There has been much comment in the media recently about risks to the environment and the sustainability of our food chain. This concerns our members, and during our summer break we visited a large dairy farm, and more recently were addressed by a past chairman of the National Farmers' Union. Many of us recalled a time when there might be about 40 cows on a mixed farm. The cows were often covered in muck and the sheds where they were milked were filthy and smelly and there were regular outbreaks of disease. It was tough for the animals but, then we thought, 'that was farming'.



Visiting a modern farm was a revelation. The cows were housed in enormous sheds constructed to make the atmosphere fresh and airy, they were clean, resting on soft sand (not straw which is less comfortable and can harbour parasites), were fed a carefully formulated diet and waste was frequently swept away. They were free to wander round the large shed and visited the milking parlour three times a day. The cows are constantly monitored to ensure good health; today disease is unknown on the farm. It would require an extreme cynic to think these cows were not pampered. Science and high-tech is everywhere and efficiency measures are constantly reducing the farm footprint on the planet. Many hard decisions need to be made about how we feed our growing populations and to protect the planet. Those managing large farms such as the one we visited appear to be making a brave attempt. 





Tighten the Saggy Jawline and Improve Posture. A simple exercise with profound benefits:

- Push the tip of the tongue firmly into the roof of the mouth, just behind the front teeth.
- 2. Push your fingers into the flesh of your bottom jaw.
- Open your mouth, keeping the tongue pushed up, and you should feel muscles tightening up to pull the jaw open.
- Make sure both right and left sides are working equally hard.
- Remove your fingers once you are sure you can feel the muscles working, and continue with the exercise, opening your mouth wide. Do this 3-5 times.



This exercise works a muscle called the digastric, as pictured. You can see that as it gets stronger, it will tone up the jowls. As well as having an aesthetically pleasing effect, and saving money on a face lift, the nerves that innervate the digastric and the tongue live in the brainstem. To effectively improve posture, we have to look at brain-

stem function. To put it simply, there are two sections of the brainstem involved in this exercise: the pons and the medulla. The pons straightens the upper back and the medulla lengthens the lower back. Whilst doing this exercise, drop your tailbone and stretch up through your upper back, pushing an imaginary ball into the ceiling with your head. This will improve your posture. Typically, when we try to stand up straight, we throw our shoulders back and jut out our lower ribs. This tactic doesn't work for more than five minutes. Try this exercise instead. Improving the function of the brainstem takes more practice and knowledge but the benefits in terms of posture and ageing are enormous!

Dr Leeman's Walk-In Dermatology Clinics

Doctorlink

We are one of a small group of Practices in West Essex who have agreed to trial Doctorlink, and we would be grateful if our patients could use this service so we can assess its use within the wider NHS. Doctorlink is aimed at patients who are ill on the day, and not for the management of on-going medical conditions. Please give it a try. Doctorlink is a free online triage and advice tool which helps our patients see the right member of the practice team in an appropriate time-frame based on your clinical need. At the end of the symptom assessment, you can directly book an appointment to suit your needs and or receive advice relating to what you should do next. Once we have tested this service for a few weeks, we will add video consultations. To use Doctorlink, you will first need to register online either via https: app.doctorlink.com register or by downloading the app on your mobile device via Google Play or the App Store. Registration is simple and takes around 2-3 minutes. You must be 16 years to register but there is a facility to use the symptom checker on behalf of your child or for people within your care who are registered at the same practice. The usual methods of contacting the practice are still in place for those patients who may not be able to use a computer or do not have access to one.

RANDOM JOTTINGS

The Butterfly Effect

This story begins at the big house to which I was evacuated in 1939. There were eight children being cared for by the professor, his wife and daughter. It must have been very difficult to keep eight kids, separated from their families, amused. Winter evenings were often spent drawing at the kitchen table. In the summer we were given small jobs in the garden. We played on the green patch at the bottom of the garden, and one day we got out the hockey sticks stored away in the large shed. Here was a group of 7 to 10-year olds trying to wield these heavy sticks as big as they were. The inevitable happened, somebody was hurt. A big swing at the ball and his follow-through hit me right between the eyes. I was rushed back to the house where madam dressed the wound to the bridge of my nose and decided no stitch was needed.

I was treated with great care while the wound healed and, with a saltire of plaster in place, was allowed to join the family in their lounge, normally out of bounds, during the evenings. Here, I had my introduction to music on the gramophone. I was enthralled by Elgar's cello concerto, having no idea what I was listening to. A few months later I took this new-found love with me to my secondary school. Although we all loved the big bands of the day, the special friends I made had similar tastes to me in the classics. On returning to London following the war, this group of friends turned their attention more to girls of like minds and similar tastes. Several marriages resulted, including my own, which lasted for 63 years. As I approach the end of it, I remember how my life was influenced by a blow between the eyes.



NEWS FROM OUR LOCAL COUNCILS

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

Our Remembrance Sunday event on 10th November will start with a parade from Crafton Green, down Chapel Hill to the Memorial Gardens. All the organisations that have traditionally joined the parade have been contacted. We hope that as many residents as possible will gather in the Memorial Gardens for the act of remembrance. Please aim to arrive by 10.45 am.

Next year there will be an additional remembrance event on Friday 8 May to mark the 75th Anniversary of VE Day. VE Day, or Victory in Europe Day, marks the day towards the end of World War II when fighting against Nazi Germany came to an end in Europe. We would like to hear from any surviving veterans or people who have a close connection to a veteran so that we can involve them in the ceremony.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN CONSULTATION

The Neighbourhood Development Plan consultation period will be from 1 November until 13 December, hopefully taking place in the new Mountfitchet Exchange. VILLAGE POND

Senior residents in the village are telling us they can't remember the pond drying out as completely as it has this year. Hopefully it will start to replenish itself naturally once we get a bit of wet weather but it does raise concerns about how our changing weather patterns are going to impact on our natural environment. The dried out pond bed gives us an opportunity to assess how effective the spraying we did to try and eradicate invasive weeds has been, and the good news is that there is no sign of the weed that was causing us problems. The experts tell us that the weed roots could still be capable of spreading the problem again, so we are not being complacent and claiming victory just yet.



Affinity Water are already flagging up the prospect of hosepipe bans next year and urging all of us to be as economical as possible in our use of water.

7A SHUTTLE BUS SERVICE

The temporary 7A shuttle service between Cambridge Road Hargrave Estate Bentfield Road and the Mount-fitchet Estate ceased operation on 27 September. Until Abbotsford Bridge in Elsenham re-opens (likely to be late November at the earliest), it has been replaced by an 'on demand' minibus service operated by 24 x 7 Ltd.

The minibus runs on the same route as the 7A shuttle and to the same timetable BUT ONLY WHEN BOOKED TO RUN. Passengers wishing to use it must telephone '24 x 7' on 07534 586785 and give them at least two hours' notice and then wait at the time you have asked them to run at one of the bus stops on the 7A route. Please note, the driver is not required to stop anywhere except at designated bus stops. This service is only available MONDAY to FRIDAY. If you are making a return journey, bookings must be made for both the outward and return journeys. No fares will be charged on this shuttle bus. Wheelchairs and children's buggies (folded) can be carried.

It is to be hoped that this will be a more reliable service than the 7A shuttle previously operated by Trustybus. When Abbotsford Bridge re-opens the whole of the 7 service route structure will be reviewed and further changes are likely.

FLORAL DISPLAYS AND GRASS CUTTING

Despite the dry summer, our gardening contractors, GWB Horticullture, have received plaudits from villagers for the quality of the floral displays in the flower beds and hanging baskets. The owner of GWB, Gareth Broad, gets up very early to water the hanging baskets before traffic starts to build up.

M D Landscapes have also done a great job in keeping the grassed areas that the Parish Council are responsible for looking neat and tidy. Sadly the same cannot be said for some of the roadside verges, which Essex Highways are responsible for, which in some areas of the village are a real eyesore.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

CIIr Melvin Caton writes:

Stansted Airport

Stansted residents may recall that before the elections last May, Uttlesford councillors decided to delay the issuing of the Section 106 agreement associated with the grant of planning permission last November to expand the capacity of Stansted Airport to 44 million passengers per annum, in order to review its content and effectiveness. At a Special Council meeting in July the council asked the Planning Committee to review the decision including the Section 106 agreement.

The Planning Committee, with 50 of the members newly elected, is now holding a series of special meetings to learn the background to and the issues surrounding the airport application. Unfortunately, as I spoke against Airport expansion at the Planning Committee last November, I have had to step down from the Committee for this decision because I may be perceived as being biased. Geoffrey Sell is taking my place. It is hoped that the Committee will be able to make a decision by the end of November. It was recently revealed that Uttlesford has spent £90k on legal advice on this review to date.

Airport fly parking

I have persuaded the Scrutiny Committee at Uttlesford to launch an investigation into fly parking by airport users and staff on local residential roads in Stansted and other villages around the airport.

This was an issue that cropped up on the doorstep frequently during the local election campaign. The airport runs a hotline number 0800 731 2385 for residents to report suspected on-street airport-related parking. However, many people complained that no action is taken even after they report vehicles to the hotline.

In order to get more proof of the problem locally, and if you experience fly parking in your street, I would be grateful if you could please email a photo of the vehicle concerned, along with a note of the date, time and duration of the parking, to cllrcaton@uttlesford.gov.uk as well as reporting it to the hotline.

Climate Emergency

Both Uttlesford District and Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Councils have set up working groups to take action following their declarations of a Climate Emergency. I am a member of both groups which are seeking ideas and help from interested individuals and community organisations about what early wins and longer term goals they should be tackling. More tree planting and a refill initiative to reduce the use of throw way plastic bottles are already on the to do list at both parish and district levels.

District Council Commercial Investments

Finally, Stansted District Councillors have always argued that there needs to be a better framework for decisions about the district council's investment in commercial property (which is needed to generate income to replace funds lost in cuts to our central government grant). Unfortunately, that didn't happen before Uttlesford considered a £2m investment in student accommodation in Cambridge. We will continue to call for a more considered approach that seeks to reduce the cumulative financial risks to Uttlesford's Council Tax payers of any future investments.

Autumn brings a new season of activity when our volunteers begin coppicing trees. Coppice rotation is a sustainable method of woodland management. Jono Forgham, a science educator and conservationist, staged several lively, hands-on activities during the summer. Bug hunts and moth nights involving people of all ages have helped us assess what is living in the wood and the diversity of our insect life.



Insects are crucial to the food chain and maintaining the woodland ecosystem, but are a threat in high numbers. Many of our trees were blighted last spring by the November moth caterpillar, which munched through the canopy. Where trees had been coppiced, the level of bird predation of the caterpillar increased and there was less tree damage. This underlines the importance of our work in managing the balance of woodland flora and fauna.

The long-term challenge is dealing with climate change and disease. Last year's drought put enormous stress on trees, leading to significant losses across our countryside and encouraging disease. Ash trees are succumbing to chalara ash dieback, a fungal disease which may cost the UK £15bn. The Birchanger Wood Trust has set aside a considerable contingency to manage the disease, which means we are always looking for funds. Chalara is not the only disease. The oak processionary moth, whose caterpillars strip oaks of their leaves, was identified close by this summer and is bound to come here very soon. We are always on the lookout for volunteers; we meet every Saturday morning at the compound next to the water tower on Heath Row, Bishop's Stortford. You can also support us by buying our firewood. Look for future events on our website.

How to find out about Transport Options in our Area Living in this part of the UK has many advantages. We are surrounded by beautiful countryside and picturesque villages, have London and Cambridge within easy reach, and stately homes and interesting places to visit. However, rural living comes with its own set of issues, one of which is transport. Cuts to local bus services mean that for most of us a car is essential, but what happens when driving is no longer an option? Fortunately, there are alternatives, though tracking them down can be time-consuming and frustrating and what is available depends on where you live. For the over 60s who find public transport too difficult, Uttlesford Community Travel can be a godsend, as can the social car schemes like Helpline which ferry residents to medical appointments. For those who have been assessed as in medical need, there is the non-emergency hospital transport service. For a comprehensive overview of all local transport options offered by Uttlesford Frontline, a free fact sheet Getting Places is on our website. This includes: social car schemes; bus routes and timetables; DaRT (on demand) services with information as to which villages are covered, booking details and how to check which buses are disabledfriendly. There is also information about assistance if travelling by Greater Anglia rail, as well as at Stansted Airport. Details about concessionary bus passes, the Blue Badge Scheme and help with travel costs for medical appointments are included together with all contact details.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

This year our farmers celebrated the season of mellow fruitfulness with good crops of wheat, while the hedgerows have been well-stocked with crab apples, sloes, rose hips and hawthorn berries. Folklore hints that masses of fruits foretell a harsh winter to come; in reality the favourable conditions last spring enabled the flower buds formed the previous summer to blossom. Each year has its own unique pattern of weather with records of notable events. The spire of Finchingfield Church blew down during the great storm of February 1661. The inhabitants of Finchingfield suffered again as 16 barns were destroyed in the great storm of November 1703. The freezing conditions of the very cold winter of 1895 allowed the people of Saffron Walden to enjoy tobogganing by moonlight while folk in Dunmow held an ice carnival. There are many accounts of hot summers when wells ran dry or hail ruined crops.

Those who study long-term trends are concerned about the warming of the atmosphere, hotter summers and an increase in the frequency of storms which can cause serious flooding, damage to trees and property and loss of power. In May the UK Government declared a Climate Emergency with ambitious plans to plant 50 million trees per year across the country to help soak up carbon. Current tree cover in the Hundred Parishes is about 6 and any new trees will bring significant visual changes to its landscape. Trees produce timber, habitats for wildlife and reduce flooding risk. Groups of trees can modify the local climate by providing shade, cooling the air and making urban areas more attractive. To ensure that this project is successful, consideration must be given to the location of plantings and the most appropriate species, with maintenance plans so that these new trees thrive.

STORING WINE – DOS AND DON'TS



Ideally both red and white wines should be stored on their side, in the dark, away from vibration, and at a consistent temperature of about 12 C (not above 18 C or below 7 C). A cellar is ideal or an under-stairs cupboard or an unheated room would do fine. Some merchants provide good advice on how long to store wines along with tasting notes. Some will even store wines for you for a small charge. Perhaps you put away some red Bordeaux which you have been told will improve in 5-10 years. Because your storage temperature is not ideal your wine might mature more quickly so you decide to try after five years and find it has still not lost that mouth-puckering tannic clout. Fear not, you may be able to improve things by decanting or using a hand held aerator to aerate a single glass. Both options work well and can transform an immature wine. However, if your red wine has been left for years you are likely to find it has developed a sediment and thus needs decanting. Hopefully you will find it has developed lots of secondary flavours and be more interesting. However, if it is too old, over-oxidized and unpleasant it could still be used in sauces or frozen in ice cube containers to add to stocks later. Trying wines at regular intervals and keeping notes on their progress should avoid that happening.

Here are a few suggestions of wines to store away for a few years:

Brokenwood Semillon 2018, Hunter Valley, Waitrose £10; drink 2019 to 2030

Clos de Los Siete, Malbec 2016 Mendoza Argentina, Sainsburys and Costco £13-£17; drink 2019 to 2023 Ch Lalande D'Auvion, Medoc 2016, Waitrose £16; drink 2021 to 2030

The leaves were still hanging onto the trees and bushes and there was a very abundant supply of irresistibly large and very sweet blackberries, a variety of hips, apples and the bright red berries of the high climbing white Bryony (not edible and highly poisonous). There were also cobnuts and some sloe berries.



HATFIELD FOREST

As autumn turns to winter, nature focuses on hibernation and resting through the colder months. It is also a crucial time to continue our conservation work. Our major project this year is to rediscover the forest views which the Houblon family cherished in Georgian times. Work has started to clear hawthorn scrubland on the western side of the lake which has taken hold since the 1940s, blocking views towards the north of the Forest. Landscape historian Dr Sarah Rutherford's research has revealed the extent of Capability Brown's design for the lake area, showing open parkland, peppered with magnificent specimen trees.



Henry Bexley, the Forest's Operations Manager, said, We have an early 1800s map, which shows every tree in its correct location. Once the scrub hawthorn is removed, we can replant young trees to restock it. We cannot wait to reveal some really special views of the lake and its surroundings, unseen for the last 70 years. All the new trees will come from the Forest's own nursery, grown from seeds gathered on site. For details visit: http://bit.ly/hatfieldLakesideRestoration.

The rest of the Forest also needs our care; please keep to hard-standing paths to allow the woodland to regenerate, or save your visits for the drier summer months. The speaker for our October meeting was Michael Abel, a former commercial fruit grower and lecturer at Writtle College. The size of a fruit tree depends on the rootstock on which it is grafted; fruit trees on their own roots will grow too large for most gardens. Dwarf or semi-dwarf rootstock will produce trees varying from a height of 2m up to 6m. Family trees, where different varieties are grafted onto the rootstock, are becoming popular as patio container plants. Pruning reduces tree size and promotes vigour for fruit production. Vigorous vertical growth and downward growth should be pruned out as horizontal growth is the most productive. Use winter pruning to promote vigour, and prune in summer to reduce it. Pruning also controls diseases by cutting out dead wood and fungal infections. It lets in air and light which reduces scab and promotes bud formation and good fruit colour. It is essential to understand the difference between fruit buds which are fat, and vegetative buds which are more pointed. Fruit size can be improved by generous thinning of fruit in the early stages of growth. Pest control using grease bands, barrier glue, and pheromone traps was discussed and the promotion of beneficial insects such as ladybirds, earwigs, hoverflies and lacewings was recommended. Birds devour vast numbers of caterpillars and should be encouraged. A lively discussion followed.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 6th November 7.30pm for 8.00pm at the Day Centre, when Chris Day will talk about *Taming the Indoor Jungle - Houseplants made Easy.* Refreshments are available prior to the meeting. Visitors are always welcome.

Nature Notes

The Beautiful Woodcock

With another beast from the east threatening to cause a mighty cold winter ahead, our thoughts go out to the wild-life that will have to endure another severe season with little break from the elements. However, there are a few creatures which will thrive. One species which migrates to our shores and can be found locally is woodcock; this is quite remarkable as they do not seem adapted for snow and ice. It is a pigeon-sized wading bird with short legs and a

long straight tapering bill. It is largely nocturnal, spending most of the day in dense cover in woods. Most of the birds in the UK are residents, but in the autumn birds migrate from Finland and Russia



to winter here. They are often seen when flushed out of a bramble patch or a pile of rotten logs in woodland; they fly low and fast, flicking from left to right, keeping below the tree canopy. Whilst on the ground they have amazing camouflage and are quite brave; you can stand right next to one and not notice it.



Can you spot the baby woodcock?

Unfortunately, they are still prized in the shooting world even though their numbers are declining. There is a well-established club: 'The Shooting Times Woodcock Club'; membership is obtained by shooting a right-and-left flying woodcock. This year's black-tie event was held at the Saville Club in London with speaker Sir Nicholas Soames. Amazing to think a club still exists that celebrates killing a rare bird! Members wear a lapel badge that shows four pin feathers, as the woodcock has one tiny pin feather on each wing; these are considered to be one of the finest artists' brushes available and are used by Rolls Royce for pin stripe detailing.

UGLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

She worked on the film Suffragette in 2015 and did a lot of research into the subject, the fruits of which she shared with us. She gave us an interesting account of working on the film and then told the history of the Suffragettes quoting Mrs Pankhurst's words when on trial. Lucy visited Mrs Pankhurst's house in Nelson Street, Manchester - a moving occasion for her. She explained that Suffragists acted within the law whilst Suffragettes acted outside the law; it was the Daily Mail that dubbed them suffragettes. Lucy ended her thought-provoking, moving and informative talk with another verse of the anthem The March of the Women and left us reflecting on how much we owed those brave women who were prepared to march and suffer to gain the right to vote: something we take for granted today. Our next meeting, to be held on **Wednesday 20th November** at 2.15pm in Ugley Village Hall, will see the return of popular speaker Brian Carline who will be taking us back to the days of Dolly Blue and Izal. The 2018 Stansted Airport Planning Application should be considered entirely afresh.

That is the verdict of leading planning barrister Paul Stinchcombe C in an independent legal opinion prepared for Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE). The full legal advice has now been published and can be viewed on our website. The

C s opinion sets out the key precedents in planning law and confirms that Uttlesford District Council (UDC) is lawfully entitled to reconsider the entire Planning Application. A number of new material factors which have arisen since the application was provisionally approved last year mean there is an obligation to reconsider. The Cs advice explains that, provided there are good reasons, the new Planning Committee could lawfully reach a different planning judgment from the former Committee who, by the slenderest of margins (the Chairman's additional casting vote), provisionally approved the Application last November. It is worth noting that the five members of the former Planning Committee who voted in favour of the expansion plans last year are no longer councillors, whereas the five who opposed it were all re-elected and continue to serve on the Committee.

Importantly, the legal advice also points out that UDC could support SSE s High Court challenge for the Planning Application to be treated as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). If the case is won, the responsibility for the application would automatically transfer to the Secretary of State for Transport thereby removing the risk of a costs award against UDC as well as the costs of a public Inquiry.
