Georgina Ferry was the speaker at our June seminar on *Dorothy Hodgkin*, the only British woman ever to win the Nobel Prize in Chemistry.

Dorothy's groundbreaking work in crystallography and her commitment to humanity have left an indelible mark on the scientific community. From an early age, her fascination with natural and artificial patterns ignited a lifelong passion. She earned a degree in chemistry at Somerville College, Oxford and her fascination with X-rays of crystals led to a PhD at Cambridge. Her groundbreaking work shed light on the structure of insulin and penicillin. Born in 1910, she faced numerous obstacles in a scientific world dominated by men but she persevered, juggling professional pursuits with marriage and raising three children. She was awarded the Nobel prize for Chemistry in 1963, an exceptional feat for anyone, but especially for a woman at that time.

Our next seminar, with interactive discussion, is on **19**th **August.** Led by Patrick Parrinder, Emeritus Professor of English at Reading University and *H G Wells Society's* president, it is entitled *H G Wells: The Realist and the Dreamer*. THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Our area is blessed with an exceptional number of museums, all open at this time of the year.

Saffron Walden Museum was purpose-built in 1835 and displays a real treasure trove of material relating to the local area.

Imperial War Museum, Duxford is enormous, displaying all kinds of wartime material including its own listed buildings from each World War, as well as many aeroplanes, both civilian and military.

Great Dunmow Museum is housed in a former maltings and encompasses displays about its former function as well as broader elements of Dunmow history.

Forge Museum in Much Hadham includes metal tools from the forge, while its own medieval wall paintings reveal an insight into Tudor fashion.

The Henry Moore Studio and Gardens shown below, includes an extensive outdoor display of the famous sculptor's large works and an indoor history of his life. The hamlet of Perry Green was his home for many years.



Ashdon Village Museum has an exceptional display of all aspects of local life in the 20th century, with the bonus of an excellent tea room!

The Toy Museum is part of Mountfitchet Castle which is itself a popular destination for children who probably do not realise that this fun place is teaching them a lot about the history of Norman times.

The 15th-century Guildhall in Finchingfield incorporates a small collection of local history, presented with help of modern technology.

A Cottage Museum is in Great Bardfield, boasting a village cage, a former lock-up.

For further details, visit the attractions section of our website where you will also find information about the Fry Art Gallery, Linton Zoo, Hinxton watermill and several windmills. We are indeed blessed.

IN MEMORIAM

SALLY MARGARET SMITH

28th April 1949-21st April 2023



Sally was born in Bishop's Stortford and moved to Takeley in 1951. She attended Takeley Primary School and then moved to Hadham Hall Senior School. During her time at school she joined the Girl Guides and also started her love of cricket by scoring for Takeley Cricket Club. She attended Harlow College and studied Home Economics. With this qualification she started her first job at Lesme Chocolate Factory in London but her desire to work locally saw Sally take up the rôle of Doctors' Receptionist at South Street Surgery in Bishop's Stortford.

After marrying Roy in 1973 she moved to Stansted. Motherhood followed and they had two children, Mark and Alison. With their children at school Sally involved herself in a wide range of interests in and around the village. She was a member of the Stansted Evening WI for over 40 years including time spent serving on the Committee and participating in countless trips, including to its spiritual home, Denman College. Her love of painting was fulfilled by membership of Stansted Art Group and more recently the Bishop's Stortford Art Society.

Cricket has been of interest to all the Smith family and Sally provided cricket teas for both Takeley and Stansted Hall cricket clubs. The family were members of Essex County Cricket Club and followed the team both home and away. Sally liked to travel and enjoyed cruises particularly in The Aegean and Mediterranean. Among her favourite trips were visits to Algeria, Egypt, Israel, Canada, America and New Zealand. Sally was a member of the Imperial War Museum and attended many Duxford Airshows where she enjoyed seeing the RAF Red Arrows and Typhoon Display Team. Her love of the RAF came from her father who flew as a navigator in Mosquitos at the end of the Second World War. Another interest of Sally's was stage musicals. She saw countless London West End shows including more than 20 visits to Les Misérables with her daughter Alison. At home Sally's love of crafts - embroidery, knitting and cross stitch is exemplified by her work at a domestic level around the house. In 2010 Sally, supported by Roy, immersed herself in

the Stansted Mountfitchet Magna Carta Tapestry. As part of the Stansted Church Craft Group she made hundreds of items that were sold to raise funds for the local church. Many of you reading this will have examples of her work in your home.

As a much beloved mother and wife Sally loved being part of the family unit and enjoyed hosting birthdays and Christmas celebrations. The suddenness of her passing was a great shock and she will be greatly missed by all who knew her.

WE ARE ALL MADE OF STARDUST

No matter where we come from, we are united by the stars. The elements which make up our bodies, from the iron in our blood cells, to the calcium in our bones and the carbon in our DNA, were all originally created in the stars. Literally nothing would exist if it were not for these objects of stellar beauty; nuclear powerhouses forging atoms, creating elements and releasing minuscule gifts of life's building blocks when that star dies, sometimes as a result of a spectacular Supernova explosion. The process has been going on for billions of years; NASA reckons the universe is 13.7 billion years old, give or take 200 million years or so!

So we can thank the stars for everyone and everything that we love. In my work supporting bereaved families I have seen that some take comfort from the idea of our bodies returning to these elements after we die, of turning back to stardust. Because the light from stars takes so long to reach us, when we look up at the night sky we are literally looking back in time, a beautiful light shining from the past, in the same way in which we reflect on our memories of those no longer with us. The light from stars in *Orion's Belt* takes over 1000 years to reach us - how incredibly humbling.

There is a poem by Nikita Gill, which celebrates this in such a beautiful way, called 93 Percent Stardust, and it is well worth a quick google. There is also a book called No Matter What by Debi Gliori, which is particularly helpful when talking to children about love, life, and loss. It has the most beautiful line Love, like starlight, never dies. Take care everyone.

SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

Working with Local Businesses to Support a more Sustainable Stansted

Small and medium sized businesses produce a third of UK carbon emissions. All businesses have a huge contribution to make in reducing the carbon footprint of our community. They can do this by reducing their own energy use and waste and provide goods and services to their customers to help them to do the same, such as the refill barn shown in the photograph below. We work with Stansted businesses to help support and promote this activity.



As well as being critical for the future of our planet, working in a greener way can also bring demonstrable business benefits:

- Reducing energy use and wastage is not only good for the climate, it can also lead to significant reductions in costs
- Many large corporations are now asking their suppliers to demonstrate their commitment to work in a more sustainable way
- Around 70% of 16 to 25 year olds are extremely or very worried about the climate (study in the Lancet 2021). They are increasingly looking to buy services and products from businesses that show they are reducing their environmental impact

None of us expected to be here after three days but here we are, all waiting for the doctor to come and discharge us. It's quiet for the time being and we are bored silly. We just want to go home. These ladies are the best company and we have all kept each other going, but there is only so much we can do; think we have exhausted *I spy*. We hear heavy footsteps.

Lisa whispers, "it's the doctor."

"Morning ladies and how are we today?" he asks in a chirpy voice.

"Well," said Lisa in her London accent, "as we're all going 'ome, we're 'appy."

"Oh no no no," says the Doctor, "you let me decide that", as he pulls the curtains round Lisa's bed. Have to say nothing is private here, we can hear everything that is said and done. Seems Lisa is staying another day. Next up is Elaine but she thinks she won't be going home due to blood issues, so isn't surprised when she has to stay as well. He walks straight past me to Bridget, obviously saving the best till last. Seems Bridget isn't going home either. Me next and I'm hopeful. After what seems a long time he says, "and you can stay as well; maybe tomorrow." "But you said that yesterday," I said tearfully. So, we are all upset to be staying, and need to do something to cheer ourselves up. Lisa comes up with "Let's break out of here."

After lunch she disappears for a while. "Look what I've found," she says proudly showing us a wheelchair. "Come on ladies let's go. Bridget, you get in the wheelchair and I'll push you; I think my back will hold out. Elaine you can use the Zimmer frame and Linda you use the crutches. Oh, and if anyone has money put it in your pocket, and be quiet whilst we escape."



There's nobody at the nurses' station so we slither as best we can past it. We manage to dodge the catering lady, but the physio almost sees us, so we hide in the doorway. We struggle to pull the door open and must look such a sight as we make our way down the corridor. Bridget has odd socks and no slippers, I have green surgical stockings and pink fluffy slippers, as does Elaine (who also apparently has her dressing gown stuck in the top of her pjs) and Lisa is barefoot. None of us have actually walked the length of the ward let alone anywhere else, so we're tired even before we reach the lift. However, the lift arrives and we shuffle in. Elaine stumbles onto the buttons so we end up in the basement with the cleaning stuff, tubes and heating pipes. So, we wait again for the lift which takes forever to come, and by now we are all really tired. We finally get to the correct floor but find that the coffee shop is at the end of a very long corridor with a lot of people hurrying about their business. By now I'm beginning to think we may have overdone it, our great escape, but the others are still up for it; and in need of cake and coffee. So upwards and onwards.

First stop the convenience shop, where we gather cakes and biscuits for later on. Now Bridget needs to spend a penny. I roll my eyes. She's had a hip replacement and needs a toilet frame and a high seat. We ask her to wait but she can't. As I have a card I'm paying whilst the others find the loo. I join the queue ."Wanna a bag for all that?" asks the till person. I look at it. "Think I need one. I can't carry all this with crutches, can I?" "Nah not really." She stuffs it all in a bag and hands it to me. I see a problem here as I can't carry the heavy bag, and cope with the crutches at the same time. I have to hang around until the others return. They have their own problems, as poor Bridget needs help but Lisa has a bad back so can't lift and Elaine can't let go of the Zimmer in case she falls, so Bridget will have to wait. They find me, and thankfully I'm able to put the bag onto the back of the wheelchair. I'm aware that people are looking at us and smiling. We just smile back and carry on to our next stop which is the coffee shop. We order two teas and two coffees which I pay for. Umm, hot drinks that we can't carry. We didn't think that one through. Right planning c...k up. We're now holding up the queue. They have run out of trays, but I don't think that would make any difference as we can't carry that either.

Luckily a knight in shining armour appears in the shape of Lisa's husband, Pete, who just popped in to surprise her, and is buying coffee. He thinks our predicament is funny, pointing out that Elaine is showing her bare bottom to everyone. No wonder everyone's smiling at us. By now we are all completely exhausted, so Pete whizzes Bridget back to the ward in the wheelchair for her wee, then comes back for Lisa, whilst myself and Elaine take a very slow walk back to the ward.

Later that afternoon the ward sister comes in. "Well ladies and where do think you were going earlier? I suggest a rest after your little escapade." The cake and biscuits were for a late-night feast, but we all slept so well none of us woke up; but they'll keep. But we're all going home tomorrow. Or are we? Oh well, at least we made someone's day, as our great escape was all caught on CCTV.

Straightening up the toes

Twisty toes and bunions hurt and weaken you, and their cause needs investigating. Good news, much work can be done to help straighten the toes again; it just requires persistence. One important muscle to strengthen is called *Abductor Hallucis*. It runs from the inside edge of the big toe straight to the heel bone. It pulls the big toe away from the other toes. How to get it to wake up? Start with whichever foot has the straighter toes. Place your fingers along its arch and try to move the big toe away from the other toes. The movement is in a straight line, the big toe does not lift or curl up. Hopefully your fingers will be able to feel the muscle stiffen up a bit. Maintain that contraction so you can tune into it.



Now turn to the other foot and do the same. It is normal for absolutely nothing to happen! You can try shouting 'Hello!' to the big toe and this snoozing muscle. Assuming nobody's home, do this: push the big toe upwards against some resistance (you may need a partner if reaching the feet is difficult) and hold the pressure for about five seconds. Then squeeze the big toe and the next toe together, using a finger pushed between the toes for resistance. Then press the big toe downwards, allowing it to curl. Now retry moving the big toe away. Usually this sequence helps activate the muscle. You will need to activate and strengthen the muscle daily for quite a while. You can try wearing soft yoga toe separators – or invest in a pair of Vibram Five Fingers. These will also help straighten the toes, but you will still need to activate the *Abductor Hallucii*.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

with news of the reopening of the Recreation Ground in July, the Foresthall Park traffic consultation, a round-up of progress on other highways measures for the village, the Stansted in Bloom's trail leaflet launch event, Councillor co-options and the Parish Council's response to the siting of a junction box at Five Acres



The Recreation Ground Reopening



The emergence of a sinkhole on the Recreation Ground in the days following the Coronation Event, held at the site on May 7, led to the Parish Council having to close the area to the public for health and safety reasons. It took eight weeks and the completion of two ground surveys before the Rec could be reopened to the public. Because the Rec is a highly valued and much used public open space, the Parish Council would like to clarify the reason for shutting down access to the site for this length of time and explain the significance of both surveys' results.

As soon as the first sinkhole was reported to the Parish Council, a decision was taken to close the ground off and commission a ground survey. Herts and Essex Site Investigations investigated the site and learned of two further holes at the Stansted Bowls Club. The specialist surveyor's report to the Parish Council suggested ground instability may exist across a wider area than just the initial sinkhole. The surveyor advised for the continued closure of the Recreation Ground while these concerns were investigated, supported by the Council's insurers. Laser Surveys, one of only a handful of businesses qualified to perform a more thorough examination of the site, completed a deep ground radar penetrating survey at the Rec on June 22 and June 23. They reported back to the Parish Council with their results in the first week of July.

The Full Council considered the report's findings at a meeting on July 5 and, having received confirmation that the Council's insurers were happy, a decision was taken that it was safe for the Recreation Ground to be reopened to the public.

SURVEY FINDINGS

The report by HESI indicated the unusually high footfall across the Rec on the day of the Coronation Event, added to the vibration from vehicles, music and the stage, may have affected ground stability. But there was no definitive corroboration of this in Laser Surveys' report, though its radar survey highlighted several small ground anomalies. Laser Surveys have advised the Parish Council to be mindful of the weight of vehicles it allows onto the Recreation Ground going forward.

Foresthall Park Consultation

n June a consultation on Foresthall Park got under way to explore residents' views on proposals to tackle problems such as airport parking, speeding drivers and dangerous parking. Over 750 survey leaflets were delivered by Parish Councillors to homes on the development. The survey also came in two digital formats — one posted on social media, the other uploaded to the Parish Council website. More than 162 residents sent in their views on the proposals before consultation ended on June 30.

The Foresthall Park working group is assessing the survey answers before it presents their recommendations to the Highways Sub-committee in October. Any recommendations will then go to the Full Council for their approval and, if appropriate, be put to the North Essex Parking Partnership this autumn.

Highways Proposals: Slow Progress

t is a frustrating reality that years can pass for a highway proposal to become a reality — seven in the case of the pelican crossing on Lower Street which arrived in 2022. The list of parking and highway proposals for which the Parish Council awaits news is a long and growing one:


A post-election Essex County Council has blamed a lack of manpower for slow progress on its commitment to fill in a select number of potholes in our area. ECC's much mooted plan to re-route (and ban) HGVs remains much mooted with no obvious progress.

Meanwhile, the Local (Uttlesford) Highways Panel has set no installation date for the approved zebra crossing on Silver Street. Likewise, the panel has no update on if it will widen the footpaths of Cambridge and Church Roads. Nor has it news of requests for village twinning signs, and feasibility study for a "20 is Plenty" scheme in Walson Way and Hampton Road

The Parish Council can share that the North Essex Parking Partnership (NEPP) has informed us it is to consider our proposals submitted in June for the introduction of red lines on the Mountfitchet Estate.

A few factors can slow a proposal's progress. For example, the NEPP sifts and prioritises proposals each October. But it sets a June deadline for new submissions to allow time for assessments to be made. Miss it and a proposal could sit aside for a year. And sometimes a scheme just disappears!

Proposals for red lines to be introduced on roads on the Mountfitchet Estate were submitted in June.

Gigaclear Asked to Re-site Box



Gigaclear have been asked to re-site a junction box sited on the corner of Five Acres. The land is managed by the Parish Council. No permission was sought by the broadband installer prior to locating the box at this site.

"Gigaclear went ahead, without further consultation, and planted it on our land without permission," says Finance and General Purposes Chair John O'Brien. "This resulted in an eyesore and a loss of amenity for the community in a restful spot, despite it being close to a busy road."

Gigaclear has acknowledged its error. Their mitigations efforts have been rejected by the Parish Council. Instead of planting a screen of shrubs and repainting the box green, the Parish Council has asked for financial compensation for a loss of amenity and a failure to consult. Gigaclear have also been asked to re-site the box to behind the bench (see image).

Councillor Co-options

Three individuals answered last month's call in these pages to step up and become Parish Councillors. The Full Council discussed the merits of two of the applicants at a July meeting and voted to co-opt them to the chamber.

Tom van de Bilt, has previously served on the Parish Council from 2019-21 but stepped down due to work commitments. His work as a bid writer and project manager now allows for home working and the time to devote to life as a Parish Councillor. Like Tom, Sanjukta Ghosh is a resident of the village with strong local ties. The School of Oriental and African Studies historian is particularly proud of her voluntary work for the Stansted Pilots former youth organisation, and is a keen champion of diversity. Sanjukta looks forward to developing green spaces in Stansted and opportunities for sustainable development. Discussion of the third candidate was deferred as they had to manage an urgent family matter.

Having a Full Council chamber helps share duties and responsibilities across the Parish Council's 14 committees and working groups.

Youth Council

Closer ties between the Parish Council and Forest Hall School are helping grow the Youth Council. The school has encouraged two of its pupils to sign up to the body, with a potential third to follow suit, while students studying Citizenship are to be invited to participate, too. The Parish Council is now just two shy of its target membership of six. Achieving this goal will allow the Youth Council to be fully constituted. The Parish Council has arranged for youth members to visit the Houses of Parliament, along with students visiting from Rungis, later in the year.

DISTRICT COUNCIL NEWS

Councils run a scheme called Local Council Tax Support (LCTS) that is designed to help the most vulnerable in our community. The cost of the scheme is born by each Council Tax preceptor (Essex County Council, UDC, town and parish councils, Essex Police & Fire) pro-rata to their Council Tax receipts.

Uttlesford District Council are proposing for 2024/25 to maintain the scheme on the same basis as in 2023/24. This means they will:

- keep the contribution rate at 12.5% for 2024/25
- continue to protect pensioners, vulnerable and disabled residents and their carers on a low income

The District Council would like your views on their plans for LCTS in 2024/25. You can do so by requesting a paper copy of the questionnaire (01799 510510), or if you are online you can email comments to consultation@ uttlesford.gov.uk. The closing date for the consultation is Monday, September 4.

In the meantime, if you are struggling with rising bills and housing payments, UDC encourages you to check out its Cost of Living Support Fund. It targets support for Uttlesford residents who may be struggling to pay their council tax. This scheme is on an application basis only. Eligible households awards will be determined up to the total of the Council Tax liability, or lower dependent on financial circumstances, for the 2023/2024 financial year (1st April 2023 – 31st March 2024).

THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

As summer settles on the reserve the trees are in full leaf, creating a green canopy full of young birds, many of which are still being fed by their parents. You will hear the contact calls between birds as the family group moves through the trees. In summer they are more difficult to see but some are still singing to maintain territories, among them blackcap, chiff chaff and song thrush. We have a good variety of trees including rare black poplar and some fine specimens of elm. Many of the trees date back to the reserve's origins as a private wildlife park and are starting to show their age. This year it has been necessary to fell some trees that were in danger of falling across the paths. Wherever possible we do leave trees to die back naturally, as standing dead wood and fallen trees are valuable habitats for wildlife. Recently the volunteers who maintain the reserves for Essex Wildlife Trust in Uttlesford have been

busy removing Himalayan balsam, an invasive species that would take over large areas of the reserve if left unchecked.

In the open areas of the reserve we look to maintain a meadow environment by removing the vegetation each autumn so that soil nutrition is kept low, favouring the wild flowers. Look out for meadow sweet, common spotted orchids and you can even see some wild strawberries unless the birds have got there first. As you look for the flowers and other wildlife, we ask you to please keep to the paths to avoid trampling the plants, and ensure dogs are kept under control so that they do not disturb the ground nesting and feeding birds. IN THE GARDEN

Use this month as a time for reflection. Look at your garden and ask yourself whether a different planting scheme will give a better display of flowers next year, bearing in mind the weather conditions we seem to be experiencing. There may be a plant that you have seen which you would like to grow in your garden. Before buying, however, always find out what that plant requires - soil, sun, shade - and whether you have the right position for it. It is worth writing a journal, making a note of the plants in your garden and what they require with regard to pruning, feeding etc. The first flush of roses has been and gone. Continue to deadhead to encourage new blooms to form, using shears. This is especially advantageous for ramblers and climbing roses. Always feed, water and mulch afterwards, giving them the advantage to flower again, although most ramblers will only bloom once. Cut wisterias back to five shoots. By now their laterals will have extended several feet. Only keep those that you require to be tied in to the main framework.



Let us hope that ponds are teeming with frogs, newts and dragonflies. Over the last few months some ponds have developed a green tinge to them which could be a result of sun and/or not enough oxygenating plants. The lily leaves should be more prolific now and will help cover the water with a good cluster of flowers. Most of all, sit back and take time to enjoy your garden. Too often we forget to do this and although the act of gardening is both mentally and physically good for our health, there should also be pleasure attached to sitting and immersing yourself in the joy of just being.
