The first meeting of the new season of the Society took place on Thursday 7th September and was extremely well attended. The Chairman, Dave Perry, welcomed members both old and new for what will be a very interesting series of talks and discussions over the next few months. He also explained why the time of the meetings had been brought forward by half an hour which the Committee considers will be advantageous in the colder winter months.

Dave introduced our speaker, Ralph Phillips, who gave an interesting talk with numerous slides which showed in great detail the early types of locomotives used and also the various types of carriage. First Class had luxurious and comfortable seats; Second Class was inside the carriage but very basic accommodation. With a Third Class ticket you sat outside whatever the weather with the added joy of having soot and debris covering you.



As the railway trains usually had limited brakes, Ralph also explained how employees had to clamber from one carriage to another to engage the brake mechanism, which caused numerous injuries and the occasional death. However, as the march of the railways as transportation expanded, and the quality and speed of trains grew, so did the importance of the passenger stations and goods terminals. This led to intense competition between the large railway conglomerates to take advantage of this expanding market. Of course, there were also casualties of this expansion; the demise of horse-drawn goods and passenger transport was inevitable.

- Sweets and chocolates (well within their use by date)





Affinity Water will be installing new water mains in Stansted over the next few months. They will be working along Silver Street, Church Road, Pines Hill, Stansted Road, Chapel Hill, Spencer Close and Forest Hall Road. They are starting on 25th September for four weeks in Silver Street, from the Chapel Hill Junction to The Old Bell pub. Temporary traffic lights will be used. Church Road will be closed outside Forest Hall School during half term for another section, from 21st-29th October.

Affinity Water are aware the works will cause some disruption, obviously it can be very inconvenient when working outside people's homes. The works are however essential. They have been in regular meetings with Essex Highways to ensure they can mitigate the level of disruption caused, particularly when they need to close roads. GROVE HILL

Village residents are so fed up with the convoys of HGVs and tipper trucks using Grove Hill as a through way, causing traffic jams and potentially very dangerous situations, as exemplified in the photos below. To quote a local resident:

Since 6.20am this morning there has been a yellow oversized vehicle attempting to drive down Grove Hill A1060. The driver reported to a resident that he had 'paperwork' allowing him to use this road ..? He cannot move forward because his load is too wide to avoid damage to the listed cottages at the bottom.

He is unable to reverse and is stuck. There has been a queue of cars trying to access the road, and at one point a van overtook the entire queue, mounted the pavement and was away – it is causing some extremely dangerous manoeuvres. If any of the local councillors need to visit then there is ample opportunity. We have a mass of photo footage of vehicles mounting the pedestrian pavement as the road is too narrow for these wide vehicles.



We are extremely annoyed with the delays and excuses that the authorities keep on dishing out with regards the promised scheme to rid the village of the dangerous HGVs that hound our roads every day from 6.00am-6.00pm. Parish Highways keep on passing the buck and say they have no authority to do anything, they can only lobby, so the question is *What is the point of them being there?* Residents put more effort into chasing for resolutions than they do! Councillors at the front end of getting this promised scheme in place keep pushing back dates on meetings required to move to the next step.

Consultation with neighbouring villages seems not to be managed efficiently. These villages oppose the scheme as they are using Grove Hill as a tool or excuse to oppose housing development applications in their area; councillors managing the scheme should point out to them that this has not worked so far as new developments are going up left right and centre.

It should be stressed to them that directing HGVs to use Hall Road Elsenham would actually benefit them as HGVs would then not use neighbouring villages' roads.

It seems councillors dealing with this opposition are not using the correct counter strategy or being persuasive enough for neighbouring villages to understand this scheme would actually benefit them.

Thatch has been used as a roofing material for thousands of years. It was once common in rural areas because the material was cheap and readily available. Now, a thatched roof is much more expensive but the skill of the thatcher can still be seen throughout The Hundred Parishes. A thatcher undertakes a five-year apprenticeship with a master thatcher before becoming a master thatcher himself. Most properties in the UK use either long straw, wheat reed or water reed.

Many thatched properties are listed and when re-thatching is needed the same type of material must be used as before. In medieval times wheat grew to nearly six feet tall, while today's modern farming methods produce shorter-stemmed wheat and this has weakened the straw and its longevity. Now specialist growers produce taller-stemmed varieties, grown especially for thatching.

There is some debate about the longevity of a thatched roof. To some extent, life expectancy relates to the material used, but it is also dependent on factors such as pitch, orientation and air circulation. A good thatch will typically

last 20-50 years, providing excellent insulation. The ridge, along the top of the roof, will last 10-20 years, so requires more frequent attention. Traditionally a new layer of material is laid over the seasoned roof; this is called *spar coating*. The bundles of straw taken up onto the roof are called *yelms*. Twisted hazel sticks known as *spars* or *gads* are used to secure the thatch in place. A thatcher may mark his work by placing a distinctive straw finial on the ridge. Thatch appears not only on houses. There are several thatched pubs, a thatched church at Duddenhoe End in the parish of Elmdon, and a partly-thatched village hall in Ashdon.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

These month's Parish Council pages are devoted to a village-wide part-night lighting scheme to be trialled over a three-month period starting in October.



Street Lighting Trial

This autumn the Parish Council is to undertake a lighting trial that will see about a third of streetlights under its control in the village switched off from midnight to 5am. The trial is to last three months after which a review will be undertaken to determine whether the switch should become permanent for all, or some of, those lights.

The Parish Council has set aside over £23,000 in its 2023/4 budget to meet the routine annual costs for lighting in the village, a figure that is under pressure as our existing energy contracts expire and energy markets remain volatile. Converting lights to LED, and installing timers, will allow the Parish Council to make significant energy savings. It is estimated that LED lanterns, once installed, will be up to 80% more efficient than the current lighting stock. Streetlights that are turned off for part of the night could see a further 50% reduction in energy consumption.

These savings in energy usage will help the Parish Council manage its budget, and also allow it to take an important step to a greener future for Stansted Mountfitchet. In June 2022 the Parish Council joined many other organisations and authorities in declaring a climate emergency. One commitment stemming from this was to update the 242 streetlights managed by the Parish Council to LED.

In the June edition of The Link, the Parish Council announced it had received £34,900 from the district council under its Zero-Carbon fund to pay for this conversion to happen. The money, however, was conditional that the Parish Council introduce a part-night lighting scheme and would identify and tackle areas of the village where there was a duplication of lighting stock.

Eliminating duplication in practice means where a street is lit by two lamps in close proximity, one should be decommissioned. The Parish Council has decided that seven duplicate lights will be withdrawn from service as part of the lighting trial. At a meeting on 13th September, the Council will have discussed which of the lights highlighted in yellow in the table, will be converted to part-night lighting. Any changes agreed at that meeting will be reported in the next edition of The Link.

Will all Stansted's street lights be included in the trial? Responsibility for streetlighting in Stansted Mountfitchet is shared between Essex Highways, Uttlesford District Council and the Parish Council. Only streetlights maintained by the Parish Council will be involved in the trial. Of these 242 streetlights, 149 will remain lit all night throughout the trial.

How were lights chosen for inclusion in the trial?

Where possible the Parish Council has tried to ensure there is a pathway of light to follow as you walk through the village at night. That is, when you are walking along a street where a light has been switched off, you will always be in sight of an illuminated lamp. The trial has also been planned so the main throughfares of Cambridge Road, High Lane, Lower Street, Chapel Hill and Church Road are lit all night. Also, the village twitchels are excluded from the trial as well as Water Lane, as these are viewed as pathways particularly important for walking around the village.

Won't turning street lights off make the village unsafe? In preparing for the trial, we consulted with the Essex Police's Uttlesford Community team. Their experience is that in areas like Saffron Walden and Dunmow where part-night lighting schemes operate, there has been no evidence of an upturn in crime. The police will also be providing feedback to the Parish Council on whether they have observed any spike in crime during the three months of the scheme.

When will the trial start?

The trial is likely to begin in October, once contractors have completed switching sodium to LED bulbs and installing timers to streetlights participating in the trial. The timing of the trial itself has also been dependent on the completion of a structural review and electrical testing of the Parish Council's streetlights which was completed over the summer.

Will other village areas be switched to part-night lighting? This will depend on sourcing additional grant funding. For example, Chapel Hill has been kitted with ornate "lantern" stylings that double the cost of converting to a LED light to £750. For areas like Stoney Common, which has a particularly poor road surface, they may be unsuitable for inclusion.

Will the switch to part-night lighting become permanent? Hopefully yes, but this depends on the success of the trial. Once this has ended the Parish Council will undertake an assessment of the scheme. But should we need to adapt it and revert a light to an all-night setting this can be easily done, with a flick of a switch on the timer.

How can we provide feedback on the trial?

PHARMACY UPDATE AND FINAL REPORT

Last month I reported that we hope to have a licensed community dispensing pharmacy in the Lower Street area. Some time ago I met Kemi Badenoch MP. She advised that we had done all that could be hoped of us and that the issue was now commercial which only Mountfitchet Partners Ltd (MPL) and Prof Ashok Soni OBE could resolve. The owner of Stansted Pharmacy and MPL have now agreed that the latter will take over the Stansted Pharmacy lease in Castle Maltings with effect from 1st October, and Prof Soni will no longer be involved. Please note that they will be open as a chemist from that date but will not be dispensing prescriptions until 1st November.

What this means for the local residents is that we will have a licensed community dispensing pharmacy next door to Stansted Surgery and retain Boots on Cambridge Road. People with mobility difficulties will be able to enter a licensed pharmacy with relative ease. We now have a state-of-the-art health centre comprising our Primary Care GP surgery, an NHS dentist and a dispensing pharmacy. This campaign started in February 2008 and so ends another chapter in the development of our growing community and needs. Thank you to all who helped.

BRAIN TRAINING

How using your thumbs can improve your vision, or your private parts, your ankles and toes. There are many eye drills that improve vision, and some involve using a target within an arm's distance. For example, near/far is rapid switching between a near target and a far target. For any eye drill we can use the tip of a pen or our thumb. The tip of a pen is a very small target whilst our thumb nail is much bigger. There is value to using both, especially for a sports person.



Within the brain lies the sensory cortex, where the various parts of the body are laid out, as the accompanying picture shows. What lies next to each other affects the other. A close peer at the picture shows the eyes lying beside the thumbs, the toes next to the genitals. Since this is in the sensory cortex, warming, cooling or adding vibration (for example, holding an electric toothbrush) to your thumb will help improve vision, as will doing the same to your private parts to improve toe or ankle movement. So you could hold a metal spoon with your thumb running up the handle, giving a sensation of coolness. Bring the thumb and spoon fairly close to the bridge of your nose, not the tip, and find a distant target, a letter or number if possible. Now switch between your thumb and the target as quickly as the targets become clear. This drill can really help the non-dominant eye! Do one minute of repetitions with the non-dominant eye, then a further 30 seconds with both eyes. Which thumb you use does make a difference. Test your balance before and after the drill and use the thumb that gives the best result.

THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

We have now cut all the meadow areas and removed the debris. This takes many hours of manual labour for the working parties who are also cutting meadow areas in the other Essex Wildlife Trust reserves across Uttlesford. We use a scythe mower, which is the kindest on all the species that are living amongst the vegetation, and it gives us a chance to watch the various mice, voles and other creatures scurry away to the borders and retained grassy areas. This year we were delighted to see large numbers of frogs of all sizes that have been living in the meadows. The ponds in the reserve have obviously provided well for the breeding population.

The three main ponds are quite different from each other in appearance and the flora and fauna they support. The top pond is rich in plants and invertebrates such as water fleas and mayfly lava which indicate good water quality. It is regularly visited by the heron, but you will need to approach with stealth in order to see it. It is important that fish are not added to the pond as they prey on the smaller wildlife and reduce the diversity. The middle pond appears stagnant and lacking in life; we want to do a proper assessment of it before acting. What looks visually appealing to us may not be the best for wildlife. Some paths in the reserve can become very muddy in autumn and winter; we would like to improve these to give people a dry footing and to avoid the trampling of areas off the path. We have applied for funding for this and we will have to see if we obtain it.

- Emergency funds for fuel, food, prescriptions and essential travel

Tax credits are coming to an end; most people will need to move onto Universal Credit (UC) instead. The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) have started sending out UC Migration Notices, explaining what you need to do. Please note that you will not be moved across to UC automatically. When you receive your letter from DWP you must act quickly and claim UC by the deadline otherwise your benefits will stop. However, you must not make a claim for UC before you receive your written notice.



IN THE GARDEN

As the nights start drawing in and the light levels fall during the day, the garden responds by slowing down. The grass needs less mowing, leaves take on their glorious autumn hues and, if we have early morning frosts, plants like dahlias will die and need cutting down. There are many who claim success in leaving the tubers in the ground over winter but traditionally it is recommended they are lifted, trimmed, allowed to cure for a week or so, then placed slightly apart in a ventilated box lined with newspaper and two layers of semi-dry compost over the tubers. The box should ideally be kept somewhere frost-free where they can be checked every so often. Any tubers which have become mouldy during storage should be removed to prevent the rot spreading.



There are still plenty of other jobs that can be done. Climbing roses should be pruned and tied in to withstand autumn winds. Cut back, lift and divide existing perennials, planting any new ones now whilst the soil retains some warmth and a good level of moisture. Cut back any tall shrubs like buddleias, lavateras and larger shrub roses to about half their height to prevent wind rock during the winter months and to ready them for their hard prune once the spring arrives. Trees begin to extract as much goodness as they can from their leaves before shutting down for winter, which causes the red hues to emerge. One of the great joys of this time of year is to revel in this glorious display so spend some time among the leaves before raking them up. Put the fallen leaves in a container to rot down for rich leaf mould to be used as mulch in future years.
