

Be aware that footpaths across the fields which form part of the Stortford North Developments may be subject to temporary closure. We will monitor this and try to ensure closure is not permanent, and routes are kept open during construction. Countryside and Rights of Way monthly news has a new online eNews version. Herts County Council and East Herts District Council are currently drafting a cycle corridor study from the Lea Valley to Stansted Airport via Harlow and Bishop's Stortford, which is very detailed and full of interesting possibilities. The latest Essex/Uttlesford Cycling Strategy Document produced in 2018 does not identify any flagship route for Stansted village, although it does state that with the right infrastructure and incentives from employers at and around the airport, the share of cycling by employees could grow significantly - and now there is the addition of the college at the airport.

It is with sadness we report that our former secretary, Anne Lowe, died on 6th December after a long illness. She had suffered from cancer for several years, and although it was terminal she was about to start chemotherapy at the beginning of December; but unfortunately the cancer spread rapidly and she was too ill to receive it.

No safe limit for air pollution

Recent research published in the British Medical Journal has shown that airborne emissions of fine carbon particles known as PM_{2.5} can have serious health impacts even when the level of concentration is below the World Health Organisation's quideline limits for air pollution. PM_{2.5} emanates from fuel combustion and is one of the major issues associated with airport expansion, because of the additional air pollution from increased flights and road traffic. The research confirms previously established associations between PM_{2.5} and respiratory and cardiovascular diseases, Parkinson's and diabetes, plus evidence of health impacts not previously associated with PM_{2.5} including septicaemia, fluid and electrolyte disorders, skin infections and infections of the urinary tract. Stansted Airport is already a major source of PM_{2.5} air pollution and was required to provide a report, which showed that if its planning application to increase throughput from 35 to 43 million passengers per annum were to be approved, the airport would be responsible for putting 13.6 tonnes of PM_{2.5} per annum into the air that we, as local residents, have to breathe. That is 25% more than today, which is wholly unacceptable, when this new research removes all doubt as to the connection between airborne pollution from fine carbon particles and severe health impacts upon the local population. The paramount duty of Uttlesford District Council is to do all that it can to safeguard the health of its local residents.





NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

THE MOUNTFITCHET EXCHANGE

By the time you read this The Mountfitchet Exchange should be fully fitted out and functioning as a home for the library service and The Parish Council. You can also access District and County Council services, the Citizens Advice Bureau, and contact Nicki, our Police Community Support Officer. We intend to hold an official ceremony to celebrate the opening of the new building sometime in the Spring.

There will be a member of the Parish Council staff on the front desk from 9.00am until 4.00pm on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday and from 9.00am until 1.00pm on Wednesday. There will also be Essex County Council librarians available during their opening hours. Books can still be returned and issued outside the library opening hours using a self-scanning machine. The library computers will also be available but there will be no support available if a librarian is not present. See page 20 for more details of Stansted Library opening hours and what the Library Service offers. You will also be able to access basic photocopying and printing services at reasonable rates. Library and Parish Council staff will be happy to help you with this. This kind of service has not been available in the village since the closure of Millways so we are very pleased to offer this to residents and businesses.



Many of you will have had a glimpse inside the building when it was used as a polling station for the December General Election, but if you haven't had a chance to have a look inside yet, please feel free to drop in and see what our new community building has to offer.

FLOOD DANGERS

Heavy rain just before Christmas resulted in a warning, generated by the sensors that the Parish Council have fitted in the brook, of potential flooding in the village. When we get a warning like this it is essential the culverts that carry all the water that runs off the fields are kept clear of any blockages. As a lot of debris gets washed down, we rely on our volunteer flood wardens to put on their wellies and waterproofs to keep the grids on the culverts clear.



Our photograph shows two volunteers working hard at the culvert in Gall End Lane where the grills often get clogged up with vegetation. If this isn't cleared fairly promptly, there is a high probability that water will quickly build up, the brook will break its bank, and flood water will quickly spread down into Lower Street, threatening residential and commercial properties. We currently have eight people who have volunteered to be first call flood wardens, but there is never any guarantee that they will be available to respond to a flood warning. This was certainly the case with the most recent flood alert as most of the wardens were at work and several were away on holiday. We desperately need more volunteers, so please consider offering your services by contacting the Parish Council office.

Our climate problems seem pretty insignificant compared to what other parts of the UK and wider world are facing, and our thoughts as we write are very much with the Indonesian people suffering dreadful flooding, and the devastating bush fires in Australia.

That said, we need to do everything we can to protect our own village and also make a determined effort to make sure our individual households and the wider community do their bit to try and minimise the negative impact our activities have on climate change. To this end a **Climate Change Group** is being established in the village. A fuller article on this will appear in next month's Link, but in the meantime if you would like to get involved in this group please contact the Parish Council office.

MEET YOUR COUNCILLORS

The second of our profiles focuses on Vice Chairman, Fran Richards. Fran has lived in the village for 43 years and has served as a Parish Councillor for 16 years. She is now retired after spending her working life as a children's nurse specialist and a health visitor.

The Vice Chairman should be ready to chair meetings of the Full Council in the absence of the Chairman, and is a member of all the committees, so they need to keep themselves fully briefed on all aspects of the council's work. In addition, Fran chairs the personnel sub-committee and is the Parish Council's representative on the Day Centre Management Committee.

As well as her council work, she is a member of the Essex Foster Parent Panel and is active in the outreach work for the Free Church.



Fran has a granddaughter who lives nearby, so she spends a lot of time with her and also enjoys her walks around the village with her dog, Nelson.

NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Cllr Alan Dean writes:

And so, into a new decade. The Roaring Twenties again? They last led to the 1930s; a decade whose repeating would be most unwelcome. Yet, once again, there is significant uncertainty about our national future, just as the future for Uttlesford district and its council remains unclear. By the time Link drops through letterboxes, we may at last know whether the Local Plan has been given a green light by planning inspectors. As September became October and turned to November, we were promised an answer. Then a General Election became the latest excuse for procrastination. I daren't predict the reason if there is yet another delay! Meanwhile, work has continued at UDC to set up delivery boards for the proposed garden communities near the Chesterfords and the Eastons. The boards comprise planners, developers and councillors with the remit to work out the best possible designs for future housing and community needs. The opponents remain active, preferring such alternatives as the restoration of centuries-long-gone hunting forests instead of the bricks and mortar of homes for future local workers and other people wanting a place to live round here. In early 2020, community forums will also be set up, so that present and future residents can help shape these new places over future decades.

Any new forestry means the planting of trees, and new trees definitely are needed; probably not as an alternative to new homes, but certainly as one of many ways of offsetting our nett carbon emissions. December's council meeting approved the council's second motion on the climate emergency in just under five months. The July declaration of a climate emergency sadly hasn't yet resulted in any action to reduce local carbon emissions. There isn't, so far, even a plan of future actions. Not good! So, in December councillors put forward an outline plan that includes planting a tree per resident in the next year and 10,000 trees each year thereafter. The motion called for new planning policy to require one tree per bedroom to be planted for each new build property in the district, with at least two trees to be planted to replace any tree which cannot be retained. Well, that would have been fine, but trees cost money for saplings and for land. That's where uncertainty came into the debate. The majority council group refused to commit to putting any money into the next year's budget to make this and other things happen. They hope that central government will dole out grants for tree planting; a hope that takes us back to my first paragraph on uncertainty. Do we have a new national government that is firmer in its commitment to real action on the climate emergency than UDC yet appears to have? Having listened to Greta Thunberg and Sir David Attenborough on Radio 4's Today on the very day I wrote this piece, I have to be optimistic, like Sir David, that generations younger than mine will take the view that an emergency requires real, cool action rather than dreamlike, warm words.

Of course, everything ends up in a discussion about money. The council continues to borrow to invest in science parks, student accommodation and shopping/leisure centres to replace the vital income lost through cuts in central government grants. That's a high-risk financial initiative made necessary by the political avoidance of direct taxation. Only time will tell whether the uncertainty this brings will have been a wise move or a foolish wheeze to hide the true cost of public services.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY - SIGNPOSTS

It is easy to take for granted the helpful signposts to be found at many of our road junctions, yet they are part of our culture and heritage. Early road signs were erected by cycling and later, motoring organisations as ordinary people began to enjoy the freedom afforded by ownership of a bicycle or motor car. Standards for signage on main roads were redefined in the 1960s to satisfy faster traffic and night visibility. Fingerposts that indicate direction and distance from rural junctions are frequently much older and can merit further investigation.

Fingerposts, with arms pointing in several directions, are white with black lettering, and generally made of wood or iron. Many local examples, some almost 100 years old, were made of iron at Maldon Iron Works.



On the B1039 between Chrishall and Great Chishill, a finger points to a non-existent Great **Chishall**.



Some signs have information on the back, albeit hidden from view. This signpost points to Broxted and Bps Stortford, but the back reveals that it has been recycled and once pointed to Wimbish Green.



My favourites include this fingerpost at Matching Green indicating the mileage to London - precisely 26¼, and another one north of High Roding that points to Takeley Station which closed 60 years ago.



This Henham sign shows the way, not only to local villages, but also to the pub, the Ugley Chequers.



As you travel along the lanes, please take a look at our humble, ancient fingerposts, especially where new signposts have been placed alongside the original ones, as in this picture taken at Clanver End, Wendens Ambo.

TAKING STOCK FOR YOUR PETS

Now may be a good time to take stock of general preventative healthcare for your pet. Are vaccinations and pet insurance up to date, have you wormed it recently, and does the microchip show the correct name, address and telephone number? I had a client who cancelled her cat's insurance as she had not claimed for five years, then her cat was knocked over by a car and she had a bill of several hundred pounds! Microchips are really useful. Before they became compulsory for dogs, we used to take in a lot of strays and there was often no means of identifying them. They ended up being taken to local rescue centres, held for seven days and then rehomed. When more dogs were chipped, it was lovely that we could get the owner's details and rehome them straightaway. Are you ever daunted by the choice of wines on our supermarket shelves and for the lack of time you have to browse? No wonder that many of us plump for our favourite wines. Online retailers offer a vast selection of wines to suit all budgets, tastes and preferences. They are able to offer a larger more diverse range, better information and excellent deals, all at the click of a button. Some supermarkets also sell small quantities of specialist stock only online. Aldi, for example have their Classic Icons range with free delivery for a mixed case of six. I liked their 2018 La Finca Toro Loco from Spain at £11, a gloriously fresh and fruity red wine and their lighter 2015 Roversi Barberesco from Italy with cherry, plum and smoky flavours. Decanter scored it as 93 out of 100. Similarly, you can order the Majestic range of WIGIG (when it's gone it's gone) wines to ensure you secure limited ranges before they disappear from their shelves with free delivery as part of a mixed six bottle case. Other wine merchants may be impractical to visit but have a great online service. Favourites are *Great* Western Wines, The Wine Society (£40 life membership), Slurp and Laithwaites. Despite the benefits of online buying I will always still enjoy the prospect of handling bottles or even tasting the wines before purchase; visits to local wine merchants like Majestic, who have not gone completely online, will always be welcome. Finally, a plug for the French Wine Tasting in aid of the Stansted twinning with Rungis which I am helping run with the Parish Council, which is on Friday 21st February (see opposite). Why Change Is Difficult



- We are creatures of habit. It is in our blueprint Our brains work on prediction. The brain predicts the nice feelings that follow a nice biscuit
- 2 To change the predictive map you need to change association; link biscuits with diabetes
- 3 Everything we do, we do for a subconscious reason that makes change effortful
- 4 The analogy is the elephant and the handler. If the elephant is happy, it will work as directed by its handler; if the elephant is unhappy, the handler will have almost no control over the elephant
- The unconscious, or old brain, is like the elephant. The conscious brain, particularly the frontal lobes, is the handler
- To successfully lose weight, give up habits like drinking, gambling or smoking, improve your posture; to get rid of chronic pain, you must address your elephant and make it happy!
- 7 The old brain is the automatic stuff: eye movements, body movements, breathing, posture, hunger, digestion, mood, desire etc. The articles I write are almost always aimed at improving the old brain, so doing any of these exercises aids change
- When you are in the process of changing a habit, this is controlled by the frontal lobes and takes a lot of effort from them. You need to feed your brain to give it energy. All goes well until we are hungry, tired, and stressed; the elephant is out of control
- 9 To feed the brain it needs fuel, breathing and activation. Fuel is good food usually food you have cooked yourself. Breathing is good breathing; breathe without your shoulders rising at all
- 10 Activation is actually movement, which is problematic if you're trying to get into the exercise habit! Any movement helps, and if that really is not possible, try a decent breathing drill instead
- 11 I believe there is no such thing as willpower. Relying on willpower alone is doomed to failure and beating yourself up after a failure is unhelpful. Much better to get curious: how do I make my elephant happy?

COMBATING LONELINESS

'All the lonely people, where do they all come from?' So sang the Beatles in their haunting 1966 ballad of *Eleanor Rigby*. Fifty-four years later, loneliness is perhaps more of a societal problem than ever before. Modern life has much to recommend it, but in its wake comes divorce, breakup of families, bereavement, retirement, ill health, old age and a myriad of other situations that can trigger feelings of loneliness. Paradoxically, loneliness is not the same as being alone. Many people live happy and contented lives in solitary bliss, while others experience the empty feelings that come with this isolating condition, even in a crowd of people. Nor are young people exempt; loneliness can impact anyone whatever their age. Loneliness is debilitating, has a real impact on our wellbeing, and can lead to mental health problems.

So what can be done to help? There is no magic wand, of course, but we can all watch out for family, friends and neighbours who may have experienced a devastating event. A phone call or an invitation for a cuppa are ways we can show that someone cares. There are also organisations, clubs and societies that help through social activities, befriending, phone calls, drop-ins and outings; however, trying to track down what is available is not always easy. Uttlesford Frontline has details about organisations such as Essex Befrienders, Age UK who offer one-to-one and telephone befriending, and **REAL Friends** who provide support to young people enduring bullying. Frontline is the brainchild of Uttlesford Citizens Advice Bureau and lists almost 200 local organisations that can provide help, advice and information on a wide range of health and wellbeing issues. Each service listed provides full contact details, fact sheets and a call back option. You can find details by calling 0300 500 1895 or visiting our website.

Protecting native woodlands is crucial in the fight against climate change; we are very fortunate to have an ancient woodland on our doorstep. The wood's management trust was originally set up to end encroachment by housing and preserve it as *green lungs* in an area dominated by the M11 motorway and an international airport. The wood can only be properly managed with the help of volunteers and support from the community. Over recent months, residents have bought our seasoned firewood, while Stort Valley Rotary Club and Premier Court Care Home in Thorley have kindly donated funds to help maintain and improve the woodland. Yet, nothing could happen without our volunteers, led by warden Pat Forrest, whose name suits his lifelong commitment to environmental conservation. Every Saturday during the coppice season, the volunteers are coppicing trees - a sustainable way of managing trees, which regrow and provide the firewood that funds our operations.



We are always in need of more team members and would warmly welcome people who are prepared to be hands-on. If you are interested in conservation volunteering, even just an hour or two on a Saturday, please go to the compound next to the water tower on Heath Row, Bishop's Stortford. Local ecologist and science educator Jono Forgham has been documenting all the species in the wood. He is calling for community involvement in a year-long study of the wood and its natural history by recording the tree species, birds, mammals, insects, arachnids, plants and fungi. He will be visiting two to three times a week, with moth trap nights on a weekly basis, and would like anyone who is interested to join him. As we settle into the new decade, the National Trust is celebrating 125 years of looking after natural and historic places for the nation. The trust was founded in 1895 by Octavia Hill, Sir Robert Hunter and Canon Hardwicke Rawnsley, shown below.







Hill, born in Wisbech, was a social campaigner, philanthropist and leading force behind the development of social housing. Hunter was a lawyer who helped ensure the protection of open spaces, including many commons in London and Epping Forest. Rawnsley was based in the Lake District and campaigned to protect the countryside there. His literary connections included Beatrix Potter, whose former home is now owned by the National Trust. They were motivated by the increase in industrialisation, fearing industry was in danger of gobbling up green spaces, so vital for our wellbeing.



Fast-forward 125 years and we are grappling with similar challenges. Nature is being driven into crisis and green space could be a distant prospect for the next generation. The vision that our founders had seems particularly prescient now. Looking ahead, we must also consider how we as individuals can look after these special places. At Hatfield Forest the wet winter weather has taken its muddy toll. We urge visitors to save their visits for the summer when the ground is better able to cope with heavy footfall. If you do visit this month, please stay on hard standing paths to give the ground time to recover.

Our next talk is on **Tuesday 11th February** 7.30pm at Bishops Park Community Centre, Bishop's Stortford (next to Tesco). Gary Prescott aka *The Biking Birder* talks about the birds seen, RSPB reserves visited, people met and the many incidents encountered. He says, "May I modestly say that I am one of the world's most famous Green Birders? Green Birding is where one tries to reduce one's carbon footprint when enjoying the world's best hobby, birdwatching, mainly by restricting one's use of fossil fuel transport modes." In 2018, he completed his fourth adventure in the saddle. Three years of biking birding adventures around the whole of the UK in the years 2010, 2015 and 2016, was followed by six months of 2018 cycling and pack rafting in Peru! Daisies are our silver, buttercups our gold: This is all the treasure we can have or hold.

Daisy Bellis perennis also known as day's eye and bruisewort It is said that summer has arrived when one can put a foot on seven daisies. In warmer winters they continue to flourish right through the year, so the old adage might no longer apply. The name means the eye of the day, as it opens only during the hours of light, and will not open on very dull days. The term bruisewort gives its use as a folk medicine. When treating bruises today it is fashionable to purchase Arnica, which is not related to the daisy, but has similar qualities. The crushed leaves of the daisy can be applied to wounds to help healing. Herbalists make daisy tincture to purify the blood, thus helping treat skin diseases and boils; it is also used for coughs, catarrh, arthritis and rheumatism.
