UGLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The speaker at our April meeting was the popular Peter Gibson, a trustee of Saffron Walden almshouses. He gave a fascinating talk on the history of the King Edward VI and Reverend Joseph Prime almshouses. These were established in 1400 when the Guild of Our Lady of Pity was created in Saffron Walden by charter from Henry VI, following a bequest of £40 from John and Eleanor Butler. The purpose of the guild was to provide almshouses for the succor and sustenance of thirteen poor men such as be lame, crooked, blind, bed ridden and most in need. A number of local benefactors donated land and money to the guild. In 1694 new almshouses were built between today's Park Lane and the Slade but by 1782 some had become so dilapidated that they were demolished and replaced. A new almshouse was completed by 1834 providing homes for 30 elderly people. In the 1950s bungalows were built in Prime's Close named after Reverend Joseph Prime, these are now being re-developed and made fit for 21st century living. Vacancies are advertised in the local press and on the almshouses website, www.swalmshouses.org.

- Photos should be landscape if they are accompanying articles
- They should also be fairly high resolution, otherwise they look fuzzy and we cannot use them. At least 250KB is our recommendation
- Panoramic photos do not work within the confines of our narrow margins
- We would be hugely grateful if you could send photos, preferably jpg, separate from the article to which they belong, not embedded within the article.

In addition, we often find ourselves short of photos of village events which are suitable for the front cover. If you find yourself at one of these events, such as the Windmill Fête, do feel free to take pictures and send them to us. However, in the case of front covers, the photos must be portrait, with a high resolution, over 1MB. Many thanks to all of you.

Our April meeting was held at the Bowls Club where we welcomed Lindsey Barrell who spoke to us about British Sign Language (BSL). She is a WI president and is on the Institute's hub for BSL. Signing has really come into public awareness since Rose Ayling-Ellis won *Strictly Come Dancing*. Lindsey explained how we all use signing without realising it: thumbs up for good and a wave for hello. The first record of sign language use was 1450 and there are 300 different types. We were surprised to learn that a deaf person has to pay to learn it which seems incredible. Many signs date back to naval origins; for example, the one for biscuit is tapping the elbow and this relates to sailors tapping to rid the biscuits of weevils in them! She gave a very interesting, knowledgeable and witty talk which was greatly enjoyed.

Our next meeting is on **Thursday 13th June** at 7.30pm at Touchpoint when our speaker will be Paul Gillions from the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. The competition is a nautical item. We welcome visitors and new members so please come and join us.







IN THE GARDEN

June heralds gardens bursting with colour. Many gardeners will be feeling exhausted after the wet, cold spring, trying to decide when to sow. April is usually a good month for this but seedlings have struggled to germinate this year and it has been difficult trying to decide when to plant out into a garden environment. Hopefully this month we will have some settled weather.

Runner and French beans should be climbing by now but it is not too late to sow. Sometimes a second sowing in July reaps rewards of harvesting in the Autumn when earlier plantings would have ceased to bear fruit.



Deadheading is important as it keeps everything looking tidy and encourages fresh growth and flowers. This is also the time of year, immediately following the Chelsea Flower Show, for the oft-mentioned *Chelsea Chop* which can apply to many of the plants in the garden around June.

If you are lucky enough not to have succumbed either to blight or the ravages of the box moth caterpillar, now is the time to give box hedging a good trim.

If you have perennials such as phlox, achillea, campanulas, echinaceas, rudbeckias, penstemons and heleniums then prune back half the stems to spread the plant's flowering period over a longer season.

Remember to visit open gardens near you. Gardens should be at their best now and for the next three months. Last year we mentioned visiting open gardens under the National Gardens Scheme, see www.ngs.org.uk for details. For a few pounds in aid of charity, you get a glimpse over the garden wall. Funded Childcare If you qualify, you will get 15 hours of funded childcare the term after your child turns two, and from September when your child is nine months or over. See www.citizensadvice.org.uk/family/education/claiming-the-new-15-hours-of-free-childcare-for-2-year-olds.

Pension Credit gives you extra money to help with your living costs if you are over state pension age and on a low income; this is separate from your state pension. You can claim online, over the phone or by post and will qualify for a higher amount if you are severely disabled or a carer. Go to www.gov.uk/pension-credit-calculator.

The National Living Wage and National Minimum Wage hourly rates have increased. Salaried workers are also affected, so workers doing 35 hours per week must be paid at least £20,821 a year. New rules are also in force for flexible working. See www.gov.uk for details.

ANN CONROY

Ann was born and raised in Enfield, alongside two sisters and identical twin brothers. She and her husband Gerry both worked for Edison and Swan, also known as AEI, in a factory at Ponders End, where they first met. He was making special bulbs, such as those for lighthouses. Some of the staff were transferred to Stansted; Edison and Swan had a factory located where the Mountfitchet Care Home is now. Ann and Gerry married in Ponders End; while Gerry was in a taxi en route from Henham to Ponders End to get married, he was looking at the local newspaper, searching for work for Ann! Two days after the wedding, she was at the Labour Exchange in Bishop's Stortford, trying to find a job. That really was an unusual kind of honeymoon! She found a job at the Collector of Taxes office, for a year, then she worked at the Stansted Edison and Swan factory, doing office work. The factory closed in 1967 and she started work in Spellbrook at Hayters' Lawnmowers.



In 1969 Ann and Gerry had a son Ian, followed a few years later by Lorna. They lived at Dunmow Road in Bishop's Stortford, in a small two-bedroomed house. Lorries rather blighted their existence as they were prone to crashing into the outside wall and were very noisy. In spite of this, Ann was not keen to move as she loved the little house. She went shopping one day, and came back to find the house had been sold! The family moved into a very nice house in Rainsford Road, Stansted. Ann's famous child-minding got started thanks to a very pleasant neighbour who had a small son; she asked Ann if she could take care of him while she worked. Ann did what was needed to become an official child minder, and took on several more little ones to care for at home. She and three friends, mother helpers at Sideways Nursery, went to Saffron Walden to take a course in how to interact and entertain small children, and decided to form Rainbow Playgroup, now Rainbow Preschool. They rented the Youth Centre and the group was registered to care for up to 26 children. One rather odd rule that they had to contend with was that unqualified teachers could only be responsible for four children each, whereas a qualified teacher could have eight, even if the person were qualified to teach something totally irrelevant like Astrophysics! The Youth Centre group lasted for 25 years; after that, they moved to the Quaker Meeting House.

Ann and her group were asked if they would like to use a room at St Mary's School, where they stayed for five years, with Ann as a leader. She took on volunteer status when the group moved to the Peter Kirk building. Ann still does two sessions there every week. She belongs to the Herts and Soul Choir, the St Mary's singers and St John's Church Choir; a previous leader of the latter choir had links in Cambridge, so annually the choir would join other church choirs to sing at Kings College, Cambridge. Ann also had the opportunity to sing in many different places including St Paul's Cathedral. She has an allotment close to St Mary's Church, and also enjoys attending the Bowls Club, where her nickname is Killer Conroy! She also belongs to the Craft Ladies Group, who make items to sell at the monthly Ugley Farmers' Market and at the Windmill Fête, in order to raise money for St John's Church. In the past Ann ran a summer playscheme for the Parish Council and she was a Sunday school teacher. Gerry and Ann have two children, three grandchildren and two great grandchildren, all of whom live locally. So Ann is a very busy lady indeed, with all her hobbies, taking care of her family, working two sessions a week at Rainbow Pre School - so much for a quiet retirement!

NATURAL BEEKEEPING

In April you get the first honeybee swarms but they really kick into gear in May and June, which I think are the most exciting months for swarms, as shown below. So what has happened in the hive over the last two months? The bees would have overwintered on the honey from last year; then in April, with the first flowers, the queen would have moved down to start laying eggs in order to build up the colony again, and fill the hive with bees. Beekeepers would have been feeding sugar and pollen to stimulate this. Feral bees would now have died because they would have expected, in vain, to be fed. However the wild colonies would have a good supply of honey and would be in good condition.



This year I have not seen as many bumble bees as I would normally have expected for the time of the year. I suspect it was the rain washing the nectar and pollen away thus reducing their food, as well as just being very wet. Most spring flowers hang down so they can still retain their pollen and nectar, such as blue bells and crocus; both are very important food sources for all the early season bugs. I have been amazed by the magnificent displays from my apple, pear and magnolias this year. With no frost they have been able to retain all their flowers and have been spectacular! With all the warm weather and the foliage on the trees now, I hope for a marvellous bug-filled summer with loads of moths and butterflies, and all the pesky ones too! Next time I will talk about how the many bugs that are considered pests are actually very useful, and how we can work around them being pesky if we learn to understand them.





THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH There were no entries for April in St John's Registers

Many of you probably know that I had a nasty ear infection three years ago, which left me somewhere between moderately and severely deaf in my right ear. I bought my first hearing aid from a company whose representative comes round to your house. A nice lady called Martina visited me. She had a sympathetic manner and wore a Dolce and Gabbana suit. I was putty in her hands. Of the three types of hearing aid on offer, I ended up buying the super-duper one, which by extraordinarily good luck was on special offer. Nine months later, the hearing aid stopped working. I phoned Martina, and she told me the firm she worked for had gone bust, and there was nothing she could do for me. I could not help thinking that I had been taken in by a racket.

So I started all over again, this time with a well-known high street optician. The audiologist there was fantastic, with a real pastoral manner. I now have a genuinely super-duper hearing aid, with three microphones. The most wonderful part of my fitting was when I put my new hearing aid on for the first time, the audiologist said something, and I realised I could hear him with both ears. It was a miraculous moment of restoration and healing; if I were an audiologist, this would be the moment I got out of bed for in the morning. I came home and listened to a very specific piece of music: the third movement of Beethoven's 15th string quartet, which has the title Holy song of thanksgiving of a convalescent to the Deity. There is no more profound expression of healing, relief and gratitude in the whole of music; listening to it with two ears, I think I knew how Beethoven must have felt.



BRAIN TRAINING

It is my nerves! Part 1

Nerves matter. If we had no nerves, we would be a heap on the floor. They are an important part of rehabilitation and can be the cause of pain or worrisome weakness. What do they do? They carry vital information. The brain instructs the body and the body instructs the brain via its nerves; this



is the nervous system. Nerves therefore both ascend and descend, frequently through the same nerve. There are many nerves! For now, let us talk about the sciatic nerve, which is simply huge. It leaves the spinal column, passing through the piriformis, a muscle in the hip. The accompanying picture shows the areas it covers. The sciatic nerve branches off into smaller nerves which let you kick your own bottom or move

your feet plus wiggle your toes. Some branches are purely for sensation; these are called cutaneous.

These nerves of sensation are easily overlooked. For example, the saphenous nerve does not make any muscles contract, but only carries information about sensations involving the skin. Why does this matter? Have you ever tried running on numb feet? It is awful. Very hard to achieve a personal best running up Chapel Hill if you cannot feel your feet. The brain just slows us down due to insufficient sensation input. To add to the wonder, information about the state of the muscles, the joint tissues and the various sensations felt in the layers of the skin is sent back up the sciatic nerve via the spinal column to the thalamus. This is located above the brainstem, and it decides whether the ascending information requires action or not. Most information requires no action; after all, the sensation of our pants on our bottom is only important if our pants are falling down.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

...with news of D-day Commemoration Service, the cemetery near St Mary's Church, Bloor's plans for stage 2 of their Walpole Meadows development, Parish Councillors' attendance records, and the recent renovation of buildings at 72 Chapel Hill

Cemetery Hits Capacity

ver since the parish cemetery next to St Mary's Church was first administered by the parish council in 1956, we have tried to accommodate any resident's wishes to be buried at the site off Church Road. Sadly, the day has come when this is no longer possible. Stansted is now a much bigger village than it was in the 1950s. There are now an estimated 500 graves and cremation plots at a cemetery that occupies just half an acre of land. With no extra capacity, the cemetery has simply almost run out of space.

SMPC has been working with landowners to find more burial land. The good news is, they are open to the possibility. The bad news? Offers come with obvious caveats — further housing development in the village. But even if these can be negotiated and a site be found, extensive soil testing and archaeological studies will be needed and the land prepared. These could take up to a year. So, there is no short-term fix on the horizon.

Until land can be found, our cemetery will remain open for you to pay respects to your loved ones. We will also be honouring any existing commitments made for burials and internments will still be possible for family graves with capacity. But, for all other circumstances, we can only advise residents to consult with funeral directors for nearby alternatives.



Dendrophile Wanted

f you are a dendrophile, especially one with a Level 2 qualification in basic tree surveying, the Parish Council would like to hear from you! In plain English language, we need someone with a love of trees to be our voluntary tree warden.

What does that involve? Basically, we need you to help us make assessments on the health and safety of trees on land that we have a duty of care for. This could involve, for example, looking into instances where a resident has suggested a tree is posing a risk to property. Or perhaps you may be asked to check on a tree near a playground that could be a risk to the public.

What you will not be doing is climbing up trees. Or getting familiar with a chainsaw. The work of felling trees and branches is left to an arboriculturist. Your

job will be to let us know when we need to hire one. You also will not be asked to spend your time inspecting hundreds of trees either. We commission regular professional Tree Surveys to take care of that. All that we really ask is you become acquainted with our Tree Management Policy and agree to inspect any tree that is brought to our attention as a potential problem.

Our tree policy is on our website and is a great way to get some some insight into the important role played by a tree warden in our community.

Walpole Meadows 2 Update

embers of the Parish Council's Planning Working Group recently met with representatives of Bloor Homes ahead of the community engagement event they held on 24th April.

The masterplan layout was discussed, and they explained the rationale for having the country park at the northern end of the site to act as a green buffer to minimise the visual impact of the proposed development as you approach the village from the north. It was reassuring to hear the Phase 2 development allows for a much wider boundary to the western side where it meets Pennington Lane. Some houses in Phase 1 were built so close to the boundary that sections of the ancient hedgerow were lost forever, and members made clear that this must not be repeated.

Clarification was sought on the current position regarding the two sites allocated in Phase 1 for educational provision. Whilst land will be available in Phase 2 for a community facility, funds will be required from elsewhere to design and build it.

It was confirmed that Bloor are considering our request for off-site highway improvements to include upgrading the footway from High Lane, around the corner and along the B1383 to Five Acres and installing street lighting. Ideally this would be accompanied by an application to reduce the speed limit to 30mph as far as the roundabout at the entrance to the development.

Finally, Bloor are also proposing to close off a section of Pennington Lane to traffic thereby making it more enjoyable for walkers, horse-riders, cyclists etc. This is a long-held wish of the Parish Council.

Day Centre Makeover 2024

t is exciting for the buildings at 72 Chapel Hill, which reopened at the end of April after two months of renovations ended. TouchPoint raised over £120,000 to fund improvements to the old day centre and the former parish council offices at Crafton Green. With a better kitchen, new toilets, improved access, and more floor space, the community organisation says it can now expand its services at the top Chapel Hill. This is impressive stuff considering that prior to the building work, TouchPoint already ran food shares, advice drop-ins, free meals, community cafés, gardening clubs and film afternoons from the old community centre. A new radio station is just one of the ways TouchPoint plans to use its revamped premises.

Funding Repairs

SMPC was one of several parties to contribute money for the renovation project (see chart below). TouchPoint was able to draw on a £9k reserve set aside by SMPC for repairs to the community building and Crafton Green. A further £22k in district council money, previously awarded to the Parish Council for the day centre's upkeep, was also made available for the improvements.

Buildings Spring Back to Life

The withdrawal of district council funding for its local day centres (including Stansted's) had forced the Parish Council prior to the pandemic to consider the viability of the building at 72 Chapel Hill. Especially in the light of a library and new SMPC offices being built next door at the Mountfitchet Exchange. TouchPoint has undoubtedly breathed new life into the previously under-utilised community buildings, and SMPC is proud to say it has backed the group since their inception in Spring 2021. Here's how:

- ➤ **Licence to Occupy** agreements signed with TouchPoint for use of the premises at Crafton Green & the old day centre, which has now been renamed as TouchPoint
- ➤ Rent-free use of Crafton Green House and the former day centre to TouchPoint
- ➤ Insulated Crafton Green house
- ➤ **Funded repair** of Crafton Green House roof tiles, soffit boards and gutters
- ➤ Parking permits for TouchPoint at Crafton Green car park
- ➤ Hall hire income from local organisations for use of the former day centre to be kept by TouchPoint. The money will be used to cover energy costs which, until recently, were covered by SMPC for the buildings at 72 Chapel Hill



SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

Sustainable Travel

I recently went to Australia to see my brother after not having seen him for eight years. His farm was suffering from lack of rain, none of note for six months. We could not use the barbecue due to extreme fire risk. Climate change is clearly affecting them. Obviously I flew there, out via Heathrow back via Stansted. How much CO_2 did this involve? I flew economy so my share was only 6.2 tons; if it had been business class maybe 24.6 tons. I calculated this using an online guide. This has made me think; there is no real alternative for Australia apart from not going, but for Europe? Another suggested calculation of CO_2 is per km:

Long haul flight 150g Short haul flight 255g Petrol car 192g Train 41g Eurostar 6g Walk or cycle 0g

Estimates vary, but the picture is clear; where possible we should use trains rather than drive or fly. What prevents us from making this choice? For some journeys time may be a factor but the flying time is increased by the airport time. The big issue is **cost.** Travelling to France to see our son by train costs about three times the cost of flying. In Britain train fares for families are very high. However, there are options to make it cheaper. Booking ahead and using rail-cards and off-peak saves money as do the periodic *Hare Fare* deals on Greater Anglia. Cambridge trains let you take your bicycle, which is CO_2 free, in order to extend the journey. Sadly, Stansted Express does not accept bikes. For short journeys walk or cycle. Then bus or train if possible. Limit driving and flying to reduce CO_2 emissions. What do you think? Please contact us or see our Facebook page.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Hundred Parishes includes much of the extensive barley-growing area of the Hertfordshire and Essex borders. The malting of barley in preparation for its use in the brewing industry was a significant activity in several of our larger villages and market towns, especially along the River Stort, from the 18th to the 20th centuries.

Evidence is still to be found in the form of place names indicating the location of former maltings, such as *Malting(s) Lane* in Much Hadham and Chrishall; and in the names of buildings that were once maltings or associated with one nearby. Thus there are a number of *Malting(s) Cottage(s)*, as in Linton, Bartlow, Much Hadham, Aspenden and Ugley; and *Old Maltings* as at Arkesden, Great Chesterford and Manuden (see below). In Little Hallingbury there is *Malting Farm* and *The Old Brick Malting*.



As well as conversion to private houses, surviving maltings have been renovated and converted to a variety of uses. Great Dunmow's is now a museum and community resource. In Wethersfield the maltings is now the village hall and shop, while the station maltings in Newport and those in Central Arcade in Saffron Walden are commercial premises. Multi-storey maltings in Sheering have been converted into apartments and in Stanstead Abbotts to a business centre.

The classic form of a malting reflects the various processes which took place within the building. Grain was hauled in through the *lucam* or hoist housing at one end of the building where it was then steeped in water to start the germination process. The grain was laid out on *germination floors* before growth was halted at a particular stage by applying heat in the *kiln* at the other end of the building. The process of initiating and then halting germination is known as *malting*.

THROUGH THE GRAPEVINE

At the Gunyah Vineyard we are mad about all things wine, and we would like to share our knowledge and passion with the local community in a regular feature for The Link. We are calling it Through the Grapevine, starting with a very brief history of winemaking in the UK; or should we say: What have the Romans ever done for us? They started growing wine in Britain as early as 43BC after emperor Claudius began the conquest of the British Isles. Winemaking was disrupted by invasions by the Jutes, the Angles, and the Saxons and was pretty much stopped by invasions of the Vikings. Winemaking in the UK was slow to recover and by the Norman invasions 42 vineyards were recorded in the Domesday book. The Middle Ages brought competition for home grown wine from our new trade with France and the rest of Europe and Britain became better known for sourcing, importing and bottling rather than growing wine.



British wine took further hits throughout the 18th and 19th centuries as reduced import taxes flooded the country with European wines, which were cheaper and better. The 20th century brought war to England and vineyards gave way to crops; it was not until the 1950s when England began wine production on scale again, pioneered by people like George Ordish. As our climate changes, the 21st century brings back wine-making opportunities to the area, with our climate now close to those of the best wine producing regions such as Champagne, and the opportunity to grow grapes such as Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier.


