

It has been a typically busy and bustling first half term at school with lots of events and activities. We held two prospective parent days for new starters in 2024 and these were very well attended. If you would like to come and look around our happy school please see contact details below. You may have noticed exciting changes to our roof; as part of the Solar for Schools project we were lucky enough to be chosen. Our multiple panels have been installed and we have already started generating our own electricity.

Harvest Festival was celebrated with an abundance of food donated from pupils which was delivered to Uttlesford Foodbank. Willow and Lilac class shared their version of The Dingly Dangly Scarecrow, and Key Stage 1 sang Thank you for the World with British Sign Language. Lower Key Stage 2 read descriptive poems about harvest and our oldest children performed a thought-provoking poem about Mr Want and Mr Need and displayed some beautiful artwork. We also held a non-uniform day to fundraise for the Abilities in Me Foundation. They write children's stories based on real children with a range of conditions. We raised over £180 which will pay for a set of the books for school and also support other Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) projects.

We have recently become aware of a fantastic new resource for children with autism. The Peer Education Programme is run with Autism Central, by families, for families. They provide online information sessions about autism such as anxiety, sensory needs, back to school support as well as fortnightly informal drop-in sessions. STANSTED SURGERY PPG ULTRASOUND APPEAL

I am the current chair of our Patient Participation Group (PPG) and greatly appreciate what the surgery does for this community. Their current challenge is to administer flu and covid jabs to thousands of us. The PPG has tried to raise money for pieces of equipment not provided by the NHS. A hand held ultrasound machine would be extremely helpful to our GPs and physiotherapists. Diagnostic ultrasound uses soundwaves to produce images of internal body structures. These can provide valuable information for diagnosing and directing treatment for a variety of diseases and conditions. Currently, if a doctor thinks that ultrasound images can help diagnose your condition, they refer you to a local hospital and you are placed on a waiting list for this to be done. The ultrasound is performed by someone who does not know the details of your condition, and the results sent back to your doctor.

As the portability and quality of ultrasound machines have developed, they have become an accessible tool for GP surgeries. The benefits of performing ultrasound scans within the doctor's surgery include: improved care by integrating the ultrasound findings with the clinical history and examination, increasing the speed of diagnosis and treatment, reduced pressure on hospital services and reduced travel for patients. The cost of this equipment is £5,000 and it would be available for use by all the doctors and physiotherapists at the surgery. If you can donate to this worthy cause, it would be very much appreciated. 




Come and see the Shell House fully restored to its former glory by the lake. The house was built around 1750 and its shells come from the West Indian, West African and Indo Pacific trade, collected by the Houblon family. Cliveden Conservation have carried out its vital restoration. Traditional techniques were followed using original patterns. Materials such as knapped flint, blue glass slag and a variety of exotic and native shells have been fixed to the outer walls using original materials, where possible. A deep conservation clean is now taking place and it will reopen to visitors soon.

STANSTED HELPLINE GETS TOGETHER

On Wednesday 4th October all our volunteers were invited to a cuppa and cake at the Day Centre. It was an opportunity for the drivers to put faces to the voices of the people who ring them to arrange transport for our clients, and a chance to chat to their fellow volunteers. The afternoon was enjoyed by all. Our new Chairman, Anne, started with a potted history of Helpline and then shared the latest statistics. Our adult safeguarding policy was also covered by Anne before volunteers were asked for their comments about Helpline. There followed a lively discussion concerning hospital car parking, particularly registration of blue badges at Princess Alexandra Hospital in Harlow and the type of help available for patients discharged from hospital such as free GPS alarm systems. Paul Chambers joined us to explain the work of Touchpoint and its activities at their Community Café, including breakfast and teatime clubs, lunches, food share and Sunday afternoon family movie shows. It is hoped that Helpline and Touchpoint can work more closely together to support Stansted residents.

Helpline was established in 1984 and started with 100 volunteers dealing with 165 calls; 88 were for transport. We now have 20 to 30 volunteers and last year took 139 calls; all were transport requests. We could do with a few more volunteer drivers who would be free to do as much or as little as they want. If you can help, please ring the Helpline number 07704 553727, which is available Monday to Friday 9.00am-4.00pm. It is very rewarding work and a chance to meet some lovely people. If you cannot drive or use public transport and have no-one else able to assist, please call us, and we will do our best to arrange to take you where you need to go.

MAUREEN CATON

Most Stansted residents know Maureen as the Chair of the Parish Council. However, as you will see in this article, she has a great many other interests and a very varied and fulfilling life. She was born and raised in Chelsea, then attended Saffron Walden Teacher Training College. Following this, she went to University College Cambridge where she earned a Bachelor of Education degree, specialising in Psychology, Sociology and Anthropology. She taught in Hackney for five years, then changed career and moved into Children's Social Care, becoming Head of Service for Children's Residential Care, the Placement Service, Family Centres and Children with Disabilities for Essex County Council.



Her first post in Social Care was in an Adult Training Centre for six months, while she considered exactly what she wanted to do. She chose to work with children who have physical and mental disabilities and her first job doing this was at Hargrave House, long before it became the Care Home that it is today. Maureen met her husband Melvin in Stansted, and they have lived here for the past 42 years. Hargrave House for Disabled Children was moved to Chelmsford, in spite of petitions to Downing Street. Maureen hosted Princess Diana when she opened the Chelmsford Home in 1996 – it was a state-of-the-art building which included an indoor swimming pool.

Maureen is now self-employed as a Children's Social Care Consultant working in different local authorities: Cambridge, Southend, Peterborough, Norfolk, Slough, Sussex and Birmingham. She undertakes service reviews and investigates major complaints, as well as monitoring practice in various children's residential homes. She has always loved the work as it is incredibly rewarding but, as you can imagine, it can be very emotional indeed. She so enjoys watching the outcomes for young people changing for the better and loves being around youngsters. Maureen is glad to say that she has never been without a job; these days it is nice to be able to pick and choose which job she wants to take on. In any typical working week, the Social Care work takes up about half that week, and the Parish work accounts for the rest.

Maureen was elected to the Parish Council 11 years ago, and chaired the Open Spaces Committee for a year, until she was elected to be Chair of the Council - a post she has held since. Her attitude is that Councillors are there for the local community, so what concerns the latter should also concern the Council. I asked her about what she feels have been the Council's achievements under her leadership and her immediate answer was giving support to the recent permission granted for a second licensed dispensing pharmacy in the village. The local Surgery taking up the cudgels, and getting the licence on appeal - which we are all hugely happy about. In addition to this achievement, Maureen mentioned the Youth Council, working with colleagues on the Neighbourhood Development Plan, Twinning with Rungis near Paris, and working with the Stansted Business Forum on the Economic Development of the local area, which enables local business to access grants, for example. Finally, after a great deal of hard work, which included picketing and speaking at County Hall, the Library was saved from closure by the Parish Council led efforts.

When asked about past and current challenges, Maureen mentioned that looking for land to re-site the Almshouses is proving problematic, but the biggest thorn in many peoples' side is that of the Grove Hill nightmare. This exemplifies the ongoing frustration of the time needed to resolve such issues, due mainly to excessive bureaucracy. The saga of the construction of the new Council Offices in Crafton Green evidently burns in her memory; the process was riddled with troubles throughout!

So, what does Maureen enjoy doing for leisure? She and Melvin very much enjoy jazz and they often go to the 606 Jazz Club in Chelsea. They also recently went to the Royal Albert Hall, for a performance by Gregory Porter (a top-class American singer/songwriter). The Catons have two children and two grandchildren, aged 8 and 10, whom they see quite often, in spite of the children living across the water in Hillsborough, Northern Ireland. Finally, Maureen and Melvin love to go travelling particularly to foreign cities, and during October they went to the Golden Triangle in India, which is bound to have been an unforgettable adventure.

The last of our Sunday open days for 2023 was on 1^{st} October and they re-commence from Easter next year. We are happy to open the mill for groups to visit so please get in contact if you are interested in a guided tour. We would like to express our appreciation to our volunteer stewards who have given up their time to enable us to open the mill to the public, and raise much needed funds to support our conservation work.

Our focus now is on getting the mill ready for our Santa at the Mill event which takes place on **Saturday 9th December**. Transforming the first floor of the mill into a magical grotto takes a lot of time and effort from a small team of volunteers. Full details will be in the December issue of The Link and on social media platforms.

We are currently in the process of applying for grants to enable us to complete the repointing of the brickwork at the mill. Approximately 10% of the brickwork was repointed in 2019 at a cost of about £5,000. We now need to complete the job by repointing the remaining brickwork. We have a quote of just over £50,000 from a local company that specialises in undertaking conservation work on historic buildings. Maintaining the pointing of a brick structure through repointing is crucial. Although it does not need to be done frequently it is vital to do it correctly. The replacement of decaying mortar is necessary because the bricks would otherwise suffer damage from the elements resulting in serious problems such as damp ingress and black mould spreading, causing costly and hazardous problems to the internal parts of the mill.



Your Feet and your Memory

The soles of the feet are rich in pressure receptors. These send signals up to the brain aiming to keep us safely upright. The feet are a vital part of the whole balance system. These receptors talk to the parts of the brain that promote movement, as well as the insula cortex which helps us prepare relevant heart rate, blood pressure and so on, and, most extraordinarily, to the hippocampus – long term memory and memory retrieval. We do not know why there is this connection; it seems to be related to remembering our direction of walking.



I have noticed that, while grappling with my daily Duolingo French and German, when I cannot remember some blooming word, I get fed up and start to go to get a drink of water. I often remember the word within a few steps. This has always struck me as odd and now I know why this would work. I have also heard that if you cannot remember why you came into the room, return from whence you came, and you will remember what you needed. Again, it is probably the walking with intention of remembering that helps that happen. Of course, it is important that your feet can feel the floor. Wearing cushioned shoes deadens these pressure receptors and plays havoc with your ability to balance. Therefore, if you forget something and you are wearing comfy slippers, take them off, wiggle your feet about on the floor to wake them up and start walking around. Best of all is to wear thin soled, flexible shoes whenever possible.

SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

Why is it important to reduce food waste?

"Please take a whole tray of mushrooms" the friendly pink t-shirt wearing volunteers say. "Does anyone need a birth-day cake?" "Have you ever tried star fruit?" I *love* going to the TouchPoint Community Food Share. If you have not discovered it yet, TouchPoint rescues food that supermarkets no longer want, to prevent it going to landfill. Several times a week they offer it, at no cost, to the local communities in Stansted, Elsenham, Takeley and Saffron Walden. Over 1,500 people a week benefit and 7,000 kg of food each month is saved; it is quite something.



I love getting something for free and I love the challenge of making something with a new, unexpected ingredient. The main thing that pulls me to the food share each week is that reducing food waste has a significant part to play in the fight against climate change. When food rots, rather than being eaten, it creates much larger amounts of the greenhouse gas methane. In fact food waste is responsible for more greenhouse gases than the airline industry. According to the United Nations, if food waste were a country, it would be third only to China and the United States, in terms of greenhouse gas emissions.

Other ideas to reduce food waste include:

- Meal planning, only buying what you need, and checking what you already have before shopping
- Using your freezer more, for example for sliced bread. Fuller freezers use less energy too!
- Love your leftovers; use recipe websites to search for ideas based on what you need to use up
- Blend fruit that looks a bit past its best into smoothies (or freeze it until you want one.)

With autumn now upon us the reserve is changing colour from greens to browns and the trees and shrubs are providing a feast of nuts and berries for the mice, squirrels and birds to feed on. Beneath the beech and hazel trees in particular there is a very good crop of nuts this year. Look closely and you can see the different ways in which mice and squirrels open a hazelnut shell to get at the edible part inside. If you find a hazelnut that has not been opened, open the shell yourself and chances are that the nut inside has not formed. The squirrels and mice can tell this before opening the shell and therefore save themselves the effort. Now is also a good time to see spiders. The spider webs are more obvious as they glisten in the morning dew and make an excellent subject for photography. The reserve supports a wide range of spiders, something that would be worthy of study in its own right. One species that caught my eye recently was the Wasp Spider; a spectacular spider so named for the yellow and black markings on the female.



The car park has some significant potholes and needs attention, so work will be carried out this month to repair it. This may mean closing the car park for a short period, so apologies for any inconvenience.

TOUCHPOINT - BEHIND THE SCENES

Many of you will have noticed the free food share project started over a year ago by local charity Touchpoint. When I discovered that the equivalent of 200,000 meals had been distributed free of charge to our community, I was curious to learn what went on behind the scenes. My first trip was shadowing a regular volunteer on his round to a couple of Tesco branches in Harlow, to collect food. These trips take place throughout the week to several supermarkets and chain restaurants including Sainsbury's, Aldi, Waitrose, Pret A Manger and most recently Nando's. The food and other goods collected from these locations go primarily towards the food shares, but also Sunday movies and local school breakfast clubs.

Upon arrival at the Tesco stores in the eye-catching Touchpoint refrigerated van, the produce is swiftly loaded to keep it as fresh as possible during the drive back to Touchpoint headquarters in Stansted. During this collection we picked up bread, fresh fruit and vegetables, along with some flowers. I learnt that all of this would have ended up in landfill despite it being in good condition, which is so very sad. Back in Stansted two more volunteers are ready and waiting to weigh, sort and log the items before storing them ready for their use in the coming days.

I gained a greater understanding of the collection and sorting process by shadowing the team and felt a sense of achievement and pride from them; they all said they enjoy working together on such a great community project. ...with news of this year's Remembrance Service, a new local business support group and success for the village in the Anglia in Bloom competition. Also we have an overview of how Uttlesford draft Local Plan could impact the village in the future.





Remembrance Service 2023

Veterans of the World Wars of last century may no longer be with us but Stansted's Remembrance Service held to honour the sacrifice of all those who have fought in conflicts around the world since 1914 to defend the nation and our way of life remains a well-attended, fitting tribute by our community to their heroic efforts. Hundreds attend the Memorial Service each year, and in 2022 more than 30 wreaths were left at the Chapel Hill memorial by local organisations, charities and representatives from the emergency services, armed forces and local authorities. The service will be held on Sunday, November 12 if you would like to pay your respects once more.

Event Details

Time: Gather from 10.30am

Place: St John's Memorial Gardens, Chapel Hill

Parade Route: From Crafton Green car park, down Chapel Hill to the Memorial Gardens. The parade will be led by service personnel from Carver Barracks.

Service: Rev'd Dr Colin Fairweather will lead the service. Refreshments will be served afterwards in the Church Hall. Traffic Management: Traffic will be held in both directions along Chapel Hill from 10.40 to 10.50am. Drivers using the village roads at this time are asked to consider their speed and noise until the service has finished at around 11.30am, and ideally to find an alternative route before this time.

Laying foundations for business success

This autumn the Parish Council was proud to announce the establishment of a new business body that will work to boost the prospects of local enterprises and employment opportunities. The Economic Development Group consists of SMPC chair Maureen Caton, officials from Uttlesford District Council and members of the Stansted Business Forum. The body will meet on a weekly basis and has set itself the task of working to:

- promote Stansted Mountfitchet as a vibrant and thriving community with access to shops / services and local attractions
- develop plans to enhance commercial and retail activity and expand the variety of service provision
- help businesses access start-up support, as well as loans and grants
- promote local community employment opportunities tackle barriers to business development
- support the retention of employment land for that purpose and, where appropriate, its redevelopment to meet current needs including green retrofitting
- assist business in working towards net-zero carbon emission targets by helping them access low-carbon and renewable energy schemes
- reduce liability risks stemming from climate change, such as from fire and floods
- work with (and lobby) existing local authorities and agencies, eg UDC's Business Support Group
- support the Stansted Business Forum

The Economic Development Group held its first meeting in October at which it established its terms of reference. Parish Council Chair Maureen Caton said: "Covid lockdowns, the impact of Brexit in terms of additional business costs and finding staff, as well as the impact of rising energy costs are making life very difficult for many of our shops and companies. We are hopeful the Economic Development Group will find ways for businesses to overcome these obstacles and thrive in the future."

Council News in Brief

Uttlesford | PUBLIC CONSULTATION District Council is to begin consulting residents on the Local Plan 2021-41. It proposes 390 homes to be built in the north of Stansted (see page 22). Meanwhile, the Parish Council is working with UDC officials to prepare the village's Neighbourhood Development Plan for submission to the Planning Inspectorate.

Bloor Homes have notified ALLOTMENTS the Parish Council they are ready to transfer the new allotments at Walpole Meadows. UDC have authorised the transfer. We await action from Bloor's legal team.

Topsoil and quick-drying | REPAIRS cement have been used to seal the sink hole at the Recreation Ground, following temporary repairs needed to stabilise the area this summer. Also, railings around the water fountain on Chapel Hill will be fixed after being clattered by a motorist.

An application is to ZEBRA CROSSING be made to Uttlesford's Local Highways Panel for 2 zebra crossings on Walson Way in light of a favourable response to the proposal from a consultation with Foresthall Park residents this summer.

Forest Hall School, which has drummed up fresh recruits, our Youth Council is now fully up and running. In October it held its first meeting at the school and the Parish Council arranged for youth councillors to visit the Houses of Parliament with pupils over from Rungis on a twinning trip.

Recent summer | AILING TREES heat waves have adversely affected trees across the village, notably at Elms Farm, with many saplings planted in 2022 failing to thrive. A tree survey next year will uncover the extent of the problem and its budgetary impact.

DISTRICT COUNCIL UPDATE



Uttlesford District Council is currently preparing a draft Local Plan. This will determine where development will take place up to 2041.

The reality is that Uttlesford has not had a Local Plan since 2005. There have been two failed attempts. Consequently, the district has seen much speculative development. Some 6000 houses have received planning permission which have currently not been built.

The Local Plan Leadership Group I recently attended and spoke at. Please see the link to the meeting. Go to media https://uttlesford.moderngov.co.uk/ieListDocuments.aspx?Cld 510 Mld 6263 My contribution is at 42 minutes from the commencement of the meeting.

I raised concerns about the traffic volumes on the B1383. Potentially this draft Local Plan and those houses approved would amount to an additional 4,600 households making use of the B1383. I recently had a dental appointment in Bishop's Stortford. It took me 30 minutes to travel from Stansted.

Car Dependent Development

For Stansted the draft Local Plan is proposing the developments at north of the existing Walpole Meadows development and south of Alsa Street. These will be both car dependent.

"The provision of up to 390 dwellings, including affordable and specialist housing on high-quality development to the north of the settlement and outside of the Green Belt.

Uttlesford's Draft Plan & Stansted Key Proposals

- 6,076 new homes to be built across Uttlesford by 2041, of which 390 will be in Stansted
- Proposed community gains from development include a new primary school, a community facility, and improved pedestrian and cycle provision along Cambridge Road
- Enhancements to the village railway station, with improved local walking and cycling connections to the station
- A commitment to a Countryside Protection Zone around Stansted to preserve its rural identity and prevent merger with nearby settlements

"The proposal will deliver a 2 form entry primary school, which helps cater for nearby development that is already consented, and contribute towards the expansion of the existing secondary school.

"The site will also provide a new community facility, to comprise either an educational, health or leisure function and to be located accessibly with regard to the existing settlement.

"New areas of green and blue infrastructure which link the settlement into the natural resources within the wider landscape. Enhanced pedestrian and cycle connectivity along Cambridge Road".

What happens next?


The draft Local Plan will go to Cabinet and then to Full Council on the 30th October. If approved, it will then go out to public consultation on 3 November. This will last until 15 December 2023. Representations can be emailed to localplan@uttlesford.gov.uk

Night Flights - Smoke and Mirrors

If you feel that there are more Stansted night flights than ever, you would be right. Stansted Airport Watch (SAW) has finally been able to establish what has been happening. Stansted is allowed a maximum of 13,700 flights a year during the 6½ hour core night period 11.30pm to 6.00am, more than twice the number allowed at Heathrow, so local residents in this part of the world are entitled to feel they have drawn the short straw. That is not the whole story. The Secretary of State allows Stansted management to use their own discretion to disregard certain night flights. These are known as dispensations and they are mostly granted when an aircraft which was scheduled to arrive or depart before 11.30pm, actually arrives or departs after 11.30pm, thereby becoming a night flight. In summer 2022, Stansted management granted a total of 1,201 dispensations.

SAW has also been able to obtain comparative information for Heathrow and Gatwick which shows that they are far less liberal in granting dispensations. Compared to the 1,201 Stansted dispensations, Gatwick granted 576 dispensations and Heathrow just 415. This is despite the fact that Stansted is by far the smallest of London's three main airports. The vast majority of Stansted dispensations were Ryanair flights and were categorised as being delays due to bad weather (mainly thunderstorms) and Air Traffic Control problems. However, this begs the question as to why Stansted flights should be so much more prone to thunderstorms and Air Traffic Control problems compared to Heathrow and Gatwick? Meanwhile many local residents may feel that it is time to stop Stansted management marking their own homework. Better still, it is time to dispense with dispensations.

On learning that one of the founding members was stepping back from the Committee into the audience after 28 years I reflected on all their concerts I have been to since moving to the village in 2009.

That first concert for me was also the first event I went to in the village and remains the best move I have made into the cultural life of Stansted, and in my view the jewel in the crown of what the village offers. The quality, variety and standard of the programmes have been consistently of the highest, and at £10 per concert for season ticket holders of my age (65+) compared with the £38 I paid recently for a concert at Saffron Hall but without the driving and parking, it is a no-brainer as they say.

The only disappointing feature of the concert was the small size of the audience - only 50 or so, when in my first years

here the church was always packed. Is it the covid effect or too much competition from other events locally and via the media? Who knows, but in case anyone has not heard of these concerts or is not sure about going along, please give it a try. The music on offer is just too good to miss.

Last year we put in a new path from the Italian garden to the walled kitchen garden. Visitors have really appreciated it and it is already well bedded in. Once it is complete the path will help visitors see the glory of the gardens even when the grass is very wet in spring and autumn months.



Throughout October the gardens looked lovely in their autumn colours; in November we need a big leaf clearance effort. By the end of the year the bay is full to overflowing, but it is amazing how quickly the leaves rot down and become usable mulch. We use this for protecting the dahlia border and asparagus beds over winter and for keeping moisture in the ground around newly planted trees and shrubs, so we need a lot. Flood Safety Tips

- Keep an eye on weather reports for flooding in your area. Avoid driving in heavy rain
- Do not ignore road closed signs
- Never attempt to cross or drive through floodwater of an unknown depth. Just two feet of water will float a car
- Never try to swim through fast flowing water or floodwater – you may get swept away or be injured by an object in the water
- Do not assume fords are safe to cross because the road is not closed. Always look at the river level gauge and use your common sense
- Never allow children or pets to play in floodwater; it may be contaminated
- Prepare a flood kit in case your home floods or you are trapped in a vehicle for any period. This should contain a change of clothing, wellies, waterproofs and blankets, a torch, charged mobile, medication, a first aid kit and list of useful numbers, including flood alert lines.

- If the small, circular country in southern Africa between South Africa and Mozambique is classed as Eswatini, your globe is from 2018 or after
- If Eswatini is instead classed as Swaziland and your globe has a South Sudan, it is from between 2011 and 2018
- If it does not have South Sudan but does have Kosovo, it is from between 2007 and 2011
- If it has Serbia and Montenegro as separate countries but does not have Kosovo, it is from between 2006 and 2007
- If it has Serbia and Montenegro as one country and East Timor/Timor-L'este it is from between 2001 and 2006
- If it has Serbia and Montenegro but no East Timor/Timor-L'este it is from between 1992 and 2001
- If it has Czechoslovakia but no Soviet Union, it is from between 1991 and 1992
- If it has Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union, it is from before 1991.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY - FINIALS AND POPPYHEADS

Before the 15th century, people attending a church service would stand or kneel. When benches or pews were introduced, they were sometimes decorated by skilled craftsmen. In particular, the top of the ends of some pews were carved with figures called finials or poppyheads. This word comes from Latin via Old French meaning the poop or figurehead of a ship. Poppyheads can be found in churches across the country and they are particularly prevalent in East Anglia. The Hundred Parishes has some fascinating examples. The carved figures can represent almost anything: for example flowers, fruit or animals. Mythical creatures or demons were introduced to remind parishioners that if they led a sinful life they would go to hell. Saints and angels, however, meant that if you lived a good life you would go to heaven.

You will also find carved creatures depicting saints. In St Mary's Church Hatfield Broad Oak, 300-year-old poppyheads symbolize saints, with a lion for Mark, a bull for Luke and an eagle for John, while Matthew is represented by a 'divine man'. Ickleton's parish church has some fine examples of medieval carved poppyheads. One shows St Michael weighing souls of the dead and another features a dragon-like creature. In Wendens Ambo parish church you will find a fearsome-looking beast which you may meet if your soul goes to hell! Linton's church has a wide range of subjects including scribes resting their books, one on the back of an angel and another on a dragon.

IN THE GARDEN

In early September a few people from our Garden Group visited the Walled Garden at Cressing Barns near Braintree. The site was acquired by the Knights Templar in the 13th century and includes two beautiful barns – Barley and Wheat. A short history of the site was given by Rebecca, one of two employed gardeners; all other work depends on volunteers. The Walled Garden has been created as in Tudor times, growing plants for medicinal purposes, together with a vegetable patch and small orchard. Although colour is not in abundance at this time of year, the structure could be seen quite clearly and ideas gleaned for our own gardens. It is well worth a visit; special days are held throughout the year, so do look out for them. The best months to visit for colour are May, June or July; admission is free.



Approaching winter months is a good time for tidying sheds, cleaning and sharpening tools and sorting the clutter acquired over the summer months. Pots and seed pans can be washed and made ready for planting up in spring and plans made for what to grow next year. If you do not have a compost bin, store raked-up leaves in black plastic sacks to make leaf mould. Fill the sacks with the leaves, pierce the sides with a fork for aeration, sprinkle with water before sealing and leave them for a year to decompose. It makes great mulch for the garden. Gathering leaves like this also tidies the garden and helps to deter slugs and snails from sheltering amongst them. If you have pots with plants that may be damaged by frost or prolonged cold snaps and cannot move them, wrap the pots in bubble wrap, hessian or horticultural fleece in order to insulate them against the worst of the cold.

The October talk was given by John Rhodes and his subject was the tree-lined Warwick Road in Bishop's Stortford. It runs from London Road parallel to Dunmow Road, and is sealed at the far eastern end to prevent it being used as a rat run for traffic. The road has a long history and is part of the Hockerill Estate, whose development can be traced back to Sir Walter Gilbey. His family had a long and distinguished association with Bishop's Stortford through various and very successful business ventures in the 19th century. The family

became wealthy and influential and were friends with the Prince of Wales. The road itself had a rich complement of housing from simple cottages to grand houses and is one of the most sought-after locations in the area. John has lived in the same house for many years and it is unusual in the fact that it has an exceptionally large garden of some 400 feet. When the majority of the houses were built in the early part of the



20th century, they were offered with an average purchase price of £350 for a detached or £600 for a pair of semi-detached houses. John's talk was enhanced by numerous photos and drawings which helped to bring this fascinating subject even more to life.

Chairman Dave Perry thanked John for an extremely interesting talk and said how much we appreciated him coping with the problems faced, as the microphone decided not to work that evening; and also that he had asked for his fee for this evening's talk be given to the food bank. 
