council, on this occasion I cannot support it. I feel it is inappropriate and unnecessary to have large posters littering our neighbourhood with luminous, glow in the dark threatening eyes looking at you. I think children and the elderly may be upset by such menacing images,. If anyone hasn't seen them I would suggest they visit the parish office and look for themselves. I don't believe it will curb such owners' action; a better idea would be to enforce the bye laws and fine the culprits. Indeed if it's a real problem, and they also enforced fines for littering, if could be self-financing.

I have recently been helping the Uttlesford food bank. I have been extremely impressed by their commitment to help people in need living within our community. Living in such an affluent area like Uttlesford many of us are unaware of the real and often hidden issues that give rise to a real need for such a service. I would urge people to spread the word. STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET EVENING WI



Our December meeting was well attended and we all settled in for a cosy evening. On display was a smaller version of the Christmas tree we had dressed for St. Mary's Church Festival earlier in December. The theme was *Peace and Goodwill*.

Our President thanked all the members who had produced the lovely end result. Lynda Dale, Chairman of the St Mary's Friends Committee, had sent a card to thank us for taking part. One of our members then entertained us with tales of her career, first as a typist for Cunard, then at the Elsenham Jam Factory, followed by various jobs ending up as a home help. She had many tales to tell, some sad but others had us in fits of laughter.



This was a hard act to follow, but we then welcomed our speaker for the evening, Peter Jennings, who came to tell us about *Yuletide Customs*, a subject which he is clearly passionate about. He explained that most of our traditions originate with the winter solstice and have roots going back hundreds of years. From the Yule log lit from the embers of the previous year's log, the introduction of the decorative fir tree in Victorian times, the development of the cracker, peculiar to Britain, the introduction of cards instead of Christmas letters, to the popularity of the robin picture stemming from the uniform of Victorian postmen who were known as robins'. Our refreshments, provided by the Committee, were decorated around a Christmas theme and much appreciated.

BRAIN TRAINING

How can you learn your left from your right and help reduce pain? It really matters that you can tell your left from your right and not only because it saves marital strife when driving/navigating. The main reason lies in the function of your thalamus. The thalamus sits on top of the brainstem and one of its primary jobs is to decide how important incoming information is. It also should be good at distinguishing the finer points of that information. One of the most important messages analysed by the thalamus is pain. If we suffer long term pain, signals from the painful area spread to nearby areas and non-painful signals from that area come to be interpreted as pain, like the light squeeze of your socks. Which means pain intensifies and we start to fear movement. Not a good scenario. During pain rehab, it is important to rehab the thalamus so it normalises its response to signals coming from the troublesome area. The first line of attack comes with getting the Recognise app on your phone or iPad. To find it just google 'Recognise app'.



This app has been developed by the NOI (Neuro Orthopae-dic Institute) in Australia, a leading research group into pain. You can get the app for various body parts, such as the neck, back, or foot as suits your needs. What the app does is show you pictures of the chosen limb in various odd positions and you have to decide whether it is the right or left part of the body within a chosen time frame. It is likely that this will be difficult, but it does begin to decrease fear of movement.





WINES FOR VALENTINES



Searching for some wines to accompany that romantic meal? Here are some suggestions:

A sparkling wine has to be a good choice, particularly if it is pink! Janz from Tasmania produce a good value one: pale and delicate with a lovely mousse at £14.58 from Cambridge Wine Merchants. An alternative with lovely crushed berry flavours is *Graham Beck Rosé* from South Africa, available from Majestic at £14.99 as part of a mixed six bottle case. A step up in quality (and price) is the *Nyetimber Rosé*, nor-

mally £35 per bottle but expect a good discount at this time of year to around £26. The class shows with red fruit aromas and a creamy redcurrant flavour.

With a steak for supper you might like a powerful red wine such as an 'Amarone' from Valpolicella. It is normally quite pricey but Aldi had Villa Alberti Amarone at £12.99, and whilst it lacks the complexity of pricier versions, it still packs an impressive punch for the money. Tesco had a very good 2015 Tesco Finest Amarone at £18.00 which is intense and full bodied with flavours of ripe black fruits, sweet spices with a rich smooth finish. If that is a bit powerful, a more delicate red is the appropriately named Beaujolais from the Cru vineyards of the most northerly region of Saint Amour. More tricky to track down but Rannoch Scott of Colchester has the 2014 Chateaux de Belleverne Cru de Amoureux at £9.50 on the internet, with wild strawberry aromas and blackberry and liquorice on the palette and a long complex finish. Finally, if you are finishing with chocolate why not try the unusual sweet and fortified port-like red wine of Maury from southern France which goes so well with chocolate puddings. Waitrose has a 50cl bottle of Domaine Pouderoux Gran Reserve at £11.50 with flavours of prunes and figs and a long spicy finish. Have a wonderful evening.

GARDENING TIPS FOR FEBRUARY

Try not to walk or work on your soil during wet periods; it will squash out a lot of the oxygen in the soil essential for plant growth and the soil fauna that live there, and are essential parts of the ecosystem. If you have no alternative but to work or walk on your soil, consider using old planks of wood to spread your weight and significantly reduce compaction.

If you did not plant any daffodils in autumn, they will start to become available in nurseries as pot-grown specimens; they are, however, much more expensive to buy this way. Snowdrops are traditionally available for purchase at quite cost-effective prices at this time of year (referred to as in the green); they can also be divided at this time. Other plants that are looking good at this time of year include yellow wintersweet (Chimonathus), Nepalese paper plant (Daphne), iris (Iris unquicularis), and various hellebores. Winter flowering heathers that have finished flowering can be given a haircut; prune them back without going back into woody growth with no leaves, as they tend to reshoot from growing wood only. Deciduous hedges such as hawthorn, hornbeam, privet and viburnum can be pruned back before the bird nesting season starts. Roses not pruned in autumn can be pruned towards the end of the month; for bush roses aim to try and achieve a goblet shaped spread of strong stems. On climbers, aim to start bringing selected stems down towards their desired horizontal position to maximise the rose flowers in summer. If your climber is becoming old and woody, choose the oldest stem to prune right back to the base to encourage new shoots this summer. Late summer flowering shrubs like Caryopteris and Buddleia (butterfly bush) can be cut back to stubby growths near the base.



Coppicing is the process of cutting trees down; this allows the stumps to regenerate, over a period of about seven years. It is usually carried out on the bushy smaller trees such as hornbeam, hazel, hawthorn; however, it may also be applied to other deciduous tree species, including oak, maple, sweet chestnut, willow, lime and ash. Coppicing is a form of woodland management that has shaped woodlands for hundreds of years. Reasons for the process have changed over the years. In the past trees were coppiced for fire wood, charcoal, bean poles, weaving and pea sticks. Nowadays timber production is combined with management for conservation.

Today, the most important reason is the benefit it provides to wildlife. Rotational coppicing maintains a small-scale structural diversity, with a constantly changing pattern of cut-over areas, scrub thickets and open areas. Newly opened areas allow sun and rain into the floor of the woodland, and this stimulates dormant seeds into life which then cover the woodland floor, attracting insects such as butterflies, moths and beetles as well as dormice. These in turn become food for birds and bats. After some three to five years shoots of the coppiced stools grow, and brambles and bracken take over from the herbaceous plants. If left undisturbed for between five and 15 years, coppiced areas become thick impenetrable havens for larger mammals, such as foxes, stoats and weasels, which can forage without being chased by dogs. It is also superb for small nesting birds such as warblers, dunnocks and wrens. If trees are left uncoppiced, the structure of the woods will change. More uniform conditions will gradually develop, with fewer clearings and a less varied structure, and will sadly lead to the extinction of many species which have adapted to depend on coppice conditions. Weather permitting, we hope to be carrying out some coppicing.

Today there is much we take for granted which our ancestors would not have done – for example the availability of fresh running water. In 1786 it was recorded that during an attempt to reposition a Dunmow water pump, "the gentlemen of the Mob Classes were determined it should not be moved ... a great mob got together and a great riot ensued." The riot led to 12 people being imprisoned in Chelmsford Gaol. Throughout the Hundred Parishes there are numerous surviving examples of water pumps that once served a small local community and I have described just a few below. Many of them are now listed buildings. There are plenty more to be spotted around our beautiful area, some in obvious public locations and others in private gardens.

The communal village pump at Pump Green, High Easter has been sensitively renovated, having been in use until the 1930s. It stands in the shade of a lime tree planted to commemorate the coronation of King George V in 1910.

Westmill village near Buntingford has a pump dating from about 1900. It stands on the village green and carries the inscription "Traverse the desert and then you can tell what treasure exists in the cool deep well."





To commemorate Queen Victoria's Jubilee in 1887 the village pump was erected in Little Dunmow. It is now listed and is a fine example of Victorian design. Thaxted and Great Dunmow have similar, rather grand, 19th-century pumps in prominent positions.

Nature Notes

THE NUTHATCH

The nuthatch is a plump bird which resembles a small woodpecker. It is blue-grey above and whitish below, with chestnut on its sides and under its tail. It has a black stripe on its head, a long black pointed bill and short legs. Length is 14 cm, wingspan of 24 cm with a weight of 23g. It lays six to eight eggs in April or May in old holes or crevices in trees. The female alters the nest hole using mud, protecting the chicks from predation; hence its old name of mud stopper. The chicks will fledge at around 24 days old. The name nuthatch is derived from nut hacker, because the bird cracks nuts by jamming them into a crevice then hammering at them.



Most of our knowledge about the nuthatch comes from work carried out in Sweden and Belgium. Studies have shown that large gardens with oak trees provide the optimum habitat for this species and they are increasingly making use of bird feeders. They take food from the bird table to store elsewhere; this can lead to sunflowers sprouting in unexpected places. Pairs are strongly territorial throughout the year due to this habit of storing food within their territory. They will readily adopt nest boxes and cannot resist plastering mud around the entrance hole, even if the hole is the right size. The favourite natural site for a nuthatch is the old nest hole of a great spotted woodpecker.

Nuthatches are one of the nosiest birds in the early spring and are sedentary, seldom moving far from where they hatched, usually less than a kilometre. Attracting nuthatches to your garden is best in the autumn and winter; nuts, seeds and invertebrates form an important part of the diet of nuthatches; peanuts and sunflower hearts are particularly popular in garden feeding stations.

PET EMERGENCIES

We have had a few pretty full-on days and nights recently at Mercer and Hughes, but a comment from a client really made an impression on me. The first was the emergency caesarian which occupied four nurses and me for a couple of hours, operating and then resuscitating the severely compromised puppies; for a while it was touch and go, but

eventually we managed to pull them all through. We also negotiated the disruption to the practice with so many staff caring for one patient, with a lot of hard work and staff staying on after their shifts had finished.

The next day seemed to be the day of the dogs eating inappropriate objects: stones, chocolate and socks to name but a few. After the second emergency operation to remove some of these things from various parts of intestines, our kennel nurses were set to have a busy night with postoperative monitoring. By the third day we were all wishing for a quiet one but after a normal busy day, I had an emergency call to say a cat had just come home with severe injuries. I told them to go straight to the Saffron Walden surgery, and was met by worried owners and a cat with some of the most horrific injuries I have ever seen. We spent the next hours carrying out emergency surgery. When I rang the owners at midnight to say we had just finished, they were relieved and grateful, but it was their parting words that have stayed with me over the last few weeks. They said "Thank you for being there". Just a simple phrase but one that has really resonated with me, because although it is our job, on a daily basis our staff go above and beyond what you might expect. They stay late, comfort pet owners, deal with whatever is thrown at them and they do it with care, love and good humour.


