RECYCLE INK, STAMPS AND TOOTHBRUSHES



End-of-life Care

During the Covid-19 pandemic, my team stepped up to care for dying patients; it is very important to support people to die in the place they wish. We need more specialist nurses for people with complex life-limiting illnesses, and the Hospice is campaigning to raise funds through our *Nurses* are Needed campaign which was launched in May. When I go to care for someone at home, I am a guest. It is a privilege to be invited in and to care for someone in their own surroundings. I am driven by the fact that, more often than not, home is the right place for someone to be cared for at the end of their life. This is a pathway that we cannot control or stop; however we can make the journey as pain free and as dignified as possible. For me there is one family that I will never forget. It was right at the start of the pandemic and there was a lot of anxiety surrounding the situation at the time. A patient with Covid was being cared for at home; she was dying, and she refused to go to hospital. I was the first person to visit her and make an assessment. She was not old, but her breathing was bad; it was clear that she was going to die. It then unfolded that the patient's partner also had Covid, and that he was dying as well. We found out that he was being sent back from hospital so that he too could be cared for at home. In my 20 years as a nurse I have never nursed two dying patients side-by-side in a double bed. That in itself was a huge challenge for us as a team. The hospiceat-home healthcare assistants all agreed to help, proud to go in and do their job caring for this couple. It was very difficult, both emotionally and physically and such a sad situation. Both patients had quite severe needs, so we had to work closely together with the district nurses to care for them but we did it. The couple died together, at home.



There are only three trained nurses in the team, so the more nurses with the skills and knowledge to support people at the end of life, the more people we can help. At the moment, the district nurses offer the main nursing provision for end-of-life patients in our area, as well as having to care for other patients with different illnesses. As specialists in end-of-life care nursing, St Clare would be better placed to give that care. Having more qualified nurses in the team throws the door open to a more knowledgeable and

experienced service which reaches more people. We are seeing much more complex cases now, and we need to be focusing on giving more in-depth care to meet people's needs and that requires more nurses. You can find out more about the *Nurses are Needed* campaign and donate, on our website.

Whenever we dance the Hokey Cokey, we will always remember Jean and her dedication to the Club.

BRAIN TRAINING

Carrying Stuff, Working out in the Gym

Most neurological drills are simple to do, and none more so than carrying stuff in one hand. Most people are stronger on one side of their abdominal muscles than the other; over time this leads to chronic pain, typically in the hip or knee. Finding out if carrying stuff in one hand helps is very easy: grab something that is up to about 2kg in weight and hold it in one hand. Now stand in tandem stance – both feet abso-

lutely straight and one in front of the other, heel to toe. If possible, shut your eyes. If you feel extremely wobbly, move the thing to the other hand and see if your balance improves. The weight is pulling you over to one side, so the other side of your body has to tighten up to stop you from falling over and looking silly. If you find this works, carry bags or what-



ever in the more effective hand and lengthen up whilst doing this. If you have knee pain, this can really help. If you work out in the gym, having a slightly larger dumbbell on the more effective side will have a very beneficial effect on your workout long term.

To further help stability, try either poking your tongue into the same side cheek as the weight – meaning weight held in the right hand = tongue poked into the right cheek; or start to swallow so your tongue squeezes up into the roof of the mouth. All you need now is that tight yellow dress and some killer heels and then rehab for a broken ankle.

Approval for increase in Stansted Airport's planning cap The panel of planning inspectors described the conduct of Uttlesford District Council (UDC) as "unreasonable behaviour" in their formal ruling, which approved an increase in Stansted Airport's planning cap from 35 million to 43 million passengers per annum (mppa). This followed a public inquiry, involving three main parties, namely UDC, Manchester Airports Group (MAG) and Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE). SAW (formerly SSE) Chairman Brian Ross, said: "We are, of course, disappointed but we are not at all surprised." It will probably take up to ten years before international air travel returns to pre-pandemic levels. It is also widely believed that there will be a reduction in business flights, with Zoom meetings now established as a safe, time-saving, cost-saving and effective alternative. The panel's report makes repeated criticism of UDC's conduct at the inquiry and making an award of costs against UDC in favour of MAG. This could leave local council taxpayers facing a bill of an estimated £1.5 million.

Climate change impact of Stansted Expansion

The climate change impact of the proposed Stansted Airport expansion could be eight times higher than its proponents claimed, according to research from the New Economics Foundation (NEF) published on 21st May. It is equivalent to putting around one million additional cars on Britain's roads. The NEF report concluded that Stansted Airport's estimate of the climate change impact of its expansion plans was not credible because, for example:

- It assumes that the aviation sector will be using currently undeveloped technologies to deliver fuelefficiency savings over the next few decades
- It does not account for the impact of non-CO₂ emissions like aerosols, water vapour and nitrogen oxides, which can double or even triple the climate impact of airport expansions
- It has not put a monetary value on the climate change impacts of expansion, nor has it tested the impact of higher carbon prices in the future, contrary to Government guidance.

The NEF report recommended that the Government should halt all active applications; and any decisions on airport expansion should take into account the Government's upcoming publication of its aviation decarbonisation strategy, the new statutory target to cut emissions 78% by 2035, and the Committee on Climate Change's recommendation for no net expansion of UK airports.

There are three care homes in Stansted with around 150 elderly residents. All those who care for the wellbeing of those residents are carers and there are, I am sure, many other people in the village tending to loved ones old and young. All deserve our applause. A less hands-on way of caring is to know and be concerned about the welfare of others. For example, in 2019-20 there were an estimated 14.5 million people in the UK living in relative poverty after paying housing costs, some 22% of the population. Many of these were classed as destitute. Almost two million of them were children. Does anybody care? Most of the estimated 200,000 homeless people are living in accommodation described as 'human warehouses'. These are converted office blocks around the country including the now infamous Terminal House and two others in Harlow; but does anybody care?

We should also care for our society, our democracy. Who cares how personal protective equipment was procured, how many people died because of delays in calling for lockdown or who paid for the decoration of the Prime Minister's flat? Now it is getting closer to home. The proposed development to the west of Pennington Lane has been rejected after a large number of submissions from villagers and opposition from both Parish and District Councils. As expected, the developers have appealed and an inquiry is to be held. I would not bet one penny that the developer will not win the day; but who cares?



As part of the Young Citizen's programme, our children have signed up to make a difference to their local community and themselves. Pennington Lane Planning Inquiry JULY 13-22 JUDGETIENT DAY

The campaign to prevent the construction of 168 houses on land north of Pennington Lane reaches a climax on July 13 when a planning appeal inquiry gets under way. Here we explain what is at stake for the village and outline the case against development as advocated by the Save Stansted Village group and backed by the Parish Council.

he land tied to Pennington Lane has long been coveted by land developers. In 2013 Taylor Wimpey had hopes of building houses in fields that butted onto the boundary of the Bentfield Green conservation area.

Those hopes foundered against a campaign put together by Save Stansted Village (SSV), a pressure group set up to fight the project and headed-up by long-time Stansted resident, James Hogg. Backed by the Parish Council and district councillors, its campaign rallied the community to oppose the proposed development. Then, as now, the case against housing focused on the damage to landscape and heritage assets, namely Pennington Lane's status as a protected lane and Bentfield Green's as a conservation area.

SSV banked a considerable amount of popular support, rallying the community to write letters of protest, sign a petition and erect banners and objection boards around Stansted. This support combined with a little good fortune - a resident to the village was a national authority on landscape who

lent their expertise to the campaign — to help sway decision-makers' minds at Uttlesford District Council. Surprisingly the Uttlesford District Councillors rejected its planning officers' own recommendation to approve the Taylor Wimpey's project. An appeal by Taylor Wimpey followed but at an inquest the independent planning inspector ruled against development. And that was that.

ROUND TWO - BLOOR HOMES

At the end of 2019 Bloor Homes, one of the UK's largest property developers, announced on Uttlesford's planning portal its intention to build on 25-acres of land north of Pennington Lane. A formal application followed in August 2020.

"It did disappoint me, but didn't surprise me," says James Hogg. "Developers are opportunistic and will wait until the planning environment changes. They have submitted an application on pretty much the same land and claim it's a materially different location. But it isn't."

So why is Stansted at the centre of planning controversy yet again? Other than defining targets for housing construction, central government delegates much of the decision making around this issue to local authorities. Each tier of local government must consult with its community and draw up a plan addressing the issue of local development.

Uttlesford District Council has failed to produce a plan since 2005. This has allowed property developers like Taylor Wimpey, and now Bloor Homes, to target green space circling villages in Uttlesford, such as Elsenham and Stansted, that hasn't been officially set aside for other means.

TILTED BALANCE, THE NEED FOR EXPERTS

A spanner was thrown into Bloor's plan for Pennington Lane when Uttlesford rejected their planning application. This was then appealed against by Bloor and hence a Public Inquiry is to start on July 13 for 6 days. At this Inquiry, because the Council cannot demonstrate a five year housing land supply, the concept of tilted balance comes into play.

Simply put, the planning inspector will weigh the public benefits of development claimed by the developer Bloor Homes against the damage posed to the community as argued by Save Stansted Village and the Parish Council, acting together as a 'rule 6' party as community representatives. Here developers have the upper hand. They can easily point to the numbers of people who will benefit from new housing, and how they are delivering on government targets for land supply use.

Demonstrating the damage is more tricky. The impact on community life, the loss of wildlife and conservation areas, and impact on landscape and heritage are much less quantifiable. "When it comes to an inquiry, it is very hard for a lay person to argue about the value of landscape, or the subtleties around planning policy," says James. "That's why you need to hire experts."

Save Stansted Village has nearly reached its target of £20,000 to fund a planning consultant and an expert in landscape at the inquiry. The Parish Council contributed £4,000 to the fund, but the vast majority of money came from the public. "It's a lot of money for a community like this to offer up," says James Hogg. "It serves as a testament to public feeling against development near Bentfield Green and this was from right across Stansted not just those local to Bentfield Green."

WHAT'S AT STAKE?

Bloor Homes claim the Pennington Lane project will provide much needed affordable housing. They argue it is sustainable - a key planning requirement - as the needs of new residents will not overwhelm the existing infrastructure of roads, schools and health care amenities. They also suggest they have mitigated for any negative environmental impacts. None of this stacks up.

Firstly, Pennington Lane acts as a natural boundary to the village. Building 168 homes so close to the conservation area of Bentfield Green would make it more difficult to argue against other projects, thereby risking the opening up the countryside to a vast swath of housing going north all the way along the west of Pennington Lane. The south of the village is less appealing to developers as much of the land there is designated green belt. But a green light for Pennington could see hundreds of homes built to the north.

Secondly the project is simply not sustainable. Rainsford Road is Bloor's preferred means for its home owners to access Cambridge Road. Yet that road is already a congested cutthrough. Pennington Lane, meanwhile, is subject to flooding and ill-suited to more traffic. There are no plans to build more schools leaving the 3 existing ones to meet the extra demand.

Then there is the impact the project would have on Bentfield Green and Pennington Lane. Bentfield Green is a conservation area that was singled out by the independent planning inspector in 2013 as "the jewel in Stansted's crown." Taylor Wimpey planned to build to the edge of it. Now Bloor wants a bigger development just 80 metres farther away.

Pennington Lane is one of three protected lanes in the village. A survey conducted in preparation for the inquiry found on a single Saturday more than 400 runners, cyclists, walkers and horse riders used the lane. This popular community asset could soon be bulldozed away.

DAVID AND GOLIATH

The inquiry on July 13 will be held virtually due to Covid. A judgment will arrive by September 2, and proceedings will run along judicial lines. Bloor Homes will spend some of its £122 million in profits made in the 6 months to June 2020 employing barristers and planning experts to represent its case.

As well as the District Council fighting against Bloor Homes, representing the community will be the Parish Council and Save Stansted Village. Simon Thompson will advocate as he did in 2013. Hundreds of pages of evidence, thoroughly researched, multiple 'Proofs of Evidence', all the community's objection letters and a petition with over 1,500 names attached will be submitted, all of which will be backed up by testimony from a planning consultant and landscape expert.

"We did it against the odds last time round in 2013," says James Hogg. "It is eminently winnable. There is no room for failure." $\,$

CHECK-IN ON RUNGIS



Residents of Rungis and Stansted will be able to take part in each other's garden festivals this month. STANSTED AIRPORT PLANNING DECISION

The major news from Uttlesford District Council this month has been the decision by the Planning Inspectors to allow the appeal by Stansted Airport to expand to 43 million passengers per annum.

The Inspectors also awarded costs against the council because of Uttlesford's "unreasonable behaviour" in changing their view at the appeal from the Planning Committee's unanimous decision to refuse permission on environmental grounds to one of approval with conditions. These costs may run into a seven figure sum.

Needless to say the Council's strategy at the appeal Enquiry has proved very controversial. We wait to see the council's next steps in this long running saga.

DEPARTURE OF THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Dawn French, who has been Chief Executive Officer at Uttlesford since February 2016, has said she will be leaving the council by the end of August or earlier.

She has said that that her decision is something she had been deliberating for some time, in order that the needs of the council are balanced with her own personal aspirations.

Dawn has worked in local government for 38 years, joining Brentwood Council straight from A-Levels and wants some time to be able to do something different in the later stages of her career.

Miss French said: "I feel incredibly privileged to have worked with such a great team at Uttlesford, and would like to thank everyone for their support, dedication and hard work through some challenging times especially during the current pandemic."

CHANGE OF LEADERSHIP

After the Annual Council Meeting in May, Cllr Alan Dean handed the baton of leadership of the Uttlesford Liberal Democrat Group over to me. Geoffrey Sell has become Deputy Leader of the Group. Cllr Arthur Coote from Saffron Walden was elected Chairman of Uttlesford District Council for the 2021/22 civic year.

BUSINESS SUPPORT

Despite the gradual easing of Covid 19 restrictions, the Council's Revenues Team continues to support local businesses by administering the range of grants available. The following statistics give an idea of the scale of support given to business in the district during the pandemic.

2020/21

First lockdown

 Small Business and Retail, Hospitality and Leisure Grants to 1,559 businesses totalling £18.785m Discretionary grants to 144 to businesses / organisations not on the valuation list totalling £1.025m

Tier restrictions and second lockdown

- 227 businesses during the initial Tier 2 restrictions received grants totalling £379,278
- 779 businesses received support totalling £6.420m
- 335 businesses and small organisations (who are not business rate payers) through the Additional Restrictions Grant received support totalling £1.091m

The council also paid out £28,000 to wet-led pubs (those that are not able to offer food outside or on a takeaway basis) over Christmas. £175,383 was awarded to 133 businesses in December and January through the Essex Business Adaption Fund (funds received from Essex County Council).

2021/22

The new grants to support the local economy in reopening:

- Restart Grants paid out to 348 businesses totalling £2.434m so far and the council are still going through the applications so more to be paid
- Additional Restrictions Grant paid to 278 businesses and small organisations (who are not business rate payers) totalling £1.415m.

Uttlesford are also running a series of videos promoting local businesses on their Facebook and other social media channels as part of a Shop Local, Shop Safe campaign in Uttlesford. It includes Stansted businesses.

THE WASHING LINE

What is there to say about the humble washing line? It turns out there are a whole lot of things to say. To start with, since the Covid situation it seems it now takes two people to hang the washing out; is this a new law that perhaps I have missed? As for pegs, there are four types to my knowledge:

- Dolly pegs wooden, ok, but useless if the garment is thick
- Plastic pegs break as soon as you look at them
- Wooden with metal springy bits ok but get stuck in the lawnmower when they break
- Soft pegs, brightly coloured, work quite well but they are big so when you get the washing in you have to make a few journeys to the peg bag. Being coloured some people may, but surely not ... match the colours to the washing, Oh my days, really!

Anyway, imagine coming home to find your favourite jumper on the line pegged on by the cuffs, shirts by the pointy bits of the collar, trousers by legs creating a V shape which you could peg something in between, but tea towels, towels and flannels all hung reasonably well. I always remember a short saying:

Things on the top you peg from the bottom and things for the bottom you peg from the top.

I remember when my mum hung my best and favourite jumper on the line, folded over so it was in half; when it dried there was a very visible line right across the jumper that stayed there for ages. It was not possible to wear it again, ever.



Take my neighbours; their washing is hung about a foot apart, why? Do they think the tops will attack the bottoms and the socks will run off with the pants? It then takes two changes of washing whereas if they had all been correctly hung (in my view) it could have all been dried in one go. Why do people hang socks in pairs? I just peg whatever is next in the basket much to my husband's despair. I really cannot be bothered to match them up, all facing the same way. When you take them off the line, they get chucked back in the basket all muddled up so therefore need sorting into pairs again. I dislike doing the same job twice.

Then there is a prop; surely it should be placed in the middle of the line? There are different types of props: the ones that just flop down at the slightest breeze, the wooden ones that give you splinters as soon as you move them and the ones with the sliding frame that catch fingers just like Arkwright's till in *Open all Hours*.

Whirligig lines - good, bad or just plain dangerous. Whilst having coffee at a friend's house, she put her washing out on said line, only to find her dog hanging on for grim death to a shirt sleeve running round and round like a whirling dervish, having a whale of a time and completely ruining the shirt. I have had issues myself with these torture lines. They are death traps (well I exaggerate a bit); having been really chuffed at getting one, I duly started to peg washing on it but it was a windy day and I was not fully trained in the tantrums and hissyfits of a whirligig, but I would be soon.

Looking back, I think a windy day was not an ideal time to learn. I pegged the big stuff on the outside and when I had finished, I had the undies to peg out but could not get them on the line unless I took the big stuff off, so I had to start again. When I came to putting the sheets on the line the wind got up so it was extremely difficult. The sheets were everywhere; I pegged one corner on, then the other fell off. The line was whirling round like a spinning top. I bent down to retrieve a pillowcase and as I stood up ... crack! the corner of the whirligig thudded into my head. As I fell to the ground, I caught my leg on the washing basket; blood was everywhere. I stood up to assess the damage to my leg and the whirligig came round again, knocking me off balance straight into the washing basket which tipped up making me fall badly. That is when I passed out.

Next thing I knew was my husband standing over me not knowing if to laugh or cry, until he saw the blood, then realised I had been knocked out and needed immediate medical attention. Not sure what happened next but It was embarrassing to have to explain to A&E that I was attacked by a whirligig, but it made them laugh. After being kept in overnight due to concussion, a leg with stitches and an arm in plaster as I had broken it on my way to the ground, I decided that a plain old fashioned washing line was good enough for me. Hence the saying *If it ain't broke don't fix it.* Moral of the story: buy a tumble dryer or train your husband better to hang the washing out.





SOME HISTORICAL FACTS Part 2

In the 1500s, people cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that hung over the fire. The fire was lit daily and more things were added to the pot: mostly vegetables as meat was rare. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while. Hence the rhyme: Peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old. Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could bring home the bacon. They would cut off a little to share with quests and would all sit around and chew the fat. Those with money had pewter plates. Acidic food caused some of the lead to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning and death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous. Lead cups were used to drink ale or whisky. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a few days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of holding a wake.

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or the *upper crust*. England is old and small and the local folks started running out of places to bury people. They dug up coffins and took the bones to a bone-house and reused the grave. When reopening these coffins, one out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realised they had buried people alive, so they tied a string on the wrist of the corpse. The string passed through the coffin and up through the ground with a bell at the end. Someone had to sit in the graveyard all night (*the graveyard shift*) to listen for the bell; thus, someone could be *saved by the bell* or was a *dead ringer*. That is the truth; who ever said history was boring?

Nature Notes

Herb Robert, Geranium robertianum

Loved from my earliest years. I knew that if I pinched the leaves of Herb Robert it would release a rather distinctive smell, but not a perfume. It is a pretty plant, a great favourite in my garden, and is a member of the Cranesbill family, due to the shape of the seed pod. Its name came from the founder of the Cistercian order in the 11th century, Abbé Robert. In Medieval times the plant was used to ward off evil spirits and ill health. Culpeper used this plant as an astringent to arrest bleeding. In the case of accidents, the crushed leaves applied to the wound caused the bleeding to cease. Today a herbalist might use this plant to deal with peptic ulcers and internal bleeding and it can be used as a gargle for the mouth and throat. It is said that tea made from Herb Robert can lower blood sugar in diabetics.



Herb Robert is thought of as a cancer cure in Scottish folk medicine, referred to as *cancer wort*, a notion that goes back centuries. In fact, this plant increases the amount of oxygen in the cells; it is said cancer cannot live in oxygenrich conditions. How did our ancestors know such things? Perhaps from observation? Dr Otto Warburg, German physiologist said; "The prime cause of cancer is lack of oxygenation of the cells". He did not mention Herb Robert, but it could be one way of increasing the oxygen in the body. The German naturopath Rudolph Breuss suggested that a daily pinch of dried Herb Robert steeped in a half cup of water for ten minutes could increase the chances of a pregnancy; therefore as the folk lore suggests, it offers good luck and fertility.
