STANSTED SURGERY CORONAVIRUS UPDATE

We have implemented new measures to help us protect the community and our healthcare staff during the current COVID-19 outbreak. The online booking of appointments has been suspended until further notice. We are also asking all patients, regardless of travel history, with cold- and flu-like symptoms, including all respiratory problems, such as cough, ear pain, shortness of breath or an elevated temperature to go online and complete the risk assessment on the NHS 111 website: www.111.nhs.uk/covid-19. The advice given by NHS 111 must be followed, and you may be required to provide evidence that you have completed the risk assessment if you have been signposted to the surgery by NHS 111. You can also call 111 if you do not have on-line facilities available.

We respectfully request that patients do not attend the surgery unless you have completed the screening process. Expect additional questioning by our reception team when contacting the surgery; we cannot book surgery appointments without obtaining certain information from patients. We understand that the new measures will be inconvenient and cause anxiety, but it is vital that we all work together to stay safe. If you have questions or concerns, please contact the surgery, and we will ask a GP to call you. We will probably need to change how we work again in the weeks to come, so please keep an eye on the surgery website for updates, or follow us on our Facebook page. We will also send out regular updates via text message, so please ensure we have your up-to-date mobile phone number. We appreciate your support in helping us keep the community safe.

Supporting Carers in Stansted to Stay Healthy

There are over 145,000 carers in Essex who look after a relative or friend who, due to ill health, physical or mental illness, disability, frailty or addiction cannot manage without their help. Carers First supports adult carers by providing specialist information and advice regarding their caring role. For many, caring is a rewarding and positive experience, but for others caring can feel overwhelming without the right help and support. For some, caring can trigger feelings of loneliness and frustration and many find their physical and emotional health, work or finances are often affected.

We go to carers rather than asking carers to come to us. We run groups and activities which give people the opportunity to get a break and meet other carers. The team are

frequently in Stansted and hold four carers groups across Uttlesford. Team leader Fiona Langridge said "My team are already supporting carers in Stansted but I believe there are many more carers in this area who could and should be supported in their caring role. Carers provide vital support to those they care for, and it is important that



they can access support and consider their own wellbeing alongside their caring role. We would encourage anyone who is looking after a relative or friend to contact us to find out what support is available. If you know a carer please put them in touch with us." BRAIN TRAINING

Upper back mobility is critical for a healthy spine and for all sports involving any rotation. A good way to mobilise a stiff upper back is to get a *Theraband resistance band*, throw it around your upper back, high under the armpits, grab each end with your hands and straighten your arms out from your chest. Push your upper back into the band, looking down a bit. Swallow, so the tongue is in the roof of the mouth and cross your eyes, looking at the bridge of your nose. Pray the wind does not change direction. Next, keeping your arms stuck straight out, push your chest out, as if drawing it away from the band. Smile like a loon, squeeze your eyes tight shut and bring your teeth together. Keep your arms and shoulders completely still and your chin level with the floor. The point of the face pulling is not to make you look foolish: the parts of the brainstem that encourage flexion are activated by any tongue exercise (you could gaggle those geese if you want) and by crossing the eyes. Big smile, squeeze the eyes and bring the teeth together; this helps activate the part of the brainstem that encourages opening up, or extension.



Upper backs need to be able to both flex and extend. The hardest part of the exercise is keeping the shoulders out of it. For most people, their upper back movement is small at first. If you find you seem to be able to move forwards and backwards a lot, the chances are that you are just moving your shoulders. A safety note: do check your band is not cut or perished, as it can be nasty if it suddenly rips under tension.

ACTIVITY GROUP FOR DEMENTIA SUFFERERS

People living with dementia can now benefit from a weekly Activity Group in Dunmow run by Essex charity *Action for Family Carers*. Over 50 people in the area already attend similar groups mixing with others and participating in a variety of mentally and physically stimulating activities ranging from seated exercise, indoor bowling, reminiscence discussions and games, often including music.

Action for Family Carers has taken over management of the groups which were previously run by the Alzheimer's Society. The groups are led by a small team of professional and caring staff and many dedicated local volunteers. Morning sessions, Keeping Active, focus on physical activity; afternoon sessions, Active Minds, focus on activities to stimulate the mind. Physical activity is an important part of a healthy lifestyle and can help overall wellbeing. It can give opportunities to spend time with others, reducing isolation and loneliness and support people to continue being independent. Cognitive stimulation involves activities and exercises that stimulate thinking, concentration, communication and memory in the dementia sufferer. It involves discussing day-to-day interests, reminiscence and information relating to the current time and place. The Activity Group takes place in the Dourdan Pavilion, Dunmow on Mondays 10.00am-12.30pm and 1.00pm-3.30pm; new members are welcome. Sessions cost £18 but you can try it out with a free taster session; call Clare Savva on 07851 249707 or email clare.savva@affc.org.uk.

Seeking Help from Frontline

Love it or loathe it, the internet has become integral to our daily lives. It is not always easy to navigate through hundreds of websites to find just what we are looking for, especially as regards matters of health and wellbeing. Where can you turn to find reliable and up-to-date information if you are a carer looking for support, or you have a loved one with dementia? Frontline is a digital service pioneered by Citizens Advice and supported by Essex County Council and the West Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (NHS) and is simple to use. It is invaluable when it comes to finding out what is available locally and who can provide genuine assistance for someone who is housebound, suffering from depression, needs to exercise or is disabled etc. You can search under the following categories: Advice, Family, Older People, Mental Health, Disability, Addiction, Transport and Wellbeing.

It is worth browsing through the entire **Frontline** library to see the range of help available locally; there are currently 196 services and it is often possible to self-refer rather than going through a GP. There are also detailed fact sheets about local transport, complaints about local healthcare providers and planning ahead for later life. If you prefer to telephone call **Healthwatch Essex** on 0300 500 1895 (charged at local rate) Monday to Friday 9.00am-5.00pm.



There will be the usual catering and the chance to meet our beekeeper and turners of our wood. Light, fun music will be provided by the Ukes of Hazard band and there will be children's activities.

HATFIELD FOREST

Hatfield Forest is an ancient site, but sometimes it takes modern technology to reveal information about its past. A survey carried out in the gravel pit area has given us a glimpse back to the last Ice Age. Our researchers made two-metre boreholes to explore biodiversity and geology here. This area is unique, with a seam of sandy gravel amid a sea of Essex boulder clay. It was discovered that the lower levels of gravel were completely exhausted by ancient quarrying.

A wide range of stones and pebbles were found, including flints, sandstone and quartzite. These are thought to have been deposited by an early channel of the River Thames, before it was forced south to its current location at the onset of the last Ice Age. The gravel and sand quarried here was a prized and locally rare material used for road building, including the Roman Stane Street, now the B1256 through Takeley. Elsewhere, our new Environment Agency-funded aerators are helping to combat oxygen depletion in the lake, caused by blue-green algae.



Many visitors will remember the cygnets our resident swans raised last summer. In September one of the brood was found injured and volunteer Ranger Gerry Wallace took it to the Swan Sanctuary at Shepperton, Middlesex for treatment. The cygnet's damaged hip was treated and after regaining full mobility he was released onto the sanctuary's main lake. April kicks off our summer season. 

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

We live in an increasingly detached society where people do not even know the names of the people living next door. People can buy items without as much as saying "hello" to another human being. An even greater challenge is the lack of responsibility people have for their own actions because they are able to hide behind a computer screen or keyboard. The latest emphasis on #BeKind surely illustrates how far we as communities have strayed, that something as simple as being kind is having to go viral in order to be achieved?

In church the other week we read the parable of the prodigal son (Luke, Chapter 15, verses 11-32), and we focused on the importance of celebration and being free to rejoice in the good things we have. We also looked briefly at the older brother; he was not able to join the celebration because he was so focused on what his younger brother had done wrong, that he could not rejoice in how much love the father had for his son. In a society where relationships are increasingly stretched, where we are having to consciously choose to #BeKind, let us take up the challenge: it is one thing to be mindful of our own lives, what we do or do not have and either rejoice or despair; it is something completely different to be able to be mindful of someone else's life and to share in their joy or offer a hand in their despair. Let us not take ourselves away, watch from a distance, hide behind a screen like the older brother; let us find ways to engage with others in our communities, putting differences aside and showing unconditional kindness.

NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

CRAFTON GREEN HOUSE CONSULTATION

Crafton Green House has served as the council offices for many years. It is a community asset and, as such, it is right to give the community a chance to have their say on its future. The Parish Council will consider all the responses, but the overriding factor in the decision on Crafton Green House's future will come down to the cost versus benefit outcomes for the community.

There are various groups in our community who will have different ideas and wishes for the future of the building. Some businesses would like to see it demolished to make way for extra car parking. There are charities who would like to use it for outreach work and for enrichment programmes for the village.

Possible Options are:-

Attempt to lease the building without any refurbishment.

This is unlikely to be possible due to the state of the building fabric. There is no disabled access and this could not be achieved without significant funding. Even without refurbishment, car parking for any lessee would have to be found or created. This will require several spaces to be reserved in a car park that is already at capacity. The Parish Council's view is that leasing the building in this manner would lead to further deterioration in the condition of the building, and that the returns on any lease would be well below market rates. The parish would have to cover the costs of keeping and maintaining the building until it is leased, as well as fund and repair any further deterioration.

2. Refurbish the building and then attempt to lease it.

Quotes to put the building into a suitable state of repair to get the maximum return on a lease have been received and are in the order of £100,000 - £120,000. This is money that the parishioners would have to fund through the precept - or at least service a loan for the work - this would add £10 to the precept of a band D property. The property might command a rental of £20,000 per year exclusive of services and business rates which, after repaying the repair costs, would be a boost to the PC's income. The downsides are that its use may require a significant number of parking spaces

to be allocated with at least ten spaces reserved. This would effectively prevent any significant expansion of the existing car park. Once again, the parish would also have to cover the costs of keeping the building until it is leased, as well as fund and repair any further deterioration.

3. Demolish the building completely and redesign the car park.

Probably the most emotive of the options. However, the land freed up after demolition together with the grassed area would probably permit another 25-30 parking spaces to be added to the 52 spaces currently available. The upside is simple in that there would be a substantial increase in offstreet parking and the demolition of the building would immediately remove the costs of the upkeep. There would be extra income from the additional parking charges, 50% of which comes to the parish. The downside is that we would be losing an asset that has, on paper, a substantial value. The cost of this would be funded by UDC, along with a grant of £70,000 from the North Essex Parking Partnership, who would reclaim partial costs from the Parish Council's share of car parking charges. The Parish Council should see a financial gain in the region of £12,500 per annum after costs have been repaid.

4. Private Sale to return to residential use.

A valuation of the building gives an approximate sale price, in its present state, of £250,000 (subject to planning permission being granted). In addition, 2-3 parking spaces plus a plot for a substantial garden would need to be provided. Assuming the price could be achieved there would be a capital gain to the Parish Council funds. The downside to this option is that the Crafton Green site would be broken up and all the land which would otherwise have been available to expand the car park and Day Centre would be lost. The appeal of the building as a residential property is limited with its proximity to the car park and Day Centre. This would also be against council policy which is to retain the whole site for the community.

5. Use the building for community use.

It had been considered that a community hall could be built on the site incorporating the Day Centre. Having looked at the scale of the community centre in Manuden and the population of Stansted as well as the future car parking needs generated by another community building, it is considered that this site is too small for this option. The expenses and upkeep would fall to the parish.

6. Extend the car park by approx. 15 spaces on to the green area and then lease as per options 1 or 2.

There is an option to use the green space at the back of Crafton Green House to provide extra car parking for up to 15 cars. This would, once more, rely on parishioners paying through the precept for the car park redesign. Adding that cost to the £100,000 - £120,000 refurbishment costs of CG house would seem to exclude it as an option. Several car parking spaces would need to be set aside for the building's lessee so the net gain to the parish would be severely reduced.

NOTES:

- Rental income cannot be guaranteed, this is going to be a difficult building to lease.
- •Crafton Green House will cost the Parish Council a minimum of £8,000 pa to keep empty, this will only cover the business rates.
- •Disabled Access will have to be provided in any scenario where the building is kept. This would be at an approximate cost of £25,000 £30,000 and greater if a lift needs to be installed.
- •We are committed to repaying the Forest Hall Section 106 fund as soon as possible.

It is the Parish Council's position that the land should remain in the ownership of the parish if possible. The Parish Council would still own the land of an extended car park.

HELP YOURSELF AND THE PLANET

Hopefully everyone is aware that climate change is happening with the impacts not only affecting distant Australia but the streets, schools and homes in this village or, to put it another way, hurting all of us young and old.

The Parish Council has launched an initiative to identify ways in which every person of any age can contribute now to improve our environment for the benefit of all and perhaps most importantly for the lives of our children.

Actions by governments will determine long term the fate of people across the world, but we, and that means you, have a contribution to make now to begin the recovery.

- Reconsider how we travel more walking, cycling and better public transport coupled with fewer diesel vehicles and more electric/hybrid cars. These actions will contribute to better health through breathing less polluted air and more exercise.
- Examine what we eat and buy. This is not a campaign to make you vegan but to look again at the balance in our diets, to avoid air freighted foods and, critically, to cut waste (if you buy it, eat it or give it away).

Make our views known to District and County Councils to push them to implement major tree planting schemes, to plan that new developments are carbon neutral and designed to make walking, cycling and the use of public transport safer and more pleasurable.

Moving even higher, Members of Parliament must be under no illusions that the Government must implement and fund the major changes needed to transform sources of energy and the reduction of dangerous emissions. Coordinated planning action must be a priority not an afterthought.

Any local initiative must involve the whole community – no one should opt out and pass the buck. The most important groups may be school children and young people whose lives will be blighted or blessed depending upon the determination to solve these problems.

NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Cllr Alan Dean writes:

In February I collected my first book in many years from Stansted's new library. A splendid new facility! The challenge for me is to get through nearly 600 pages in three weeks. I will have found out by then how to renew the book.

Uttlesford faces the biggest crisis in my 33 years as a district councillor. What do we councillors do about the Local Plan? My colleague, Ayub Khan, set out in March's *Link* the background to the soundness of the latest Plan being challenged by Inspectors from the Planning Inspectorate for England and Wales.

Preparation of a new Local Plan for the Uttlesford District is now in its fifteenth year. That is an incredibly long time. As Ayub implied, all our towns, villages and countryside fields are now open to applications for unplanned, speculative development by opportunist landowners and developers.

I fear the situation is made much worse, now that UDC is controlled by a party that made a populist promise, if elected, to scrap the Plan and, with a blank sheet of paper, ask voters what they wanted to replace the existing Plan. Out would go proposals in which most development would be focussed on three new, high quality Garden Settlements near Great Chesterford, Little Easton and Stebbing. There is little chance that the Residents for Uttlesford Party majority will have any more success than the former MP had when he asked all parishes what growth they would like.

As things stand, as I write this in early March, the Council is due to decide its next steps on the last day of the month. I suspect a decision on whether to start again from scratch or to improve the present Plan will take a little longer. January's decision at Uttlesford to refuse the airport's planning application for expansion to 43 million passengers annually has been matched by West Somerset Council's decision in early February to reject expansion at Bristol Airport on the same grounds as here - the Climate Emergency and aviation's carbon emissions. A hat-trick (if you think it's a positive feat) was scored by the end of February, when the Court of Appeal struck down the 2018 legislation that had given Heathrow preliminary planning permission to build a third runway. Why? On related grounds to the refusals at Bristol and Stansted: the government had failed to take into account at Heathrow its commitments made under the 2016 Paris Agreement on Climate Change. So, it seems for the first time that the environment is being ranked before the economy and some types of jobs. Whilst that may concern some residents of Stansted, it seems that airport passenger number are stagnant or in decline, potentially making the airport operator's planning application unnecessary.

THE LAND OF FIRE AND ICE

Arriving on the island of Iceland on a gloomy January afternoon was like stepping onto an alien planet with huge empty skies and a biting wind. For the first two nights we stayed in a small hotel situated miles from anywhere: a perfect place to see the Northern Lights, and we were treated to spectacular displays. The first day we travelled along Iceland's only main road to Thingvellir National Park and walked along a rift valley caused by the shifting of tectonic plates, dwarfed by towering rock formations scattered with snow and ice. Iceland is the most sparsely populated country in Europe and one of the most geologically active places in the world. We saw the thunderous Gullfoss waterfall - an awesome sight - and the Great and Little Geysirs who 'perform' frequently so it doesn't do to stand too close!

Next day we were up early to visit the man-made **Blue Lagoon**, a spa located in a lava field near **Grindelia**. The hot water, a byproduct from the nearby geothermal power plant, averages temperatures of 37-39 °C and is a milky blue colour due to the soft white silica mud on the bottom of the lake, which bathers rub on themselves. The mud and the salt-rich water is supposed to be good for the skin, and I must say the locals did all have a healthy glow (although that could have been due to the cold wind).

We stayed in a large modern hotel in Iceland's capital city for the remainder of our trip. Reykjavik is compact, charming and, just like everywhere else we'd been, the people were very friendly and spoke perfect English. Hallgrimskirkja, the parish church, is an impressive 74.5 metres (244 ft) high and one of the tallest structures in the country. Our visit to Iceland had been short but definitely memorable.



Pall bearers carried wooden poles to carry the coffin into church, with a horse drawn hearse and a family vault. The poor would borrow the parish coffin and pall, returning them before burial, a hand wheeled bier and shared graves with no memorial. In addition to their funeral work, Daniel Robinson does a great deal of work for charity. This talk was of particular interest as one of the proposed resolutions for June's National Federation of Women's Institutes Annual meeting is talking about death and dying.

Some fascinating history lies behind the views from train windows during journeys from Stansted. This was brought vividly to light by Terry Ward, our March speaker, who gave a fascinating talk on Taking A Trip from London to Cambridge. If you have ever wondered why Cambridge station is such a long walk from the town centre, it was apparently to help prevent the potential moral corruption of students by making it more difficult for them to get to London. Cambridge originally had four stations. The line and stations were constructed from 1845; later stations included Harlow Town in 1960. The station architecture and design vary from Victorian grandeur to brutalist minimal, popular in the 1960s. Amongst the sad losses are the railway workers' cottages and, with continuing modernisation, the old signal boxes are unlikely to survive. The original station at Saffron Walden was funded by the Quaker movement who hoped to convert the Irish construction workers to the Quaker cause; needless to say, they failed. Audley End station was requested and part-funded by the Braybrooke family who lived in Audley End House. The railway line also led to the demise of the canals and the need for coaching inns, and was a significant factor in the development of commerce and trade. As Britain became an industrialised and prosperous nation, factories and warehouses were constructed close to the railway lines.

Nature Notes

Buttercups

There are many different types of buttercups, and this amazing plant is said to be 130 million years old; it belongs to the Ranunculus family. It is one of the best known of all the wild flowers, easily recognised by children. Once upon a time, children were asked if they liked butter, whilst a fond aunt might hold a buttercup under their chin. The glow from the shiny petals ensured everyone did indeed like butter.



In spite of looking cheery in the meadows, livestock avoid eating it due to its toxicity. The leaves are an irritant and can cause blistering to the mouths of cattle. Most animals have the sense to be wary of eating it. This blistering effect is of use to the herbalist. Bizarre as it seems, there are conditions that require this treatment, said to be of benefit to those suffering painful joints or gout. Blisters on the wrists can relieve rheumatism. Certain severe headaches can be cured by applying the juice to the nostrils, and the violent sneezing was thought to bring about a cure. John Wesley recommended the buttercup as a plaster which would be applied to the head in the case of severe headaches. The resulting blisters were said to bring about relief. The homeopathic preparation of buttercup is used for similar complaints as rheumatic and neuralgic conditions, skin eruptions, shingles and herpes. Cicely Mary Barker wrote in her Flower Fairy book:

'Tis I whom children love the best; My wealth is all for them; For them is set each glossy cup upon each sturdy stem.

O little playmates whom I love! The sky is summer-blue,
And meadows full of buttercups are spread abroad for you.

Stansted Passenger Numbers continue to slide

The airport handled 1.9 million passengers in January, 30,000 fewer than the same month last year, making this its seventh consecutive month of decline. Several reasons have been suggested for Stansted's decline over the seven months including the non-delivery of Boeing 737 Max aircraft to Ryanair, the collapse of Thomas Cook and now also the Coronavirus. Stansted's main competitor, Luton Airport, achieved 6.8% growth in passenger numbers during the second half of 2019 whereas Stansted passenger numbers fell by 2.5%. These figures are surprising in view of the

many new routes which Stansted has announced in recent months, suggesting that many of its well-established routes have declined quite sharply. Stansted's cargo business also continues to be in decline with the tonnage carried in January down by 20.2% compared to the same month last year. This follows a 9.6% decline in cargo tonnage in 2019. These latest Stansted Airport traffic figures provide further confirmation that there is no need to approve further expansion at Stansted for the foreseeable future. The local community is entitled to some long-term peace of mind.

One of the delights of a woodland walk on a sunny April day is the sweet scent wafting from bluebells. One of our best-loved wildflowers, with half of the world's population found in the UK, it is typically associated with ancient woodlands but can also occur along hedgerows. The narrow glossy leaves and flower spikes are produced from deeply rooted bulbs supported by specialised symbiotic fungus. Flowers are deep violet-blue, white or pink; they are narrow, tubular-bell shaped, with tips that curl backwards, and the pollen is cream. After pollination by honeybees and other insects many green capsules form containing ripe black seeds which are shaken from the capsules by breezes or animals.



The Spanish bluebell has broader leaves and pale blue, unscented flowers with blue pollen; flowers are arranged around an upright stem. Recent research has found that the native species has a genetic advantage due to larger numbers and greater fertility and so should continue to thrive. You can see bluebells along the Hertfordshire Way as it passes through Sidehill Wood and Mill Wood in Much Hadham and Howe Wood in Littlebury beside Strethall Road as it crosses over the M11 motorway. Several walks described on our website pass through woodlands. Walk no 4 goes through a fine bluebell wood at Rickling whilst the longer walk 20 meanders through Mill Wood. 
