Our pupils were given new tools to inspire confidence during a visit from motivational speaker James Shone. He had been a teacher for 16 years when, in 2012, he was preparing to take on his first headship. During a routine eye check, it was discovered that he had a large brain tumour. After 27 hours of brain surgery and 80 days in hospital unable to eat, drink or talk, he was left with no sight in one eye and only ten per cent vision in the other. As founder of his charity *I Can and I Am*, with a mission to inspire confidence, James hosted a whole school assembly where he shared his story.



Year 6 pupils also attended a workshop with him, exploring ways to inflate balloons of self-belief by showing kindness, feeling gratitude and setting themselves small steps forwards rather than large leaps. They also thought about what makes them unique and the importance of having a sense of belonging. Art teacher Ann Clausen said: "James' visit included joining a group of children from Years 1 to 6 for an art workshop, in which we all worked together to create a beautiful set of mosaic letters for I can and I am. His visit and message had a memorable impact on staff and children alike and will help with our on-going commitment to building self-belief and resilience in our children and the overall mental health wellbeing of our children and staff." Head of school Jen Pearce said: "James shared his acronym of UFO with us, meaning we should look Upwards, Forwards and Out. This is a mantra we will continue to build on in school with the children, as well as remember ourselves as adults and role models."



SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

Most UK households throw away at least 40kg of plastic each year; enough to fill 10 recycling bins. Nationwide, we use 7.7 billion plastic bottles per year, an average of 117 bottles per person, per year. This has a detrimental impact on our environment. If you want to reduce your waste, following the Five Rs is a great start; four actions should be taken, if possible, prior to recycling: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose and then Recycle. This month we will look at ways to reduce single use plastics. There are several local low plastic businesses in Stansted. These include:

- Steve Golding Greengrocers on Chapel Hill, where most fruit and veg come plastic free
- Kings Family Butchers on Lower Street welcome you bringing your own containers and using paper bags instead of plastic
- REFILLit delivers cleaning products and more to your door in glass bottles - for more info go to www.refillit.org.uk



Further afield there is **The Refill Barn** in Radwinter for food refills using your own containers. We really encourage you to support these businesses, as they are all independent, selling healthy, locally sourced and environmentally friendly products. Here are some tips to reduce your plastic usage:

- Carry your own refillable coffee cup and water bottle
- Food packaging: find products in cardboard, buy loose fruit and veg
- Filter water using Phox instead of plastic cartridges www.phoxwater.com
- Buy milk and juice in glass bottles that can be reused from the milkman, MrMilk www.mymrmilk.co.uk or Milk & More www.milkandmore.co.uk

Rural Cost Of Living

The cost of living in a rural area is higher because we have to travel further to shops and services; this is particularly hard for anyone trying to find work, access education or navigate the benefits system. Many houses in Uttlesford are off-grid and many are old and poorly insulated, which means that fuel poverty is more prevalent. We also have to contend with patchy connectivity, no job centre and poor public transport links.

A survey commissioned by the Rural Services Network (RSN) last year shows rural areas are also suffering more acutely from the rise in the cost of living compared to urban areas. So, to understand more about rural household budgets, they have launched a *Rural Cost of Living Household Survey*. Your input will help the RSN to engage more effectively with Government Departments, MPs and other policy makers. Growing for the Flower Arranger part 2

The Club welcomed Maike Windhorst again. Her homegrown flowers business for the floristry industry has grown and diversified since her last visit in 2016. Wild flowers, and what used to be considered as weeds, are very popular in floral art nowadays and *No Mow May* has highlighted the large number of colourful and unusual plants which we cut

down before we see their beauty. She recommended the Hardy Plant Society as a good source of unusual seeds. Aware of the amount of plastic used in her garden, she has been experimenting with different methods of growing and displaying flowers without plastic. The most successful method of producing non-plastic containers is by making hessian tiles; approximately 22cm (9") square with the height of the sides dependent upon what was to be planted, then sewn at the corners to keep their shape, filled with compost and planted up. Once outside, the hessian eventually rots down and the compost improves the soil. Her displays of bulbs and perennial plants proved to be popular with her clients; experimenting further, annuals and biennials were then introduced. Seeds or plug plants extend the range that can be used. Fellow florists are now experimenting making tiles with old woollen clothes. Slides of these tiles being used in her garden and some of her gift displays were shown.

NIGHTMARE ON GROVE HILL

Urgent attention needs to be given to the daily problems on Grove Hill. There was carnage there on Monday 6th February due to potholes and an oversized Warburton vehicle, with the knock-on effect of driving on the pavement causing danger to pedestrians, gridlock, and jumping red lights. A Stansted resident used to walk her dog from Aubrey Buxton using Grove Hill but does not dare to nowadays in view of the huge danger posed by vehicles driving on the pavements.



Two quotes follow from residents on 6th February:

"Ambulance vehicle engine cut out due to potholes, I just spoke to them. Surely an emergency vehicle taken off the road due to unacceptable conditions is reason enough to improve the situation. There could be lives at risk lost due to this! "

"Ambulance driver lost steerage of vehicle having hit one of the potholes causing 20-minute jam on Grove Hill. A second ambulance team arrived to assist but ended up in a longer jam. All resolved by much reversing and mounting of pavements again."

The meeting was opened by the Chairman, David Perry, who announced the sad news that our long-time member, Pearl Wellings, had recently passed away and he offered condolences to her family and friends.

During our February meeting we watched a fascinating collection of short films on the National Trails of South East England kindly loaned by the East Anglian Film Archive, part of the University of East Anglia. The first, Father Thames (1935), followed the river from its shallow source in the Cotswolds to the heart of London. Although rather grainy due to age, it portrayed a quiet and peaceful landscape of pre-war Britain. The second film Pilgrims Way (1956) covered the 120 mile trek over the North Downs and showed rather pretty towns and villages mostly unspoiled by modern developments. The slow speed of the sparse traffic reflected a more peaceful time. Holiday on the North Norfolk Coast (1952) followed a group of young women and men from Glasgow walking from Morston Quay to the Blakeney Nature Reserve. Then came Eastbourne (1958) showing an organised cross country walk over the South Downs. Unlike today, where walkers are kitted out in the latest paraphernalia, those taking part wore normal everyday clothes; men in suits or sports jackets and ladies in skirts and tops. No special walking boots either, just normal shoes; not great for mud and puddles. Norfolk (1986) narrated by journalist Bruce Robinson, was about an ancient Norfolk Roman Road called Peddars Way Path. The final film The Ridgeway (1988) showed the lives of people who lived and worked on Britain's oldest road. Special thanks were given to Roger Barrett who arranged the evening.

BIRCHANGER WOOD: THE YEAR AHEAD

The wood faces challenges and opportunities this year. Ash dieback continues to ravage our mature ash trees, causing a massive financial headache for the charity as professional arborists are required to fell the trees located near the A120. A further nine ash trees died over the summer, due to the drought. Purchases of our firewood soared ahead of Christmas and by January we had sold out, forcing us to suspend sales. The funds raised from wood from our sustainable coppicing help pay for the work on the dead and dying ash. However, we still need funds to plant replacement trees and we are applying for a grant from Uttlesford's Zero Carbon Communities fund to pay for large saplings, to re-establish forest cover quickly and maintain the wood-land's structure.

The wood is not just affected by this deadly fungal disease, but also by climate change. The Trust is trying to combat the effects of frequent drought and floods by slowing the pace of the woodland stream by constructing leaky dams. We have also created a wildlife pond inside our compound, to support insects and amphibious creatures. Maximising biodiversity is crucial to our woodland, particularly in times of climate stress. We are working with a local beekeeper to establish wild honeybee habitats in the wood with the installation of swarm boxes. By establishing native wild bee colonies, we can help native bees to resist colony-threatening pathogens.



One of our objectives is public education on woodland conservation and ecology. Our annual open days held every August are always a roaring success and we will have two open days a year; one in the Spring. Jono Forgham, a local woodland ecologist and a trustee, is planning a year-long natural history survey to examine biodiversity, hopefully with the assistance of volunteers. He is also set to launch a Bug Club for children - the most enthusiastic visitors to our open days.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

Last month was the beginning of Lent. At the time of writing this (still in February), I am unsure what I will be doing for it this year. I did have a phase slightly less than ten years ago of learning passages of scripture by heart. I have memorised Romans 8, which Rowan Williams submitted to the Liturgical Commission as one of the passages which he thought that all Christians should know by heart. The next year I learned the Sermon on the Mount, which is three chapters of the Gospel according to St Matthew. However three chapters was a somewhat oppressive task. I did it in the end but Lent is not about oppressing ourselves, and I do not recommend it.

Last year I was looking through the story of the Temptation in the Wilderness as preparation for a Lent sermon. I had never noticed before that the story begins with the Holy Spirit leading Jesus into the desert. It struck me that, far from being a time of miserable privation. Lent can actually be a time to experience the Holy Spirit in all its fullness. So my Lent resolution was simply to pray Come Holy Spirit each morning before I got out of bed. It lacked the heroics of extended Bible memorisation, but it did turn out to be a wonderfully energising spiritual discipline. If you do say this prayer, however, do not be surprised if some of the dark corners of your heart are unsettled; the Holy Spirit is not an obedient pet who will simply do your bidding! So, however you decide to spend your Lent, I hope that it will be a holy time for you. The sign of a good Lent is a joyful Easter. May both be ours this year!



IN THE GARDEN

Roses

These are the nation's favourite flowers, so we are told; they are certainly mine as they offer such a vast array of types. There is one for every garden situation and, if treated well, they continue flowering into autumn. To get the best from them, now is the latest time to prune them for maximum vigour this summer. Cut out dead, diseased or crossing stems: for shrub roses reduce height one to two thirds. Cut hybrid teas and floribundas hard back. Climbers should have main stems trained laterally and the shoots from them cut back to one or two buds. Ramblers can be left to their own devices unless you need to reduce their spread. Just remember, it is very difficult to damage a rose by pruning so if you get it wrong it will not harm the plant, you might just miss out on prize blooms this year!



The Pond

Hopefully you had a rubber ball floating in your pond creating a supply of air during the icy weather. If the oxygenated plants were not thinned between November and January now is the time to do so before they multiply rapidly in warmer weather. Remove floating, dead leaves and cut back faded top growth of marginal plants. Divide or top dress submerged plants like water lilies.

Tomatoes

There are many varieties to choose from ranging in size, colour and most importantly flavour. Ideally sow seeds in March in a cold greenhouse using a heated propagator for best germination. Sow seeds 2.5cm apart on moist compost in a 15cm tray. When seedlings have developed a pair of true leaves, gently prick out using a small spoon, replanting into 7.5cm pots. Do not touch the stems, only the leaves. More about this subject next month.

COMMUNITY EVENTS



The Parish Council's aim is to keep and support Stansted as a vibrant, caring community that is able to adapt to our changing lifestyles. The Jubilee event held on the Recreation Ground was a huge success and the proceeds of £3,320 were donated to The Stansted Trust Funds to administer. We have agreed to run an event for the Coronation of King Charles III. We are awaiting confirmation but this will be 7th or 8th May.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

It was disappointing we could not extend our Christmas light offering to more businesses on Lower Street this year. We did not get a response from Essex County Council to our request to use the power source to light up the Fountain at the top of Chapel Hill.

ZERO PRECEPT RISE TARGET MET

I am delighted that, following a number of deliberations with the Chair of Finance, we were able to agree a 0% increase in the Parish Council's share of the Council Tax in the next financial year. This is in recognition of the current financial situation everyone is experiencing. It is unlikely to be repeated again next year.

TOUCHPOINT SUCCESS

Touchpoint go from strength to strength, and are now considering extending our partnership to lease – at no charge – Crafton Green House from the Parish Council.

This would enable them to provide further services to our community. They now promote and facilitate a number of similar projects throughout Uttlesford and you will hear more about their plans when they speak at the Annual Parish Meeting.

THREADNEEDLE UNDERWHELMS

Columbia Threadneedle Investments had applied for planning permission to develop the Northside of Stansted Airport for mainly logistic sector developments and permission was granted by UDC in late January. We lobbied hard to promote the needs of Stansted within this application and were disappointed at the lack of community benefits considered in relation to the development.

The turf football pitches on the site, which were used by Elsenham Junior Football Club, are to be replaced

by a 3G artificial facility at Forest Hall School – we have requested that the Parish Council is represented on the body that manages this new facility. We did manage to secure funding to contribute to Essex County Council's (ECC) feasibility study on the

redirection of heavy goods traffic away from the village via the A120. We used this experience of lack of community benefit to respond to the UDC consultation on S106 provision and developer consultation and contributions.

We should also be clear, the Parish Council only supported the development of 250 homes on land north of Walpole Farm, in the proposed UDC Call for Sites, not the 350 now proposed. This was made very clear at their consultation event.

HOPE FOR ALMSHOUSES...

The search for land to replace the Almshouses in Stansted continues. We are currently in discussions with ECC and Legacy East Almshouse Partnership to determine if the old Youth Centre site in Lower Street could be a feasible replacement site.

...AND FOR A PHARMACY

We are also hopeful that, with the allocation of dispensing licences being passed to the Herts and West Essex Integrated Care Board in April this year, we can continue to demonstrate the need for two dispensing pharmacies in our community.

COMMUNITY POLICING



Our Special Constable and PCSO continue to work with us to promote and safeguard our community. Following the withdrawal of Elsenham from the funding agreement with Uttlesford District Council, UDC has agreed to cover that element of the funding deficit for the remainder of the contract.

ACTIVE ON HIGHWAY ISSUES

Highways issues have been high on the agenda this year – with Grove Hill still awaiting legislation to enable remote enforcement of weight limit infringements. Residents' parking schemes have been consulted on in the south of the village and will be soon with Foresthall Park residents. "No Airport Parking" signs have been erected there as they have on some roads in the north of the village

A GREENER GREEN



Further improvements to the Mountfitchet Green have been completed with the addition of seating, fencing, a goalpost and a swing for less able children. Various areas of the village have benefited



from a tree-planting project undertaken by the Essex Forest Initiative who will maintain the trees for the first three years.

LED STREET LIGHTS

We are seeking a grant from UDC to convert our streetlights from sodium to LED to save money and reduce CO2 emissions. A Climate Change group of residents has been formed to encourage a change in behaviour by our community. The group, *Sustainable Stansted*, has applied for funding to distribute flyers and aim to find more funding for projects focusing on domestic energy saving and environmental issues.

PLAN NEARLY READY

The UDC Local Plan remains an emerging plan with delay after delay announced - leaving us open to speculative development. Meanwhile, we are finalising the mapping and appendices to go with our Neighbourhood Development Plan and expect to deposit the draft with UDC prior to the Annual Parish Meeting.

YOUTH SERVICE

The delivery of the Youth Club service was retendered this year, with the provider now being Essex Youth Services. The service has transferred to, and was relaunched in, a refurbished building on the Peter Kirk site just a few weeks ago. Our Youth Council is now including year 6 primary school young people, working with primary heads and school councils. We aim to provide our youth with skills to negotiate and debate the promotion of a Stansted that enables them to develop into valued citizens.

Financial Report

n last year's report, I raised concerns over inflation forecasts of up to 6% for April 2022, but a mis-conceived 'Mini Budget', together with the Ukraine war's effect on energy costs, resulted in almost double that figure with inflation reaching 11.1% in November and a forecast that the rate will only fall below 10% after March 2023.

In December the members of the Finance and General Purposes Committee voiced their opinion that, in view of the 'Cost of Living Crisis', a way should be found for the Parish Council to show its support for those members of our community struggling with their own financial worries. In January, it was unanimously agreed to recommend to Full Council not to increase the Council's Band D Tax rate, which should remain at £127.88. This was approved unanimously by Full Council at its meeting held on 18th January.

As explained last year, the Parish Council's policy is to maintain a minimum increase in the Precept at 2% per annum, way below the predicted rise in the UK economy of 5 times that amount. Full Council has agreed that it will not claw back the 2% concession but to ensure that we can meet our obligations, the Council also agreed that any shortfall in the budget for 2023-2024 should be taken from the £25,000 annual repayment into the Foresthall Park Community Fund, which would be repaid as an extra instalment after the end of the loan repayment term (in 4-5 years).

As stated last year, the F&GP Committee is charged with trying to balance 'need' with 'service to the community'. The formation of a **partnership with Touch-Point** has seen the start of not only improvements to council property at Crafton Green, but also in services to those in need of support. We have indeed seen 'added value' to community services here. Crafton Green House is now looking in better shape after repairs to the roof and windows, with the former Day

Centre becoming a true welfare hub for our own and wider communities.

The environment and sources of energy are hot topics which need attention. The Parish Council has implemented a second phase of tree planting around our open spaces with 56 trees being planted through the Essex Forest Initiative. The F&GP Committee has agreed that a £5,000 Earmarked Reserve be transferred from funds left over to produce the Neighbourhood Plan and be made available to the newly founded Climate Change Working Group (now named Sustainable Stansted).

Our Parish Council, unlike others, owns 85% of all streetlights in the village and an application has been made to Uttlesford's 'Zero-carbon Community Fund' to convert 100 of our sodium lights to LED. If successful, it would help us reduce the anticipated timescale for the full conversion of our lighting stock, from 7 years to around 3 years, achieving an overall saving of 72% in carbon emissions and energy costs.

Last Christmas saw the first attempt to improve the Christmas lighting display in Lower Street. This proved more difficult than expected with property owners understandably reticent to allow fixings installed on the outside of their buildings. Despite this, thanks to the Stansted Social Club and King's Arms a great improvement to the atmosphere was achieved. The great fund-raising effort of Patsy Banks provided the Christmas trees which were lit up outside the Castle Maltings and opposite The Dog and Duck pub.

Annual Parish Council Grants: Applications were received from six organisations and dispersed as follows: Stansted Millers £500; Uttlesford Community Travel £1,250; Human Roots £500; Stansted Hall & Elsenham Cricket Club £500; Uttlesford Citizens Advice £1,120. Touchpoint £1,150.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) recently published analysis of the 2021 Census. The population of England grew by 6% in the last 10 years and 14% over the last 20 years. Locally, the increase has been much faster. The population of The Hundred Parishes in 2021 was around 156,000, up 12% since 2011 and 24% since 2001. If roads seem busier, these extra 30,000 people are a major factor. Half of the increase is accounted for by six parishes close to Stansted Airport. Elsenham, Flitch Green, Great Dunmow, Little Canfield, Stansted Mountfitchet and Takeley have all expanded by more than 50% in the last 20 years. Another big growth was seen in Buntingford: from 4,300 in 2001 to 7,900 in 2021.



The Domesday Book

The Census is the modern equivalent of the Domesday Book of 1086 AD when the national population was less than two million, compared to 60 million today. Today, 8% of the Hundred Parishes population was born outside the UK (compared to 17% in the whole of England and Wales); 10% of homes are flats (v 22%); 36% of houses have four or more bedrooms (v 21%); 27% of homes are rented (v 37%); 40% of adults work at home (v 31%); 55% are in professional or managerial jobs (v 46%); 56% of households have two or more vehicles (v 35%). We have a different age mix from the UK average, with a shortfall of around 5,000 people in their 20s and 30s offset by around 5,000 extra people aged over 40. While the above information highlights contrasts, some statistics are closely aligned with the national picture: 99% of households have central heating; 5% of households have a second home; 51% of the population is female and 49% male. 

STANSTED PHARMACY UPDATE

Since my update in the December Link, a number of important events have occurred. In November I submitted a statement to Herts & West Essex Integrated Care Board (H&WEICB) explaining why we urgently need a licensed community dispensing pharmacy near Stansted Surgery in addition to Boots on Cambridge Road. A small group of residents then had a virtual meeting with a director of H&WEICB, and a follow-up meeting is planned. In December Health Watch Essex conducted an online survey asking what we experience when visiting our local dispensing pharmacy and what could be improved. Over 170 responded, most of them Stansted residents.

On 26th January H&WEICB held a virtual meeting; I attended but was not allowed to speak. However, I submitted a statement which the Board responded to. On 27th January a representative of Health Watch Essex visited Stansted and met a few residents. We showed her the Lower Street pharmacy, our Surgery and the NHS dentist. We walked up to Boots then had a whistle-stop tour of the village. It was her first visit to Stansted and helped her understand our need. One of our wheelchair-bound residents sent me her statement and allowed me to read it to the Parish Council on 18th January; a copy was sent to the H&WEICB and our MP. Her statement is so powerful: Our community does not properly consider the needs of those less able due to no fault of their own. Those who cannot walk need to be able to gain access to Stansted's key facilities; let us start with a licensed pharmacy that ALL can enter. If any readers or others are disabled, please contact me with your experiences. The campaign continues.



STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET WINDMILL

We were very pleased to hear that our application for a grant from the Stansted Airport Community Fund had been successful. The award of £651 will enable us to carry out work recommended by our Millwright. The project is an engineering issue with health and safety implications. A fantail is the circular windmill mounted perpendicular to the main sails, at the rear of the windmill cap. When the wind changes direction it turns the fantail and through a very low-geared mechanism, turns the whole cap so that the sails face into the wind again. Since a major restoration in 2009-10 the windmill has been able to turn itself into the wind automatically by this mechanism. However, in conditions where a strong wind veers or backs quickly, the fantail can rotate extremely fast. To reduce the risk of damage or breakage of individual blades (with an attendant risk to people or property in the vicinity), tie-rods would interlock the individual blades into a single more rigid entity which is better able to withstand such bad weather conditions.



We are currently working on an application for an Airport Flagship award to enable us to complete the re-pointing of the brickwork. Under this scheme, organisations within a 10 mile radius of the airport can apply for grants up to £50,000. They will be awarding just one Flagship Award per year and we are likely to be competing with a number of other applications; we will be waiting nervously to hear if we have been successful or not. Your first chance to visit the mill this year will be on Easter Sunday 9th April. We are also open on Easter Monday 10th April. There will be an Easter Egg for the children. Normal admission charges will apply: adults £2, children 50p, under 5s free.


