EDITORIAL



We really enjoyed having Jenny Gibbs as a speaker at our January meeting on Zoom. She intrigued us with the story of her very first trip abroad, which was also her first cruise. As she has a phobia about water she had never dared to go on a boat before. She chose a small sailing boat, with only 12 passengers, and stayed in her tiny cabin for most of the journey emerging only at the end of the trip, off the coast of Turkey, to see a beautiful view of cloudless blue skies and turquoise water. She decided there and then to return and live there!

When she returned home, she was offered redundancy and took it; she was 50 years old and made immediate plans to return to Dalaman in West Turkey. She managed to get a job in a restaurant and soon learnt to speak Turkish. The head chef, Mustafa, invited her to visit his family home in a very small village up a steep mountain. Looking back, she realised how trusting and naïve she had been. The women were all in national dress, which is very colourful and sparkly. She was dressed like this for us to see. Jenny was the first foreigner to visit the village and later that week Mustafa suggested that they buy a farmhouse together if she wanted to stay, which she did; many years later they are still renovating it! At this point she introduced Mustafa, now a handsome man with thick white hair, in place of the jet black he used to have. He smiled at us and said: "now you understand why - she never stops talking!" They spend half the year in Suffolk and the other half in Turkey, where they make silk from their own silk-worms as many people do. When here Jenny talks to many groups about Turkish customs and crafts and sells some of her silk scarves. Our competition that evening was a holiday souvenir; but none of us had anything to rival Mustafa!

Our National Committee is still producing the monthly magazine *WI Life* and it is good to know that so many WIs are keeping together and managing to do projects such as community gardening, online book clubs and arranging Zoom meetings with speakers and inviting other institutes.

As I sit here in my office the snow flurries past my window in great big gusts; spring is surely right around the corner ... right? I am eager to start planning this season's vegetables, which means crop rotations, companion planting, turning beds, mulching, trenching and weeding and pruning. Also, considering when to chit potatoes and then planning when to apply all our organic materials and biological pest control. Oh, and remember to start sowing a small amount of seeds this month! It need not be overwhelming. When planning your edible gardening, think carefully about what you and your close ones like to eat or what kind of flowers you enjoy growing. You do not want to be spending lots of time on plants that require a lot of work!



I decide what I want to grow and where I will put plants and seeds in the garden. It is important to keep a journal or, if you are like me, a spreadsheet of all the plants you have ever grown and in the exact position they grew in the years before. This process will make your life so simple as the years go on, as you will totally forget what you planted in March 2015! I have a silly little rhyme that I use to help me remember: Roots, Fruits, Beans and Greens. Memorise this and it will help you stay ahead of the many years of planning you are about to embark on. We call this crop rotation. Every year you will want to rotate the crops you are growing so that you can maintain a healthy balance of nutrients in the soil while keeping the biodiversity in check. When rotating your crops always plan around your main crop. Good luck growers. If you have any questions, please contact nikkidimmock@humanrootscommunity.org.uk or get in touch via our website. 

Balance Training 2

To improve balance needs more than just practising it. In December we explored simply turning round in a circle to the side that needs stimulation. This month we are digging deeper with a more precise balance drill. First test your balance in a way that is challenging but not impossible:

- 1 Sitting or standing, hold a pen vertically in front of you and stare at a target on it
- 2 Swallow hard so your tongue is in the roof of the mouth. This matters
- Tuck your chin down a bit. This is important
- 4 Now move the pen to your right, following it with head and neck. Keep staring
- Shut your eyes and return head and pen to the start, 5 moving more slowly
- Do this three times, then retest your balance
- Now do exactly the same but moving the pen to the left. Retest, using the same leg as before
- You need to do this exercise to the side that gave the best result. Do it regularly throughout the day.

Having the tongue right up in the roof of the mouth is critical for neck stability and also helps make this exercise more effective for other more complicated reasons. Tucking in the chin slightly can also help neck stability and also makes the exercise more precise. Over the next few months, we will explore other parts of the balance - or vestibular - system. So if this did not help much, there will be other exercises to try.



Nature Notes

Yarrow Achillea millefolium

During the Trojan War, Achilles used herbs including yarrow to heal battle wounds. The scientific name Achillea pays homage to him. Yarrow has many common names: to military personnel, it would be 'soldier's woundwort', to the woodworker, 'carpenter's herb'. On the home front it is known as 'staunch-wort' and 'nosebleed'. It has antiseptic, astringent and wound healing qualities. Before the days of the pharmacist, plants growing nearby could be relied upon for first aid. Yarrow has been used since the Neanderthal period. A cave thought to be 60,000 years old was found in the Zagros Mountains in North East Iraq. The grave became known as Shanidar IV, the Flower Burial. Scientists investigating in the 1950s thought this was the grave of a Shaman, or healer. He was laid out on a bed of yarrow, and pollen of plants found with him were hollyhock, St Barnaby's thistle, cornflower, grape hyacinth, marshmallow and groundsel. All plants are still used by a modern herbalist. Yarrow was used as a springy mattress material, and this is so today.



Now to more recent times. In the 12th century, Hildegard von Bingen was Abbess of her nunnery in Germany. She was exceedingly learned and talented; she knew about cancer, and treated it with violets, a plant that is being investigated today as a possible cancer cure. More amazingly, she understood metastases, the secondary cancerous growths in other parts of the body. For this she advocated yarrow tea to stop its spread. Her learning she declared came from God, and she wrote many books about the God-given plants that she used. The flowers of the yarrow will be out in May and June; for now only the feathery leaves are showing.

THE STANSTED IN BLOOM GROUP

Britain in Bloom is the UK's longest running gardening competition. It provides a regional and nationwide platform for community groups to brighten up their village, town or city. The Stansted in Bloom Group has been established by a small group of residents who were involved in last year's Stansted in Bloom competition and all wanted to make a positive difference in their community. We have set ourselves the following objectives:

- To work in partnership with the Parish Council for the betterment and beautification of the village
- To increase community involvement in volunteer led projects as supported and agreed by the Parish Council
- To look for sponsorship and financial support to assist in improvement projects
- To enhance the environment throughout Stansted Mountfitchet by encouraging sustainable practices and increasing the local biodiversity
- To foster community spirit and encourage civic pride with enhanced planting, weeding, cleaning and recycling initiatives.

We want to engage with other groups such as Human Roots and the Stansted Litter Pickers who have been doing great work for some time. We are also in contact with the Essex Wildlife Trust and hope to work with them on a bee corridor into the village. It is our intention to enter the village in the Anglia in Bloom competition and we will be judging the established Stansted in Bloom competition on Sunday 11th July. The site of our first project is the area around the Knight sign at the northern entry point to the village at the High Lane/Cambridge Road junction.

The Covid-19 restrictions make organising any working groups almost impossible at the moment but once they are relaxed we hope to have groups out and about in the village making our village even more attractive. Knight Signs

Researching the history behind the Knight signs, which are located at the northern and southern entry points to the village, has proved a challenge as the documentation that has survived leaves a few unexplained gaps. It would appear that the sign at the Blythwood Gardens junction dates from the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 and was paid for by donations from residents and businesses in the village. The original sign at the Northern end of the village seems to date from 1982 and was paid for by two members of the Stansted and District Chamber of Trade. By the time of the Golden Jubilee in 2002 both signs were in a poor state of repair and seem to have been replaced at a cost of £3,000.

Most people will have noted the area around the Knight sign at the Southern end of the village has had a makeover with a new flower bed which will soon be planted up to create an attractive entry point to the village. The Knight sign itself is in reasonable condition but will need a bit of TLC before too long. The sign at the High Lane junction has not fared well and was removed at the end of January (see photo below) so that it could undergo some restoration work which will cost over £1,000. It should be back in place by mid-March to coincide with the whole site undergoing landscaping work and planting, which will transform an area that has suffered due to all the development work at that end of the village. Thanks to the generous support of Sworders Auction House, the Stansted in Bloom Group was able to commission Liz Lake Associates to design and deliver the project.



The 1979 Stansted and District Guide to Shops and Services includes a picture of one of the original Knight Signs on its front cover. The guide shows how Stansted had evolved from the village in the 1940s which John Salmon described in his articles in the September and October 2020 editions of The Link. Many of the businesses John listed in his articles had survived but in the years since the end of World War II the UK had undergone some fairly radical changes. The village had a vibrant retail and service sector which included four antique dealers, three banks, nine public houses and a night club. You could also buy, amongst other things a tent, a bike, a radio (and rent a TV), a bed (from the 'largest village furniture store in England'), a chainsaw, a tin of paint, a pair of stockings, a fountain pen, a set of clackers (from one of three toy shops!), a copy of Douglas Adams' Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy and a knitting pattern. There seems to have been a gap in the market for a men's outfitters and a record shop but other than that you could buy more or less everything you might need in the village. You could also get your boat and swimming pool serviced. Those were the days.



CENSUS 2021 DIGITAL FIRST



It is that time again. Ten years since the last national head-count, thousands of Stansted residents will soon be receiving invitations to participate in Census 2021.

The coronavirus pandemic had raised uncertainty over the timing of census, but the council has recently been informed that surveying will go ahead on Sunday, March 21st.

Census 2021 will be the third tallying-up of the UK population this century. Significantly it will break new ground in that it will be conducted digitally.

You will be given an access code by the Office of National Statistics to complete the census online, on mobile, phone or tablet. An online helpline area has been setup. Plus there is support by phone, webchat, social media and text to overcome any IT hiccups.

HELP FOR THOSE NOT ONLINE

After Census Day, field officers will visit households from which no information has been collected to offer help and advice on how to complete the questionnaire. Field officers will wear PPE and will never need to enter your home during the pandemic.

If it's safe and within government guidelines, you will also be able to access Census Support Centres to get help tackling the online questionnaire too. You are also encouraged to ask friends and family to help you complete the online form in the first instance.

CAN I CHOOSE NOT TO PARTICIPATE?

No. You must complete the census by law. You can be fined £1000 if you don't, as well as if the information you provide is false. It is not an offence if you do not answer parts that are voluntary.

WHO GETS WHAT AND HOW

Census 2021 tells the government and councils so much more than just how many people live in a particular area of the country. The information provided is used to determine what society needs today and what it is likely to need tomorrow by providing a detailed picture of everyone living in England and Wales.

At a local level the census could help to shape future funding decisions for this village. The information will focus decision-makers' minds as they weigh up whether to build roads and homes, expand social services, invest in schools and GP surgeries, or close them.

How much public money to fund our community, and in turn how much council tax residents end up paying over the next decade will depend on parishioners' answers to the questionnaire this March.

With the exception of 1941, when we were at war, there has been a national census conducted every ten years since 1801.

The last census in 2011 found Stansted Mountfitchet had a population of 6,669. Since then we have seen the construction of several housebuilding projects. So it is likely Census 2021 will confirm a sizeable increase on that figure. But how times have changed in this corner of the world since the first recorded census that included the village.

Conducted by that notorious bean counter, William the Conqueror, the Doomsday Book recorded in 1086 that Stansted Mountfitchet was host to 11 villagers, 20 small holders, 3 slaves and a priest! You can find out more about Census 2021 at census.gov.uk/about-thecensus.

TREES TO MAKE STANSTED GREENER AND CLEANER

Residents and landowners are being encouraged to take part in a county-wide scheme to plant thousands of trees to fight global warming.

Under the Essex Forest Initiative, £1 million has been set aside to plant 375,000 trees over a five year period. It is hoped that planting the equivalent of 210 football pitches of saplings will improve air quality, boost biodiversity and reduce flooding.

So how can you help? Stansted Parish Council is eager to hear suggestions from the public as to where trees could be planted in and around the village.

Given the numbers involved, the council would also like to hear from landowners who wish to participate in the scheme by setting aside suitable plots of land.

Timing is important as the optimum time for tree planting is between November and March each year.

Stansted Airport Inquiry

The inquiry into the appeal against the District Council's refusal of the application by Manchester Airports Group to expand Stansted Airport up to 43 million passengers per annum started in January. As most of the Inquiry proceedings are being held virtually you can view the livestream at

Local Plan - Call for sites

The District Council has issued a call for sites as part of its work on a new Local Plan. Anyone may submit a site or broad location for consideration, and the Council will use this information when preparing draft policies and site allocations. The Council has asked for site submissions for all types of land use, including - specifically - 'green sites' which may have benefits in terms of accessible open space, biodiversity gains and/or carbon absorption.

The deadline for submission of sites is 5pm on Wednesday 21 April 2021.

Uttlesford Housing Trajectory and 5 year Land Supply UDC have reviewed and updated and housing trajectory and 5-year housing land supply calculation (5YLS).

This represents the housing land supply position as of 1 April 2020 and demonstrates that the district has 3.11 years of housing supply for the 2020-2025 5-year period.

Having a land supply below 5 years makes the district more vulnerable to speculative applications from developers. This proved the case in Elsenham in December when Planning Inspectors upheld two appeals for the construction of 450 houses.

UDC's previous 5YLS, as of 1 April 2019 was 2.68 years. Rising above 3 year supply is significant because Neighbourhood Plans made within the last 2 years, which contain policies and allocations to meet their identified housing requirements, have additional protection from further development.

The second Uttlesford Local Heritage List

In 2018 Uttlesford District Council approved a first edition of its Local Heritage List (LHL). They have now identified a number of additional properties, including some in Stansted, which the council would like to include in a second edition of the LHL.

I notice that the Council are proposing to list a number of cast iron finger posts in some locations elsewhere in the district.

It strikes me that there a some similar finger posts in Stansted that are, in my opinion, suitable for listing including one at Bentfield Green and a couple on Pines Hill.

The latter ones have Birchanger named as the parish on the top so are physical and visual evidence of the expansion of Stansted to the south post the Second World War with the official absorption of the hamlet of Stoney Common/ Rochfords Nursery into Stansted in the early 1980s.

Please let me know if you can think of any other suitable signs elsewhere in the parish that would be suitable for inclusion in a future list.

Christmas Waste Collection Update

Uttlesford recycled at least 58% of waste collected immediately after the Christmas period.

Our collection crews worked hard during the catch-up period and collected over 275 tonnes of food waste and just over 700 tonnes of co-mingled recyclable materials.

Since the first national lockdown, the nature and volume of waste produced across the district has changed, with notable increases in the amount of glass and cardboard being presented for collection.

A new large vaccination centre in Harlow

On 26 January, West Essex's first large vaccination centre opened to patients at Harlow Leisurezone. A centre has also opened in Bishop's Stortford.

This will become available to book via the national vaccination booking website, by people who are eligible and have received letters from the NHS Covid-19 Vaccination Booking Service. The NHS is rolling out additional services quickly, but it is important to remember that vaccinations are by appointment only.

The West Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (WECCG) has asked councillors to remind local residents that everyone registered with a GP who is eligible to be vaccinated will be contacted in priority order, including those who are housebound or clinically extremely vulnerable. There is no need for anyone to proactively contact their surgery.

SHOUT OUT TO CHRISTMAS TREE HELPERS

Many, many thanks to all of those who were involved with the Community Christmas Tree at Castle Maltings this year.

We are grateful to Hiltons - site owners - for meeting the costs of the permanent base for the tree, and to D Honour & Sons Landscapes for erecting the tree and removing it again.

Without the services of John Banks there would have been no lights or decorations on the tree, and we are thankful that Roger Pryor was able to come down with his ladder!

The tree was paid for using the balance of the funds collected last year, supported by a contribution from the Parish Council.

If we want to see a tree there in 2021, we need to start collecting more funds please – of which more to follow in subsequent editions.

STANSTED AIRPORT PLANNING APPLICATION

In January 2020, Uttlesford's Planning Committee overwhelmingly rejected Manchester Airport Group's planning application for an extra 8mppa over the current 35mppa limit. Climate change impacts of the application figured very prominently in the Committee's decision to refuse permission. There is an environmental imperative that, for the purposes of this public hearing, can no longer conveniently be set aside. It is now universally accepted that we are living in a climate emergency. If the application is approved, Stansted Airport carbon emissions in 2028 would be 82% higher than assumed by the Department for Transport. Stansted's proposals would only increase aviation's carbon footprint further still, and would do nothing to square the circle between aviation expansion and its increasing impact on the environment. Stansted airport clearly thinks it can operate in a parallel universe where it isn't accountable for its actions and the subsequent environmental consequences that follow. This is surely a message at odds with our stewardship of Cop 26 in Glasgow next year.

Despite the unintended consequences of Covid-19 on aviation over recent months, the bigger picture is one of an industry that appears unwilling or unable to address the inconvenient truth that continued airport expansion and its significant environmental impact are not mutually exclusive! What we have here is Stansted Airport's owners seeking to apply an unsustainable business as usual approach to its impact on the climate in a dangerously warming world! The Climate Change Committee's advice to the Government at the beginning of December in its sixth carbon budget was clear and unequivocal: there should be no increase in the UK's airport capacity if emissions from flying are to be cut to net zero by 2050. A dangerous warming of the climate should be a clear warning to us all; it is neither the time nor the place for further expansion of Stansted, let alone any other airport in the UK.

I urge you to do the right thing: make a statement in which the wellbeing of the residents in Uttlesford and the protection of the environment is given priority over the commercial interests of Stansted Airport! We are told that humanity has only ten years to make a difference. You can make a difference by rejecting this appeal.

STANSTED AIRPORT EXTENSION

The planning application for this extension asks for 47,000 extra flights. An extra runway must have more taxiways. This application asks for additional airfield infrastructure, one new rapid entry and one new rapid exit taxi way. It needs this additional infrastructure to be able to operate sufficient flights to carry the additional passengers. It also asks for additional aircraft stands. This is clearly an expansion plan. Even before the effects of this dreadful pandemic there was much spare capacity on the existing airfield side of this airport; there is much less need now. Expansion is not needed or necessary and even less as a result of Covid-19. We should also consider the risks international travel brings into our country.

The roads in and around the village already operate to maximum capacity in normal times. The roads have hardly changed during the past 100 years other than their surfaces being strengthened to carry extremely heavy lorries. All the main roads in our village have bottle necks restricting traffic flows, often intentionally to discourage more traffic. To confirm this issue, Essex Highways is currently conducting a detailed HGV survey to identify where these vehicles start their journeys and their destinations; we have to find affordable ways to re-route these vehicles away from the village. Our local roads are crowded already; expansion of the airport will exacerbate this problem. Fly-parking is a problem on our roads to such a level that some have signs warning against the practice, but most roads do not, to the annoyance of local people.



There are many other issues such as noise, air pollution, climate change and health. Parts of Bishop's Stortford are frequently overlooked when considering aircraft noise; for example, the junction of Beldams Lane and Linkside Road. When aircraft take off to the south west and then turn onto the Clacton flight path, this area is extremely noisy. This is outside the noise contour.

I WONDER

Walking around the village I have become a little obsessed by how some of our streets and roads came by their names. The majority of the older long-established routes like Cambridge Road, Church Road and Lower Street are selfexplanatory but I wonder how Grove Hill and Silver Street got their names. A grove usually refers to a group of trees so perhaps it is as simple as that; after all there are still many trees in that area. It is not quite so easy to explain how Silver Street got its name. It has been suggested that



there was once either a silversmith or cutler with premises in the vicinity or maybe it was named after someone called Silver (as in Long John perhaps?). Then there is the more recent Spindles Lane off Silver Street; is that named after the pretty spindle tree, or does it have a windmill connection? The origin of

Cannons Mead is not that obvious either - a cannon being a big gun - and where on earth does the name Loppy's Hill come from?

It is quite common to call a road after a local person, land-mark, flora and fauna or to mark an event like the Coronation or Jubilee. London's Olympic Park is a recent example, and I wonder if there will also be a Pandemic Park at some point. Here are a few suggestions for other street names linked to the current Covid crisis – should they be needed: Rainbow Road, Two-metre Street, Stayhome Gardens or Captain Tom Mews. I know that we do not need reminders as we are never likely to forget the pandemic and its effects, but for future generations walking – or more likely driving – along a road called Lock Downs for instance, might be scratching their heads and wondering why it was called that; just like I do whenever I go down Loppy's Hill.

Therefore, the message to all our supporters is to stay safe and well; our teams will be back at some point in 2021.

The pandemic has added a brutal blow to what is already often the hardest thing we ever have to go through as human beings: saying goodbye to a loved one. We are unable to visit them in hospital, hold their hand in their care home, or give them the funeral we would have wanted. Currently a maximum of 30 people, excluding the staff, funeral director, and minister/celebrant, can attend. Social distancing has to be observed throughout, and you may not be allowed to touch the coffin or display pictures. Wakes, interments, scattering of ashes and memorials are limited to six people. The limited numbers are a relief to some people: a reason to keep mourners to immediate friends and family. To others, it is added stress - who makes the cut? However you are feeling, the vast majority of people will understand that things have to happen differently at the moment.

Many venues can livestream the ceremony, potentially reaching more people, especially if they are isolating or abroad. If it is unavailable, there are companies who can provide this service, or you can set up your own Zoom link and do it yourself. You can only do your best, and you can always do more later on. Grief does not end at the funeral; you do not stop loving a person because the funeral has happened. Make plans for a memorial or a celebration of life at a later time. Yes, Zoom wakes are even happening!


