Our lovely front cover shows one of our local beauty spots, the permissive path system near Elms' Farm. Thanks so much to Kathy West for sending this in to us and to the two young children who took part. Many people use these paths for walks, with dogs or without them. A variety of wildlife can be seen: Canada and Brent geese, with their glorious cries, as well as red kites and buzzards with their rather odd squeaky cries. Song birds accompany the walker all along the paths, and water birds squawk loudly from the two lakes – usually cursing my dog if she gets too close! In this issue, there are loads of spring flower pictures sent in to grace our pages: Hatfield Forest, see below, In the Garden p3, and Easton Lodge p17.

One of the highlights for me editing this magazine is to read about our local primary schools, and the amazing range of adventures they have at school. So much imagination goes into their curriculum, both inside and outside the classroom. I remember my early schooling as being completely academic, seemingly lacking in heart and soul. Magna Carta mentions a *Dress to Express* day, St Mary's Years 5 and 6 children were asked to feel what it is like to be a polar explorer, Bentfield sang in the *Young Voices Concert* in the O2 arena, and Birchanger are now experiencing an innovative *Outdoor Play and Learning* programme. I am sure you will enjoy reading about them.

As we move into spring, the coppicing tools will be put away in order to give the birds time to move in and start nesting. If you are quiet, you may be able to hear the hammering of the woodpeckers amongst the other noisy birdsong chatter. The darker colours of winter are chased away by the emergence of the vivid emerald-green carpet of *dog's mercury* with flecks of colour from the wild flowers; *dog violets* and *primroses* common sights along the woodland edges.



Even as spring begins to make an appearance, the ground conditions are still poor. We are dealing with the ongoing erosion of historic woodland rides, so if you come across a diversion, please follow it and discover a new route. From **Sunday 25th March**, the forest will go back to summer opening hours and we will be open all week, 9.00am-4.00pm. The café is open 9.00am-4.30pm with a delicious seasonal menu, hot and cold drinks and takeaway food. Do visit us and hopefully experience some of the warmer, sunnier spring weather. At our last meeting, instead of a guest speaker, we watched three films streamed from The East Anglia Film Library which has an extensive catalogue of downloadable short films. *Mid-Day Adventures* was a film showing the preparation and serving of school dinners from 1950-1960. It was a labour-intensive job and although having some helpful tools like an automatic potato peeler, the cooks and dinner ladies worked hard to produce a substantial mid-day meal for the children. However, it did not show the dreaded and unforgettable semolina puddings (or frog spawn as we called it).

Harlow New Town (1956), dealt with the ideas and initial construction of this exciting concept: to build a town with all necessary facilities, in landscaped areas with easy access to local shops and green spaces. Young people would be catered for with youth clubs and sports facilities. A separate industrial centre was to be built to enable most of the community to work within the town, and a modern three-bedroom house could be rented for £2 a week. To those who came from the London slums it must have seemed too good to be true. If only ...

Stansted Airport 1980 was a real blast from the past. Originally constructed in 1942 by the US air force, and having a runway over two miles long, it was destined to be London's third airport. In 1980, it was a matter of arriving, parking directly outside the terminal for a very small parking fee, and when your flight was called, walking out onto the tarmac and boarding the plane. Those were the days when it really was a pleasure to fly. The next meeting is on **Thursday 7**th **March** at 7.30pm in the Quaker Meeting House.

IN THE GARDEN

The beginning of March ushers in Spring and seeing the first daffodils blooming in the garden brings a relief that another winter is behind us. Even if we do endure a cold spell this month, we all know that at this time of year it will not last very long. In his book Christopher Lloyd's *Gardening Year*, the author begins his March chapter with: *There is something sharp and aggressive in the very word. March is prepared to hurl every sort of weather at us.*

Magnolias venture into flower with trepidation, scillas and hyacinths now bloom. Euphorbias, primulas and cowslips, species tulips, grape hyacinths, anemones and pulmonarias, with their two-tone, pink and blue flowers which bloom until May, are all stars of the borders now. The first month of spring is also a time of hope and activity.

This is a good time to relocate shrubs and to prune. Vigorous climbers can be cut back hard as can winter stems grown for their ornamental colours. Divide perennials and put in supports such as twiggy pea sticks before there is too much growth. Hardy annuals can be sown, as can herbs such as chives, fennel, coriander, parsley, tomatoes, salad leaves and beetroot. Chard and spinach should be sown under cover. Now is also the time for getting early potato tubers and onion sets in the ground. Lawns need to be aerated, scarified and mown with the blades on a high setting. Do not forget houseplants as now is the time to begin to feed them weekly. By the end of the month the clocks will be going forward and the borders will be bursting forth with renewed growth. There is always something to look forward to in the garden.

Recently our Years 5 and 6 participated in a Polar Challenge, which tied into their topic of Frozen Kingdom. It was devised so they could experience some of what polar explorers have to endure. The tyre challenge was to replicate pulling provision-stacked sledges and the children threw themselves into dragging or flipping tyres, and doing an army-style obstacle course. The ground was frosty, and the negative temperatures were ideal training conditions; this helped them appreciate the epic tasks undertaken by polar adventurers. What really impressed me was the teamwork and support the children gave each other and how they pushed on through despite tyre bruises, rope burns and fatigue. Our sleeping bag challenge involved a relay of getting in and out of three sleeping bags and zipping them up while wearing gloves. It made for a very different activity with lots of squeals and giggles, but it certainly was not easy and relied on them helping each other.



Year 5 had an exciting trip to the O2 to perform as part of the *Young Voices* choir. On the day we attended there were an astounding 8,742 children singing together. It was a long day with rehearsals in the afternoon before the concert in the evening. They joined in with songs by performing artists such as Natalie Williams and MC Grammar. They were also joined in the Matilda medley by Miss Honey herself! The children were all fabulously well behaved and did a great job representing the school, as well as having an incredible experience and they should be very proud of themselves. A big thank you to the staff who supported them in learning the songs and taking them to the O2. Next month I will share a little of what our younger pupils have been up to.

Her presentation of 52 Weeks in the Shade Garden – a different shade plant for each week of the year was inspiring. She discussed many more than hostas and ferns; over 1500 different varieties of plants are grown in the nursery, all outside and in peat-free compost. Guiding us through the year with slides, members were shown some of the many different plants which thrive in shade or partial shade. Form, colour and texture should be considered before planting in order to create a really interesting plant bed. Throughout the summer the nursery can be seen at the various garden shows around the country. THE END OF THE SAXONS 1043-1087 PART 2

The Battle of Hastings

In Saxon England and Scotland, the throne did not necessarily go to the reigning king's son. The king could promise it to anyone, which is what Saint Edward the Confessor did. He promised the crown to Harold Godwinson, his wife's brother, and to William the Conqueror, Duke of Normandy. Harold swore an oath to William, but when Edward the Confessor died, the former said: Y'know what? Stuff that, what is the worst that can happen? The Viking Harald Hardrada invaded in early 1066, looking to take the crown. He was defeated, and Harold Godwinson figured that William would soon do the same.

So his army waited and waited, until they eventually decided that the Duke of Normandy was not coming, gave up, and went home. When William landed in England later that year, Harold was unprepared. He hastily summoned his army, and hurried to Hastings to die.

Remember that clever know-it-all from part 1? He will tell you that the Battle of Hastings actually happened in a place called Battle, but the War-Naming Commission decided the Battle of Battle was a stupid name, and instead named it after Hastings, a nearby town. However, we have learned not to trust him. In fact, Battle did not exist in 1066. It did happen in Hastings, because why else would it be called the Battle of Hastings? When the town Battle came along later, it was named as a reference to the Battle of Hastings.

SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

Knowledge is Power Sir Francis Bacon

One thing that may prevent us from reducing the power that we use, is not knowing how much our appliances are consuming and costing, when we use them. If we do know, we can then make informed choices, so this article shows how to calculate what appliances cost to use.



The Steps

	Find the power rating of your appliance in Watts;	Electricity	Cost in pence
Step	look in the product manual, or on a label on the product.	Price P	to use for 1 hour
	If in Watts, divide by 1,000 to convert to KwH	per KwH	
1	Microwave rated at 900 watts = 0.9 Kw per hr	30**	0.9 X 30 = 27p
2	Oven rated at 1.2 Kw = 1.2 Kw per hour	30	1.2 X 30 = 36p
3	Tumbledryer – typically 2.5 Kw per hour	30	2.5 X 30 = 75p
4	Washing Machine – on average 0.9 KwH	30	0.9 X 30 = 27 p
5	100 W old fashioned light bulb = 0.6 KwH for 6 hrs*	30	0.6 X 30 = 18p
6	11 W LED bulb (for similar light)= 0.066 KwH for 6hrs*	30	0.066 X 30 = 2p

*A typical winter night **a round number and quite typical

Do not forget the amount of time you are using the appliance. For example a jacket potato in the microwave takes 10 mins, so costs 2.7p, but the oven takes 1hr costing 36p. A tumbledryer cycle is usually about 2 hrs costing £1.50p. We hope this helps you, and we love feedback, so please let us know how you get on.



We are fortunate today that we have a benefit system to help vulnerable people. In the past, the less fortunate relied on parish relief or the generosity of the better-off. Some wealthy benefactors left money for the provision of almshouses. You can see an article on almshouses on the Hundred Parishes website. Other philanthropists helped the poor by giving money in a variety of ways.

Some churches record the benevolence of these donors on large benefactor boards. For example, on the board below in St Peter's Church Ugley, it states that *In his will of 1620*, *Robert Bucke, a draper, gave three suits of clothes to three poor men and three suits to three poor women with hats, to be given every third year forever.*

Just a few miles away in Manuden's parish church, a board describes three benefactors, one of whom is the same Robert Bucke. Here he gives the same number of suits to the poor of Manuden, with additional hats, shoes and stockings. In Little Hadham the church of St Cecilia has a board recording that Miss Ann Scott, in her 1865 will, left dividends to the rector and churchwardens to distribute bread on Shrove Sunday each year *at their discretion* to the poor of the Parish.

Hatfield Broad Oak's Church of St Mary the Virgin has a brass plaque describing the generosity of John Gobert. He left £600 in his will of 1623 for the purchase of land, the proceeds from which were to be distributed in a variety of ways including £4 per annum to the town of Hatfield Broad Oak. His heir Sir John Barrington subsequently bought the manor of Keeres in Aythorpe Roothing to comply with the will. Please look out for more proclamations of generosity.

The reserve is already showing the first signs of spring, brought on by the relatively warm weather for this time of year. The hazel trees have catkins hanging from the branches. These are the male flowers; the female flowers are there too, but these are much smaller red buds. The birds too are thinking of spring, and many are actively looking at possible nest sites. I watched a pair of magpies collecting sticks and seemingly exchanging views on what were the best ones. The winter visitors are still here however, and we were delighted to see a flock of redpolls feeding on the birch seeds. They will be putting on as much energy reserves as possible before migrating northwards. They bring the bird species count for birds over the last 12 months to 32.



The volunteers tackled a large tree that had fallen across the middle pond. We sawed through the trunk to leave the root ball on the far side and then gradually hand winched the tree across the pond sawing it into sections as it came. I must say we rather enjoyed it!

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

I used to start my day listening to the Today programme on BBC Radio 4. Now, however, I am more likely to tune into classical music on Radio 3. My conversion is largely attributable to the increasing habit of politicians and activists to talk across each other. Far from arousing my interest, it leaves me irritated and, to some degree, insulted by the implied assumption that if you have the last word you win the argument. Not so. The British public are not as impressionable as some politicians might think. People see cheap party-political points scoring for what it is, an insult to responsible political debate and a side-step from the real issues to hand. The public are not fooled into thinking that those who can talk longer and louder than their opponents win the day. What they do realise is that failing to listen to others and not to exercise respect and restraint damages the political process. Worst of all, it undermines public confidence in those who represent us and the machinery of government, whether national or local. Why is it so few people bother to vote when it should be a primary civic responsibility?

With a general election looming this year, we will have to brace ourselves for increasingly noisy and fractious arguments between the rival parties. People's willingness to engage thoughtfully in the vital issues underpinning the election will not be helped if we have just another unseemly shouting match in which nobody listens to anyone but themselves. Real listening or, put another way, attentive listening is not always easy. It requires honesty and openness and an ability to put aside one's own views for a moment and to consider with care the views of another person and the experience that gave rise to them. It requires courage to challenge oneself and to be open to the possibility that one might be mistaken.



BRAIN TRAINING

Here is a quick and simple way to improve neck movement if you have a stiff neck.

- 1. First test out how your neck is moving: turn your head left and right then drop your head side to side
- 2. Rub each of the following areas for 5-10 seconds
- 3. Rub around the base of the skull where the neck joins the skull. Do not be too vigorous here! These muscles are only weeny and very precious
- 4. Now rub behind your ears, on the skull. Listen to the sound of your fingers rubbing the skull
- 5. Next up, rub the pinnae of the ears, so the flappy bit (aka lugs). Rub all round, paying attention to the sound
- 6. Finally rub your fingers together near your earholes, again paying attention to the sound of the rubbing. Is there a side-to-side difference?
- 7. Now retest your neck mobility, which will hopefully be a bit freer.



This is an excellent drill if your neck is stiff; it is also good after a lengthy session on a screen. It is a wonderful drill for ball sports where you keep your eyes on the ball whilst your body is in vigorous motion delivering the ball to elsewhere, with as much accuracy as possible and the right level of power.

What to expect from our Annual Parish Meeting...

 $B'_{\rm Council}$ will have held over 30 meetings. Residents are invited to them all, but there is one event each year where our doors are opened that little bit wider for the public — the Annual Parish Meeting.

Other than our Full Council, which features a 15-minute period for questions from the public, residents typically attend meetings as observers.

But what makes the Annual Parish Meeting special is the chance for you to raise issues and ask questions of your choice directly to Parish Councillors. In fact under the Local Government Act 1972, any registered elector present at an Annual Parish Meeting is able to call a ballot on matters discussed.

What is also special about the Annual Parish Meeting is it provides a space for village organisations to inform residents of their activities. In recent years we have hosted presentations from TouchPoint, the Stansted Surgery, representatives from Essex Police's Uttlesford Community team, even the chief executive of the district council.

On our pages this month you will find details of the Annual Parish Meeting agenda, reports from SMPC Chair Maureen Caton and John O'Brien, head of the Finance & General Purposes Committee. We also have some background on our guest speakers.

We hope the content on these pages will help residents to be sufficiently informed to make the most of this year's Annual Parish Meeting. We look forward to seeing you there!

And This Year's Guest Speakers Are...

Thanks to help from Forest Hall School our Youth Council made great strides in 2023. We now have six serving Youth Councillors. At the meeting you will hear how they plan to build a vibrant youth community in Stansted Mountfitchet. Also on the youth front will be Fairycroft House's Tim Atkinson. A stalwart of the youth and live music scene in Saffron Walden, Mr Atkinson will set out his vision for

youth services at the Peter Kirk Centre, now Fairycroft have taken on the running of our Youth Club there. You will also get to find out from recipients of the £7000 distributed to organisations by the SMPC in 2023. Annual Report for the council year 2023-2024

As I write this update and overview of some of the work of the Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council over the last year, I am conscious we have achieved some of our aspirations, but also acknowledge that others are still works in progress.



Potholes & Station Staffing

We have all experienced the lack of joined up working by Essex Highways on our local roads. We worked with others and ultimately were able to get some of the decisions that had created unnecessary delays and diversions reversed. This, along with the pothole issue—which remains a focus for answers from Essex County Council on the expenditure in Stansted—must be addressed.

Along with our local District Councillor for the North, we successfully supported the local campaign to retain the staffing levels at our railway station.



Peacock Pharmacy & TouchPoint Partnership

We were also a key advocate in the appeal—which was successful—to grant the Peacock Pharmacy a dispensing licence. We continue to work with our partners at the surgery to provide additional services and a collection access point here at Crafton Green for our residents in the North—since the decision by Boots to close over 200 smaller premises, including Stansted's on Cambridge Road.

We continue to partner with TouchPoint to promote services to benefit our community and congratulate them on their continued success and achievements in securing grant funding to promote the gradual transformation of our Day Centre and Crafton Green House. Other than helping TouchPoint by organising and funding repairs to the Day Centre and adjoining buildings, the Parish Council agreed to lease Crafton Green House to the organisation. Handing over the keys to both buildings will open more doors (excuse the pun) for TouchPoint to run and expand its service provision to the community.



Finding room for Almshouses

You will be very aware that we have been in search of and exploring potential sites for the re-provision of the Fuller-Maitland Almshouses, previously sited on Church Road. Due to a lack of available appropriate sites, Legacy East Almshouse Partnership, who are the managers of the fund, have made the decision to begin negotiations on the purchase of a house within Stansted to ensure the funds are retained for our community's benefit. We do not have the detail of these negotiations at the time of writing, but more information should be available by the time of the Annual Parish Meeting.



Sticking up for Residents...

Additional cemetery land is still required and is now becoming more urgent, and so remains an ongoing focus in discussions on community benefits with planners and developers. Our relationship with Uttlesford District Council (UDC) planning officers—to promote and gain community benefits where land has been agreed for development has improved and we hope appropriate land can be made available in future negotiations.

SMPC has sought legal advice in relation to Gigaclear's siting of "the box" on Five Acres without our permission. The advice was to informally negotiate rather than begin a costly legal challenge with a probable negative outcome as the utility cannot be feasibly moved. A meeting with residents, Gigaclear and ourselves will have taken place before the Annual Parish Meeting to hopefully promote an acceptable outcome for all concerned.



Shepherding the NDP nearer to completion

Having received input from UDC officers on our draft Neighbourhood Development Plan, we are now putting the final touches to it to ensure that our policies and objectives are sufficiently robust to withstand an Inspector's review.



Amplifying the Voice of Local Business

UDC will have completed a consultation on car parking access and charging by the middle of March. Local businesses, the Stansted Business Forum and the recently re-established Economic Development Working Group (EDWG), have robustly questioned the proposed doubling of charges—we await the final outcome. The EDWG works closely with Business Officers from Uttlesford Council and has promoted their drop-in sessions at SMPC offices at the Mountfitchet Exchange for local businesses to get support to apply for grants.



...& Helping Younger Residents Have Their Say

We realise that we need to invest in our youth and you will hear at the Annual Parish Meeting about the exciting projects that are planned for the young people attending our Youth Club provision. Our Youth Council has become energised with the support of staff and pupils at Forest Hall School. The group's Chairman will give a brief outline of some of the projects and ideas they wish to pursue. The Youth Council is helping to promote the needs and interests of the young people in the community and gives our young councillors the experience, skills and competencies they will be able to utilise in their working lives.



Support for Climate Group Bears Fruit

Within the focus on Climate Change, Sustainable Stansted will commission a biodiversity study if the outcome of their grant application to UDC 's Zero Carbon Fund is successful. Meanwhile, the council has selected two sites for meadow flower planting—the land surrounding the north knight sign at the junction of High Lane and Cambridge Road, and the two grassed areas at the junction of Pennington Lane and Rainsford Road. Sustainable Stansted is now in its second year which is itself an achievement. Apart from setting up and establishing a Facebook page, a number of initiatives have been started. Articles are published in *The Link* and *The Flyer* every month. A leaflet on energy saving has been delivered to all households and presentations made. Looking ahead the group hope to identify and lobby with others for safe cycle routes in Stansted.

Flicking the Switch to Part-night Lighting

The programme to convert the majority of the street lights owned by the Parish Council to LED has progressed successfully. The expectation is that this will result in less maintenance and with a minimum energy saving of 40%. The introduction of part-night lighting to some areas will produce further savings, which cannot be calculated until we agree the new contract in September.



Working with Nearby Councils to Fight Boundary Changes I will be able to update you on discussions held with Elsenham and Henham Parish Council Chairs in relation to this Parish Council's response to the Boundary Commission following proposals from ECC to realign Stansted with the rural wards to the west of the district. These include Langley, Elmdon, Wendens Loft and Chrishall—all within the sphere of Saffron Walden influence and no connection with wards along the A120 corridor. If agreed, the impact of such a change would be significant in relation to issues such as HGV traffic up and down Grove Hill.

Annual Financial Report Fiscal Year 2023-2024

n last year's report, I raised concerns over inflation forecasts, at a time when the rate was at 10%.

Last September, we saw inflation had fallen to 6.7%, but energy costs were still very high, as we experienced when the library building's energy contract was renewed in September with an eye-watering increase of 415%. While we were happy to see inflation drop to 3.9% in November, our energy brokers were warning that there could be significant volatility in the markets caused by ongoing international events.

Street lights These are our largest energy users, and their contract is due to renew in September. We are therefore unable to predict what future costs might be by then. Even after converting most of our street lights to LED, and further energy savings gained through part-night lighting, it would be unwise to risk predicting their level without knowing what baseline cost they would refer to.

To ensure that we are protected against unpleasant surprises, the council is deferring the £10,000 per annum for cemetery expansion for one year, and has also decided to bring in the anticipated £12,000 income from investments in 2024-25, as reserve cover against such surprises.

I hasten to add at this point that should our energy costs not increase by as much as we fear, any surplus within that item on the budget will be paid back into the Cemetery earmarked reserve.

Other Energy Costs Now that TouchPoint are planning to expand their services in both the Day Centre and Crafton Green House, the energy bills are bound to rise significantly as the result of greater use. Consequently, we have had to increase the energy budgets for those buildings.

The Day Centre's energy contract is due for renewal this February, with that for Crafton Green House in December.

We are looking into an opportunity to reduce the tariff for the library building and to align all our energy contracts to a common date, to allow the budgeting of future annual costs to be more accurate. We should also gain the advantage of a possible extra discount based on a combined energy demand.

Below I list other essential additions to the budget for this coming year:

Street lights £15,000 A structural and safety survey highlighted that the lights along Chapel Hill, Lower Street and Station Road are nearing their time for replacement. We cannot ignore this warning, so we need to raise £45,000 over three years to have them all replaced in one go — which will be much cheaper than doing it in phases.

Trees £6,000 The summer heat of 2022 exposed how vulnerable our native species are to climate change. The budget for this year has already been spent and we need to re-establish an earmarked reserve, not least because our three-yearly inspection of all trees is due in 2024.

Play Areas £7,500 Most of our equipment has wooden supports as the main part of their structures, and which need replacing.

CCTV £4,500 The system's server is old and needs to be replaced. This system has proved helpful to the Police in their enquiries.

Repairs to Buildings £4,800 There is still some work to be done at Crafton Green.

Grass Cutting £3,000 To increase the cuts in the cemetery and churchyard to maintain them in a tidy condition.

And finally, a cautionary note: Uttlesford District Council is having to make cuts that clearly indicate the authority is in extreme financial difficulty. This is raising concerns over their competence. Take their recent consultation on parking charges which has proposed swingeing increases in both car parks in Stansted. This was based on out-ofdate information. This Parish Council is robustly arguing that this is just a debt reduction exercise with no thought for the potential detrimental effects on the businesses and residents of our own and surrounding communities. We are calling for a rethink on how the Lower Street and Crafton Green car parks are operated and pressing for a free 30-minute period.

The team took part in various training drills including Breathing Apparatus training, Ladder training and Road Traffic Collisions training; these are all areas the team continues to practise to ensure our response is guick and efficient when we are called out in an emergency. January and February have been a busy start to the year for the crew with the adverse weather meaning an influx of weather-related calls.

Our team now welcomes two Trainee Fire-fighters into our blue light family. FF Morrison and FF Carter have now passed the selection process to start as Trainee Fire-fighters. This selection process consists of a fitness test, maths and English test, aptitude tests, carrying fireground equipment, interview, medical assessment and DBS reference checks. FF Morrison and FF Carter have now completed their initial four-week drill night training on station and will now attend their two-week basic training course at our Service Training Centre under the eyes of our instructors. Then they will undergo a variety of assessments for six weeks before they can join the crew operationally as Trainee Fire-fighters. Everyone at our Fire Station wishes them the best and continues to support them throughout this initial stage of their careers.



The station had a very special visit from Elsenham Primary School on 1st February and the crew commented on how well-behaved all the children were. They were shown all the tools and parts that make up a fire engine and there was even a chance to test out their fire-fighting skills in the drill yard.
