IN MEMORIAM MALCOLM COLIN TREACHER MBE 5th October 1929–22nd May 2023

We are so sad to hear that Malcolm Treacher MBE, a stalwart of Essex Scouts, has gone home at the age of 93, following a short stay in hospital. Born in Henham, Malcolm moved to Stansted in 1940 to live with his uncle in The Old Post Office. It was here that he became a telegram boy. He joined Scouting aged 11 and moved into his first leadership rôle just three years later. In 1951 at the age of 21 he decided to go to the Docklands Settlement for Young Boys in London as a youth worker and returned three years later to take over the responsibility of running the group, holding Scout meetings in the village windmill. In 1962 he negotiated with Walter Mayhew to purchase the land the headquarters stands on today. The HQ itself was the Social Club Hut of Rochford Nursery at Stoney Common which was dismantled and re-assembled. Malcolm was a huge supporter of special needs scouting and was a great churchman, assisting Rev'd Ken Jarvis serving both St John's and St Mary's as a lay reader. He also served as a sidesman in Chelmsford Cathedral. His list of Scouting roles included District Commissioner, District President, Assistant County Commissioner, County Secretary and Organising Commissioner for all Counties, more recently with the county archive team. Malcolm also had a love for Scout Gang Shows, having been involved for many years. He was heavily involved with Mini Gang and was still painting scenery for this year's show just a few weeks ago.

Another of Malcolm's passions was maintaining historic records of all things Scouting. He wrote books on the history of local Scouting and Skreens Park, Stansted Windmill, and his autobiography *An Essex Lad*. He maintained a number of historic records as part of the county's archive team. Malcolm was made a Member of the British Empire (MBE) in The Queen's Birthday Honours back in 1991 for his services to Scouting and youth work, a very worthy recipient. He was awarded Scouting's highest honour, The Silver Wolf in 1982. Malcolm is one of a very small group of people to have received their 70 years' service to Scouting award.

The elderly folk in the village may remember him working at Rochford's Nursery for many years until he left in 1968. We are so grateful for everything that Malcolm did for us here and further afield. The time and dedication he has given to us over the years cannot be overstated; his actions will have benefited so many of our young people. Malcolm will be remembered fondly and greatly missed by all who knew him.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

www.hundredparishes.org.uk

Conservation Areas were introduced in 1967 and district councils are responsible for designating them. The area must have special architectural and/or historic importance that merits protection. The aim is to protect an area rather than single buildings. Within each Conservation Area, there will generally be individual buildings that have additional protection, classified as Listed Buildings. There may also be a Scheduled Monument, or trees with a Tree Preservation Order, or buildings or spaces that have been designated as Assets of Community Value. There are varying degrees of protection for each of these designations, all aimed at preserving our heritage for future generations.

Uttlesford District Council covers around half of the Hundred Parishes area and has designated 33 Conservation Areas. For each, it has published an appraisal defining the area covered and explaining the reasons for the designation: *www.uttlesford.gov.uk/conservation-area-appraisals*. These appraisals are often a helpful source for the kind of information provided in the route descriptions for walks that can be downloaded from our website. East Hertfordshire has the second biggest representation within the Hundred Parishes and this district council has designated 26 Conservation Areas. Their appraisals also provide valuable insight: *www.eastherts.gov.uk/planning-and-building/conservationareas.*



Similar appraisals are available from the other district councils in the Hundred Parishes: South Cambridgeshire, Braintree, North Herts, Chelmsford and Epping Forest. Within South Cambridgeshire, Linton has the only *Outstanding Conservation Area* designation, including its long High Street and some lanes on either side *(see photo above)*. Much of this area is explored on Walk 182 whose route covers less than two miles. Our towns and villages are usually best explored on foot and each is included in at least one of the Hundred Parishes routes. If you are able to get out and about, I encourage you to try them.

ACTIVE TRAVEL

Most of us in Stansted drive cars or vans and live within a mile of shops, doctor, dentist, station and post office. What links these? The chance not to drive for short trips to pick something up, which we have all done at times. Walking and cycling are *active travel* - convenient, cheap, low carbon and healthy. Good for the planet and for you. Nationally 20% of trips under a mile and 66% of trips under 5 miles are by car or van. Short ones are easily walked by most people and cycling up to 5 miles takes around 30 minutes.

The Government Active Travel Fund in 2023 is £200m; this is far too little, but councils can bid to encourage walking and cycling. Small things matter: better footpaths, improved lighting, safer crossings and separated paths for pedestrians and cyclists. Local councils need to find out what people want, and they need better planning and maintenance of resources. We also



want individuals to leave the car at home and walk or cycle. If we all do this it will make a difference. Cycling on a weekend ride is great but it must also be a part of our transport system. I cycle to Bishop's Stortford from Stansted but it is not an enjoyable route; with better planned routes it could be. This could easily be alongside the existing footpath. Uttlesford is exploring shared cycles in Saffron Walden. Would this appeal here? Got an old bike that needs some tlc? Would you like help doing that? Would you feel more confident cycling with somebody else? Please let us know what you think.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

I am writing this a couple of days after Trinity Sunday, and my head is currently full of Trinitarian theology. So, can I explain the doctrine of the Trinity in 300 words? Let us see. The Father is God. The Son is God. The Holy Spirit is God. Each person of the Trinity is a perfect, though different expression of the divine nature. What makes each person unique then is their relationship with the other two. So, the Father has a paternal relation with the Son. For His part, the Son exists in a relationship of sonship (*filiation*) with the Father. Father's relation with the Holy Spirit is one of *spiration*. The word means *breathing*, and it invites us to think of the Holy Spirit as the breath of God. The Holy Spirit's relation to the Father is one of *procession*, ie the Spirit proceeds from the Father. The Son also *spirates* the Spirit, and the Spirit proceeds from the Son.

The fact that we have different terms stops us misspeaking of God. The Father is not paternally related to the Holy Spirit, because He only has one Son. The Son is not paternally related with the Spirit, because this would give the Father a grandson. Beyond that, though, what do these terms actually mean? Since God does not have a body, He clearly does not reproduce or breathe in the way human beings do. This is the sense in which the Trinity is a mystery – the relations within it can only be expressed in an approximate, metaphorical way. The reality of the divine interrelations remains ultimately beyond our comprehension. I say *mystery*, but actually it is more like mysteries; paternity, filiation, spiration and procession are distinct mysteries, and *Trinity* is the sum of them. One thing we can assert with confidence, however, is that all the Trinitarian relations are perfect expressions of God's love. Since God is love, they are also therefore perfect expressions of the divine nature.

STANSTED PEOPLE

GEOFFREY SELL

Geoffrey Sell will be familiar to many of you. He has had his roots in Stansted for all but four years of his life. His parents were very much part of the local community. His mother Jane was a founder member of the Day Centre and she taught evening classes at what was the Youth Centre and the Mountfitchet School (now Forest Hall School). Geoffrey grew up in a very political household; Jane was a founder member of the Liberals in 1965; the only family member uninterested in politics was Geoffrey's younger brother Chris. His father Ken was a keen member of the Bowls Club. He was a veteran of Dunkirk and one of the British troops to go into Belsen in 1945; Geoffrey thinks this scarred him for life. Ken was in hospital with Lord Haw Haw after Dunkirk. Geoffrey's family now consists of his wife Sophie and son Edward, aged 23. He met Sophie in 1992 in London; she was working for the Roman Catholic Dean in Chelsea. They married in 1994 and in addition to Edward, Geoffrey has two step-children, one of whom lives in Manila, so Geoffrey and Sophie visit the Philippines often.

Geoffrey attended St Mary's Primary, then Saffron Walden County High, where Jane was a teacher. His undergraduate studies were in Politics, at Newcastle University; he also studied Politics for a Masters and PhD at Birkbeck. His dissertation was on Jo Grimond and his leadership of the Liberal Party. He became a full-time lecturer, teaching Business Management at Arden University, a private institution in London. He took early retirement in 2013 and now teaches twice a week at Arden and also works sometimes for Pearsons, in Quality Assurance. This means that he checks anyone offering Pearsons' programmes to make sure that they are being delivered properly and that assessment is being done correctly. This work did involve global travel and he has travelled to China, Nepal and Madrid – but no travel has occurred since the Covid lockdown.

To most of us, Geoffrey is a politician. He has been a member of the Parish Council (PC) for 28 years, and Uttlesford District Council (UDC) for 21 years. I asked if he had ever entertained thoughts of becoming a Member of Parliament, but he never had any interest in that, preferring to work on local issues. Asked about the achievements which meant most to him, he first mentioned how proud he was to have defeated developers in the matter of building houses near Pennington Lane. The first time was in 2013, when Geoffrey was Chair of the PC, and the second time was in 2021, when he founded the *Save Stansted* pressure group.

A second achievement to be proud of was when, as Chair of UDC, he and his team were successful at raising £70,000 to go towards the Support 4 Sight charity and our beautiful local nature reserve, Aubrey Buxton, run by Essex Wildlife Trust. That was an amazing bit of fundraising! Finally, Geoffrey takes credit for having floated the idea of UDC and Stansted PC working together to part fund the position of Community Support Officer for our area. Of course, every institution has its downside, and he says that the greatest challenge of local government is that one has to have a great deal of patience, as it takes a long time to get anything actually accomplished!

Geoffrey remembers, again with a strong sense of achievement, that in 2015, when the Lib Dems nationally were given a pasting (following coalition with the Tories), the local Lib Dems bucked the national trend and did well. He is proud to be in his 6th term at UDC; he retained his seat during the May elections. Politics has allowed him to give and earn knowledge and experience, so he is very glad that he will be able to continue with this over the next few years.

FORGOTTEN GARDENS OF

June started as hoped, with the gardens looking gorgeous; in particular the wild orchids on the bank in the glade, the waterlilies proliferating and the first of the roses. However, as I write, some trepidation is beginning to creep in, because there is no rain in the forecast, which means that our volunteers will be doing lots of watering. We should, hopefully, have enough water in the well and in the new butts to look after our young trees and shrubs and to grow vegetables in the walled kitchen garden. By July we will have produce to sell to visitors on Open Thursdays and Sundays.

The next Open Day on **Sunday 16th July** is when we focus on the world war history of the Gardens. *Perfect Vintage* singing duo will help us get in the mood, with Vera Lynn songs and other classic swing tracks and vintage banter. There will be a range of stalls and our archivists will present the stories of the Earl of Warwick's involvement with the Essex Imperial Yeomanry in the run up to World War I. We will hear about airmen and women stationed at the neighbouring Great Dunmow airfield in the 1940s, recuperating in the gardens during their time off.



Children can enjoy looking at the vintage cars and military vehicles and there will be associated craft activities. Dogs are welcome on leads and refreshments are available. IN THE GARDEN

In midsummer the garden is at its peak; even though most of the flowering trees and shrubs are now past their best, the flower borders are ablaze with colour. There are many different forms of salvia and all give a splendid display throughout the summer into autumn. Shrubby salvias are available in a wide variety of colours and usually survive the winter where other cultivars may prove too tender. Cut back stems to a leafy shoot in spring. July is the month to take cuttings: lavender, salvias, pinks and carnations are just a few suggestions. A moist, gritty compost is required: take the cutting below a leaf node and plant around the edge of the pot. Water, then place a plastic bag over the top, secured by an elastic band to form a small greenhouse; within four to five weeks roots will have formed. The cuttings can then be placed into a larger pot. Keep your containers moist and feed once a week to encourage flowering. Roses and other flowers in the herbaceous border need to be deadheaded to stimulate a further flush of flowers. Prune rambling roses once their flowering season is over.



Pinch out the tops of tomato plants when they have set four trusses of fruit, having pinched out the side shoots from cordon tomato plants as they form. By the end of July the fruit will be ripening and harvesting can begin. Feed once weekly when the first truss has set fruit. Beans should be in flower now and a fine water spray will help set the beans. They do require regular watering and they are very hungry feeders so a liquid feed is essential. Ponds should be teeming with frogs, newts and dragonflies. Some ponds have recently developed a green tinge which could be the result of sun or not enough oxygenating plant. Lily leaves should be more prolific now and help cover the water with a good cluster of flowers.

The Stansted SkateJam is something of a summer institution, drawing crowds to the Lower Street car park to catch the event every year. Ahead of this month's Jam we caught up with event organiser Seann Tompson

How is the Stansted Skatepark Jam regarded among the skateboard community?

The SkateJam has a good reputation within the local BMX, Skate and Scooter scene. It is effectively a local jam but we do often see some people making long journeys for it. People have travelled from as far as Manchester purely for the Stansted Skatepark Jam. Others from the Netherlands and California have ridden in the jam while coincidentally being in the country for other larger events.

What's the standard like at the SkateJam?

A few of the BMX riders at the skatepark do compete in national, and the occasional international, competitions. One of the local Inline skaters, Zak Aaron, has just returned from a FISE World Series event in the south of France. He competes in many national and some international events.

Which Xtreme sport is the hardest to do?

All are similarly difficult to master but each requires different sets of skills. Skateboarding involves a lot of control with your feet while BMX involves more airborne tricks and speed. Judges in higher level contests look out for difficulty of tricks done, how cleanly they are landed, consistency, height etc.

What the appeal of Xtreme sports?

I, like many others, find skatepark sports a refreshing difference to traditional team sports. Skatepark sports aren't sports as such, but more a lifestyle, an art form, an expression of oneself. It is the perfect escape from any of life's troubles. While I am on my bike I feel true freedom to ride how I want to ride, do what tricks I want to do, it's the most fun you could possibly have. You don't find this sort of freedom on a football pitch which is why I find these sports attract so many people.

MIND THE ZIGZAGS, PLEASE

Three points on your licence and a £100 fine is what you can expect as a driver if you park your vehicle on the zigzag lines on a pedestrian or pelican crossing. That's the message Uttlesford Community Policing team have asked us to pass on to you, following a recent weekend in Stansted Mountfitchet spent clamping down on the dangerous practice. Four drivers were caught and fined for parking on zigzags at crossings in the village, and a further 10 ticketed for speeding. The message from the police is simple: parking on or near a crossing can have tragic consequences. So please don't do it. PRESSING FOR A SECOND PHARMACY

Since the Essex Health and Wellbeing Board knocked for six the community's hopes of a second dispensing pharmacy last October the Parish Council, along with other individuals and interested parties, has been trying to reverse their position. This is no easy task.

Firstly, this is because as NHS regulations make clear: "There is no right of appeal against the findings or conclusions within a Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment." PNAs are used by health boards to determine the provision of health services in communities and are commissioned every three years. Without an appeal, it could be 2025 before we next get a chance to set out our case.

Secondly this is because the reasoning behind decisions taken in formulating a PNA can be unclear. When the Parish Council wrote to our local Integrated Care Board to clarify how we could contest the decision to not licence a second dispensing pharmacy we learned little beyond: "The PNA ... does not, and has not in the past, identified any gaps in provision [and] ... reflects that existing pharmacies can cope with any increase in demand over the lifetime of the PNA."

And then there is the legal context to consider. Statutory

obligations mean health boards look for specific sets of data when drafting a PNA. They prefer to consult with the public by techniques such as inviting people to complete their online questionnaires as part of the PNA process. Petitions seem to fall on deaf ears.

When there is no route to appeal, it's unclear why a PNA has gone against you, and room to present a case is limited, it is perhaps unsurprising to learn few PNAs get overturned. **This fact hasn't stopped the Parish Council from trying.**

What we are doing

Since the result of the PNA was announced, the Parish Council has called for the Integrated Care Board for Hertfordshire and West Essex to review their decision, kept the issue alive in the press, and got local MP Kemi Badenoch to back the call for a second dispensing pharmacy.

Our stance

The Parish Council wants a licensed dispensing pharmacy in the south of Stansted, where one currently doesn't exist. To get it we will pursue any avenue that evidences the need of this community and will meet the requirement of the Health and Wellbeing Board's PNA criteria.

DISTRICT COUNCIL UPDATE

District Councillor for Stansted North

Now the dust of the district council elections has settled it is time to reflect on the challenges that lie ahead. Before doing so, on behalf of Alan Dean and myself, we should like to thank those residents of Stansted North who supported us in our re-election campaign. It is a privilege and a responsibility to serve the residents of the place I have called home for most of my life. Once again, the quartet of councillors that represent Stansted on Uttlesford District Council has changed.

I welcome Nick Church and Ray Gooding who were elected to represent the Stansted South and Birchanger ward. I look forward to a constructive working relationship with them. Commiserations go to Melvin Caton and Ayub Khan who were unsuccessful in getting re-elected. They both worked hard as councillors. I have taken over from Melvin the leadership of the Liberal Democrat Group. The Residents for Uttlesford Party were re-elected with a reduced majority. There are some significant challenges facing the District Council not least with Planning.

LOCAL PLAN

The Local Plan is out of date. Because of this the presumption for planning inspectors is to grant planning permission. Planning inspectors call this the tilted balance, where the balance is in favour of the developer. A Local Plan will be controversial, but it will give a degree of certainty as to where development should take place. The latest projection is that the Council is working towards producing a plan by the end of 2024.

PLANNING DESIGNATION

Last year the Council was designated by the Government over the quality of its planning decisions. This means that developers of over 10 houses can apply directly to the Planning Inspectorate without having to go through the Council. Most have chosen not to do so. When developers do avail themselves of their right it gives us just the status of a consultee. It was heartening to learn that not all applications to the Planning Inspectorate received approval. An application for 18 houses in Elmdon and a solar farm in Manuden were both turned down.

CORPORATE RESPONSIBILITY

Many firms in their literature lay claim to be good corporate citizens. The reality is that for some they do not live up to their claims. In the case of Gigaclear, a provider of broadband, they erected a large cabinet at the entrance to Five Acres on Parish Council land without any consultation either with the Council or residents. A further failure of communication was with Care Homes UK at the Mountfitchet Care Home in Coltsfield, where a number of mature trees were felled. No explanation was given to residents in advance as to why this action was necessary. On both these cases I have intervened. The community is a stakeholder in a business. It is time that companies accepted this and act upon it.

COST OF LIVING

The cost of living crisis is causing hardship to residents who are facing financial difficulties. A cost of living crisis fund has been set up for the 2023/24 financial year to support Uttlesford residents who may be struggling to pay their Council Tax liability. 

GUERRILLA GARDENING

Guerrilla gardening is the act of gardening - raising food, plants, or flowers - on land that the gardeners do not have the legal rights to cultivate, such as abandoned sites, areas that are not being cared for, or private property, with the aim of improving the environment or producing vegetables or flowers for people to use or enjoy. Although it is technically illegal, few people have ever been prosecuted; however, you need to tread carefully if you are tempted to tidy up a piece of land that you regard as a bit of an eyesore. It is quite possible that what you see as an eyesore somebody would see as an important wildlife habitat.



Stansted's own guerrilla gardener has targeted the land on the corner of Crafton Green. It is a prime site which many of us frequently pass without a second glance. The large tree means any planting at the site gets limited direct sunlight and the tree roots also create problems but there is no reason why carefully selected plants cannot thrive and add a bit of colour to a gloomy corner of the village.

DON'T SUFFER IN SILENCE

A recent thought-provoking talk to Stansted u3a members opened our eyes to a complex and challenging subject – *Child to Parent and Grandparent Violence and Abuse,* which is often hidden behind closed doors. Researchers at Hull University have evaluated a scheme called *Who's in Charge,* introduced to support parents and grandparents who have been confronted with serious threats and often violent, harmful, controlling behaviour by under 18s. Simon Green, Professor of Criminology and Victimology, explained that whilst there is not yet a legal definition of the syndrome, and research is only just emerging, it is clear that for those trying to cope at home it can become a major trauma, damaging family relationships, leading to distress, shame and misery. It is estimated that 40% of victims do not seek support from the community or police. Help is often difficult to find.

The innovative *Who's in Charge* project is essentially a support programme which seeks to empower parents, providing them with solution-focused strategies for coping, helping to

rebuild their self-esteem, and reduce shameful feelings. It tries to build stronger understanding of a child's behaviour, creating the conditions for parents to identify and implement a programme of consequences for bad behaviour, and particularly to build parental self-care and assertiveness. The discussions that followed the talk revealed how little awareness there is of this syndrome, and just where to turn to for help if the situation affected us, or someone we know. Help is at hand. Whilst this is a sensitive and little-known problem, there are online and community contacts to help parents and/or grandparents to find support and help. 
Shoes and Balance

An important part of having good balance lies in the soles of the feet, as well as the eyes and the balance organs within the ears. The brain needs clear sensations coming up from the soles of the feet. Thick soled shoes weaken those sensations, as well as our foot muscles. Feet are stupendous pieces of architecture. Wondrous springs with four layers of muscles along with the sensation nerves so we can discriminate the ground beneath our feet. The foot is designed to open and close, to rock and roll as we move through life, meaning we should also be able to stretch out our toes at every step. Bunions are a sure sign that all is not well in the foot department; more on these next month.



Good shoes are critical. The ideal shoe is thin-soled and completely flat, which is called zero drop. Unless for a specific sport like tennis or golf, the shoe is completely flexible and has a wide toe box; no winkle pickers here. However, following years of wearing thick soled and narrow shoes, we need to prepare our feet and legs for fully flexible shoes, to avoid injury. The calves and foot muscles need strengthening. One place to start is going barefoot at home in the warmer months, or maybe buy a pair of slipper socks. These are available in a variety of thickness but all with grips on the bottom. They keep your feet warm but have complete freedom of movement and better ground feel. Apart from this, the good news is that there is now a huge variety of flexible shoes and walking boots available. Your feet will love you!

PHARMACY UPDATE

Those of us who are campaigning for a second Stansted pharmacy initiated an online questionnaire in early May, at our own expense. This is now closed but it attracted 667 responses, with many people giving more detailed responses. These have given us an even better understanding of what people actually experience and will strengthen future discussions with Hertfordshire and West Essex Integrated Care Board (H &WEICB).

We want to encourage the ICB to visit us and see for themselves why we are campaigning. We want them to see the proximity of Stansted Surgery and Stansted Pharmacy; to walk up Chapel Hill and to imagine that they are pushing a buggy with a child in it, or are using a disabled person's powered wheelchair. They should see the kerb, steps and parking outside Boots and observe our sprawling and rapidly growing large village. We want to give them every chance to question us and realise how nonsensical it is *not* to grant a licence to another dispensing pharmacy in addition to Boots. 
