


# Celebrating 40 years of The Link - 1980 to 2020 Our cover story



Before The Link was born in 1980 the village had been well served by the Parish Magazine, which had been published by the Church of England for at least 50 years. This is the cover of the December 1952 edition that was kindly provided by Ray Rogers, now living in Scotland, and whose baptism was recorded therein.

The first issue of The Link appeared in October 1980, and was on a subscription basis.

Under the heading 'How The Link Began' there were the following two paragraphs (yes, it was in Courier font from a typewriter!):

'The confidence and cooperation which have grown within the local Christian community now enable us to launch THE LINK which aims at being a truly village effort. Every group or individual may contribute to and, we hope, benefit from this new magazine.

The title of the magazine describes its function. The cover design signifies our village, the Church and the world about us. Our purpose is therefore clear; we seek within Stansted to reach people of all denominations or none and so provide a service for which the joint churches' organization is uniquely fitted.'



After 24 years using the same rather bland design, in 2004 we changed to something more like our current cover. However, we were still limited to a single colour on the outside and no colour inside. By this time we had moved from typewritten 'cut and paste' articles to fully computerised production and professional printing. In 2004 the village was without a Post Office, so readers were no doubt pleased to see the following item by Alan Dean on Page 10. It eventually bore fruit!

**'Post Office** A lot is happening behind the scenes to open a new Post Office. I hate being secretive, but all I can say at the moment is that there are some really good ideas being considered. The District Council is doing its best working with other people and organisations to help turn the ideas into what we all want — a fully operational Post Office in Stansted.'



From November 2007 we decided to increase the circulation of The Link by making it free of charge. It now had full colour on the covers and was delivered to every home and business in Stansted village, as it still is. The Link came of age in September 2009 when we became formalised as a Community Interest Company (CIC) under the editorship of Derek Honour, who had been Chairman of the magazine committee at its foundation back in 1980. This final step relieved the Churches of their guardianship and gives legal responsibility to the directors.

Since our launch in 1980 we had used the same cover image for several consecutive issues. This was so covers could be printed in advance in large batches and simply over-printed with the issue number and date each month. Understandably this led to some confusion, so in 2013 we started using a different cover picture each month. The final significant change was a year later in February 2014, when we upgraded the printing process and the magazine now included colour throughout.

# Celebrating 40 years of The Link - 1980 to 2020 Snippets around the Millennium year 2000

It has been a fascinating task to browse through back numbers of The Link, but rather more difficult to select items that might strike a chord with today's readers. In the end we have focused on the year 2000, being the midpoint of our existence.

## STANSTED VILLAGE 1940-1950 (PART 2)

Following on from last month's memories of the village we now come back along Station Road. On the west side was Thurgoods cycle shop where Bombay Butler now stands. The King's Arms is still on the corner; going up Chapel Hill we had Mumfords Grocers on the corner of Sunnyside, Mr Poole's paper shop, followed by Houghton's watch and clock repairs. The Barley Mow pub was on the corner of Woodfields opposite the church.



W Robinson's building yard was in Back Lane. Aubrey Levey's (funeral directors) was on the corner of Recreation Ground. Further up Chapel Hill was the Central Hall which served as a Court House on Saturday mornings; these are now flats. Then there was the Post Office. Just past the entrance to Spencer Close is the road leading down to Stansted Pumping Station. On the corner of the lane stood a brick building which housed the pump for the fire engine, which is now demolished.



Now we are back at the fountain where we could have a drink from a metal cup on a chain. Turning left down Silver Street, Linden House on the corner was Peringer Nursing Home; further down was the Antiques shop. The next building was Mr Players, a cobbler. I am told one of the cottages just further down was a fish and chip shop, but I cannot remember it. We then had Miss Rose's tea and sweet shop. Crossing over coming back up the hill we had Joe Childs' repairs for radios and charging accumulators, The Windmill Public House followed by the depository store (furniture).






Mr Grey's cycle shop followed, then Pearsons the bakers. The Cock Public House comes next followed by another butchers, Mascalls. The little white cottages at the top housed Mrs Mant's sweet shop and downstairs in the second one of the yellow brick buildings was our Police Station. The other shops we had were Mr Turner's along Bentfield Road which was a general grocers and the little corner shop in Stoney Common.

# STANSTED EVENING WI



#### **Our 60th Anniversary**

On  $14^{\text{th}}$  July 1960 a meeting was held to discuss forming a WI in Stansted. Over 50 women attended and 33 people were nominated to stand on the first Committee, so obviously the interest was there. At the first meeting in October, 12 people were elected and Irene Sanders became the first President. Margaret Chastney, still a member, became Assistant Secretary. Margaret Meadows and Marion Pretty, both still members, were also there. By November, 51 members had signed up and fundraising was discussed. A generous donation of £10 was given by the Afternoon WI to start us off. Mrs Burton gave a talk in November entitled Make your own Clothes. I am not sure if this was a command or an invitation to learn how! Plans were made for snowball teas, a whist drive, a sales stall at a garden meeting, a choir and drama groups, as well as lampshade making, cane work and glove making classes! Homemade cakes and tea were provided by five members each month and cost 6d.

By January, classes were under way and a trip to the Ideal Home Exhibition had been organised. Irene retired from being President after less than a year due to ill-health. During the presentation of her bouquet, all the lights went out. The speaker began her talk and demonstration on candlewick, which suggests to me that the audience may have gone to sleep. Refreshments were served in semi-darkness and AGM resolutions were discussed before the lights came on again. In 1962, members attended the group meeting of six local WIs, held in Stansted.



The picture shows the line-up of presidents on that occasion; Irene Sanders is the second on the left. The important looking lady with the largest hat is the National Federation Vice-Chairman, Mrs Farquharson. We hope to celebrate our 60 years before too long and meanwhile we keep in touch with each other as best we can. We are grateful to those early members for their enthusiasm in setting up our WI.



This year has brought us a bumper season of crops and our fair share of pests. With the season beginning to change and more free time, I am finally able to reflect on the good, the bad and the ugly for Human Roots. When the pandemic first hit, I had to decide quickly how to manage the allotment. I was constantly swaying between the 'go for it' or 'cautious' approach. I think we all know what happened. I went for it and planted all 26 beds!



Overall, I have been very successful with my crops, with an abundance of squashes, leafy greens, herbs, sunflowers, beetroots and carrots. However, I have had endless problems with black fly, aphids, melting cabbages, failed pumpkins and tomato blight. Despite the very hard work, I am really glad that I decided to go for it. Over the season Human Roots supported about 10 needy families every two weeks. All families were referred by Spangles Children's Centre and each received a range of fresh fruit and vegetables.



In recent weeks, we have recruited a new volunteer through United in Kind and look forward to working with him on the allotment in the coming seasons. Of course, we would also love more volunteers to get involved on the allotment so get in touch if you are keen to be part of something great.

# Stansted Community comes together to promote Mental Health Awareness

A group of volunteers from the village have come together to form *Let's Talk, Stansted!* This new project aims to get people talking and raise awareness of mental health issues throughout the community. It was set up as a local response to some tragic deaths in the area over the summer, following a post on social media by Elaine Knibbs, a local resident: "I was devastated to read in the local press about members of the community who had taken their own lives. I felt compelled to see if there was something we could do to bring the community together and talk about mental health issues, especially given how much Covid-19 has impacted everyone." Our objectives are:

- To raise mental health awareness within the Stansted community
- To provide a signposting service to support mental wellbeing in Stansted
- To help support members of the Stansted Community who have mental health concerns
- To create a network of local adults and young people who will all receive accredited training in suicide prevention and mental health awareness.

The group had their first meeting via Zoom at the beginning of July and after just seven weeks we were ready to launch our project on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> September, which coincided with World Suicide Prevention Day. This is an awareness day which has been observed on 10<sup>th</sup> September every year

since 2003, aiming to provide worldwide commitment and action to prevent suicides. The *Let's Talk*, *Stansted!* team were out in force around the village on 10<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup> September talking to the community about the project and recruiting volun-

#### THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

Some of you will have had your children at home a great deal over the past few months, and I can imagine this scene: there is a gigantic crash in the living room and you rush in to find two or three objects lying on the ground and two guilty looking youngsters nearby. "What happened?" you ask "Who did this?" Sheepishly, one denies all knowledge of it and the other loudly protests their innocence. "Well, it must have been Mr Nobody," you say vaguely, aware that by Newton's Law those objects would not have moved without some force acting upon them, and although you suspect the 'butter-wouldn't-melt' youngsters, whose fault was it?

Right from the beginning humankind have been playing the blame game. In the Bible story of Adam and Eve, God asks Adam, "Did you eat the fruit that I told you not to eat?" (Genesis 3:11) and Adam tries to shift the blame onto Eve for leading him astray and onto God for creating her. Eve likewise tries to blame the serpent for deceiving her.

We are living in a time which is unprecedented and sometimes frightening. There are huge differences in the delivery and interpretation of the guidelines set out to keep us safe. There are attempts made to do what is needed to stop the spread of the virus, but when it all goes wrong, whose fault is it? We need to try to avoid playing the blame game at this challenging time and instead we need to help each other through with maturity and a sense of responsibility, to help our neighbour by doing what we can to keep each other safe.

#### NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

#### **PLANNING ISSUES**

Readers may be aware that the government has launched a consultation on a new White Paper "Planning for the Future".

The proposals section has five main headings summarised as streamlining, taking a digital first approach, new focus on design and sustainability, reform of developer contributions to improve infrastructure delivery and, finally, improving residential land availability and supporting town and city centre renewal. You can read the document in full at

The lack of an Uttlesford District Council (UDC) Local Plan, meanwhile, promotes speculative planning and impacts the final shape and implementation of our own Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) and, we believe, the progress of the re-development of a new Princess Alexandra Hospital, as UDC is unable to specify projected increases in housing and population figures.

Both of these issues have meant that we need to review our draft NDP and therefore will not be holding our planned consultation this Autumn. A NDP is all about development and it must be in line with the Local Plan. The withdrawn draft Local Plan had indicated very few new homes for Stansted. However, the new Planning White Paper is likely to mean much higher housing numbers for Uttlesford - and in turn for us here in Stansted - so we have to consider carefully where those houses might be located and what community benefits we would expect.

#### **SAVE STANSTED VILLAGE**

The Parish Council is supporting the SSV group which has reconvened following the submission by Bloor Homes to build 168 homes on land west of Pennington Lane. The Parish Council is not anti development in the village, but does not consider that this application should be supported in this location. Should you share this view, please send your comments to UDC. The official deadline is 24 September, but usually comments

would be accepted up until the Planning Committee meets to determine the application. You can upload your comments to the Planning Portal at www.uttlesford.gov and find the planning page. Then search under planning reference number UTT/20/2121/OP. Suggested reasons for objection can be found on the SSV website at www.savestansted.co.uk.

#### **FLOODING**

The Parish Council has been very active recently on matters related to Flooding. On the day of the flash floods our Chairman, staff and two members of the Flood Working Group (FWG) assisted parishioners and local businesses where flash-flooding had caused issues — in most cases for the first time ever. A collection point for sandbags was set up and over 100 were distributed — our supplies have since been replenished.



Whilst roadside drains had apparently been cleared in July, the two members of the FWG undertook an inspection of these again towards the end of August accompanied by a private drain specialist whose written report is awaited. We hope to use this information and his advice to persuade Essex Highways to undertake further remedial work.

The Environment Agency has indicated that work to install Natural Flood Measures around the Bollington Hall area is progressing and will be completed in this financial year. Meanwhile, County Cllr Ray Gooding has confirmed that he will fund a new store for all of our flood equipment so we are now able to progress this matter and the upgrade of the alarm system to solar power is also in hand.

Finally, our appeal on social media for additional volunteer flood wardens brought a few new members who will undergo training. Should you feel able to join them, please contact us for further information about what this entails. We are looking to have a call-down system for when flash-flooding affects people in the future.

#### **AIRPORT APPEALS REFUSAL OF PLANNING**

Manchester Airport Group has, late on, appealed against Uttlesford District Council's refusal to allow throughput at the airport to increase from the present limit of 35mppa to 43mppa. A Public Enquiry is to be held and details of how to make comments can be found at https://acp/planninginspectorate.gov.uk quoting reference number APP/C1570/W/20/3256619 by 30 September.

The Parish Council is reviewing its arguments against permitting further expansion. The evidence previously submitted to Uttlesford District Council may be found on their website under UTT/18/0460/FUL. If you have views which you would like the Parish Council to consider, please email or write to the Parish Council. Although the impact of COVID-19 has depressed demand for air travel, MAG must believe that growth will resume sufficiently over coming years to make raising the passenger limit worthwhile. If the appeal is successful not only is substantial expansion permitted but all would be in place to move to over 50mppa, hardly an airport in the countryside.

The Parish Council supports the existing airport and the employment opportunities but considers that the existing limit of 35mppa provides plenty of scope especially when set against the urgent need to reduce carbon emissions substantially in the face of the potential catastrophe of global warming.

#### **YOUTH CLUB**

Since August Gemini Youth Support have been out and about delivering detached services to our younger population. Whilst numbers vary, we hope that they have been able to recruit some new members for the youth club when it is finally able to reopen.

#### **NEWS FROM ESSEX COUNTY COUNCIL**

#### **Cllr Ray Gooding writes:**

Normally in September we see the return of children to school with excitement and some trepidation. However, with all that has happened this year, that process is much more complicated than usual, and the preparations that schools have had to make to welcome the children back has been far more extensive and significantly different from every other year. I would like to thank school leaders, teachers and other staff for all the work they have done to plan for this and ensure that schools are safe and welcoming places.

As I write this, I know that all the schools across the county are now open and children are returning after an extended time at home. I also know that the excitement at the return is shared not only by the children who can again meet with their friends, and recommence their education, but also by the teachers who are looking forward to welcoming everybody back.

It is my hope that all children will return to school without any concerns, but one of the questions I am asked is whether parents will be fined if they elect not to bring their children back. My response to that question is that if, as a parent, you are concerned, then you must speak with the head of your child's school. Clearly, if you are shielding a member of your family or have other reasons not to return then that does need to be recorded so that assistance can be provided. However, the education of our children is such an important matter that it is necessary for headteachers to retain the ability to refer families where adequate reasons for non-attendance are a concern.

There is a great deal of information available to parents at this time and if your child is starting Reception this year then the TLC facebook page may be helpful. If getting to school is a problem then the StopSwapGo website will give you information on all you need to know.

In the meantime I wish all those children and young people a fabulous return to school at whatever point in their school career they are returning.

#### **NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL**

#### **Cllr Melvin Caton writes:**

At a recent Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council meeting a motion on discrimination and equality was agreed unanimously. Councillors from Stansted and Stort Valley subsequently developed a similar statement in conjunction with all parties represented on Uttlesford District Council which was also agreed unanimously.

The statement's prime purpose is to send positive signals to residents, communities and visitors to the District, as well as to the Council's employees, that diversity and inclusion are valued by the Council. It also recognised that the Council should not be complacent and needed to take further action.

Uttlesford councillors agreed to arrange a number of community listening events to hear from residents directly of their experiences of discrimination and the structural barriers that they face. An independently led group was set up to support and challenge the work of UDC in this area, as well as help shape the programme of the listening events. Please contact Cllr Ayub Khan if you wish to be involved in this welcome initiative.

August is usually a quiet month in local government. This year has been different. After the 'lockdown lull', Uttlesford District Council has been thinking about how we go about producing a new Local Plan for the District, following the decision to withdraw the last draft at the end of April.

All councillors have participated in three workshops delivered by specialist advisers from the East of England Local Government Association. In addition, a cross-party Local Plan Leadership Group (LPLG), which includes me, has been set up to advise the Cabinet on the way forward.

Unfortunately, a week after the LPLG had met for the first time the Government published a White Paper - Planning for the Future - which proposes radical changes to the planning system. It proposes that in future land would be categorised for Growth, Renewal or Protection. Land designated for growth would automatically be given planning permission in principle.

Alongside the White Paper the government also published proposals to change the way that "Housing Need" is assessed in each Local Planning Authority area. This change, if implemented, would result in Uttlesford having to plan for the building of 1230 houses each year rather than the current target of 715. The

new target means that Uttlesford has the 99<sup>th</sup> highest housing need in the country according to the Government's assessment. It is also the eight highest as proportion of existing homes in the district.

Other changes to local government are in the air, as the Government is due to issue another White Paper on Devolution including Local Government in October. The Government is believed to favour plans that abolish Essex County Council, the existing Southend-on-Sea and Thurrock Unitary Councils and the twelve district councils, including Uttlesford, and to create up to four new unitary councils with populations between 300,000 to 700,00 people. One option being considered is to amalgamate the three councils along the M11, Epping Forest, Harlow and Uttlesford into a new Unitary Council.

Following the creation of the new unitary councils the Government also wishes to see a directly elected Mayor who would lead a new 'Greater Essex' Combined Authority comprising the Mayor and all the leaders of the new Unitary Authorities. The Government is expected to say that they will devolve powers and funding for infrastructure and economic development to the Combined Authority.

On a local note we have worked with residents at Burton End to tackle the issue of pavement parking. Letters were delivered to households as a reminder to residents of the impact of pavement parking. We hope that the problems will now cease. Interestingly, the Government has recently announced a consultation on pavement parking which is proposing changes to legislation and more robust action including the levying of fines.

#### **FORTY YEARS AGO**

I moved to the village 40 years ago when Stansted had three banks; Barclays in Cambridge Road, Lloyds on Chapel Hill and Nat West on the corner of Chapel Hill and Lower Street. The Three Colts (currently being converted into housing) and Bell and Feathers (now Wood Grill) along the Cambridge Road were both still pubs; there was a Post Office with separate sorting office near the top of Chapel Hill (now a private house) and we had a Police Station at the end of Hargrave Close, plus many more independent shops selling a variety of goods from clothing to hardware and furniture to toys. Stansted Free Church was the United Reformed Church, St Mary's Church was still holding church services and Roman Catholics worshipped in a converted house in Millside.



Notable national and international events that occurred in the same year include the launch of the famous Rubik's Cube, British Leyland's new *Metro* hatchback and *Iron* 

Maiden's debut self-titled album, the election of Jimmy Carter as US President and the murder of John Lennon in New York.

In this year the answer to the big question on everyone's lips, Who shot JR? from the popular television show Dallas was also finally revealed to a record number of viewers.




Punk fashion also emerged in 1980, as did big hair and bright heavy make-up for women along with power dressing and huge shoulder pads.



At the other end of the scale leg warmers and velour tracksuits (who could forget those?) were popular alongside wide belts, elastic headbands and trainers.

Aerobics was the current fitness trend, *The Empire Strikes Back* was released and at the 1980 Eurovision Song Contest the unforgetable British entry, *Love Enough for Two* by *Prima Donna* (who?) scored 106 points and came third.



During October 1980 Kim Kardashian, American socialite, and television personality and actor Ben Wishaw were born and actress Hattie Jacques (of *Carry On* films fame) and Hans Asperger, the Austrian paediatrician, after whom *Asperger syndrome* was named, both sadly died.

On 10<sup>th</sup> October the then British Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher

delivered her famous *The lady's not for turning* speech and on the 17<sup>th</sup> Queen Elizabeth II became the first British monarch to make a state visit to the Vatican. The Thomson Corporation made an important announcement in London on 22<sup>nd</sup> October saying that *The Times* and all associated supplements would close in March 1981 if no buyer could be found.



However, by far the most notable event of October 1980 here in Stansted must have been **the publication of the very first edition of** *The Link!* The magazine has grown from those few pages to the award winning 40 or so of today and we are fortunate to have such an informative, well-written and presented parish magazine. Many thanks and congratulations to the hard-working team of volunteers who produce *The Link*. Here's to the next 40 years.

#### **Coping With Mental Health Issues In The Pandemic**

Like a devastating hurricane Covid-19 has wreaked havoc on our familiar way of life, impacting not only the physical and economic wellbeing of the nation but also its psychological wellbeing. Mental health illness can hit us all; even children are at risk as are those with financial problems or suffering chronic illness. Access to help is available, although many services have had to change the way they operate. There is now a greater reliance on modern technology instead of face-to-face support: email, telephone, video calling and Zoom are ways of delivering advice. Mind in West Essex offers a number of self-help courses for mental illness through its online learning academy. Most are free including Coronavirus Anxiety, developed in response to the pandemic. With the economy under so much pressure and jobs at risk, levels of stress are high even for those with robust mental health. How to get a six pack whilst sitting in your chair. Equipment: one balloon.

- Blow the balloon up to loosen it. Release the air, not missing the opportunity for a bit of silliness
- 2. Put the balloon back between your lips and hold it there using only your lips, not your hands
- 3. Spread one hand across your tummy and the other around your throat
- 4. Now blow the balloon up. When you breathe in, grip the balloon between your teeth and lips and inhale through your nose
- 5. As you blow into the balloon, the abs tighten up considerably, the throat remains relaxed.

This is the most phenomenal tummy tightener! It will take some mastering, so don't be too gung ho at first since the

chances are very high that the throat will tighten up rather than the abs and that does nobody any good at all.

Why is it brain training? Three reasons: you will feel your lip muscles working away as you hold that balloon and this is the facial nerve, the one that makes tears and spit as well as enabling you to hold a balloon in place. The second reason is you have to grip the balloon with your



teeth when you inhale, which involves the biggest and most powerful cranial nerve, the trigeminal nerve. Incidentally, both these nerves help the upper back straighten up. The third reason is that this is also the most phenomenal breathing exercise and good breathing binds brain and body together.



#### **NEW DEFIBRILLATOR**

#### Rose and Crown Pub, Bentfield Green

In December last year we started to raise money for a public defibrillator to be sited at the pub. Soon we had raised almost £2,000 thanks to Stacey, landlady of the Rose and Crown, who organised a Christmas quiz which raised over £1,200. Additional donations were received from Councillor Geoffrey Sell on behalf of Uttlesford Council, the local Freemasons and other kind individuals who donated money from their quiz winnings. A defibrillator was purchased; just as it arrived, lockdown happened! As lockdown restrictions have been eased, the defibrillator is finally in place on the outside wall of the pub, thanks to Greg Laing from Bentfield Green and Matt Pratley from EMO Electrical Services who kindly volunteered their fitting and electrical expertise.

The device is now being registered with the East of England Ambulance service, so when they receive a 999 call relating to an unconscious person who may be in cardiac arrest they will tell the caller where the nearest defibrillator is located (as long as it falls within one mile). They will also give the code to unlock the cabinet. This code is also held by Stacey at the pub and some neighbours. Once the ambulance team arrives, they will take the Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) to their station for safe keeping where it will be collected and returned to the pub by the custodian. The custodian at present is Ben, in the cottage next to the pub, who has kindly volunteered to check the equipment regularly. The locations of the other defibrillators in Stansted are on the Parish Council website and include the surgery, dentists and some schools, but some are inside buildings and not always accessible to the public. The UK resuscitation Council guidelines state there is no requirement to be trained in the use of the AED. If a person were to collapse, the nontrained person should still use the AED as the 'step by step' voice prompts will explain to the user what to do. In the event of a cardiac arrest, using an AED and undertaking CPR will improve the chances of survival.

Your transport solutions are back on the road! The charity which provides community travel services for residents of Uttlesford is back in business. After a difficult few months Uttlesford Community Travel (UCT), which provides transport for the elderly, the disabled and the rurally isolated, recently resumed the operation of a restricted service for its members.

The calm of Birchanger Wood was a haven during the strangeness of the lockdown. It was one of the few places people could walk, get some fresh air, and remain healthy at a time of stringent and, for some, isolating social distancing. People enhanced their physical and mental wellbeing while reconnecting with nature and learning about our local natural history. Walking in the woodlands reduces levels of cortisol, a hormone associated with stress, and the immune system can be boosted by breathing in phytoncides, which trees emit to protect themselves from germs and insects.

Increased use of the wood also meant greater wear and tear on our pathways, as well as damage to trees and plants. Bluebells were pulled up, ivy was ripped off trees, fires were started and at one point there were people camping in the wood. The damage was caused by a small minority of visitors, but has had significant impact on our woodland. Next spring bluebells could be less abundant. Ivy destruction reduces habitats for insects; its removal does nothing to help the trees. With autumn approaching, we are resuming coppicing, cutting back trees to bring light to the woodland floor; the trees benefit from this radical pruning, which extends their lives. We have to repair paths and remove trees that have fallen near the paths. Additionally, we have a number of exciting woodland projects we want to pursue to boost our local wildlife. Although the work is carried out by volunteers, we have machinery, equipment, training and maintenance costs. We are appealing to residents who enjoy our woodland to give a regular small donation to help support our charitable objects. # LETTER RE STANSTED AIRPORT EXPANSION

I am writing in response to Manchester Airport Group's decision to appeal Uttlesford District Council's refusal of their planning application for 43 million passengers by 2028. The Committee on Climate Change predicts that aviation will be responsible for 35% of residual carbon emissions by 2050. Manchester Airport Group's own projections for this planning application at Stansted puts their emissions at 82% higher by 2028 than the Department for Transport's allowance. The recent bailouts to our airlines without environmental preconditions are in stark contrast to some of our European neighbours, who have imposed strict prerequi-

sites on the financial assistance to their airlines. This is surely a message at odds with our stewardship of Cop 26 in Glasgow next year.

Despite the unintended consequences of Covid-19 on aviation over recent months, the bigger picture is one of an industry that appears unwilling or unable to square the circle between continued expansion and the significant impact on the environment from its rapidly increasing carbon footprint. Business leaders and some politicians might support MAG's decision to appeal; seen through the prism of airport expansion's environmental impact, what we have is an industry that seeks to apply an unsustainable business as the usual approach to its impact on the climate in a dangerously warming world!

# **Nature Notes**

#### Dog Rose Rosa Canina (Rose Hips)

Autumn is the time to enjoy foraging for food. At this time of year the hedgerows are full of tasty morsels. Perhaps the brightest of nature's fruits are the rose hips. Those hips contain the hairy seeds of the wild or dog rose, and later in the autumn they can be recognised against the sky as little beacons of red on top of very thorny stems. Great care is needed to harvest these fruits and protection is required against the cruel thorns.



Once upon a time, children liked to make use of the hips as itchy powders. However, during the war years they were obliged to pick them as part of the Ministry of Food war effort. Oranges were exceedingly rare then. Rose-hips contain 20 times more Vitamin C than an orange. The harvested hips were sent to pharmaceutical companies who turned the berries into rose hip syrup. This was a good source of calcium, silica, magnesium, phosphorous, and most importantly Vitamin C. It is possible to make the syrup at home; a lengthy process but well worth it. Until the 1970s it was possible to buy Delrosa Rose Hip Syrup which could be given to small children either diluted with warm water in a feeding bottle or administered by teaspoon. Most children loved it and it kept them free of colds in the winter months. Alternatively, it can be used for tea. Quite simply wash the hips, chop or mince, spread out to dry, then store in airtight containers. To make the tea, use about a teaspoon of the dried hips, add boiling water and leave to stand for about five minutes. Strain carefully. Enjoy ...

The BSDFA finally went out on a walk following the long lockdown. It began with the Leader, Peter, taking our contact details should one of us subsequently be found to be suffering from Coronavirus, and reminding everyone to maintain social-distance distancing. Peter decided to take us on a short 4-miler; It was a lovely day and we had a super trundle across the Herts and Essex countryside alongside meadows to Gaston Green, with horses grazing and many birds. We turned down the River Stort and the canalised Stort. Here we took a break at the Tednambury Lock and followed the towpath of the Stort and walked back to Twyford Lock.



The new Stansted permissive paths provide a good number of circular routes and they link in well with the existing footpaths/bridleways in the area Public Rights of Way. They provide the opportunity for really short walks and much, much longer ones - brilliant! A map of the paths was in last month's Link. The great thing is that you can start from the very centre of Stansted - the Lower Street Car Park. From the new access off Dairy Lane you have not only a selection of paths but you are almost immediately in open pasture or walking along the Stansted brook. These paths provide a choice of two or three different ways to Elsenham, Burton End, May Walk and along to Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve. They skirt a large area of marshland and sheep pasture. A wooden bridge goes over the Stansted brook and if you follow it along up the hill, there is a choice of returning past the community allotments, or walking up to the bridge over the motorway to Church Road. Alternatively part way up the hill, go under the motorway bridge then on to Burton End and Tye Green. You may like to take a ramble through and along these new paths and I do have a hand-drawn A4 extrapolated map which shows the many new possibilities. Keep fit. Keep safe.

#### THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY - WORKHOUSES

In these strange times we have seen people unable to attend their place of work. Many have been supported by a furlough scheme. Over the years, governments have taken various steps to care for the poor and those unable to work. The Act for the Relief of the Poor of 1601 made parishes legally responsible for parishioners who could not work. Most assistance was given as 'outdoor relief', meaning financial help but with people able to remain in their own homes. The Workhouse Test Act of 1723 obliged anyone seeking relief to enter a workhouse operated by the parish. Under the Poor Law Amendment Act of 1834 individual parishes were grouped together in a Poor Law Union which was responsible for constructing and operating a central 'Union' workhouse for the larger area. Many survive and have been re-purposed. Life in the workhouse was hard; families were split, husbands separated from wives and parents from their children - a stark contrast to today's benefits systems.
