We welcomed Mark Ratcliff to our October meeting and he talked to us about *POW Camp 116 Hatfield Heath*. After initial allied victories starting in North Africa, Italian and German prisoners needed to be kept somewhere. During this period there were between 450 and 1026 Prisoner of War (POW) camps. At the peak there were over 400,000 POWs.

Camp 116 was commissioned in 1943 and grew from the initial 500 prisoners until the end of the war when the number was nearing 1000. Most were involved in agriculture and building work. Camp life was rather open. Mark described a football match between the camp and the local Hatfield Heath FC in 1946. The camp inmates won 11-0. After the war, the prisoners were held there until they could be repatriated back home. There was an escape of one inmate, but he was recaptured nearby at Harlow Station. Perhaps he, like others, were frustrated at the delay in going home. Eventually the camp was closed but a few of the former POWs had formed local attachments and never left. The camp was taken over as housing for local workers and builders, but eventually fell into disrepair. There are current plans for the future of the site, but this is still to be finalised. This was a fascinating insight into an interesting local piece of wartime history.

NATURAL BEEKEEPING

My Honeybees

It was a slow start to the year, we did not have much of a summer and there was an early start to the cold season. In spite of everything, all my bees have been doing exceptionally well. There has been no veroa (a little parasite) or other diseases. There have been few hornets or wasps; both these bugs predate on honeybees. We do seem to have been overrun with slugs this year. Strangely enough, they have even been trying to get into some of the hives. So all is good with the established hives and all the new colonies. So I am really very optimistic for a great winter regardless of how cold it might get, or how long it will go into next year, as the drones are all gone and the honey levels are growing very well for winter.



Beehive Evolution

People used skeps in Europe for a very long time but the Victorians wanted to make beekeeping more productive and less labour intensive. Here they were spectacularly successful. They came up with the framed boxed beehive that we know today. Things have not changed for well over a century! However it did not happen overnight. To understand why framed box beehives work so well at producing honey we need to look at some of the things beekeepers noticed; how they then used these observations to the farmers' advantage but not always to the bees' advantage. One of the biggest people to expedite what was then modern beekeeping was the Queen's Consort, Prince Albert, who was a supporter of all things new. Until next time ...

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

One of the best ways to enjoy our wonderful area is on foot, so our website has always included a selection of walks. They have generally been focused on footpaths but last winter's exceptional rain made many paths difficult. This prompted us to develop a new series of walking routes that do not use any footpaths, such as the lane in Little Hadham shown below. We hope our *Quiet Lane Walks* will appeal to anyone who does not like cleaning boots and perhaps to families, people with mobility problems or less-energetic cyclists.



Our website now has almost 40 *Quiet Lane Walks* in addition to over 100 established routes. You can find a route that suits you by either scanning the lists of walks or by going to a specific parish introduction to see which route numbers go there; the *Quiet Lane Walks* start with the number 3. We have put together suitable routes that visit 41 of our hundred parishes but we would welcome suggestions for more. Just email a simple route outline to us and we will put together a full route description.

The new routes range in distance from 1 mile to 12 miles and pass through typical Hundred Parishes territory: lovely villages and attractive countryside, often with an inviting café or pub. Route descriptions can be freely downloaded from our website and printed. The descriptions should ensure that nobody gets lost and they include snippets of information about places along the way.





We were very pleased to receive confirmation that the Stansted Airport Community Fund will be donating £5,000 towards the cost of repointing the brick work on the Mill. This, along with a very generous donation of £1,000 from The Link team, means we are just another £5,000 short of the £55,000 we need to fund the project.

As the Mill is a Scheduled Monument, any repairs need consent from the Department for Culture, Media and Sport through Historic England, which acts as the Ministry's agent in such matters. They made it a condition that before they granted permission for the repointing to start, we enabled a sample of the original mortar from the inner structure of the walls to be tested, at a cost of £375. We now have a detailed analysis of the mortar which our contractor is able to duplicate. We are very hopeful that the work can start imminently and the Mill will soon be swathed in scaffolding. It is a huge relief that, all being well, the work will be completed before we are hit by winter weather.



Repairs underway

This is a once-in-a-generation project which should ensure we get no further water penetration, and the basic structure of the Mill will be safe for a long time. The sails, however, have a shorter life span; we need to keep up our fundraising efforts so that they can be replaced when our millwright deems they have come to the end of their safe working life.

Our next fundraising event is *Santa at the Mill* on **Saturday 7**th **December**. There will be full details in the December issue of The Link but also look out for posts on our website, our Facebook page www.facebook.com/Stansted.Windmill and on the village notice boards.

IN THE GARDEN

November in our region brings shorter days and cooler temperatures making it a time to prepare the garden for winter while continuing to enjoy the remaining seasonal tasks. For flower beds, this is still a good time to plant spring flowering bulbs such as daffodils, tulips and crocuses. Ensure bulbs are planted in well-drained soil, around two to three times their depth to protect them from frost. It is also a good time to cut back perennials that have finished flowering. However, leaving some seed heads, like those of sedum or echinacea, can provide food for birds and add winter interest. Tender plants, such as dahlias and cannas, should be lifted and stored in a frost-free location, while more resilient plants may benefit from a protective mulch.



For vegetable growers, November is ideal for planting garlic and broad beans, which will establish over the winter. Hardy varieties of peas can also be sown now. This is also the time to harvest the last of your root vegetables such as parsnips, carrots and beetroots. Additionally, clearing away any dead plant material from the vegetable beds will help prevent pests and diseases from overwintering. If you have a greenhouse or cold frame, use it to protect young plants or sow winter salads like mizuna or lamb's lettuce, which thrive in cooler weather. Covering your garden soil with compost or mulch will enrich it, improve structure, and suppress weeds over winter. Lastly, remember to check stored fruits and vegetables regularly for signs of rot and take time to ensure garden tools are cleaned and stored for the season ahead.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

The glorious dead is a phrase that first came into prominence when it was chosen as the inscription on the Cenotaph in London in 1920. It is in many ways a puzzling expression. Glory connotes resplendence and great beauty; how can we square it with the ugliness of war? The same question might also be asked of Christ's cross. In the cross of Christ I glory, towering over the wrecks of time, runs the old hymn. What could possibly be glorious about the horror and degradation of crucifixion?

Well, *glory* always reveals or shows something. Glory takes the form of display, and draws its power from being witnessed. The glory of the cross is not the conventional glory of the world, but shining through Christ's agony is God's sacrificial, self-revealing love, made manifest for all the world to see. A similar, strange glory belongs to the dead whom we commemorate on Remembrance Sunday. Through the horror of war, the glorious ideals of sacrifice and service are made apparent to us. They are ideals which we uphold, and which involve us, at our acts of commemoration.

Remembrance Sunday takes place in the shadow of the cross; from a Christian perspective, it is a reduplication of Good Friday, only with Christ's death refracted through the sacrifice of servicemen and women, past and present. The ultimate glory of our dead is that they are witnesses to the crucified Christ, whose suffering brings life to the world, and gives us the victory.

Crucial Community Issues

This autumn we have written on three issues affecting our community, now and in the future. In the interests of transparency, we provide a précis of our response to Essex County Council's report into HGV traffic in Stansted, along with a summary of our comments on the Regulation 19 draft Local Plan. We have also felt compelled to ask our local MP for their support to challenge the government's withdrawal of winter fuel payments for pensioners.

SMPC Position: Grove Hill

SMPC to Essex County Council

Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council is challenging an Essex Highways 2024 report which claims that HGVs cannot be diverted away from Grove Hill. The Parish Council has asked to see the full report.

or in excess of 7 years Essex Highways has recognised the problem of HGVs in the lower part of Stansted Mountfi chet and notably the issue of Grove Hill. A way to resolve the problem was reached — to exclude HGVs (other than those serving the village) with Hall Road in Takeley

being identified as the alternati e route. Once legislation permitted, breaches by HGVs of the exclusion would be identified emotely and automati ally penalised. Throughout this period ECC has informed us:



- 1. It has pursued a consistent policy to resolve the problem of Grove Hill.
- 2. That in 2023 Traffic Orders were being prepared, ready to be advertised and, at that point, objections would be received and evaluated.

SMPC believes, if this is not correct, then the Grove Hill residents and Parish Council have been misled.

About Turn: Essex Highways 2024 Report

In August a two-page summary of a report by Essex County Council on Grove Hill was circulated to the SMPC. It concluded: "It is unlikely that any scheme looking to enforce an HGV restriction in Grove Hill is going to be feasible. The Parish Council feels that this is a clear indication that Essex Highways is reneging on its previous promises."

Essex Council Reasoning

- The alternative route through Takeley is ruled out on the grounds that Takeley already has a higher share of HGV traffic
- Essex has not taken up powers to enforce moving traffic offences while the Department of Transport has stalled on moving traffic enforcement roll-out
- Other options to reduce the impact of HGVs are discounted
- Implementing proposed solutions are too costly

The summary report is unconvincing in explaining the rationale and evidence for its turnaround.

SMPC Response to Report

The Parish Council's position statement notes Parsonage Road (Takeley), unlike Grove Hill, is purpose built to take heavy traffic flows with strategic lay-bys and properties set back from the carriageway. The Parish Council also take issue with traffic flow comparisons in the Highway's report between the two roads. These figures clearly show Essex has turned a blind eye to the predicament of the residents of Grove Hill. The ma er of costs is a "created concern" as none [in the report] are new and have never previously been highlighted for not pursuing the scheme to exclude HGVs from Grove Hill.

Minimum Measures

The Parish Council calls for Essex to commit to its longstanding policy to remove HGVs from the roads feeding the lower centre of Stansted. At a bare minimum:

- 1. Move back the top set of traffic lights on Grove Hill
- 2. Prevent red light jumping
- 3. Establish a 7.5T weight limit in both directions of Grove Hill
- 4. The footpath of Church Road must be widened.

Concluding Comments

The Essex Highways' report is a sham, without substance, and fails to acknowledge the suffering of the residents living on Grove Hill. The Parish Council does not accept the conclusions on the basis of the partial report.

SMPC Comments: Reg 19 Draft Local Plan

SMPC to Uttlesford District Council

1 Consultation has been absent or misleading. SMPC proposed the development of land east of High Lane should be replaced with a similar size development on Church Road, that was more sustainable and offered more community benefits. No response was received from the Local Plan Panel. The lead officer of which, in a meeting with us, said there would be no change to the land East of High Lane proposal. Consequently, the Church Road development was not pursued. But the Regulation 19 draft shows the dwellings at High Lane have been reduced from 140 to 55. Had this been raised in consultation then the outturn on the Church Road site might have been different, to the benefit of UDC and SMPC. The proposal to close High Lane as a through route was never made known. So there has been no consultatio with SMPC or with Essex Highways. This is not acceptable. The volume of traffic along Cambridge Road (B1383) and using Chapel Hill will show a significant increase. This impact will increase the problems on Chapel Hill and add to the back up of traffic t the junction with, and along, Lower Street.

2 Stansted's inadequate road infrastructure is being ignored. The construction of new developments in Stansted Mountfitchet and Elsenham will increase traffic volumes using Grove Hill and Lower Street. Both roads are already under severe pressure. UDC's transport study highlights the issues with a prediction of gridlock within 10 years. What discussions have been held with Essex Highways?

3 Currently, there is no bus service which connects Walpole Meadows, nor the land East of High Lane to the services in Lower Street or Station Road. Without regular bus services, it cannot be said that these developments meet the requirement of sustainable public transport. In terms of Cambridge Road, this is served by an hourly bus. Unless frequency is increased, or a regular service by the 7/7a introduced, the use of buses is unlikely to increase.

his year's Remembrance Service is on **Sunday, 10th November.** You can gather in the Memorial Gardens from 10.30am or the Crafton Green car park, from where a parade will pass down Chapel Hill to the war memorial. Service personnel from Carver Barracks will lead the procession and the service will be taken by Rev'd Helen Flack. Refreshments will be served afterwards in St John's Church Hall. Please note, traffic will be held in both directions along Chapel Hill from 10.40 to 10.50am. Drivers using the village roads at this time are asked to consider their speed and noise until the service has finished at around 11.30am, and ideally to find an alternative route before this time. Contact SMPC if you would like to join other community groups in laying a wreath at the service.



Village bus services also need to service the train station to provide joined up public transport.

4 Pennington Lane is identified as part of the active travel route to Cambridge Road shops and services and Bentfield Primary School. SMPC feels strongly Pennington Lane should be closed to vehicles other than for access.

5 Two sites have been allocated on Walpole Meadows for community facilities a 56-place early years and childcare facility and the second for unspecified community use. SMPC has two reservations. First, the land allocated appears to need significant work before it could be usable. Second, without a substantial financial commitment, it is unlikely that a community facility will happen. Taking into account the two Walpole Meadows developments, land east of High Lane, King Charles Drive and the High Lane developments already approved, there will be around 540 dwellings with no community facility.

6 The local plan should support the re-provision of a sustainable site for a small number of Almshouses.

Pensioner Poverty & Winter Fuel Payments

SMPC Chair to Kemi Badenoch MP

am writing on behalf of Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council to draw your a ention to the pressing issue of pensioner poverty across Stansted, particularly in light of the recent changes to Winter Fuel Payments.

The government has announced Winter Fuel Payments will now only be available to pensioners receiving Pension Credit or other means-tested benefits. Those pensioners who are eligible for Pension Credit but have not yet claimed it stand to lose the most. Claiming Pension Credit could not only help them retain the Winter Fuel Payment but also increase their overall income – in some cases, very significantly, particularly for pensioners who are ill or disabled.

Estim tes suggest that over 800,000 eligible pensioner households across the UK are not claiming Pension Credit, despite being entitled to it. This is often due to stigma,

lack of awareness, or cultural and language barriers. According to data from Policy in Practice, there are 661 pensioner households in Uttle ford alone that are missing out on a combined total of £1,534,400 in unclaimed benefits. Stansted undoubtedly has its share of pensioners a ected by this issue. We kindly ask for your support in exploring further ways we can work together to help our older residents. Raising awareness and encouraging

more pensioners to claim the benefits they are entitled to will be essential in ensuring that vulnerable pensioners are not left without the financial support they need to stay warm and healthy this winter. We would welcome the opportunity to discuss how we can collaborate to address this critical issue.

Residents for Uttlesford ruling administration at Uttlesford District Council (UDC) to produce a permanent solution by replacing the council's unsati factory flats and maisone es on the northern side of Manor Road in Stansted Mountfi chet. In our opinion, the accommodation, which was built immediately a er the end of World War 2, is seriously degraded, especially by water leaks seeping into the living areas from outside. This is causing unhealthy damp and mould to grow in the living areas of many of the properties

"We are working alongside some residents of Manor Road and owners of those properties bought from the district council, for whom UDC remains the superior landlord with responsibility for the fabric of the building. We are grateful for support from Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council in our quest to persuade UDC that the days of wasting tenants' and leaseholders' money on short-term but expensive patch-ups need to cease and instead for the buildings to be replaced by new homes fit for the 2020s."

District Cllr Alan Dean continues:

Our motion received unanimous support at the October council meeting

I was pleased to see a lot of familiar faces, as well as people I don't know, at Sustainable Stansted's Energysaving & Sustainability Open Day in St. Theresa's Church Hall in early October. Although my home already has solar panels for creating electricity and hot water, I know that the Deans have more to learn about energy efficiency and how to "save energy, save money (help) save our world and get a warmer, healthier home", to quote from the group's publicity leafl t.

UGLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The gardens of Easton Lodge were the subject of our September meeting, and we were given a beautifully illustrated tour of them by speaker Gary Matthews. He also introduced us to the Maynard family, owners of Easton Lodge Estate from the 1600s including Frances (known as Daisy) who inherited the estate in 1865. She grew up to be a great beauty and in 1881 married Lord Brooke. He later became Earl of Warwick and inherited Warwick Castle. Daisy became one of the great hostesses of her day and her weekend parties were the stuff of legend. She was a great supporter of Essex schools, particularly the Dunmow Elementary School. She allowed use of the Easton Lodge estate for rural studies. With HG Wells and others she formed the Dunmow and District Educational Fellowship summer school for teacher training. The grounds were used for tennis and recreation. She was President of the Fellowship until her death in 1938. Gary explained that Daisy commissioned Harold Peto to create the stunning formal gardens in 1902. During WWII Easton Lodge was used by the Army and Home Guard, and thousands of trees were felled to enable its use as an airfield. The gardens were sadly abandoned in 1950 but thanks to dedicated volunteers, they are being restored and are open to visitors on selected days from April to October. October was a busy month for the Trustee who is leading the planning for the restoration of the Italian Garden. We have photos of the sunken garden as it was completed: its stone faced parapets and walls, stone steps and paving. The picture below was taken in 1903! We restored the balustrade around the lilypond in 2021 and have now built up the Trust's funds again, so we can support more match funding. There are lots of potential options for the next project. It will be challenging work for specialists, so will take a while, but it is exciting to be on the case again and we will report on progress.



With the gates closed and no visitors until the snowdrop season in February, volunteers' efforts will be to put the Gardens to bed for the winter as well as seasonal planting. They will be lifting the dahlias in order to look after any tubers which survived the insatiable slugs and snails in the early summer. It will be a chance for a stocktake, ready for a big revamping of the dahlia border next year.

Damage from local deer continues to be significant, so we will need to work on making new tree plantings even more secure. We have other big winter projects in mind too, including further work to extend the Japanese style garden, improvements to the entrance area and erecting a greenhouse to enable us to propagate from our plants.

One of the Trust's volunteers provides talks to local groups about the history of Easton Lodge, the Countess of Warwick and the Gardens. BRAIN TRAINING

Toe winking

There is much research going on into fall prevention and it seems that weak feet increase risk of falling. Also, when running, we should be taking off from a strong and straight big toe. The simplest test to gauge relevant foot strength, specifically the toe flexors, is called the *Wink Sign*. Stand in bare feet, with them hip width apart and straight. Now lean forwards a bit, pressing the pads of the toes (not the tips) into the floor. You should see a crease appearing just below the toenails. It is clearest across the 2nd 3rd and 4th toes but can be felt clearly on the big toes. The accompanying photo shows five nicely winking toes!



Pressing the toes like this activates the four layers of muscles within the foot itself, so strengthening the arch. Big toes bending towards the little toes will make the wink sign more difficult and lead to greater chance of falling and rubbish running. It is very easy to get a toe spacer, which will encourage the big toe to straighten up again, but along with this you also

need to strengthen a muscle called the Abductor Hallucis, which runs from the foot end of the big toe to the heel. As this muscle contracts, that too helps the arch to lift and strengthen. Even if you have had a bunion operation, it is very wise to strengthen this muscle to avoid the bunion returning. A nice exercise to do is to rock forwards, with your body stiff like a board and have your toes wink. Then return to neutral stance. Do not overdo the pressure with the pads of the toes otherwise you may encourage an annoying case of plantar fasciitis.

AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

The work parties have continued with the mowing of the meadow areas, although the frequent rain in late September and early October has played havoc with our schedule and delayed us moving on to the other reserves such as Rushy Mead in Bishop's Stortford. We have also been pollarding some willow trees that were starting to crowd over one end of the top pond, creating too much shade. We will be doing further tree work on the banks of the two lower ponds, both of which would benefit from some increased daylight.



Whilst working on the ponds we were pleased to note the presence of a grey wagtail. With its constantly bobbing tail and yellow under tail and belly it was a real delight to watch it hunting for insects around the pond margins. The grey wagtail was a red list species (birds that are at risk of extinction and require immediate action) until quite recently. However, in a rare improvement of fortunes for our birds it has recently been moved to the amber list (birds of conservation concern but not critically endangered). This led me to enquire whether we had any breeding birds in the reserve that were now on the red list. The answer is yes, the mistle thrush. It seems that the decline in this species is not fully understood but I am happy to report that our pair at Aubrey Buxton seem to be doing OK. This year they raised two broods.


