LICENSED PHARMACY FOR STANSTED

The need for a Licensed Pharmacy near the Surgery Essex County Council (ECC) Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment (PNA) team in their 2018 report states: "It can be seen that nearly the whole of Essex area population can reach a pharmacy within 20 minutes travel time by car." It makes no comment about issues such as: Chapel Hill is very steep; we should be driving less because of climate change; people with physical disabilities cannot negotiate the steps into Boots, our only licensed pharmacy, which is closed 1.00pm-2.00pm every day, and whose service is suffering as a consequence of increasing demands due to population growth in Stansted and surrounding communities.

The ECC PNA Report is being reviewed; the revised report will be published this year. I have spoken to over 600 people who have signed my petition; the community asks for choice and that another licensed pharmacy is within a convenient distance without having to use a car. Some people who have responded to the ECC online survey commented that the survey does not give the opportunity to say why another licensed pharmacy, conveniently located for those living south of the railway line and nearby communities, is needed. The community clearly supports the need for another licensed pharmacy and for it to be as close as possible to the surgery. The next step is to provide ECC PNA with details why we need this additional facility. I am now writing the report. Thank you for signing my petition and if you want to see my report, please contact me.

We have been very busy with our creative learning experiences at the school. Snowy Owl Class, our reception children, have been working towards performing and videoing their superhero puppet shows for their experience outcome. They started with reading Elliot Midnight Superhero and they talked about the beginning, middle and end of the book. They jotted down ideas for their own superhero stories, including the name of their superhero, their superpowers and the problem that they had to solve. After this task was completed, they went on to produce a more detailed storyboard. Finally, they made their puppets and performed their puppet show for each other. In Barn Owl Class, our year 1 and 2 children have been exploring transport for their experience outcome. They have been finding out all about Amelia Earhart, who was a famous female pilot. Children were fascinated by her amazing achievements and time was spent reflecting on why she is a great role model for us today. Just before our half-term holiday, we took part in Place2Be's Children Mental Health week. We found out that challenges and setbacks can help us to adapt and try new things, and help us move beyond our comfort zone into a new realm of possibility and potential. However, emotional development is often a gradual process that happens over time, and sometimes we might feel a bit stuck; we explored ways in which we can support ourselves and each other when this happens.







ADOPTING A DOG FROM ABROAD

During the first lockdown in 2020 my black Labrador was a lifeline. Every day we would walk, greet people, exchange pleasantries and I would feel part of the world. Sadly, Fozzy died of cancer in January 2021. I had not realised the depth of feeling I had developed for that scatty food-obsessed dog. After a few weeks I started browsing Labrador rescue sites but no UK rescue centres had any dogs. However, I soon found dog sanctuaries in Greece, Spain, Romania and Cyprus, to name a few. Dogs there are not valued as highly as in the UK. Street dogs are regularly expunged from towns and cities, so they are rescued from kill stations or municipal pounds.

So began my search. In early April, I viewed, on social media, a lab cross in Cyprus. I immediately expressed an interest, filled out an application form and crossed my fingers. Later that week I was lucky enough to have a Zoom meeting with the couple running the sanctuary. Stringent Covid measures were in place then and there were no home visits. This was concerning for them so I had to walk round the garden with the phone showing them the 6-foot fence and enclosed garden. After a few days we had passed! Siggy was ours! Now to arrange transport ... the normal route was a flight from Cyprus to Belgium, then a courier from Belgium to the UK. However due to the measures in place, this was not possible. The dogs would fly into Heathrow and then a courier would deliver them to various service stations around the UK. We took receipt of our dog in the early hours of 7th May at the Welcome Break Services, Birchanger.



Now we owned a dog that had never lived in a house, nor been fed regularly and rarely had a comfortable bed! There were standard problems that all rescue dogs present with. However, with a street dog, there are some distressing and also very comical problems! In August I went to pick the gooseberries to make a crumble. Not one gooseberry remained! When we turned on the television on that first day, she visibly jumped! She loves to eat dog poo and she is difficult to train, as any change in my tone of voice will distress her and send her into submissive mode. We have established sit and wait, but on her terms. I have nicknamed her the bolter as there is little recall. She values freedom over me. She is a work in progress. Rescuers say it takes three months for a dog to feel at ease, but I feel it is much longer. We continue our journey and I wonder if I will make a gooseberry crumble this summer?

- Be kind to nature; add bee and butterfly friendly plants to your gardens and give nature a home
- Do not be a litter bug; there is too much litter in the parks. Take your rubbish home with you and keep our environment clean and tidy
- Re-use, re-cycle and be creative in how you re-utilise things.

All of the ideas above save the planet and some even save you money!

WINTER BIRD WATCHING IN HATFIELD FOREST

Some winter days in the Forest have been cold and frosty and the southeastern end of the lake has remained frozen until the sun rises through the trees, then the ice has gradually melted and the sky becomes a brilliant blue. The ducks fly in and you can imagine their surprise as instead of landing with a splash in the water they skid to a halt over the ice. The black headed gulls in their winter plumage are abundant and the Canada geese have increased in number, up to 60 plus at one count with a solitary greylag goose in their midst.



We have begun to identify the jackdaws who are always hovering around the picnic tables waiting for crumbs. There is a one-legged one who hops and flies close to the Shell House and two partly albino with white flecks and spots on their bodies. The five swans are still present and swim across the lake from one bank to the other in a stately line. Now that the scrub has been cleared close to one of the smaller ponds it has opened up opportunities for different birds to forage including a mistle thrush happily pecking away on the rotting bark. Cormorants can still be seen perching majestically on the top of the tree nearby. We would recommend a visit whatever the weather; there are always different bird species to spot and the café is a great place for refreshment.

Rising Inflation hits low-income Households

Increased energy costs, rising inflation and the removal of the £20 Universal Credit uplift means that many households are finding it increasingly difficult to make ends meet, and typically, those on the lowest incomes are being hit the hardest. Frontline advisers at Uttlesford Citizens Advice (UCA) are already supporting increasing numbers of people who cannot afford rent, food or heating. Jack Monroe, a food writer and activist known for campaigning on poverty issues, tweeted that the use of the consumer price index and retail price index to measure rising household bills 'grossly underestimates the true cost-of-living crisis'. Data she has collected show that the price of the cheapest bag of pasta in Asda has risen by 141% and the cheapest rice by 344% in the last year alone. "A few years ago," she writes, "there were more than 400 products in the 'Smart Price' range; today there are 87 and counting down".

Over the last two years, we have seen a steep rise in the number of people who have come to us for advice relating to budgeting or help to pay essential bills. If you are struggling, please remember you are not alone. Our advisers can help by making sure you are receiving all the benefits you are entitled to and working with you to maximise your income; they can also help you access other support, including emergency financial support, if needed. TOUCHPOINT

We have agreed a Licence to Occupy for the Day Centre with TouchPoint for a period of six months initially, with a review at that point, and will also consider a lease agreement for both Crafton Green House and the Day Centre.

We have also joined forces to agree work to be undertaken to make both buildings health and safety compliant and upgrade the kitchen and ventilation system in the Day Centre, with both parties continuing to apply for grant funding for the capital sums for the required work on the buildings.

The services and activities provided by TouchPoint to date have proved an invaluable asset to our community helping promote its health and wellbeing.



NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Our draft plan has been publicised to households in the community, and consultation on each chapter took place on village social media pages. Comments received, as appropriate, have been incorporated into the document.

We have also considered the sites located in, and significant to, the position of Stansted as outlined in the Uttlesford Call for Sites. We await the decision by Uttlesford District Council (UDC) on how many sites will be required to be delivered in our Parish as a result of an agreed Local Plan.

Our Neighbourhood Plan will be ready for consideration by UDC in the Spring, possibly in early April. UDC may then decide to pause the adoption, or not, of the NDP until their own Local Plan has been adopted – as the two plans are expected to be aligned.

We should also note at this juncture that the Bentfield/Pennington Lane appeal application by Bloor Homes was refused as a result of community pressure and we congratulate all who worked to secure this area of open countryside.

PLAY EQUIPMENT

The Reeve Road play equipment has been reinstalled to the specifications agreed with Uttlesford District Council.

The installation of a Zip-wire is the first phase of our improvements that we have agreed for Mountfitchet Green. The next phase will see the Parish Council investing in picnic benches, and a swing suitable for those with accessibility needs in this much used public space. A trim trail is also planned for Wilkins Crescent on Foresthall Park.

Our Projects Officer has secured Community Initiative Funding to enable the provision of the Mountfitchet equipment. Money from the Foresthall Park Community

Fund, meanwhile, will contribute to the expenditure on the Foresthall equipment, along with the Parish Council budgeted funding.



CEMETERY

We continue our search for land for future burial use.

REFORESTATION

Newman's Plantation is the first phase of tree planting/reforestation in the village. We hope to continue this initiative once Elms Farm Public Open Space is handed over to the Parish Council.

LAND NORTH OF STANSTED AIRPORT

We have had discussions in respect of the impact of this development on our community and discussed how this could be mitigated if the application is approved. We have advocated for various community benefits – one of which is the provision of youth football pitches that are accessible and should be managed via a community interest group. This continues to require ongoing discussion with Columbia Threadneedle, the applicants, and community stakeholder groups.

LAND AT FORESTHALL PARK

We have also discussed with UDC and Columbia Threadneedle the possibility of support to purchase the land adjacent to St Mary's School to provide nursery/pre-school provision. There has been no further feedback on this to date. We have endeavoured to engage with Taylor Wimpey to secure this land for community use and will continue to attempt to progress this.

PHARMACY

We are still working to promote the need for a second licensed dispensing pharmacy in the south of Stansted. In January the Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment public consultation was successfully extended for a week after Parish Council intervention. We have also lobbied our MP, Kemi Badenoch, who is fully prepared to support our stance and will submit her written support at the statutory consultation stage. We are also actively working with the Uttlesford Health and Wellbeing Board to promote this need, and they are progressing discussions on our behalf.

FULLER'S ALMSHOUSES

We continue to work with Legacy East Almshouse Partnership to promote the reprovision of the Almshouses for the benefit of our Stansted community. There may be some



opportunities for co-operation from the Uttlesford Call for Sites responses, and LEAP are aware of these.

FLOODING

The Flood Working Group is preparing to present a plan to ease the stalemate between the Environment Agency and local landowners and to provide an agreement to enable natural flood management measures to be installed that will prevent or at least minimise our future flood risk.

GROVE HILL, CHURCH ROAD

The plan to remove HGV access to the village via a weight limit restriction - unless they are specifically delivering – will have a positive impact on both these

highways, and others. Under this scheme, which is subject to further consultation with residents, surveillance equipment will track vehicles at each entry point to the village. This



is the first step to possible further consideration of pedestrian-only access on Lower Street.

YOUTH COUNCIL

The current group is small, but very positive and is actively seeking further membership to promote ideas and outcomes for the village's younger residents. The Youth Councillors are hoping to meet with our MP this year for a trip around the House of Commons. Now that meetings of the Full Council are reinstated as face-to-face events, the group will be able to attend and observe the deliberations, and latterly contribute and promote their agenda items.

Financial Report



y October this year it was evident the combined consequences of Brexit and the continued Covid pandemic were having an inflationary effect on the UK economy.

Inflation in December hit 5.4%. It's since been forecast to rise to 6% by April. Against this background, the Parish Council has kept to its budget but, looking ahead, it has wrested with how best to maintain community services without a significant Precept rise.

In particular, the Finance and General Purposes Committee was faced when setting the budget with taking note of warnings of sky-high rises in energy costs and how that will impact on people's pocket, while striving to preserve community services.

One such service is the **Cemetery**, which is fast reaching capacity. The Parish Council is seeking extra land to expand this facility. But once found, a costly certification process of that land's suitability is required, in addition to its purchase price. Expanding capacity could cost up to £40,000. The committee recommended raising £10,000 for the next 4 years to cover this amount.

The arrival of **TouchPoint Stansted**, has been welcomed by the Parish Council, especially after Uttlesford's withdrawal from supporting day centres in the district,. We see the charity as a great opportunity in 'adding value' to community services, as well as continuing a low-cost meal offering to all residents. That's why we are investing in improvements to our buildings to support their service provision.

In line with the Council's policy, members were asked to consider a 2% increase in the **Precept**. It was agreed a 0% increase was unsustainable as it could result in service cuts or deplete our Free Reserves, now deemed at an acceptable level by auditors. The Parish Council was asked to consider a Precept rise of between 2% and 4.2%, plus £10,000 for cemetery expansion.

After discussion, the Parish Council opted for a 2% increase plus the additional charge for cemetery expansion. That took the total increase to 4.48% for 2022/23. Our precept will rise from £414,932 to £433,231. For a Band-D Council Tax household the annual precept will cost £127.88, or a rise of £5.48 for the year, or 11p/week.

Unspent funds in the current year, eg. for the Firework display and for the Christmas lights, will be transferred into earmarked reserves and spent on the same projects in 2022/23. Other funds raised for 2021-2022, namely for work associated with last year's Tree Survey and funding play equipment for the over-11s, have progressed well. Unsafe and diseased trees have been felled, and new trees planted within Newman's Plantation. Grants have been obtained by our Projects Officer to pay for play equipment at Mountfitchet Green. This is scheduled for a March installation.

The Link between tight Shoulders and Insomnia

Tension in the neck and shoulders is interpreted by the brain as being highly stressed, even if life is trundling along fairly normally. Lifestyle itself leads to tight shoulders due to hours of screen time and sitting about (see photo), along with past injuries such as whiplash or concussions. So we try to sleep with our tight shoulders telling the brain we are highly stressed, in great danger. Typically, we have a few hours' sleep, then lie awake quite unable to get back to sleep. Why are we sleeping when there's a wildebeest in the room! The muscles of stress lie at both the front and the back of the neck. It does take some skill, but tensing a tight muscle really helps it to relax.



A general catch all way of tensing the shoulders is to round them, draw them together, and pull them upwards and then, if it does NOT make you dizzy, look upwards, giving all a squeezing. This will feel quite nasty. Then calmly let the shoulders return to normal and look forwards again. To stretch them, slightly roll the shoulders back and down, broadening the bottom of the shoulder blades and squeezing down into the armpits whilst slightly tucking your chin down. If you really cannot sleep at night, it is worth hopping out of bed and trying this out. Calmer shoulders mean the wildebeest is grazing and it is safe to sleep again. Insomnia can be caused by any very mild pain in the body: a little tummy ache, a bit of a stiff calf and so on. It is the brain's way of waking us up to give us a message that all is not well.

BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH

My birdwatching report in the March 2012 Link read as follows: Having stocked up the bird table and filled the birdbath with fresh water, I settled down with a copious supply of coffee, to take part in the annual RSPB Birdwatch. At the end of the hour my large piece of paper contained just three entries: one blackbird, one magpie (crossed out as it was perched on the conifer in my neighbour's garden) and a stripy cat. This year was no less disappointing. Still only three entries on my piece of paper: one blackbird, one sparrow and one starling. (At least all the entries were birds that were actually in my garden this year - and no cats!)



Each year I am filled with excitement as I sit down pen poised, expecting to see all my regular feathered visitors, and each year they fail to appear at the appointed hour. I wonder if they desert me because there are other bird tables and feeders around containing tastier treats than mine during Birdwatch weekend, so they choose to 'dine out'. Or do the birds know they are being watched and counted, so decide to stay in their rooms like moody teenagers?

Of course, on the following morning all my usuals were back, the gang of squabbling starlings who descend as soon as the food is put out, the two or three fat pigeons who bravely wade in amongst the starlings and grab more than their fair share, and finally the robin who always appears when the rest have gone, picking up scraps scattered on the grass by the greedy pigeons.

Days before the Birdwatch weekend I spotted a rare sight - a trio of robins hopping around together in the garden; we sometimes get two robins but I have never seen more than that before. The day before we also had a group of long tailed tits at the bird table, which was a first. They only stayed for a quick snack but it was lovely to see them. Why does nothing as interesting as that happen when I am recording bird activity to pass onto the RSPB? I will have another go next year, but plan to up my game in the food

department, and learning from previous years' experiences, I will have a much smaller piece of paper.

Birchanger Primary School New Outdoor Area

The school is always looking to improve their environment and although their nature garden has been a wonderful resource, over the years it has become very overgrown and is no longer a useable space. The school is voluntary controlled and currently has 110 pupils; we quickly identified the type of space that would be beneficial to them. We are hoping to build a natural environment with natural bark pathways, raised beds, soft borders with seasonal colour, and a seating arbour.



The original collaborative aims of the project are:

Lowest Passenger Numbers for Twenty-Three Years

Stansted Airport handled just 7.1 million passengers in 2021, the lowest number since 1998, reflecting the dramatic reduction in air travel caused by the Covid-19 pandemic. Prior to the pandemic Stansted handled 28.1 million passengers. All UK airports have been affected to a similar extent as international air travel, for both business and leisure, has been decimated. Figures released by the Office of National Statistics (ONS) show that outbound and inbound tourism have declined by about 75% because of the pandemic. This decline in tourism has had an unexpected benefit for the UK economy, with a favourable impact on the balance of payments of £26 billion in 2020, and a similar figure expected in 2021. Much of this money, instead of being spent on overseas holidays in countries like Spain, Portugal and Greece, has been diverted to the UK economy and spent, for example, on home improvements and furnishings, as well as staycations.

Reduction in Business Travel could be Permanent

It is widely expected that overseas tourism will recover strongly as travel restrictions are eased but this may not be the case with business travel. The pandemic has shown companies that a great deal of business travel can easily be replaced by Zoom meetings. Business leaders also point out that reducing business flights helps protect employee health and wellbeing and improves productivity, as well as generating substantial savings in travel budgets. In addition, almost all major UK PLCs now have a commitment to help tackle climate change by reducing carbon emissions, and one of the best ways to do this is to reduce business flights.



Beginners' Course

Readers may remember that when I was Chairman of the Bishop's Stortford Beekeepers Association (BSBKA), I wrote a regular column for The Link. Since then, I have only written articles when there was something really important to report. The annual Beginners Course run by BSBKA is starting in the spring. At the end of the course the student will be capable of becoming a hobby beekeeper, knowing how to source bees, maintain a colony in a hive and extract their honey for sale, with the following skills and knowledge:

- Understanding the life cycle and role of each type of bee
- Being able to complete hive inspections competently
- Understanding the reasons for swarming and carry out preventative measures
- Knowing the different types of hive and understanding the advantages and disadvantages of each
- Being able to build a hive and frames
- Being able to identify common diseases and carry out solutions
- Being capable of extracting honey hygienically
- Being able to source a nucleus
- Knowing how to use the basic equipment.



This course will consist of five sessions on Tuesdays 8.00pm-10.00pm (coffee served from 7.30pm) in the Day Centre starting on 15th March and at least one weekend practical live session at the Association apiary. The cost is £60, which includes a course textbook, refreshments and protective clothing, plus £5 to become an Associate member of Bishop's Stortford Beekeepers Association which entitles you to attend all the Association's events and meetings. Even if you do not intend to keep bees, you will have fun and enjoy learning about them. You could come as a husband-and-wife team and revive the fun of doing things together. Or bring your children; juniors are welcome and we only charge half the price. At our February meeting, we welcomed Alan Padgett who gave a talk about The History of Bellringing, including St Michael's Church Bishop's Stortford. He told us that English bellringing is unique, and guided us through the early origins of bellringing from its simplest form to the increased number of bells we know today. Using images and video clips, he showed us its origins from Campania in Italy to its spread through Europe to England from Saxon, Norman and medieval times. The earliest accounts of St Michael's can be traced back to 1433 using the old churchwardens' accounts. When Henry VIII created the Church of England, he banned all bell ringing in 1547 during church services. Bell ringing became almost wholly secular. Accounts show that St Michael's bellringers were paid for ringing the bells when Queen Elizabeth 1 visited Bishop's Stortford and when the Spanish Armada was defeated.

Bellringing became a sport for young gentleman who formed ringing societies. This created competitiveness and led to 'change ringing' with an increase in the number of bells in many churches; St Michael's was no exception with an increase to eight bells in the 18th century. The competitive edge led to poor standards of behaviour with large consumption of ale, as the water was not always safe to drink. The local constable in Bishop's Stortford was paid on one occasion to control the crowds in the Church yard. When the top of the medieval tower of St Michael's was rebuilt, the restriction on ale brought a response from the builders who left a message and complaint, still seen in the stonework to this day. The meeting was a thoroughly entertaining evening with a good attendance. At our next meeting on Thursday 3rd March 7.45pm for 8.00pm in the Day Centre, Jenny Oxley from Saffron Walden Museum will talk to us about The Piano Hoard.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, Natural England can designate any area of land considered to be of special interest by virtue of its fauna, flora or geological features as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). This designation ensures that the area is appropriately managed and protected. The Hundred Parishes has more than twenty SSSIs. Here are some which can be visited:

In the parish of High Easter, **Garnett's Wood** comprises 25 hectares (62 acres) of ancient coppiced woodland (meaning the trees have been regularly cut down to ground level). Lime is the dominant tree in this wood. Mentioned in the Domesday Book, Henry II gave this wood to a knight called Geffrey Garnet. A stump of a tree has been carved to depict the knight, still watching over his wood.



Patmore Heath in Albury parish is an eight-hectare grass heathland, now a scarce habitat in South East England. It is managed by Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust. A variety of native grasses grow here and the heath's ponds are home to all three native English newt species: great-crested, smooth and palmate.

Amwell Quarry, formerly an area of gravel pits, has been transformed into a 37-hectare wetland environment, important for wintering wildfowl and regarded as England's premier site for dragonflies.

Best-known and by far the largest of our SSSIs is **Hatfield Forest** which covers more than 400 hectares, around 1.5 square miles. It was a royal hunting forest from around 1100 AD until the 15th century.

It has never been ploughed and has been managed for centuries by coppicing and by pollarding (cutting trees to a height above which livestock and deer cannot reach the new shoots). It has been owned by The National Trust since 1924.
