



It is often after the funeral which is the hardest. Planning the service effectively gives you a job to do. Something to organise, often whilst feeling totally surreal. Then you go home, after the service, perhaps to an empty house, or to a family who have lost a parental guide, a sibling, or a carer, and go ... now what? How do I do this? Friends say to pop round if you need anything, but you do not want to be a burden. Family members slowly begin to pick up their own lives, perhaps many miles away, because as much as we want it to, life does not stop; though for us, it can feel like life as we know it has ended.

I phoned a recently bereaved family not long ago; we talked about how hard it is to find information on local activity and support groups which may be of some help to their recently widowed parent. So I put a shoutout on social media, got some amazing feedback, and our local communities came good. We are supported by so many kind and caring people, including TouchPoint and Let's Talk Stansted, which go from strength to strength, creating safe spaces, and encouraging connections in our community. STANSTED SURGERY

Another Local Dispensing Pharmacy is coming soon In March 2022, the Partners of Stansted Surgery approached a specialist solicitor to help us with an application for a dispensing pharmacy license in Stansted.

Why did we make an application?

An application for such a pharmacy was made in December 2016, but was refused in January 2018. It was clear to us that local residents did not have a reasonable choice of pharmaceutical services, so we decided to give it a go.

How did it work?

The Partners had to form a Limited Company, as Partnerships cannot apply for a dispensing licence. It is important to note that this application falls completely outside of Stansted Surgery business and is a completely separate venture. Our formal application was submitted on 11th August 2022. The application was refused by NHS England on 6th January 2023; we had 30 days to appeal. We did so on 3rd February and we are delighted to announce that the application was granted on 13th July. This process was extremely difficult, and we are very grateful indeed to our solicitor who helped us navigate the very complex process. He represented the people of Stansted with passion and fought incredibly hard to get this fantastic outcome.

What happens now?

We have six months to find premises, which will require approval by NHS England. After the date of approval of our premises, we have one year to open as a fully functional pharmacy. However, we hope to do this as soon as possible.

What about the pharmacy near the Surgery?

The premises are owned by Hilton Properties Ltd, and they currently have a tenant (Stansted Pharmacy) in the property. We have written to the current leaseholder to enquire about taking over the lease from them, with a view to opening the dispensing pharmacy in that location. If that is not an option, we will find alternative premises. We have fantastic plans for our new pharmacy and will keep you informed along the way. We will post updates on our Facebook page; once we have secured premises, we will set up a website for the new pharmacy.

As you may recall, Ray Woodcock has been working tirelessly to make this happen. He also sent an article to us about the Pharmacy, and below is part of what he wrote. I am sure everyone will agree that he deserves a few hearty cheers for his commitment to this cause.

We won; within the next 12 months, I hope much sooner, we will have a licensed community dispensing pharmacy in the Lower Street area. Thank you to the 664 people who signed my petition in January 2022 and the 667 who completed the online survey in April/May of this year. Essex County Council

also conducted an online survey in January 2022; about 60 people responded from the whole of Essex and the majority came from the Stansted Mountfitchet area. If you want to know more, please call me on 816468 or email: raymond.woodcock@btinternet.com.

IN THE GARDEN

September marks the beginning of meteorological Autumn, a time to start reflecting on the garden this year and looking forward to next year. Gardening is a process of continuous change and improvement. It is a time to aerate, feed and reseed lawns, to look to the borders for opportunities to plant new perennials as the soil will still be warm and welcoming and anything planted now will have the chance to get a good start before the onset of winter. Now is also a good time to divide perennials; this not only gives you more plants with which to fill your borders but also revitalises the plant itself, stimulating new and vigorous growth. Lift large clumps with a fork, then using a second fork, insert them both, back-to-back, in the centre and push them apart. Once divided it is usually easy to prise smaller pieces away by hand. You can look around the borders for seedlings to transplant to a different part of the garden or pot them up to make small presents for friends. September is also a time to pore over bulb catalogues and choose which varieties and types of spring bulbs to buy. Daffodils and narcissi should ideally be planted before the end of September and the earlier you buy them the better the availability and choice of both quality and type.



Now Autumn is on its way, leaves may be falling into the pond so keep removing them or they will sink and it is not a good idea to scrape them up from the bottom. During August water lilies may have put on a lot of leaf growth so remove excess leaves. Keep replenishing the pond if needed and thin out oxygenator plants if they are taking over.

STANSTED PEOPLE

COLIN FAIRWEATHER

Rev'd Dr Colin Fairweather is the Vicar of St John's Church in Stansted, as well as St Mary's Birchanger, St Mary's Farnham, Holy Trinity Church Takeley and All Saints' Church in Little Canfield, known rather logically as The Five Churches. Colin has only been here for just over two years, but he has already made a very strong mark on the community. He moved to Stansted in March 2021; he was licensed for ministry in April. I wondered which was most important to him in his title, the Dr or the Rev'd; with no hesitation at all, he replied that the Rev'd means more to him than the Doctorate. The latter is intellectually very important, but Theology supersedes it. In fact, Colin wanted to drop the Dr when he moved here, but his Dean insisted that he keep it. He is happily single and has a brother with children and Colin enjoys being an uncle to them. His parents still live in Sidcup. Colin's proudest moment in his life was to see the look on his parents' faces when he told them he had earned three As for his A-levels! They were very surprised indeed when he told them he was going to be a vicar – many people in Vicar School come from religious families; Colin is unusual as he does not.



Colin was born and brought up in Sidcup, Kent. He attended grammar school, then went on to Robinson College, Cambridge as an undergraduate. He studied for a Masters in Liverpool then returned to Robinson College to study for a PhD, in Elizabethan Erotic Poetry. He became interested in Theology on an intellectual level, and started teaching the subject. He began going to church, and kept dismissing the idea of ordination. One Friday evening, after a particularly bad week, Colin talked to a friend who said "You need a promotion or you need to become a Minister". After this, he cried all weekend at the strength of the presence of God. He discussed the matter with his Vicar, who encouraged him to undergo a Discernment Process, which he did, from 2012 until 2014. The most important aspect of this process is the Calling aspect, from within himself and how other people view him in this context - the authenticity of the calling is of

paramount importance. Other important items to work out are his prayer life, relationships and leadership qualities, for example. After these two years, he went to Ridley Hall (Vicar School) from 2014-2016. He went to Braintree for his Curacy; this went on for longer than usual due to Covid. He was there for over four years. He got used to holding Morning and Evening Prayer and Sunday services on YouTube. Colin regarded Lockdown as a Call to Prayer. Colin has strong connections with a Benedictine Monastery in Hampshire and thinks he would quite like the monastic life.

We discussed humanity; Colin often sees the best of humanity in his work. in a broader context, it is great when humans get together to fight against oppression or other difficulties; he quoted the problems experienced by the Scottish singer Lewis Capaldi who struggled with his Tourette's during Glastonbury, and how the crowds supported him with much empathy. Colin can also see that large crowds can also be very negative and show the worst of humanity. As a vicar, he often sees people at their most vulnerable, and he needs to inhabit their darkness in order to help them. We talked about the odd situation that the UK has an established religion, and yet its senior politicians need show no proof of religious ties, yet the US (which has a clear separation in its constitution between church and state) pretty much insists that its presidents are Christian. British people do not attend church as once they did because religious institutions no longer have the authority as they did in former times; however, most of our citizens would count themselves as spiritual.

The role of religion in our secular democracy is to be at the intersection of the Kingdom of the World and the Kingdom of Christ. The Church should be a transforming presence. Often something transformational happens when interactions between the two Kingdoms take place, and there seems no rhyme nor reason behind them. Colin told a wonderful story about Lily, bed bound and in a care home for years. Colin said prayers to her, gave her a blessing and then started to sing *All Things Bright and Beautiful*; Lily sang too. A staff member was totally stunned as Lily had not uttered a sound for two years!

Colin loves living in Stansted; he has never lived opposite the church before and he loves having the church right on his doorstep. What an enviable commute!

Long term pain, the brain and the pudding tummy

Pain is fascinating, seriously weird and much studied. We may suffer a trauma in the body, for example slip a disc or break an ankle; once the trauma has largely healed, we still feel pain, alongside fear of using that part of the body. So, what is going on? Studies have found that two parts of the brain become unbalanced in people suffering long term pain. The areas deal with decision making. When we make a decision, they work together to make a choice. One part is very emotional and the other very deliberate and unemotional. A good example of this balancing act is the *pudding tummy*. We feel nutritionally satisfied after the main course, but our pudding tummy is empty. Hah. We then eat due to feeling, not the hard reality of how hungry we are. In long term pain these two areas become unbalanced. The fear of moving grows so the emotional brain area increases in size and the hard reality part of the brain, the deliberative part, decreases.

Say the COLOR, not the word:

PURPLE	ORANGE	BLUE
BLUE	RED	PURPLE
BLACK	GREEN	YELLOW
GREEN	BLUE	RED
ORANGE	YELLOW	GREEN

What to do? Train the deliberative part of the brain! The most effective way is with a partner and the simplest is to play hand/foot. The trainer says hand and the trainee taps a hand, the trainer says foot and the trainee taps a foot (left or right). After a few rounds of this, now when the trainer says hand, the trainee taps the foot and vice versa. Do this for a few minutes then swap. Then you will definitely need a cup of tea and a biscuit. Training without a partner is also good – you need to download a Stroop Test app. Android example: Stroop Tests for Science, Apple example: Stroop Effect. The picture gives the gist.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

A recent conversation among Quakers explored the relationship between peace, truth, equality, simplicity and sustainability; values which help to shape how we understand our faith. One significant theme to emerge was the importance of being principled in what we do. Reflecting on this afterwards, a flood of memories came back to me. Many years ago, I lodged with a Sikh family. Baldev Singh Chahal, my landlord, had been a hero in the Sikh community by resolutely refusing to wear a crash helmet when riding his motorbike. To have done so would mean he could not wear his turban which would be contrary to his religious faith. His defiance of the law led to numerous court appearances and eventually to a change in the law. By sticking to his principles he struck a blow for religious freedom of expression.

Some years later I was at a wedding reception where a group of guests were rejoicing that the white groom was marrying a woman of the same ethnic origin. Their conversation soon descended into a racist diatribe. I was on the brink of challenging them when I was suddenly seized by all the reasons not to. They are unpleasant people who are likely to turn violent; it would cause a scene. These and other reasons to hold back prevailed. I was a coward and, to my shame, held my tongue. Perhaps the ultimate test in sticking to one's principles is martyr-dom; dying for one's beliefs be they religious, political or a deeply held concern. I recall one person who had an unwavering conviction that it was wrong to experiment on animals to benefit humans. When he was diagnosed with cancer, he was firm in his refusal to have any treatment that had been developed as a result of testing on animals. This limited his treatment options and his life expectancy. We can only hope that we will find the strength to stick to our own principles, if and when we are put to the test.

TOE BEANS CAT RESCUE

This is a local charity rescuing and rehoming cats in the Uttlesford area. They have no paid staff and run completely on volunteer power. With no venue they rely on almost 20 fosterers who take abandoned, injured and pregnant cats into their homes. Of course they do it for the love of their feline friends but the pandemic pet boom and the cost-of-living crisis have put Toe Beans in a very precarious position. This year they have seen many more kittens than in any previous year. Since early 2023 they have cared for 31 kittens (with more on the way) and almost all of them came from local area streets. The increased cost of living is causing pets to be abandoned and Toe Beans' services are absolutely essential. For the first time there is a waiting list of moggies needing to be rescued and rehomed, and adoptions are the slowest ever.



Working with local vets they ensure that cats are neutered to reduce the number of strays living dangerous lives on the streets. They pay for medication and treatment, then find loving homes for the cats – all of whom deserve a comfy sofa on which to spend their days! The current situation means Toe Beans is struggling and in need of donations: money to help with vet bills, food, litter, toys and everything else needed by the fluffy residents. If you can help please visit their website where you will find details on donating and their Amazon wish list which you can use to send cat food etc directly to fosterers. Toe Beans is also looking for new fosterers so if you fancy giving a temporary home to a furry feline (or a pile of kittens) get in touch. THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Residents living in the countryside are fortunate that the sounds of human activities are less intrusive than those living within built up areas close to main roads, railway tracks or beneath regular flight paths. Even at home our ears are subjected to a cacophony of sounds: TV or radio programmes, ring tones, the hum of machines, barking dogs or noisy neighbours. Rarely are we surrounded by silence! Appreciating tranquillity is an essential aspect of being in the countryside, where people have attractive views of verdant landscapes or cloudy skyscapes, hear natural sounds and catch glimpses of wildlife without intrusive background noises. Evidence gathered over the past 15 years reveals that tranquillity is not just a pleasurable experience but is essential for human health and wellbeing, reducing stress levels and lifting spirits.

In the early 1990s concerns were raised about the harmful levels of unpleasant noise in daily lives. The Countryside Commission and the Council for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE) worked together to produce an Intrusion Map which highlighted areas that were most affected by human-induced noises. Since then, research has been undertaken by CPRE and others to develop suitable methodology for measuring noise and evaluating the visual impact of developments on landscapes.



In 2012, tranquillity gained recognition in national planning policy. Now studies are prepared to evaluate *Landscape Character Areas and their Sensitivity to Change*, and these are included in the reports prepared for Local Plans. They must include appropriate mitigation measures to help reduce noise to acceptable levels. The walk descriptions listed on the Hundred Parishes website provide opportunities to appreciate the peace of this part of the country, to hear bird song, sense the wind in the trees and view some wonderful rural landscapes.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

with news of a successful appeal for a dispensing pharmaceutical licence, the Stansted SkateJam, the Village Trail Leaflet Launch, an appeal for SpeedWatch volunteers and an update from District Councillor Alan Dean on the Local Plan for Uttlesford district.



Cause for Celebration

Stansted's hilly topography, its expanding population and rising age demographic have all been factors behind the community's calls for a second dispensing pharmacy in the village in recent years. It was fantastic news to learn then, that over the summer partners at the Stansted Surgery won their appeal, lodged with NHS England back in February, for a dispensing pharmaceutical licence. We can now have a second dispensing pharmacy in the south of village, closer to local GP services and the homes of thousands of residents.

In a little over a decade, Stansted has seen the construction of two sizable housing developments — Walpole Meadows and Foresthall Park. But there has been little accompanying expansion of health services. This has left over 8,600 residents to be served by a single dispensing pharmacy. The location of Boots on Cambridge Road can be an issue for those living in the south of the village. Walking up Chapel Hill with its narrow pavements can be an obstacle for people, such as young mums with prams, those with mobility issues and elderly residents.

Community pleas for the Essex Health and Wellbeing Board to grant a second licence for a dispensing chemist fell on deaf ears. Pharmaceutical Needs Assessments have repeatedly found no grounds for expanding medical services in Stansted which is why the Parish Council would like to thank the partners of the Stansted Surgery for going the extra mile to pursue their appeal.

Not only did they have to hire a specialist solicitor to navigate the complex appeal process, but they also had to set up a new limited company. Time remains a factor, too. Mountfitchet Partners Ltd have to meet a six-month



deadline to find premises and must be serving prescriptions 12 months after that.

The Parish Council supported the partners of Stansted Surgery by submitting written evidence for the appeal. This was acknowledged in the appeal judgement. It has been a long-standing commitment of the Parish Council to see a second dispensing pharmacy in south of the village. This looks closer to becoming a reality thanks to the efforts and hard work of Stansted Surgery.

Parking Schemes Need 75% Approval

The Parish Council has been informed by the North Essex Parking Partnership (NEPP) that any scheme submitted to it must now command 75% community support for it to win approval by the body.

The NEPP oversees parking matters for Braintree, Epping, Harlow, Colchester, Tendring and Uttlesford. Parking proposals submitted to it by Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council for Spencer Close, Cambridge Road, Chapel Hill, Cambridge Road and Lower Street have been affected by the stipulation. The 75% figure represents a high benchmark for such schemes.

Readers may recall SMPC undertook a consultation with residents of the Mountfitchet Estate with a view to introducing a Residents' Parking Scheme, but this was rejected by the residents and not pursued by the Parish Council. In addition, SMPC proposed a programme of red line restrictions to improve road and pedestrian safety particularly around the many junctions on the estate. SMPC have learned that this proposal, which was submitted, has also been rejected by the NEPP.

We are seeking further clarification of the new 75% rule. The Parish Council's current understanding is, for example, it wouldn't be enough for 75 households out of 100 to respond to a Council parking consultation. *Continues Page* 22

Continued from Page 20 At least that percentage would need to agree to the proposal. Even in cases with unanimous backing would fail if less than 75% of consultees responded positively to a survey. The NEPP explained the requirement will allow it to focus on measures submitted to it that are deemed "absolutely necessary". We are currently considering whether any scheme should be re-submitted in cases where we believe that safety outweighs other factors.

II Time is running out!" — is what a resident recently said regarding finishing and agreeing a draft Local Plan by October 2023. This was said on 26th of July 2023 at the first meeting of the Council's Local Plan Leadership Group following May's local elections. He continued: "As a resident, I feel totally uninformed." As a district councillor, I also am being kept totally in the dark about a document that is meant to shape the district for the next few decades and is due to be published in one- or two-months' time.

Uttlesford's Local Plan — its blueprint for development — is supposed to be updated at least every 5 years. You may be surprised to know the latest one is dated 2005; a near 20-year gap! The existing plan is substantially out of date.

Any new Plan needs to be sound or risks being rejected by a government inspector for a third time. Without a Plan, the Council can't be sure to achieve delivery of affordable homes for people who are unable to buy homes on the open market, and it may not achieve other high standards such as energy efficiency. Instead, we will get what developers want to build and where they want to build them.

Meetings/workshops about specific details such as climate change measures will be held in private prior to the publication of an initial draft plan. The whole idea about publication is to release the plan in its entirety in the autumn, rather than in dribs and drabs, to avoid giving some landowners and developers an advantage

SpeedWatch: Can You Help?

Can you spare a couple of hours a week to support the Community SpeedWatch Team? The group play an important part in keeping Stansted Mountfitchet's roads safe by keeping an eye on speeding motorists passing through the village. A recent two-hour session on Church Road found more than



49 drivers breaking the 30mph limit, four of whom were speeding in excess of 45mph and two going over 50mph! The details of cars driven excessively fast are passed to the police for action. The team is made up of a small band of volunteers who are always on the lookout for new recruits. SpeedWatch is supported by the local police who regularly attend the group's patrols and provide them with training. over others.

Despite that intention, concern has been expressed by both the public and by some elected Members of the Council about the secrecy surrounding what's been going on. The public will be allowed a six-week consultation in the autumn of this year (and hopefully not again over Christmas) on the assumption that the Cabinet and Full Council meetings agree to the release of the Plan.

We are promised that all the policies in the new Plan will be joined up and be consistent, and that there will be evidence to demonstrate that they are sound and will satisfy not just the planning Inspector, who has to approve the final Plan by 2026, but hopefully also satisfy the residents of the district that the plan is the best possible, even though many people may not like the inevitable changes that the Plan will contain.

At the moment, much of the development that is occurring in and around Stansted —and further afield — is based on what landowners and developers want to happen. That is because of the failure of councillors in recent years to make sensible decisions about creating a Local Plan.

At least one member of the Local Plan Leadership Group (LPLG), which is supposed to be steering the Local Plan process, raised a concern about whether it actually is a Leadership Group or rather is a Listening Group. That councillor was clearly feeling left in the dark. I fear the whole process could go pear-shaped yet again when the LPLG, or the Cabinet or the Full Council is required to make the key decision in a public meeting that takes the Local Plan forward to the public for the important public consultation stage.

All I can say is WATCH THIS SPACE ...

September is a great time to visit the forest, go for a walk and enjoy the peaceful surroundings. The school holidays may be over but the summer and sunshine are still with us. The variety of habitats attract many birds including resident species such as Linnets and aquatic birds such as ducks. Look out for Moorhen, Robin, Goldcrest, Greenfinch, Mute Swan, Grebe, Green Woodpecker and Canada Geese. Watch out overhead for Red Kites soaring over the open areas, hunting for prey. You may spot our beautiful butterflies. Thanks to coppice restoration and ride management, a growing number of butterfly species can be found in the forest. They include Speckled Wood, Common Blue, Purple Hairstreak and Small Tortoiseshell. Recent species rediscovered include the Silver-washed Fritillary, White Admiral and Purple Emperor.



Come and relax in the lake area; the Café is open daily 9.00am-4.30pm. It serves freshly made sandwiches, savoury pastries and delicious homemade cakes, as well as hot and cold drinks. Outdoor seating and toilet facilities are available. Dogs are welcome but please remember to walk your dog on a short lead in the lake area and around livestock including near fenced areas where sheep are grazing. Elsewhere, you can let your dog off but always keep it in sight and recall it when necessary. Professional dog walkers please note you need a licence to walk your dogs in the forest. Fiona Rose was guest speaker for our August meeting; she gave a detailed talk about the life of William Morris. As well as a textile designer, he was also a poet, artist, translator, writer and a socialist activist. He was associated with the British Arts and Crafts Movement, the revival of traditional British textile arts and methods of production. Born in the then rural Walthamstow, he enjoyed being outside from an early age; his love of nature influenced his designs throughout his life. Morris had a keen interest in medieval architecture, history and design and the gardens in his various homes depicted this. In the Red House Garden in Bexleyheath he commissioned small garden enclosures surrounded by wattle fencing so that roses and other plants could clamber over them. This concept of rambling plants can be seen in his colourful designs with names such as Marigolds, Acanthus, and Strawberry thieves. As his designs grew in popularity, Morris purchased land adjacent to the River Wandle in Merton, which allowed him to bring all his workshops together in one place. Two of his homes, The Red House and Kelmscott Manor are open to the public.

THE AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

The wet weather in late July and early August encouraged lush vegetation growth in the reserve, with nettle and bramble in particular doing their best to reclaim the visitor paths. Whilst keeping the paths clear I am conscious that the nettles are a top food plant for the lava of many moths and butterflies while the bramble flowers are an important nectar source for many moths, butterflies, bees and other insects. As I write this in early August there are Red Admiral, Peacock, Comma and Gatekeeper butterflies on the bramble flowers. I have had a report of Purple Emperor in the reserve this summer, although I have not seen one myself, so keep a look out for this spectacular butterfly. We are always interested in hearing about what you have seen at the reserve so do send in your sightings.

I have been asked why we ask visitors to clear up and remove their dog poo. It is very unpleasant to step on, and adds unwanted nutrients to the soil. This can be disastrous for rare plants that are adapted to low nutrient levels. As the soil nutrients increase, these plants are crowded out by nutrient-loving plants like nettles.



In September the volunteer work parties will cut the meadow areas. Whilst this looks destructive, the vegetation is only removed once the seeds have had the chance to fall to earth. The objective is to maintain the meadows for a wide variety of flowers and other plants and to prevent certain species becoming overly dominant. This in turn benefits a wider range of insect species and creates a superior base for the food chain.
