Planning Appeal Inquiry Confirmed - Support Needed
Following the refusal of planning permission by Uttlesford
District Council (UDC), the Planning Inspectorate has confirmed that this will go to a Public Inquiry on 13th July for five days. Save Stansted Village (SSV) combined with Stansted
Parish Council will act as a 'rule 6' party, to represent the community at the inquiry. The inquiry location is to be confirmed, and we encourage anybody who feels strongly about this issue to attend, all or in part. Our efforts to fight this application have stepped up. We have employed a planning consultant and are looking to engage a landscape



architect, as much of the objection will revolve around the harm to our countryside. We have engaged with UDC planning to ensure our strategies are aligned and we are preparing our Statement of Case and Proofs of Evidence. Many in the community are engaged with supporting this activity and we thank them for their help.

What can you do to help?

Please sign our petition on the website. If you have any photographs you think would be helpful for our case, for

example traffic congestion and flooding, please email them to us. If they contain pictures of people, they should only be taken in a public place. Most importantly, please support our fundraising activity. So far, we have raised over £8k and are targeting £20k to fund our expert witnesses and planning consultant. We know it is a difficult time to ask for money but these resources are vital to give us the best chance of success. Funds are managed through the Parish Council and online transfers can be made directly to Stansted Parish Council, Sort Code 20-36-98, Account Number 20147168. Playing Catch-up: how to super-charge your Baby or Toddler's Development after Lockdown

As we emerge from national lockdown, after months of staying at home, those of us that became new parents just before or during the pandemic year will naturally be asking the question how can I help my baby to adjust to 'normal' life? Much of the answer to that question comes down to two things: socialisation and communication. When babies can adequately express themselves, they feel more confident in making friends, dealing with unfamiliar people and situations and comprehending the world around them. Many people think language development begins when a baby says his or her first words, but it actually begins in the womb, with sound. Rhythm and pitch, eye contact, facial expression and gesture are the building blocks of communication. Helping your child to attach meaning to a word or phrase by adding a gesture, like waving when you say the word hello will fast-track their language abilities, and increase their confidence. Here are some quick tips for super-charging your little one's development:

Up to 6 months

- When talking to your baby, hold him/her close and make eye contact
- As you feed, change and bathe your baby, chat about what you are doing
- Sing to your baby
- Repeat the sounds your baby makes back to them
- Talk in a sing-song voice

Between 6 and 12 months

- · Name and point out things you can both see
- Read books together
- Play games like peek-a-boo
- Use baby signs, as they will your child to remember and associate words with actions.

Sing and Sign courses have been developed with the help of speech and language therapists, with two age-appropriate courses which follow recommendations for supporting early development and communication. I have just started running classes at the Free Church Hall on Monday mornings; for more information or to book a space please contact me or visit my website.

Rehabilitating the sense of smell and helping the memory

The sense of smell can be lost for various reasons, not least Covid. The loss of smell can also be an early sign of dementia or Parkinson's disease. The rehabilitation of smell involves working with sight, hearing and memory. You will need a torch or lamp, earbuds or an electric toothbrush. To begin, get three different smells from the kitchen, such as lemon peel, mint and vanilla. Shut your eyes, cover one nostril and sniff each one. Then change nostril and compare. It is common for one nostril to have a better sense of smell than the other. We are going to rehabilitate the nostril with the weakest smell. Cover the better nostril, then position a light source forwards and above the same eye as the closed nostril. If rehabilitating the right nostril, illuminate from above the left. Sniff away. If there is no improvement, we can try adding sound to one ear or vibrating with your electric toothbrush on your jawbone. Try different sides to see which helps. You can combine these rehab exercises in other scenarios. When talking to someone on the phone, hold the phone to the ear that helped, and position the light as before, with a sprig of mint or similar to hand.



On its route through the brain, smells are identified in the region that handles speech and vocabulary, and from there into the hippocampus, a major player in memory. Therefore, to further improve smell, combine it with memory by listing all the fruits and vegetables you can, starting with a letter: B, for example. Aside from broader health concerns, it is worth cultivating your sense of smell because it improves your appreciation of food, and abilities as a cook.



THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

On the day that Prince Philip died, my next-door neighbour, who is in charge of the flag at St John's, knocked and asked me if I wanted it at half-mast. I said that I did, and so it remained in a lowered position until the day after the funeral, when it was returned once more to the top of the pole. The church has now done its observance (including a memorial service in the week leading up to the funeral) and finds itself returning to business as usual. The national observance too has largely come to an end; Prince Philip's death has quietly slipped down the news agenda and lost much of its grip on the public consciousness.

And yet, for those closest to Prince Philip, the process of grieving is very far from over. Most people have moved on but mourning for the Queen and other members of the royal family does not end at the same time as the public attention and sympathy. It is a sad truth that for many people, their grief endures longer than the rest of the world's attention span. When initial condolences cease, the subsequent stages of loss can often be draining, lonely and unsupported. Of course, immediate expressions of sympathy are important, but what has the real power to heal are the ongoing relationships and the ongoing systems of support that come about through strong community. We might not be able to invite a grieving queen into our community life but fostering habits of enduring compassion and concern is within our gift – and it is something that makes us stronger not only as the people of Stansted, but as a country too.



RANDOM JOTTINGS

A Mystery

Back in the 1970s, we had two sons at what was then Newport Grammar School for Boys. As good parents, we attended the school summer fair at the school and one of the stalls was selling end of line new paperback books. I spotted one Penguin Classic which I thought I ought to read, so bought it and became hooked on T E Lawrence's Seven Pillars of Wisdom. This is his account of the part he played in the Arab Revolt against the Ottoman Empire in 1916. I read the book and became intrigued and, somewhat obsessed with all things relating to Lawrence's activities from his birth in 1888 to his tragic death in 1935. I have accumulated almost 100 volumes on the subject since then though I do not claim to have read them all. One of these books has a mysterious inscription in the fly leaf. It is written in pencil in longhand and a foreign language, or a transliteration from one. This is a transcript:

The book is a copy of *The Arab Awakening* by George Antonius. It was first published in 1938 but my copy is a reprint from 1945, and it is war-time quality. I do not remember where I bought the book. Is there anyone reading this who can help me to decipher this writing and solve the mystery? It may just be a shopping list or verses from the Quran. I would just like to know.

STANSTED WINDMILL

STRIKING ATTRACTION

A strong head for heights was called for recently when fine spring weather and the easing of the lockdown provided the Stansted Millers with a chance to complete repairs to the village's windmill.

For three days in April villagers will have seen mill wright Paul Kemp and local engineer Steve Mansfield atop the 57 ft Grade-II* listed structure.

Using a cherry picker brought over from Peterborough, the duo set about fixing the windmill's striking mechanism that controls its shutters which rotate the landmark's distinctive white sails.

"The platform at the top of the mill has slumped two to three inches, affecting the striking mechanism," says Richard Thomas, treasurer of the Stansted Millers. "We overhauled the mechanism in September but it didn't fully solve the problem."

Since the work in April, the sails can be operated from ground level as they now move in lighter winds than before because the repairs have allowed the shutters to close more freely and close fully.

Mr Thomas says keeping the sails moving is vital in maintaining public interest. "Otherwise it becomes just a static historical monument," he adds.

The duo were assisted in their work at the top of the structure by a team of volunteers, who were also busy applying a fresh lick of paint to store lockers and floodlight boxes, as well as restoring the visitor information board at the foot of the mill.

Preserving a mill with Scheduled Ancient Monument status and that retains much of its original machinery from 1787 requires biannual inspections, typically performed in the winter and summer months, and the need for frequent, expensive repair work.

"Fixing the striking mechanism has cost about £4,000 which we fund from our budget," explains Mr Thomas. "But replacing the sails in future years for safety reasons could be north of £70,000. For that we would

be looking for grants from English Heritage or sponsors like the Stansted Airport Passenger Fund."

Money raised from social events such as coffee mornings, plant sales and quiz nights put on by the Stansted Millers goes towards covering the windmill's bills. Other than acting as one of two trustees for the mill, the Parish Council sets aside part of its budget each year to help with its up-keep. This amounted to £5,670 in 2020-21.

In normal years, the Stansted Millers would raise a significant amount of funding from their summer fête. "But we managed no fundraising last year, or even so far this one, because of the pandemic," says Mr Thomas. "Hopefully the fête will go ahead on the Bank Holiday in August, and that should bring in some money."

Entrance fees to the mill also help pay for its upkeep, and usually the windmill is open on Bank Holidays, and the first Sunday of each month between May and October. Covid regulations, however, have pushed back the start of this year's visitor season to July 4.

YOUNG BLOOD NEEDED

More stewards would allow the windmill to open more frequently. The Stansted Millers has 8 people on its committee and 40-50 members who pay a £5 annual fee to support the mill, but the organisation is keen to recruit some fresh, young blood into its ranks.

"We joke that if you have a seven in front of your age in this organisation you are young," says Mr Thomas, who is himself 74. "We could really do with some young, active people to help us."

POLICE LIVE CHAT SERVICE


Uttlesford District Police are keen to highlight a live chat service that helps you report non-emergency crime such as anti-social behaviour in your area.

The Live Chat service allows people to send and receive real-time direct messages with police online operators. Live Chat aims to ease demand on the existing 101 telephone service while improving community policing in areas such as Stansted by getting help to those in need as quickly as possible.

"The Live chat function is an alternative way of reporting online," says PC Kerry Rowson of Essex Police. "It is

not monitored by the Community Policing Team. However, any incidents created from the chat would be highlighted in the same way as if they were phoned."

Live Chat is accessible every day between 7am-11pm if you have a desktop computer, a laptop, a tablet or



even a mobile phone. Just search for essex.police.uk where at the bottom of the web page you will find Live Chat highlighted.

PC Rowson also encourages residents with internet access to follow its Uttlesford Facebook page (@EPUttlesford) where the Community Policing Team posts its updates.

CITIZENS ADVICE LIBRARY SERVICE

The planned introduction of touch screens at the Mountfitchet Exchange library could see residents have increased access to the Citizen's Advice service.

Each year Uttlesford Citizens Advice helps around 200 Stansted villagers manage problems in their lives such as trouble accessing the right care for a loved one; money worries; redundancy fears or hurdles applying for benefits.

With demand for appointments in Stansted growing each year, the team at Uttlesford Citizens Advice explored ways to expand and improve access to their service. The solution they settled on was touch-screen technology.

The pandemic taught them valuable lessons about user behaviour. Face-to-face consultations remained the preferred way to get help, but clients were happy to accept telephone advice as an effective alternative. But they discovered that advice calls are not without

drawbacks. For example a lack of credit on mobiles and poor reception can be an issue, while posting supporting documents and letters can be expensive and cause delays. Adopting touch screens to act as a 'doorbell' is seen as a way around such hurdles.

With screens installed in the library, users will use them to alert the service they need a chat. An adviser from Citizens Advice will then appear on the screen, and advisors can employ cloud-managed printers and scanners to print out client documents. The goal is to provide the same level of service a client would get from a face-to-face interaction. In-person appointments will be offered and booths sound-proofed too.

It is hoped the project will open in the Stansted library by the end of this month.

UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Cllr Alan Dean writes:

TIDE TURNS ON AIRPORT PLANS

When I last wrote this column in early January, I raised several issues that are still with us, so I will try to update Link readers.

The airport expansion appeal hearings ended in March. You will have read in the May edition of the Link accounts by my colleague Geoffrey Sell and by Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) that were seriously critical of Uttlesford's legal team's "defence" against the airport's appeal to overturn UDC's refusal of expansion plans.

As I write, I am pursuing internally what I consider to be the contra-democratic act of a council that acted in the opposite way from the decision of its own planning committee!

Anyway, in April the government in Westminster decided (at last) that carbon emissions from aviation should be included in the UK's future carbon budgets to curtail climate change. That is a breakthrough.

It fits with the case behind the planning committee's refusal last year. It aligns with SSE's case at the appeal. But NOT with UDC's formal case at the appeal! Now the Council finds itself on the backfoot whilst the appeal inspectors take stock of the changed circumstances. Watch this space!

PENNINGTON LANE APPEAL

The results of the council's call for (building) sites in the latest (of several!) attempt to produce a Local Plan are expected to be published in June or July. Then there will be public consultations. I remain less convinced than I have ever been that this council will be capable of making the necessary hard decisions to complete a workable plan.

In July there will be an appeal against UDC's refusal of the opportunistic planning application west of Pennington Lane. On this occasion, thankfully, UDC will be working alongside the Save Stansted Village group and the Parish Council hopefully to see off this opportunistic application.

DAY CENTRES PLANS - FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Finally, I just want to say that I have been very disappointed with the way that Uttlesford District Council is treating some of the Stansted's elderly people.

The Day Centre has been used for many years by some of our more senior residents for companionship over a hot lunch three days a week. It has been closed for over 12 months because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

In recent months, advantage has been taken of the enforced closure to firstly scrap hot lunches henceforth, and secondly enhance the community use of the premises whenever they reopen.

I've told the ruling administration and our officers at Uttlesford that they are going about this the wrong way. They should firstly listen to what people want in future and then work out a new programme of activities. To scrap a decent meal for, let's say, a sausage roll and a packet of crisps will not do. I hope that UDC will see sense before too long.

There is local hope from the creation of the new community service TouchPoint* that Stansted will not be short changed. My colleagues and I will do our best to make sure Uttlesford continues to fund the new setup. My colleague Ayub Khan is on the Uttlesford task group due to work up the new services that UDC will support, and I know that he will fight for what local people need and want.

*This volunteer-run project aims to offer an inclusive meeting space where people can meet, share ideas and find support. At a Full Council Meeting on April 7, the Parish Council agreed to back TouchPoint, helping it shape a business plan for Uttlesford District Council and negotiating terms of occupation with the organisation to use the premises at Crafton Green.

I like to look back when I write these articles; this time last year we were beginning to welcome the return of volunteers but could not yet tell when we would have visitors. Now we have already had our first visitors - at the April Open Day, which was a lovely sunny day enjoyed by all. On the first few Open Thursdays, visitors came to see the volunteers at work. By June, hopefully lockdowns will be a distant memory and we will have normal beautiful late spring weather. We will be joined at the Open Day on **Sunday 27**th **June** by Jono Forgham, local naturalist, who will show visitors the bugs in the gardens; and by the RSPB, Essex Bat Group, Essex Wildlife Trust and the Woodland Trust. Our beekeepers, local coppicers and a local woodturner will also be with us.



Assuming we have a bit more rain by June, the gardens should be looking gorgeous, and we may have some early produce from the walled kitchen garden on sale, as well as plant and jam stalls. Key plants around the gardens in early June are common orchids, the philadelphus and on good years the lovely false acacia, which may be late this year. Towards the end of June there should be roses and waterlilies. In the walled kitchen garden, the squashes should be spreading out and perhaps climbing up the hazel A-frames erected for them. At this time of year, I hope it is useful for me to share the RSPB advice on what to do if you find a baby bird:

- If fully feathered, it has left the nest deliberately. Leave it where it is
- A very young nestling (naked/downy), may have fallen accidentally. You can return it to the nest, but only if you know where it came from and if it is healthy
- If in a dangerous, exposed location, you can carefully move it a short distance to somewhere safer. Handling will not cause its parents to abandon it
- Keep cats indoors as much as possible until fledglings are airborne
- Removal from the wild is a very last resort if the fledgling
 is injured, orphaned or definitely abandoned. It is now
 dependent on humans for survival and should be passed
 to an expert rehabilitator as soon as possible. The RSPB
 does not run a bird rescue service, so please contact a
 local rescue service such as www.helpwildlife.co.uk or the
 RSPCA
- Grounded fledglings of a few species definitely do need help. These include swifts, barn owls and birds of prey.

As summer arrives, we hope that readers will continue to enjoy the walks listed on the website. These varied routes provide a wonderful opportunity to appreciate the variety of wildflowers growing in field margins, hedgerows, verges, churchyards and village greens. After this season's chilly start, the warmer days have encouraged an abundance of flowers to provide essential nectar and pollen to support visiting pollinators. With the increasing concern about the alarming reduction in insect numbers, many of those caring for green spaces have adopted the *no mow in May* approach to grass maintenance, where the uncut grassy places can support a surprisingly large number of different native species. Their flowers add variety to these areas and the bees benefit as well!



Wayside plants such as stinging nettles and goosegrass (the long, hairy plant that sticks to your socks) thrive alongside lanes and tracks, as does cow parsley which, with its splay of tiny white flowers, can grow as high as a person. A touch of pink is often added by the flowers of red campion, also known as bachelor's buttons as it might have been worn as a buttonhole by unmarried men. Common bright yellow flowers include dandelions and the shiny golden petals of a great variety of buttercups. The tall ox-eye daisy is often present where wildflower mixtures have been sown. In recent years these have become a common sight beside new roadways. The types of wild flower I have listed can be seen and enjoyed almost everywhere in the Hundred Parishes. There are many more varieties to be seen and occasionally something quite rare. For smart phone users there are apps to help with identification, but we do not have to be experts to appreciate and enjoy nature's abundance.

Nature Notes

Spring into Summer

On sunny days we have enjoyed sitting in the garden, watching the coming of spring. Two young robins emerged in mid-April and although capable of feeding themselves they were quick to scrounge a titbit from mum if they saw her pick up a grub from the lawn.

The latter has been providing a constant supply of food for the pigeons, blackbirds, hedge sparrows and particularly for the thrush, which, when not foraging for worms and snails,



spent the day from dawn until dusk singing his heart out. He was well camouflaged and surprisingly difficult to spot in the trees and bushes, whereas the blackbird liked to sing perched on the roof for all to see. Blue tits busily investigated the new buds on the oak tree and the pigeons fed on the opening buds on the beech tree across the road. Our half dozen local pigeons were sometimes joined by a flock of up to 30 others and spent hours devouring all the fresh shoots. One would think that the beech tree would be stripped bare but it has now come into full leaf as if it had not been touched.

The red kite regularly patrols the area flying not very far above the tree tops, whereas the buzzard circles and drifts along. If it finds a thermal it soars ever higher until it is a mere speck which would disappear if you took your eyes off it for a moment.

During the dry spell the bird baths needed to be cleaned and refilled every other day and it was noticeable how the little birds loved to bathe as soon as the fresh water arrived. One of the hedge sparrows took a particularly long time bathing, splashing, fluttering and preening; perhaps she had been sitting on her nest and needed to freshen up. Anyhow, after all her ablutions, I am sure that she looked gorgeous to the others.

David Allen spoke to us about the life of Agatha Christie in April, via Zoom. Agatha Mary Clarissa Miller was born in Torquay in 1890. She spent much of her childhood alone; she was a shy child who wrote poems and loved reading. Her father had died when she was 12 and she lived with her mother. She was sent to school two days a week and to a finishing school in Paris. When her mother became ill, a doctor suggested a warmer climate so they lived for three months in a hotel in Cairo, which Agatha loved. Agatha was a good-looking girl and married Archibald Christie in 1914. During the war she nursed Belgian soldiers, and she had a baby girl, Rosalind, soon after the war. Hercule Poirot

appeared soon after in her first novel *The Mysterious Affair at Styles* for which she was paid only £25. She did not like M Poirot, so no wonder some of us find him irritating!

Twelve years after they were married Archie fell in love with someone else. Agatha was devastated and disappeared causing an intensive search. They divorced in 1928. Agatha took a trip to Baghdad on the Orient Express; whilst there she met Max Mallowan, an archaeologist, and they married a year later. Her first Miss Marple novel was written in 1930. In 1952 *The Mousetrap* opened in London and played continuously until last year; the longest-running play in the world. Agatha is the author of 66 detective novels which have been translated into 100 languages. She also wrote romantic novels under the name of Mary Westmacott. She died in 1976 aged 85, Max died in 1978. Their home in Devon, Greenway, was given to the National Trust and is well worth a visit.

We will be having our annual meeting in May via Zoom, and are looking forward to meeting outside as a group in June, and being able to talk and see each other.

STOP STANSTED EXPANSION TO BE SUCCEEDED

STANSTED AIRPORT WATCH

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) is ending almost 19 years of campaigning under the SSE banner, to be replaced by Stansted Airport Watch (SAW). SSE Chairman, Peter Sanders, explained the rationale for the changes: "Regardless of the outcome of the recent Public Inquiry, Stansted is unlikely to apply for any further increase in its capacity for many years to come. As a result of Covid-19, the current planning cap of 35 million passengers per annum is not expected to be reached within the next decade and it is questionable whether permission to grow to 43mppa will ever be needed. It is questionable whether 'Stop Stansted Expansion' continues to be an appropriate name for our campaign. Over the years, SSE has done far more than just dealing with the threat of expansion, such as campaigning on night flights, climate change and much more."

In the 12 months to 31st March, Stansted handled just three million passengers compared to 28 million in 2019, before air travel was decimated by the pandemic. The UK will not be able to meet its statutory target of net zero carbon emissions by 2050 unless aviation emissions are brought under much tighter control. This almost certainly means that aviation growth will need to be constrained. That work will continue to be necessary, and the view of the SSE Committee is that this is the right time to re-focus the campaign on the task ahead; the need will be to ensure that the airport's authorised operations cause as little harm as possible. A further reason for the new organisation is to help bring about a changing of the guard within SSE. If there were to be another threat of airport expansion in, say, ten years' time, the current team would not be the best people to handle that challenge. The hiatus caused by Covid-19 provides an opportunity to allow new blood to learn and gain experience of dealing with the key issues. Peter Sanders concluded: "SSE has notched up some considerable successes but now is exactly the right time to refocus and rejuvenate the campaign for the longer term. I have no doubt that SAW will be every bit as effective as SSE and, as its name implies, will be ever-vigilant in seeking to minimise the negative impacts of the airport upon the local community and the environment." Peter will be standing down as Chairman at this year's AGM on 26th May, having been a founder member in 2002 and Chairman since 2004. The change to SAW will take effect from that date.


