It was really exciting to be part of the first Stansted Sings Together Project, as featured on this month's front cover. We were a group of 39 singers, including nine asylum seekers staying in our local community, some not having English as their first language and one of whom brought her delightful toddler who kept us entertained. We had not previously sung together and most of us did not read music, but Jane Wheeler worked with our differences and gradually shaped us into an amazing *scratch* choir. She had invited some colleagues; three budding Young Artists from East London (pictured with her and five of the asylum seekers below) to lead us in the warm up exercises and teach us some African songs; pronunciation was tricky but we got there in the end!

Their pure unaccompanied African three part harmony was superb, and when joined by the rest of us, produced a wonderful unique sound. Their songs naturally included dancing which we copied with great gusto. Steve was a brilliant accompanist with a wicked sense of humour. We also learnt pop songs, songs written for amateur choirs, and Jane's beautiful setting of *May the road rise with you*; all the songs were based around the theme of sharing love.



After the fourth Saturday workshop, around 40 friends and family came to hear what we had been up to. Little did they know that they would be invited to join in the singing and dancing themselves, which most of them did once they had got over the shock! Some of the singers were part of the u3a Stansted Strummers, so they brought their ukuleles and treated us to a surprise rendition of *El Cóndor Pasa* which included beautiful flute playing by Louise. Jane called out the words so that everyone could join in.

We all had a wonderful time and hope there will be another event in the future. It would not have happened without Jane's vision and the generous sponsorship from St John's Church and support of several Touchpoint volunteers. On behalf of the singers I say a big thank you to them all.

The Society's annual trip was on Tuesday 11th June; this year Janice McDonald had organised a day out at Sutton Hoo in Suffolk. Many readers will have seen the film *The Dig* starring Ralph Fiennes and Carey Mulligan which, in a slightly romanticised version, told the story of amateur archaeologist Basil Brown and his team. In June 1939 they painstakingly brushed away layers of sandy soil to reveal the shape of a ship beneath a mound. In the centre of the ship, they found a burial chamber full of the most extraordinary treasures. It turned out to be an Anglo-Saxon royal burial site of incomparable richness, and would revolutionise the understanding of early England.

At the site we were treated to a walking tour of the burial mounds by an extremely knowledgeable guide who had the ability not only to explain where, what and how the various burial sites had been constructed, but also to bring the story of that time in English history to life. We visited the house of the then owner of the land, Edith Pretty, who apparently purchased the house and land in 1926 for £15,000. We marvelled at the wonderful views over the grounds, the beautiful panelling and intricate ceiling plaster work of the interior. There was a superb exhibition hall with replicas of the many treasures found at the site and a well thought out display showing how people lived and worked at that time. The site has many wonderful walks and displays; it really is worth visiting. Many thanks from all of us to Janice for organising such a wonderful day out.

GUIDE TO RECYCLING IN AND AROUND STANSTED

STANSTED SOME PARTY OF CLIMATE CHIMATE

There are 6 'R's to think about as we try to lessen the impact of our waste on the environment: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose, Repair, Recycle.

Here is a list of some of the closest places to recycle items which cannot go in the kerbside recycling, as well as a reminder of those that can! With thanks to Elsenham Eagles sustainability group for information about recycling in Elsenham.

- BRITA filters Sainsbury's, Jackson Square, Bishop's Stortford
- Disposable vapes Tesco Express, Stansted or Elsenham
- Used stamps, old and foreign coins Stansted Free Church, Chapel Hill, Stansted
- · Coffee pods visit www.podback.org for a free postal service from your home

KERBSIDE RECYCLING - WHAT GOES IN THE GREEN BIN?

- Cardboard including milk / Tetrapak cartons
- Plastic food containers including ice cream/butter tubs, meat trays, and ready meal trays
- Paper including envelopes with/without windows
- Aluminium foil scrunch several small items into a larger ball to prevent small pieces being missed in processing
- Plastic bags and Low-Density Polyethylene (LDPE) film such as bread bags, cereal packaging, and freezer bags
- Plastic bottles and lids keep together when possible to stop lids being lost in processing
- · Glass jars and bottles
- · Metal cans and tins
- . CD & DVD cases only



PLEASE DO NOT PUT IN THE GREEN BIN:

- Dirty/food contaminated items such as greasy pizza hoves
- Broken drinking glasses or pyrex
- Used napkins or kitchen roll
- · Black bin bags
- · Batteries or plastic toys
- · Glittery wrapping paper/plastic foil i.e. balloons
- · Bubble wrap, jiffy bags, and polystyrene
- Plastic tape i.e. remove from cardboard boxes







Amongst the rich heritage of The Hundred Parishes, there are many ancient homes that were built originally as an *open hall house*. Many surviving houses that were built between the mid-13th and early 17th centuries had a standard three-part layout: a central open hall flanked by two crosswings which were of two storeys and the same height as the single-storey hall that linked them. Individual houses sometimes had variations to this basic design.

Daily life for members of the household was a communal affair, focused on the large central hall. It was heated by a fire that burned on a central hearth, its smoke rising to escape through vents in the roof. The use of a chimney to remove smoke generally came only in the 16th or 17th century.

The crosswing at one end of the house contained a parlour with a chamber above called the solar. They were used by the head of the household and the immediate family. The other crosswing was a service area, accessed from a passage with front and back doors at either end. The passage also gave entry to the hall, from which it was partly screened. Each wing had its own stairs to the upper floor of that wing. Between about 1550 and 1650 AD, the open hall concept became less popular, with a desire for more privacy.

Most open halls were remodelled with the insertion of a floor to make them two storeys. The open hearth was replaced with a fireplace and chimney. The Society's website includes more than a hundred downloadable walk routes. Almost half of the routes pass a former hall house and these are identified in the route description.

NATURAL BEEKEEPING

This month I will be talking about different types of beekeeping and the various ways honey has been harvested over time. This is a huge area as we can also look at how it has been done in different parts of the world, but I will keep this relevant to the UK.

Beekeeping used to be the pastime of the rich and was done in skeps: the woven grass dome beehive as seen in children's story books. They would have racks of skeps or bee boles; these were holes in walls normally in walled gardens. In spring only a few hives would have bees and the rest would be empty. They would have a chap on watch, which is where the expense came in. Once a swarm would emerge it would be placed into empty skeps, populating them all. Then at the end of summer all the skeps would be inspected for a few of the strongest. These would be set aside for the next year and allowed to over-winter. The rest would be killed by burning sulphur and the honey would be processed and the skeps cleared out for the next year. This seems brutal but in the end you are doing a little genetic selecting for the strongest, so it is not all bad.



Poor people would bee-line. You know the term, make a bee-line for the pub; bee-lining is the hunting of bees. There are all manner of ways to do this. The tree with the bees would be marked and then cut down just before winter for the honey. This is really not good for the bees as they lose a nesting site. Next month there will be even more exciting bee stuff!

STANSTED PEOPLE

ANDREW SHARPE

Those of you who are members of the Social Club will be familiar with Andrew, who is one of the team behind the success of this Club. He was born and raised in Manchester, but has wandered all over the world since then, mostly because of the wanderlust of his mother, who has moved 27 times in her life!



Andrew's entertainment background started in holiday camps in Wales and Herefordshire, where he was responsible for activities such as horse riding, rifle shooting, archery and canoeing on the River Wye. He then moved to Southend, where his girlfriend, a chef, taught him how to cook, which took him to Westcliff, Romford and Epping, assisting in kitchens along the way. He met his first wife in London and they had a son Robbie, who is now 27. Andrew moved to London following his divorce in 1997. His 36-year IT career has been predominantly spent in law firms and has taken him all over the world, including a 6 months' stint in India. Andrew's second wife was local to Stansted and they moved here in 2000; they lived near the Dog and Duck for a while, then they moved to Stoney Common. They have a daughter, Eloise, who attends the STEM Academy in Harlow, and does mailshots for the Club.

So, what about the Social Club? In 2008, Andrew joined as a member, but he decided that it was not really for him at that time. In 2012, Roger, the then chairman, encouraged Andrew to come in again and he was co-opted onto the committee in 2013. At the time, the premises were underutilised but with great potential. Alan Snook, the current chairman, was the one who really got changes underway. The first challenge was fixing the tower; this was very urgent as the support beams were totally rotten. The cost was £100,000. Greene King lent the money, and the loan has now been repaid. In 2013 there were 400 members; the refurbishment encouraged more people to join. In 2015 the Club had a loss of £34,000, in 2017 the loss was £12,000 and in 2019 they broke even. They are now making a profit of over £50,000 and have 1,200 members! In 2022 the Club's committee travelled up to Leicester where there were representatives from 400 Social Clubs, and the Stansted Club won the Entertainment Club of the Year! This success was repeated in 2023. The premises can now be comfortably filled and the Club is now able to pay a premium for a band

to provide entertainment. They have successful quiz nights and snooker events and the premises are available for parties and wedding receptions. Revenue is mostly from bar sales, then membership dues; the Sunday meat raffle also raises money, as do special events like the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. This little story illustrates the generosity of Club members: Andrew's great niece needed cancer treatment in the USA; two charity events were held which raised £5,000 for her — and this is for someone who does not even live in Stansted! You will note that the garden in the back of the Club has undergone a massive refurbishment which is now complete.

Throughout his life, Andrew has suffered from a form of neuropathy called Charcot-Marie-Tooth Disease (named after the three scientists who discovered it). Andrew has held many sponsored events to raise money for CMT. Andrew is currently living in the Scottish Borders helping to take care of his Mum. She is mentally very fit but physically challenged. As he has to be living far away, his involvement in the Social Club is inevitably affected. He still writes the articles for The Link, and is currently revamping the website. He plans to write a history of the Club. He found some fascinating papers in the attic which he plans to use for his book. These include members' records from 1895, and a rule book from 1887. There is also a huge heavy till from the 1920s which should be cleaned and put on display - along with a time bell which was also in the attic! I feel that this could be a fascinating book, written with Andrew's wonderful sense of humour, and I look forward to reading it.

Andrew has lived in Stansted for 22 years but has a tentative historic link to the village. King John of Magna Carta fame is Andrew's great-grandfather 24 generations back!

THROUGH THE GRAPEVINE

Home-grown Grapes

At the heart of wine are grapes, and at The Gunyah Vineyard we have chosen grapes for our wines that not only taste amazing, but are also naturally suited to the unique landscape, soil and climate of Stansted. These grapes, like many of us, thrive here, so let us learn all about the *Grapes of Stansted Mountfitchet*. First up: the gorgeous grapes which make white wines:

Bacchus

This is a white wine grape created by viticulturist Peter Morio at the Geilweilerhof Institute for Grape Breeding in the Palatinate in 1933. Bacchus does particularly well in the UK climate.

Souvignier Gris

This one is a white German wine grape variety created in 1983 by crossing the red French wine grape variety Cabernet Sauvignon with the white German grape crossing known as Bronner.

Sauvignac

Here we have an interspecific new breed between Sauvignon × Riesling and an unknown resistance partner. Sauvignac produces white wines with aromas of apricots, apples, limes and blackcurrants.

Now for the grapes that create wonderful red wines:

Cabaret Noir

A Swiss hybrid of Cabernet Sauvignon and an unknown variety developed by Valentin Blattner in 1991.

Regent

This one is a dark-skinned inter-specific hybrid grape variety. It has both European and American vine species in its pedigree.

Pinot Meunier

This is also known as Meunier or Schwarzriesling and is a variety of red wine grape most noted for being one of the main varieties used in the production of Champagne.

Pinot Noir

A red wine grape variety of the species *Vitis vinifera*. The name is derived from the French words for pine and black.

You will be able to taste all of these grapes in The Gunyah Vineyard wines, which will be on sale soon.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

All of us at times feel the pace of modern life can be too much, and wish for time to slow down and recharge: to be a human being, not a human doing; to find time for undoing some of the doing, and for letting go. Perhaps August, a holiday month for many individuals and businesses, is a good time for focus and reflection on our individual lives, especially this August, after the emotional ups and downs of a general election. Whatever our age or situation, whether we lead busy lives or not, slowing down, doing less or something different from our usual routine, can be calming and valuable. Being kind to ourselves in this way, can have the effect of being more kind to others. These words of novelist Henry James in *A Life* (1972) come to mind:

Three things in human life are important. The first is to be kind. The second is to be kind. The third is to be kind.

One recent thought was to wonder how different the world today might be if it were possible for each person to have a short time each day being consciously still. Stillness to me is more valuable than silence, but to have both is invaluable! A time for doing nothing but being consciously aware, for listening, (different from hearing) can surely be beneficial to ourselves and to those around us. Quakers find that times of silence and stillness can bring us closer to the light and spirit and that of God within. The words below, written by Quaker John Greenleaf Whittier are a verse from one of his much longer poems which the well-known hymn *Dear Lord and Father of Mankind* is a part of. I remember from childhood, singing them with the congregation at the end of each Unitarian service taken by my father, the minister. I love them; they mean more to me now than they did to me as a young girl 70 years ago!

Drop thy still dews of quietness
Till all our strivings cease
Take from our souls the strain and stress,
And let our ordered lives confess
The beauty of thy peace.


BRAIN TRAINING

It is my nerves! Part 3

Sensation and movement; the brain needs to know. This piece is about the nerves that send information up to the brain from the joints, skin and muscles. It is all a bit mind boggling.

In the body we have about 600 muscles, and roughly 360 joints. Within most of these there are six different sensation (cutaneous) receptors and five movement detectors (mechanoreceptors) which communicate with each other as well as with the brain.

To enable optimal movement, all of this lot has to be working well. If we have an injury, surgery or long-standing pain, these receptors need to be checked to ensure they are all still signalling. It is normal for something to be down. When I check them out and find something down, as the sensation or movement signal is restored, the person is always amazed at how much the pain has reduced and the range of motion improved.



Whilst it is understandable that the brain needs to distinguish between sharp and dull, or warm and cool, it is less clear that it also needs to know which way the skin is being lightly brushed or how far apart two prods are. An important movement to rehabilitate is twisting a joint whilst it is under pressure, something usually overlooked.

There is a slim book called *Painful Yarns* by a leading pain researcher, Lorimer Mosely. While it does not tell you how to check these sensations out, it gives excellent analogies as to why it matters. The book is frequently a hilarious read. I have never come across all 11 receptors being down, but I have always come across one or two. The brain needs to know!

IN THE GARDEN

At this time of year, containers need attention. For several months they have produced colour but because they need watering frequently, nutrients are washed away. Feeding is essential and this can be watered in, or fertiliser teased into the soil.

Some plants become untidy such as nemesia, pansies and diascia and these can be cut back to regrow in two to three weeks. Continue to deadhead to encourage more blooms.



Container gardening does not have to be restricted to annuals; provided the right pot is selected in the first place, virtually any plant including shrubs and small trees can be grown in a container. This is ideal for gardeners who rent a property and would like to take their garden with them when they move.

For people with a small plot, container gardening can often provide the answer to limited planting space. If a plant is to live out its entire life in a container, then it needs special care. Un-pot every three or four years and scrape soil off the roots then re-pot with entirely fresh compost. Feed frequently in the intervening years and refresh the top third of the compost annually.

There has probably been a lot of growth with the oxygenating plants in ponds. Now is the time to thin them out. Remove excess leaf growth on water lilies. Remember to



replenish the pond with water in very dry spells and to leave waste plants on the edge of the pond for 24 hours, so that any creatures hiding within will have a chance to return to the water before you dispose of the unwanted material. Leave dividing any other plants around or in

the pond until late September or October.

Youth Club Success

It has been barely five months since Tim Atkinson and his team from Fairycroft House took on the running of the Stansted Youth Club. We are delighted to report the Youth Club has blossomed in that time.

Thrice-weekly activity nights at the Peter Kirk Centre have gone down a storm with Stansted's youngsters. As many as 30 regularly get stuck into the fun activities put on for them by Fairycroft House's experienced youth workers. They have been able to try their hand at everything from laser tag, ice-cream making and cooking challenges to indoor and outdoor sports.

SMPC has invested £11,000 of our budget in the Youth Club. Fairycroft House, which also runs youth services at Saffron Walden, are exploring how to expand the range of activities at the Youth Club. One possibility is taking members on a trip to the French town of Rungis, which the village is twinned with.

"It has been tremendous to see the effect the Youth Club has had," says Maureen Caton, Chair of the Parish Council. "It is not just the numbers. Members say the long Covid lockdowns had sapped their confidence and left them feeling anxious and isolated. The activity have helped them

come out of their shells."

Activity nights at the Peter Kirk Centre are every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, from 6.30 to 8.30pm. The Youth Club is open to individuals aged 11-19, and those with special educational needs up to age 25. Details of planned activities can be found on the parish council website.

The Local Plan Update



By the time you read this, the draft Local Plan will have been published by Uttlesford District Council. This crucial planning document will determine, among other things, the number of houses built in our area from now until early next decade. Provided that District Councillors at an Extra-ordinary Full Council meeting on July 30 vote in favour of this Regulation 19 draft Local Plan, as it is called, a further phase of public consultation will begin. Once that is out of the way, the Local Plan will go to the Planning Inspectorate later this year.

How much development for Stansted?

The draft Local Plan has allocated 390 dwellings to be built over two sites in Stansted between 2025 and 2041. The exact number will not be known until the latest version of the document is published this summer. This is because the number could yet be adjusted. For example, communities such as Takeley, where more house building has been pencilled in, may push for a cut in their allocation. Planners may then decide to increase the share across other parts of Uttlesford to compensate.

Where will new homes be built?

At two sites:

- Land to the north of Walpole Meadows 250 homes
- Land to the east of High Lane 140 homes

Bloor Homes is behind both projects. SMPC has been negotiating with the developer to try (Turn to page 22)



Judges for this year's Anglia in Bloom visited the village on 10th July, taking sites that feature in Stansted's entry into the well-respected horticultural competition. The judging route took in TouchPoint's community garden, Cambridge Road with its hanging baskets and street side planters and pretty thatch cottages, the nearby Aubrey Buxton nature reserve and Elms Farm allotments.

Stansted's entry is scored against three criteria: community participation, environmental responsibility, and gardening achievement. The standard needed to win prizes across the categories can be daunting. AiB forms part of the Royal Horticultural Society's Britain in Bloom competition and attracts entrants across Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, Essex,

Hertfordshire, Suffolk and Norfolk. But last year our village picked up a Silver Gilt award for our overall entry, while six local organisations scored Gold for their community participation. The Stansted Mountfitchet Social Club particularly impressed and was awarded best Pub and Restaurant garden.

Human Roots, Let's Talk Stansted, the volunteer gardeners at TouchPoint, as well as the Friends of St Mary's Church are just some of the organisations helping Stansted put its best foot forward in AiB in 2024. Results for this year's entry will be announced on September 6.





What has happened to Stansted in Bloom?

This is a question some have been raising with SMPC over summer. The competition has run out of organisers is the simple answer.

In 2021 there was talk by the people behind that year's SiB to narrow the focus of the event — more emphasis on gardens, less on public spaces and council involvement. By 2022 that idea had fallen away, taking its backers with it. A new committee stepped in and put together a successful competition, but decided 2023 should be a fallow one to recharge the organisers' batteries. Two years on, the number of SiB committee members has dwindled to the extent that the task of running SiB and pulling together the village entry to

Anglia in Bloom rested on the shoulders of one person. Understandably they felt there weren't enough hours in the day to do both well. As AiB is not just a more established, prestigious horticultural event, but also provides a better opportunity to shout about the brilliant work local organisations do beautifying the village, it was felt that SiB should be the competition to be shelved. Obviously as unavoidable as this, not being able to put on SiB is a shame.

Both 2021 and 2022 were bumper years for the competition. Stansted is blessed with so many pretty gardens, and many residents are rightfully proud to show them off. So it would be great to hear from you if you are interested in helping resurrect the competition in 2025. If you have ideas on what's the best way to take SiB forward, why not get in touch? We would love to hear from you.

(Continued from page 20) to commit them to deliver outcomes, besides houses, that would help the community; new land for a cemetery, for example.

What about a third site at Church Road?

This looked a possibility at one stage, but the Parish Council has withdrawn support for this project. The District Council had asked SMPC to consider this third site on land adjacent to Church Road, near Elms Farm. Planners were willing to apply to take the site out of the Metropolitan Green Belt, on which it sat. The scheme had tempting upsides such as money (and land) for a community building. But Parish Councillors voted in June to make their support conditional. They wanted the new homes built at Church Road to be included in the 390 figure already set for the village in the draft Local Plan. Uttlesford said no to this condition.

What is SMPC's stance on housing development?

The Parish Council accepts there is a national housing crisis and a need for new homes, even in Stansted. But we oppose projects that build houses but little else; such as Bloor Homes plans for 168 homes on the protected Pennington Lane in 2021. SMPC also have to deal with the reality that as the lowest tier of local government they are only ever considered a statutory consultee. That is, we can offer an opinion on a project, but the power to approve a plan lies elsewhere at the national and district levels of governmentt.

Any news of the Neighbourhood Development Plan?

Our NDP was sent to Uttlesford District Council in spring 2023. Since then, it has been reviewed by the authority and by an independent assessor of local planning documents. The document is now undergoing significant revision to bring it into line with Uttlesford's emerging Local Plan, which has taken shape since the NDP was submitted. Under UDC's Call for Sites, over 20 possible sites for development around the village emerged. Currently just two remain: sites at High Lane and land north of Walpole Meadows. This has meant many of the assumptions and recommendations in the NDP have had to be revisited. A revised Neighbourhood Plan will be resubmitted before the end of the year.







AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

This year was a particularly good one in the reserve for *Common Spotted Orchids*. This attractive Orchid takes its name from the leaves which are green with many purple oval spots although often hidden by the grass. The perfumed flowers are attractive to insects. Another flower that has done well is the *Meadow Sweet*. There is a good patch in the rabbit exclusion area nearer to the southern entrance to the reserve. Take a moment to have a sniff, you will be rewarded with a heady, sweet, perfume.



However all is not peace and tranquillity in the flower meadows; in fact the fight for survival is as fierce there as anywhere. The photo above is of a *Flower Crab Spider* which waits in flower heads for its insect prey. The spider relies on speed to seize the insect, often much larger than itself, and then subdue it with venom. In the photo a honeybee is the unfortunate victim.
