

It is a Grade II* listed Tower Mill England which is also a Scheduled Ancient Monument. It has been restored and can turn by wind. The Stansted Millers are a group of volunteers who look after and look out for the mill. By the early 1940s the mill had become neglected and a campaign was launched to raise funds to preserve it for future generations. It was successful and the members of that first fundraising effort formed the group that has evolved into today's millers. The windmill is funded by a number of sources including the Parish Council, entrance fees, fundraising events and other grants and donations. All businesses are welcome to go to the windmill.

In March, Ed Fairey, Essex County Organiser for the National Garden Scheme (NGS) entertained the Garden Group with the history of the scheme. He described how it came into being, why it has always supported nursing charities, and how in its foundation year (1928), it raised over £8,000 for the Queen's Nursing Institute. Since 1980, when it became independent of the institute, it has benefited a wider range of health charities, including Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK, The Carers' Trust and Parkinson's UK. In May the Garden Group will continue its own support of the NGS with a visit to *The Mount* in Roydon which opens to visitors under the scheme.

Whether birds evolved flight to descend from the trees or to ascend from the ground will be the first question to be tackled at the Saturday Seminar on 11th May. Mike Howgate MSc FLS will discuss two controversies on the Evolution of Flight: How Birds Fly and The Dinosaur Bird Link. Sometimes known as Dr Dinosaur, Mike is the General Secretary and Chairman of the Amateur Geological Society of North London and is a member of the Linnean Society of London. In the first part of the seminar he will look at the evolution of flight; he will then discuss the prevalent theory amongst paleontologists that birds arose from a group of Therapod dinosaurs.

At the General Meeting on **Thursday 16th May** we look forward to enjoying a performance from singer, songwriter and musician, Saffron Summerfield. Her career has gone from live performance on TV and on John Peel's radio show to tours abroad, playing blues guitar alongside black musicians in the Mississippi cotton fields. Her performance entitled *Milton Keynes to Mississippi* will feature different styles of guitar from classical to blues.

NATURAL BEEKEEPING

In the recent past, there was a regular article on honeybees and pollinators in this publication, which was always relevant to what was happening around us. I would like to pick up the baton and carry on with this. I do natural beekeeping, and as such I not only follow what is happening with conventional farmed honeybees but also wild and feral honeybees - ones that were once kept but have now escaped. My first experience of beekeeping was helping with bees when I was ten years old on a farm in Africa. I then discovered a book and in it was a section on bee lining, the old system of hunting bees. So I started hunting bees, not for the kill, but for the adventure of the hunt, and the satisfaction of finding a wild colony. This hobby continued when I came to Stansted over a decade ago. I have kept bees in the conventional way, in framed box hives as well as Kenyan Top Bar hives, which were invented by Canadians for Africans.



The honeybees here have overwintered well. If you know of a wild hive, you will now see them flying with great enthusiasm as the days get longer and warmer, and plants get more flowers. If you had crocus out earlier this month you would have seen honeybees and bumble bees but few pollenating flies and wasps. That is because they are either eggs or still hibernating. As honeybees cannot hibernate, they need to take advantage as soon as possible to replenish their food supplies as we go into summer. Planting flowers for summer helps all pollinators, but if you can plant early and late flowering plants which are honeybee specific, this is where you can have the biggest impact on their success. If you would like to know which plants, my advice is to have a chat with Ed from Langthorns.



ASIAN HORNET ALERT

Public are urged to join fight against destructive species

- Local beekeepers are calling on the public to help spot and report yellow-legged Asian hornet sightings
- The destructive insect poses a huge threat to our pollinators, including honeybees
- More UK nests were discovered in 2023 than in the previous six years combined
- The annual estimated losses to the economy in the UK if the Asian hornet becomes established is estimated to be in excess of £30-45 million
- The Non-Native-Species Secretariat calculate that if the UK lost all its pollinators, not just honeybees, it would cost the economy £440 million per year or about 13% of the UK's income from farming.



A devastating recent history

A single Asian hornet queen imported in a consignment of pottery from China into France in 2004, has quickly spread across Western Europe. The hornet preys on a wide range of insect pollinators, disrupting the significant ecological role they provide. It has altered the biodiversity in France and can be a health risk to those who have allergies to hornet or wasp stings. In 2023, the number of hornets in the UK increased dramatically to 78 nests in 56 different locations, with Kent and the South East most predominantly affected. The Asian hornet is predominantly black with an orange segment on its abdomen and yellow lower legs.

The public are being urged to stay vigilant and encouraged to report any suspected sightings on the Asian Hornet Watch app, which is available to download on iOS and Android, using this QR code.



Reporting a possible sighting of an Asian hornet is quick, free, and easy and has the potential to make a huge difference in the fight against this invasive species.

I would like to tell readers about the Touchpoint Community Garden located at the back of the Crafton Green Centre. In the spring of 2021, when many of us had been locked down without access to outdoor space, some of the first Touchpoint volunteers got together with the mission of turning the unloved garden into a safe and welcoming space, which could be enjoyed by everyone in the community. After many bags of brambles were removed, volunteers planted flowers, formed beds, installed pergolas, along with raised planters and lots of seating, so that today the garden is often filled with families enjoying a cuppa from the café or with fitness classes using the space to exercise. Not everyone realises that the garden is meant for everyone, whether you want a place to let children run around after a trip to the library, or somewhere to catch a few rays during your lunch break.



You do not need to be using the Touchpoint café, fitness groups or food share to use the garden. There are bird feeders and a bug hotel, daffodils and tulips in spring; in summer the roses donated by Harkness give a lovely show along with annual bedding, much of which has been grown from seed or overwintered with friends. If you have not yet followed the ramp around the back of the building into the secret garden then you are in for a treat. It is a little sun trap with year-round seating; if you want to join the team of volunteers who look after the garden you would be made very welcome. It has been a lovely summer term so far. Here are some of the topics our children have been busy learning about.

Our smallest ones are continuing to learn about gardening; they have been digging, planting, sowing and watering. At foundation stage, we have renamed Fridays *Alfresco Fridays*

and highlights have been making fresh fruit smoothies and watching our plants develop. Your community needs you!

A very important public consultation about the future of night flights at Stansted Airport is currently underway. Manchester Airports Group (MAG) is pressing hard for the removal of all the restrictions, which have been in force for over 40 years, and currently allow a maximum of 13,700 Stansted night flights a year.

Responding to the consultation

The consultation for all the London airports is at www.gov.uk/government/consultations/night-flight-restrictions-heathrow-gatwick-and-stansted-airports-from-october-2025. You can email night.flights@dft.gov.uk or respond online. For Stansted, the Government is seeking views on the following three options:

- Remove controls on the number of night flights and permitted night noise level in October 2026
- Remove controls on the number of night flights in October 2025, whilst maintaining the controls on the permitted aggregate night noise level
- Government night controls to remain, as per Heathrow and Gatwick.

The first two options reflect lobbying activity by MAG and would mean more Stansted night flights. The final option is clearly preferable and it is important that local residents make their views known to the Department for Transport.

Other points you could make

Phase out night flights altogether; Stansted is currently allowed **13,700** night flights annually between 11.30pm-6.00am. By comparison, Heathrow, which is three times bigger than Stansted, is allowed just **5,800** night flights a year. Night flights are particularly intrusive in a largely rural area, with low background night noise levels. The aim should be to phase out all Stansted night flights, except emergencies, by 2030. Night flights are the biggest single cause of noise complaints by local residents. This consultation is an opportunity to make your voice heard. The closing date is 22nd May.

Spring has sprung at Human Roots





As the hours of daylight increase and the air becomes warmer, plants put out new shoots. Many insects emerge and birds pair up, preparing to breed. Since the 1960s the average minimum winter temperatures have been rising. Snowfall is now a rarity, and frosty days are much less frequent.

The current growing season is almost a month longer than 50 years ago. Primroses and bluebells are opening earlier. Researchers recorded that the first flowering of some 406 plant species has advanced by almost a month since 1986! This has a knock-on effect for the time of emergence of pollinating insects such as bees and butterflies; some are adapting to the warmer climate. Hedgerow, shrubs and trees are leafing and flowering earlier too, providing food for so many hungry caterpillars which are ideal food for nestlings.

Hedgerows are a valuable wildlife habitat, often providing a living framework to the landscape and our rural heritage. Long-established hedges grow in soil that is rich in stored carbon and older trees within the hedgerow also hold large stores of carbon.



A recent planning application to fell an ancient hedgerow oak close to Clavering led to a vigorous and successful campaign by residents to save it. This tree is now registered on the Ancient Tree Inventory, a record similar to the one for listed buildings.

There are more trees in local hedgerows that could be recorded; details of how to do this can be found on https://ati.woodlandtrust.org.uk/how-to-record. National Hedgerow Week organised by the Tree Council runs from 6th to 12th May and is timed to showcase hedgerows resplendent with fresh new growth and full of wildlife. Please enjoy one or more of the many walks listed on the Society's website and consider recording some of our wonderful old trees.



AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

Spring has arrived and with it comes a host of changes in the nature reserve. We say goodbye to some bird species such as redpolls, siskins and redwings that have spent the winter here, but as they head north to their breeding grounds, we welcome back the summer visitors who join the full-time residents singing to establish territories and find a mate. Chiff chaff and blackcap are two arrivals that you will hear but the loudest bird in the wood is still the song thrush which can be heard singing well before you enter the wood. If you want help identifying birds from their song then I recommend the Merlin Bird ID App for your phone. It is free and generally very good. One species of note that has arrived for the first time in the reserve is the ring-necked parakeet. An introduced species, this has been spreading since the 1970s; I have seen them flying over Stansted recently but this is the first time I have seen a pair in the Reserve.

The car park repairs have been completed; my thanks to the volunteer group and to Essex Highways and Eurovia who supplied the road scrapings. With the amount of recent



rainfall it is unsurprising that all the permanent and temporary ponds are currently full. Much of the Reserve has a wetland feel with water on both sides of the boardwalks. This harks back to the origins of the reserve which was originally a wildlife park focused primarily on wetland birds.

It was advertised as the largest private bird sanctuary in Britain and had over 100 species including

flamingos. Entry was five shillings for adults. It would be interesting to hear from any residents who visited the park back then.

IN THE GARDEN

One of the Royal Horticultural Society's missions is to inspire children and young adults to garden. They state: Gardening is a healthy and inexpensive way for children to learn and have fun at home, school or the allotment. Research suggests children perform better at school if they are involved with gardening and many will develop a greater interest in healthy eating if they get to grow their own veg. Last month we wrote about growing potatoes, so why not try beans as well? Both runner beans and French beans are well worth the effort. Choose a spot that has a good amount of daily sunshine where the soil is not acid; an area that has had well-rotted manure or compost added is ideal. Like potatoes, beans can also be grown in large pots in multi-purpose compost.



The easiest method of planting is to wait until late May, or early June when the seeds can be planted directly into the ground or into 50cm pots. Plant each next to a cane which can be erected in a wigwam fashion in a pot or restricted area. Runner beans need canes 240cm long whereas 120cm canes are sufficient for French beans. Gently tie the plants into the canes to encourage them to climb and pinch out the tip when they reach the top of the cane. Water regularly, especially in dry weather and give an occasional feed. Make sure you harvest the beans when they are young; this is when they are at their best. The bonus is that sweet peas can be grown in the same way. Put three seeds around each cane and pinch out the tip of each plant when 15cms high to encourage side shoots. Keep picking the flowers to encourage more to follow.

Welcome to our article on what it is like to be an on-call fire-fighter in this beautiful corner of Essex. All our team are incredibly proud to serve the local community. It has been a busy time for the station with the team responding to a variety of calls throughout March. These included water rescue incidents due to the consistent downpours, road traffic collisions, and the most notable which was the fire at Shire Hill in Saffron Walden. This incident was a large-scale warehouse on fire and at its height eight Essex pumping appliances, one aerial ladder platform and an incident command unit were present with over 40 fire-fighters battling it. The Stansted team attended this fire throughout the day, and after a rotation of fresh crew, returned at night to ensure the job was done and safe for the surrounding homes and public.



The crew have also been training hard and continue to support the development of two trainee fire-fighters who recently joined the team and completed their basic twoweek training course. They are now continuing their development with us with subjects like ladder climbs, pumping, casualty care and roadway procedures, before starting a whole host of other subjects. The team have been really busy with visits to the station. We have had three visits: cubs, brownies and a local group, where the team gives a fire safety talk and video, then show and tell around the fire appliance. As always, the evening finishes with some target practice with one of our hose reels in the yard which everyone seems to enjoy. THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

When I was a child I had some very strange views about God, mainly through a misunderstanding of the creed which we used to recite at school. Jesus I was okay with, as we learnt about the stories of how he welcomed children; but God I pictured as a big right hand ready to point out all my faults: who sitteth at the right hand of the Father (Mark 16 v 19)! and as for the Holy Ghost, well I was just plain scared as who wants to meet a ghost? Over the years, my understanding has matured. I now think of God's hands as cradling me as a beloved child of God, and the Holy Spirit, as the third person of the trinity, is the one who guides, comforts and sustains me. 

GROVE HILL ISSUES

Reports from two residents

Since July 2023, we have had a blocked and overflowing drain directly outside my house. It is clean water; such a waste. It flows constantly along the road, carrying broken material from the road surface, creating potholes, leaving debris over the pavement and filling the gutters. The traffic passing splashes pedestrians and any large vehicles splash the houses and businesses lining lower Grove Hill and Lower Street. The Cork House is suffering from water ingress which is damaging the structure of the listed building. We have contacted Cllr Tom Cunningham who has now taken over the highways portfolio at Essex County Council. He said he would look into matters. Workers cleaned the drains in the second week of January; they advised us that there was tarmac blocking the drain and this would keep happening until the tarmac was removed. After three dry weeks, it rained again and the drain blocked straight away. I reported this to Cllr Cunningham who advised that clearing the drain of the tarmac was not a priority. We are dismayed at this declaration. There is water flowing 24 hours a day from this blocked drain, come rain or shine, and the traffic (especially HGVs) continue to make the situation worse.



Another resident has reached out to Kemi Badenoch for help with the ongoing HGV problem on the village roads. Part of his email to Kemi: Please can you intervene and help resolve the serious issues that residents of Stansted Mountfitchet have been facing day in day out for years. Over two years ago, a scheme was promised to rid the village of the dangerous HGV problem. This has stalled! You did come to the village yourself to endorse and congratulate the scheme and those involved; we need your intervention again to get this moving again and over the line. Residents are continually chasing for updates from councillors, with no response.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

...with news of a government review of night flights at Stansted, this year's gardening competitions, a stock take of the village's play equipment, and the start of our efforts to create a more biodiverse village

An important public consultation is under way that could see a significant increase in night flights over the village in the near future. We would encourage all residents and community groups to take part in the consultation before it ends on 22nd May 2024.

Public Consultation: Night Flights at Stansted Airport 2024

There have been controls at Stansted in some shape or form since 1978. Every three and five years the Department for Transport (DfT) decides how restrictions on night flights will work. Before they do so, they conduct a public consultation. Their latest one has now started and seeks your views on their draft Noise Action Plan 2024-2028. Your comments will play a part in how the government will manage night flights at Stansted from October 2025 until October 2028. The consultation lays out three alternative proposals:

Option 1 Removing restrictions on the number of Stansted night flights and the permitted aggregate night noise level* in October 2026.

Option 2 Removing controls on the number of Stansted night flights in October 2025, whilst maintaining the controls on the permitted aggregate night noise level.

Option 3 Keeping the existing night control regime in place

The night flight regimes are also under review at Heathrow and Gatwick. However, only at Stansted are significant changes to the status quo proposed. Below is a table detailing how many night flights at Stansted are permitted annually now.

Airport	Season	Movement (flight) limit	Noise Quota Count
Stansted	Winter	5,600	3,310
Stansted	Summer	8,100	4,650

*Quota Count This refers to a defined annual limit on flights deemed to be particularly noise polluting that can take off or land at night time hours. The aggregate noise level refers to a threshold that nightflights cannot that exceed

It is Option 3 for us!

In April our Parish Councillors met to settle on a position on night flights. They voted unanimously for Option 3. Parish Councillors acknowledged the airport brings employment and business to Stansted but also believed it unwise to loosen regulations until proof is in hand night flights are safer than feared. That evidence may come in 2025 when an important study on the health impacts of night flights is to be published. Until then, SMPC's position remains unchanged from when we submitted comments in September 2023 to the Department for Transport. Back then we called for action on night flights:

- A ban on the noisiest aircraft day or night as proposed by the government in 2021 within five years
- A clear commitment to reduce each year for the next five years the number of households...adversely affected by aircraft noise
- To publish quantified measurable noise reduction targets with timescales
- Engage with the local community to discuss the feasibility of reducing night flights

Night flights — What's the problem, anyway?

Flying planes over urban areas at night has a long association with negative health outcomes. They can affect sleep patterns, cause hypertension and raise the risk of coronary heart disease, strokes and cancer. The government acknowledges that this is the case. That is why restrictions on night flights exist. They hope a study, the Aviation Night Noise Effects report to be published in 2025, will provide clarity on the link between aviation noise and sleep disturbance.

How are night flights controlled in the UK?

The airports at Gatwick, Heathrow and Stansted face two sets of restrictions for night flights: movement and noise quota limits. Movement limits are a cap on the total number of flights over the course of a year that airports can schedule from 11.30pm to 5.59am -13,700 in the case of Stansted. The noise quota means these airports must not exceed limits on the overall noisiness of night flights. Stansted also faces a further restriction following a planning decision made by Uttlesford District Council in 2021. In granting the airport's owners permission to expand passenger capacity, the local authority imposed a night noise limit from 11pm to 7am.

Why are the government considering changes?

The reasoning behind Option 1 and Option 2 is that Uttlesford's noise limit represents a "material change" to the existing night flight regime, according to the DfT which has responsibility for setting restrictions. The Department takes the view that local authorities, by being closer to communities affected by night flights, are in a better position to set conditions on airport operators. Essentially the government is re-assessing its own position as regulator. Are nationally imposed limits required at Stansted if similar ones have now been set locally? The DfT says a balance must be struck, too, between the commercial interests of the airline industry and the concerns of local communities affected by night flights. Furthermore, they question that if jet engines are now less noise polluting, cannot limits be eased?

How would an easing of limits affect our village?

It is the Parish Council's position restrictions should remain in place, in the absence of convincing evidence night flights are safer than current evidence suggests. The Manchester Airport Group, which run Stansted Airport, already push the boundaries of the existing regulations. For example, last summer they were granted 1,200 dispensations to exceed night flight limits (by comparison Heathrow, the UK's largest airport, were granted just 462). So if anything MAG need to be reigned in on this front. We don't believe Stansted Airport is the bogeyman. It brings jobs and business to our community and is a genorous backer of local organisations. Still, more night flights have the potential to worsen the health of residents. That's why we back a continuing of the existing night flight regime.

ingate represents the most serious operational failure in Uttlesford's history. The failure to have the appropriate licence has cost residents dear. Refuse collection is the most visible service that the District Council provides. It is also a universal service. This failure should never have happened.

It was obvious to me and Cllr Alan Dean that all was not well with the refuse service. This was why I asked the head of the service to come before the Scrutiny Committee in November 2023 to present a report. It was clear that the service was under enormous pressure with vehicles regularly breaking down. Several key managers had abruptly left the service. Complacency had ruled the day.

Bingate: Where are we now?

- Replacement of three new refuse vehicles at a cost of £885k in the next financial year
- An additional round to be established at a cost of £137k
- The green waste charge, which was due to be increased by £10, to be frozen. For those renewing they will get 13 months instead of 12 months. A small gesture in recompense of the problems users have endured.
- The need to use vehicles from Braintree Council and Widdington Waste to collect the rubbish Uttlesford should have been collecting comes at a cost to residents. This is estimated at up to £90k

Despite now having a licence, it is clear that there are still operational problems with areas of the district having uncollected waste. A Task and Finish group has been established by the Scrutiny Committee to find out how things went wrong and what can be done so this is never repeated. I am a member of this group.

from six counties — Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, Essex, Hertfordshire, Suffolk and Norfolk — compete for prizes as they are awarded marks for Horticultural Achievement, Environmental Responsibility and Community Participation.

Stansted Mountfitchet is a relative newbie having only participated in the AiB since 2022. One of the attractions of the competition is being able to shout about so many aspects of our amazing community. Brilliant organisations like TouchPoint, Let's Talk Stansted, Human Roots, and the Stansted Mountpickers, to Twinning activities and our historical assets like our Grade II* listed Windmill all feature in the portfolio put before the competition judges ahead of their visit in July.

SMPC allocates a large slice of their budget to maintain the village's open spaces — £66,800 on gardening and grass cutting alone. > PLAYGROUND REVIEW A working group has been established to evaluate the condition of play equipment around Stansted. SMPC manages over 9 play areas and has made a significant investment in updating play equipment in recent years. The Mountfitchet Green and Wilkins Crescent are two areas that have benefitted from major refits. The Parish Council commits to mend and replace play kit identified as in need of attention in an independent annual audit of our play areas. Doing so can be a costly business. Something like a swing can cost £2,600 to replace. A larger piece of kit, like the tree house at the Recreation Ground, could put a six-figure dent in the Parish Council budget. The Working Group's review will allow us to prioritise repairs and decide where money is best spent. Would it be better to decommission an under used play area to invest in a popular, but expensive, piece of play equipment? The working group will help Parish Councillors to make an informed decision on choices like these when it reports back to the Open Spaces committee this summer.

➤ WILDFLOWER SEEDING The Parish Council will take their first tentative steps into the world of wildflower seeding in May. SMPC gardening contractors will dig up ground around the High Lane knight sign to lay low-growth turf. Meanwhile, on the junctions of Pennington Lane and Rainsford Road a wildflower mix of perennials and annuals will be sown. In time both areas should see a more bio-diverse habitat prosper. A £2,112 grant from Uttlesford District Council's Zero Carbon Communities Fund will contribute towards this project.



SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

Funding from Uttlesford District Council

Both Sustainable Stansted and Stansted Parish Council have



submitted successful bids to Uttlesford's Zero Carbon Communities Fund, enabling us to continue our work together in promoting a greener and more sustainable community. Our grant will be used for two projects:

- Providing residents with tailored information to help them make their homes more energy efficient. This will include the purchase of two thermal imaging cameras which can be used by members of the community who want to see where their homes are losing most heat
- A biodiversity study to map the animals, plants, and habitats we are lucky to enjoy in Stansted. Understanding more about our local area will allow us to know where to focus our efforts to protect and improve our natural environment. We will be working with a local ecologist and encouraging Stansted's residents to be involved in this exciting project.

The Parish Council's grant will be used:

- To plant meadow flowers on the triangle of land where High Lane meets the B1383 and on the verges in Pennington Lane at the entrance to Rainsford Road. Wild flowers provide important support to insects and other pollinators
- For rewilding projects (supporting a return to a more natural state that encourages wildlife), starting with the sustainable drainage area at the rear of Forest Hall Park. Depending on its success and taking into consideration the results of the biodiversity study, this programme will be extended in coming years.

This month's meeting was well attended, with over 40 members present. I confess I was a little dubious about the subject matter, *Horsehair Tales*, until realising that the speaker was John Boyd; his knowledge on the technical and composition of fabrics is extensive, and his ability to explain and show examples of the work masterful. I had no idea that horsehair was still being used in fabric construction and

assumed that this was from a bygone era, rather like the horse itself.

John started by giving a brief history and said that the hair used in weaving is from the tail of the horse which, over its normal lifetime, will grow six or seven tails of approximately 70cm in length; the hair can be dyed, like human hair. In the early 1830s it was a cottage industry and children as young as eight years old were employed to remove each single hair from the tail and pass it to the weaver. As the years passed, machines were designed to do this laborious job. The original fabrics had many uses: the crinoline under skirts for ladies, horsehair screens, and as seat covers for railway coaches.



Today there is a constant demand for the fabrics in the restoration of antique furniture, curtains and from stately homes and museums. However, they are expensive to produce and you can expect to pay about £150 per metre. John allowed us to examine various examples of the fabrics and some horse tails. The next meeting, which is also our AGM, will be on **Thursday 2nd May** at 7.30pm in the Quaker Meeting House.

BRAIN TRAINING

How your socks will help your shoulders

Shoulders in a muddle cause more problems than just pain, weakness and disappointing sporting performance. Unfortunately, lifestyle encourages shoulders to get into a complete huddle; this leads to constant faulty movement, which compounds the problems. This is where our socks come to our rescue.

Either a pair of chunky socks or hand towels will do the job.

- Ball up the socks or roll the towels into medium sized sausages; let us call them Pitstops
- 2. Tuck the socks or sausages high into the back of your armpits
- Let your shoulders sink and roll slightly backwards, so you are resting your armpits on your Pitstops
- 4. Allow yourself to lengthen through the spine. Tight shoulders make good posture impossible.



Do this when minimal movement of the upper arm bone is needed, for example working at a desk or knitting. The prime muscles to be engaged are the serratus anterior and the lower trapezius. Both these flatten the shoulder

blades onto the back and discourage the pesky shoulder elevators from working; the shoulder blades will sink and your armpits widen. The sensation of relaxing the shoulders will become familiar with regular practise and so will have great carry over.

Brain benefits include much better breathing, improving the critical oxygen:carbon dioxide balance, better head position leading to better blood flow to the brain and clearer thinking. Also arms properly connected to the torso means we can be appropriately strong and your core stands a chance of engaging as it should, all from your socks! I do realise this is far from a complete cure, but it is a good squeeze in the right direction.
