#### Celebrating Four Years of Let's Talk, Stansted!

The organisation was set up in 2020 at the height of the Covid pandemic. Tragically, in a very short space of time, our village lost three of its residents to suicide. A group of people came together with one single aim: to ensure that we do everything we can to let people know that they are not alone. With the support of MIND in West Essex we have trained over 40 residents as registered *Mental Health First Aiders*, providing them with the confidence to assist people. We hold regular events and support activities in and around the village to promote awareness, help break down the stigma surrounding mental health and encourage people to talk. These include socials, veg shed, open water swimming community, local men's football team, walking group and yoga and mindfulness classes.

September marks the 11<sup>th</sup> World Suicide Prevention Day and we embrace the theme of *Changing the Narrative on Suicide* with an associated call to action of *Start the Conversation*. Changing the narrative aims to inspire individuals, communities, organisations and governments to engage in open discussions about suicide and suicidal behaviour. By initiating these vital conversations, we create better cultures of understanding and support. In October we will be hosting our 4<sup>th</sup> annual Wellbeing Festival on **Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> October** in St John's Church and Hall. It is a great way to meet all kinds of wellbeing organisations and local groups as well as an opportunity to treat yourself to some wonderful products and gifts. #### DAVID HAWKES 21st February 1943-28th July 2024



David was born in Woodford Green and his sister arrived five years later. As he grew up he developed good practical skills and when he left school at 15 he joined a local firm where he served a five-year carpentry apprenticeship. During this time he worked on the building of Harlow Town Station and this is where we met. We married in 1966 and first lived in Brewery Lane, moving to Bentfield Road in 1980.

David was a keen fisherman and a founder member of the Stansted Angling Society where he served as treasurer for some years and was a member until we moved away from Stansted. He loved the countryside, and together with our daughters Zoe and Karen, we enjoyed holidays to many lovely locations with our touring caravan. One of David's hobbies was photography and he was pleased when his photo of a Hatfield Forest snow scene was chosen for the *Stop Stansted Expansion* Christmas card one year.

In 2014 David and I moved to Langdon Hills, South Essex to be closer to our family. It was a difficult but sensible decision to leave Stansted as David had undergone major surgery for prostate cancer and had developed other health problems. At our new home he was determined to keep busy in his workshop. He raised funds for the local hospice by making and selling the wooden toys he made. In 2022 David was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer. He had been undergoing treatment when he succumbed to pneumonia. He was a much-loved husband, father and grandfather to our four grandchildren.

#### **AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE**

Summer is a quieter time for the volunteer group as we leave nature to its own devices before we start again in autumn with the cutting of the meadows. However, one job that we do undertake is control of the Himalayan Balsam. This plant can grow to over head height and is able to tolerate low light levels allowing it to grow in the more shaded and less accessible areas of the reserve. It produces pink flowers that add a splash of colour and are a good source of nectar for insects such as bees which can penetrate the helmet shaped flowers. The problem is that it grows quickly and shades out native species. Each plant can produce up to 800 seeds and has the amazing ability to shoot these seeds up to seven meters. If left unchecked it would dominate significant areas of the reserve.

As we do not use chemical or biological controls in the reserve the only solution is to pull up each plant before it sets seed. In this way we are gradually reducing the numbers of this plant in the reserve, even if a lack of control on neighbouring properties means that we are unlikely to ever completely eradicate it. I must thank the volunteers who turn out every year to help with this task. Now that the woods are quieter it is a good time to appreciate the meadow areas, which on a sunny afternoon are busy with bees, butterflies, dragonflies and other insects.


## THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Hundred Parishes encompasses an exceptional number of ancient buildings. More than 6,000 are listed - they appear on the National Heritage List for England. Each property listing includes a description and many of these are from the guide books produced by one exceptional man, Nikolaus Pevsner, an architectural historian. He was born in 1902 in Leipzig, Germany, the son of a Russian-Jewish fur merchant. In 1933 he moved to England and settled in Hampshire. Following the outbreak of WWII, he was taken to an internment camp but was released three months later

Work on his series of architectural guide books, *The Buildings of England*, began in 1945. The edition covering the whole of Hertfordshire was published in 1953; Essex and Cambridgeshire followed in 1954. Most of the ancient architecture in The Hundred Parishes is mentioned by Pevsner in these three editions, either in general terms or in great detail. Here is one local example in the Essex edition: *Manuden has a specially pretty, short village street with timber framed cottages with oversailing upper floors near the church and a small assortment of Georgian houses a little further west.* 

In Cambridgeshire, he described the Norman interior of Ickleton's parish church as having *few equals in the country*. In Hertfordshire, the 17<sup>th</sup> century almshouses in Buntingford were described by Pevsner as *the stateliest alms houses in the county*. Pevsner was granted British citizenship in



1946, appointed CBE in 1953 and knighted in 1969 for services to art and architecture. In total, he was responsible for 46 county-wide guides. He died in Hampstead in 1983.

Our website has more than 100 walk routes that can be freely downloaded. The route descriptions draw attention to some of the listed buildings that are on these walks.



#### IN THE GARDEN

Hopefully by now everyone has managed to pick some garden vegetables. It has been a difficult growing season with slugs and snails in abundance. Many gardeners have come up with various ways of dealing with them: crushed baked eggshells, coffee grains, beer traps, garlic water spray, perlite and vermiculite. A good ecosystem is the only answer. However, in the past 50 years, the UK has seen a 41% decline in our wildlife, with farmland birds down 54%, and significant losses in insects and mammals due to habitat loss, agriculture, urbanisation and climate change, underscoring the need for urgent conservation efforts. What can we, as gardeners, do to help?



Firstly, planting native species is crucial. A mixed hedgerow of hawthorn, blackthorn, guelder rose, dog rose, honey-suckle, hazel and holly not only looks beautiful but can provide food and habitat for local insects, birds and mammals. Additionally, incorporating a mix of flowers, shrubs and trees within the garden can create a layered environment, offering shelter and nesting sites for different species. Water is another vital element. Installing a small pond or birdbath can attract amphibians, birds, and insects. Ensure that ponds have gently sloping sides to allow creatures easy access and exit. Adding aquatic plants can further enhance the habitat, providing cover and breeding sites.

Creating diverse microhabitats within the garden is also beneficial. Leave some areas wild with log piles, rockeries, and leaf litter, which offer homes for invertebrates, small mammals and reptiles. Bird feeders and nesting boxes can support avian visitors, especially during winter months.

Finally, avoid using pesticides and chemicals, which can harm wildlife. Opt for organic gardening methods to maintain a healthy and thriving ecosystem. By making these simple changes, gardeners can transform their outdoor spaces into havens for wildlife, enjoying the beauty and benefits of a vibrant, natural garden.

#### HATFIELD FOREST

September is a great time to visit the Forest, go for a walk and enjoy the peaceful surroundings. The school holidays are over but summer and sunshine are still with us. The variety of habitats here attract many birds. Resident species include small woodland birds such as linnets and the ducks on the lake. Look out for moorhen, robin, goldcrest, greenfinch, yellowhammer, reed warbler, mute swan, grebe and green woodpecker. Watch out overhead for buzzards and red kites soaring over the open areas, hunting for prey.

You may spot one of our beautiful butterflies. Thanks to coppice restoration and ride management, a growing number of butterfly species can be found in the Forest, including the recently rediscovered silver-washed fritillary (pictured), white admiral and purple emperor. Look closely and you may also spot a spider weaving its web or creating a nest.



Our last theatrical event in the Forest is Arthur Conan Doyle's classic *The Hound of the Baskervilles* on **Friday 6**<sup>th</sup> **September**. Sherlock Holmes tackles the most baffling case of his career in this cheeky but chilling adaptation. Performed in the great outdoors by *Illyria*, prepare for an evening of mystery and things that go grrrr in the night! Tickets can be bought on our website; look for events.

#### THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

#### Peace, perfect Peace, is the Gift of Christ our Lord

I was reflecting on this hymn from our parish hymn book, *Celebration Hymnal for Everyone*, whilst praying for peace and cohesion for all who live in the United Kingdom. Please let us light peace candles and pray for peace in our country. I was particularly struck by the eternal truth about peace declared by St Paul. After his Damascus conversion, he became an ardent believer that peace was indeed a gift from God, as are the fruits of the holy spirit: *love*, *joy*, *peace*, *forbearance*, *kindness*, *goodness* (*understanding of others*), *faithfulness* (*fidelity*), *gentleness and self-control* (Galatians 5:22-23). Paul became a deeply contented and peaceful person with everyone, which was not the case before his conversion.

As a Christian, Paul described himself as a free man who loves to associate himself with people of all categories and from all races: I made myself all things to all people, in order to save, by all possible means, some of them (I Corinthians 9: 19-23). This brings me to my main point which is an appeal to all of us to double our efforts to retreat into different places of prayer and worship and ask God for the gift of peace upon everyone who lives and works in our country. The shocking riots that have followed the unspeakable and horrific murder of children in Southport clearly show that some people are capable of committing the most evil crimes which lead to the lack of peace in our community. Sadly, there are so many conflicts and wars in the world today despite the massive human advancement in technology and other spheres of life. What is the solution to this catastrophic unhappiness and void of emptiness in our society today? Our human efforts, without God, will come to a dead end. The gospel of Jesus reveals him as the Prince of Peace, while Mary his mother, is revealed as the Queen of Peace. Therefore, as a matter of urgency, let us all flock into our places of prayer and worship to pray for peace in our country.

#### NATURAL BEE KEEPING

#### Bees and Bugs through the Ages

Last month we learnt about keeping bees in skeps. In times past, the peasantry could not really do too much skep beekeeping as it is very labour intensive, so they often took part in bee-lining. This is a major part of my interest in honeybees; I have kept bees in all different types and styles of box beehives. However the research of bees is more my interest. Bee-lining is the ancient art of hunting bees. I hunt bees to find where they live and just observe them, but in the past, some people were permitted to cut down the tree with the bees in to take the honey. Provision for this was given in the Magna Carta, I believe. How does one bee-line? There are all manner of ways to go about this; a chap called Tom Seeley has written quite extensively about it. I do a varied system of sugar water feeding points from which I can then triangulate on the hive from the direction of flight of the returning bees. This requires a lot of time, patience and luck; hot summer days are always helpful.



Lastly just a quick update on what is happening with our bugs. Well I am glad to report we now seem to have loads of butterflies, dragonflies, bees and flies, although the numbers of wasps seem to be down for this time of the year. We do not really appreciate some wasps but they eat other bugs so are responsible for a huge amount of pest control; in the end they do a lot of good. Hope you will follow again next month.

#### PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

...with news of the publication of a report into HGV traffic on Grove Hill, our stance on the Manor Road flats, an update on biodiversity sites in the village and details of Stansted's first fireworks display in years!

#### HGV report: a blow for Grove Hill



Essex Highways has produced a report over summer that pours cold water on proposals to cut HGV traffic down Grove Hill. The county council has suggested directing HGVs around Stansted, using cameras to track traffic and fine trucks flouting the road's existing environmental restriction classification.

But the report, seen by the Parish Council in August, states traffic surveys and vehicle counts along Grove Hill in 2023 found "HGV use... is relatively low in comparison with similar roads." It also noted roads with an environmental weight restriction are expected to see HGVs make up 5% of traffic volumes. This is significant because for the county council to seek powers to use cameras to enforce restrictions on HGVs, it requires strong supporting evidence. The report doesn't help in this regard. HGVs were found to make up less than 2.5% of traffic on Grove Hill.

Other hurdles to tackling lorries cited by Essex include:

- A reluctance by central government to grant powers to councils to introduce moving-traffic enforcement restrictions
- The impracticality of implementation: multiple cameras would be needed, there'd be high admin fees stemming from legal challenges to fines, plus difficulties faced identifying offending drivers and their companies
- Widening the road along Grove Hill is also ruled out in the report "due to land constraints" and "the very narrow footway present".

The report suggests "the most appropriate/easiest/cheapest

solution...would be to remove existing residents parking bays" before recognising "residents would be unlikely to agree to their removal." As for hopes that lorries could be redirected around Stansted, Essex Highways is not keen on this either. Places such as Takelely suffer similarly to Stansted and would likely be resistant to coping with more HGV traffic for the village's sake.

#### Manor Road Flats

n response to complaints about the state of 20 flats at Manor Road, and after Parish Councillors held a vote on the matter, Chair Maureen Caton invited the portfolio holder for housing at Uttlesford to attend a Full Council meeting in September to discuss the matter. This has been declined. SMPC has, however, received a reply from the interim director of property at the district council, which owns the flats. Mr Brian Burton reports over £700,000 of refurbishments are under way to fix problems connected to extensive water ingress at the properties. Anti-microbial treatments have been carried out already and leaky windows fixed, but so pervasive are the problems at Manor Road, we believe the money could be better spent rebuilding the flats from scratch. #### Councillor Vacancies

We paused our recruitment over summer of two new faces to serve as Parish Councillors. But with recess behind us, SMPC are again welcoming enquiries from residents wanting to know how they can represent their community. We'd also encourage you to attend a couple of meetings before putting your name forward to be co-opted onto the Parish Council. This will help you get a feel for the role. For those who contacted us earlier this year about being a Parish Councillor, we haven't forgotten you. Expect to hear from us shortly.

#### Biodiversity In Rude Health

n April two sites in the village were prepared and planted with a special mix of grasses and wildflowers as the Parish Council's project to promote local plant and animal biodiversity got underway. Since then it has been fantastic to witness the speed at which nature has worked her magic at the T-junction of Rainsford Road and Pennington Lane, and the land in front of the knight sign near to the B1383 roundabout.

It is likely to take several growing cycles for the sites to reach their potential, but with the arrival of summer, shoots have already well and truly burst through the rotavated soil boding well for the project's future.

At Pennington Lane three types of low growth turf have been used. This is so the vegetation doesn't grow too tall to pose a hazard to drivers using the junction. Embedded into the grass are 17 types of plant. Among them are Cats Ear, Red Glover, Chamomile, Lemon Balm and Wood Sage.

At the B1383 roundabout, meanwhile, there's been an eruption of new fauna. Here a wildflower enriched turf has been used, made up of 85% flower and 15% grass seeds. In less than two months the 52 types of wildflowers sown have seen bees, butterflies and beetles make themselves at home among the likes of Birdsfoot Trefoil, Fenugreek, Ragged Robin and Mountain Madworth.

It is hoped that over the next five years SMPC can expand the number of wildflower sites across the village. In turn this will provide sanctuary for plants, birds and insects struggling to adapt to climate change and pesticides, the combination of which is shrinking their habitats and threatening their existence. The playing fields of Forest Hall School will host the event. Gates will open at 6.30pm and fireworks will start at 7.30pm. There will be vans selling burgers, hotdogs, hot drinks and a bar. Ticket prices are to be confirmed. SMPC has set aside up to £4,000 to help cover event costs. More details will follow in the next edition of The Link.

#### Local Plan & Walpole Meadows 2

he District Council is asking for your thoughts on the Regulation 19 version of their Local Plan, which maps out where new homes, business and infrastructure should go in Uttlesford from now until 2041. The public consultation ends at 5pm on Wednesday, October 3. The Reg 19 Local Plan has been shaped to reflect people's comments made in the last round of consultation in 2023. A hard copy of this updated version can be read in Mountfitchet Exchange library. Alternatively search for The new Local Plan at Uttlesford.gov. uk/reg-19-consultation for more information.

Meanwhile, we received an update before the summer recess from Bloor Homes on their Walpole Meadows 2 project. The 270 homes to come with this development are part of 390 homes proposed for Stansted in the draft Local Plan. Bloor say 40% of Walpole 2 will be affordable homes. The project should take two years to get through planning and start building and will deliver parkland and a site for community use. Speaking of which, the long-promised 14

allotment plots tied to the existing Walpole Meadows site look set to being handed over to the SMPC. The paperwork is close to being ready to sign - seven years after the project itself was completed!

lot can happen in 12 months. It was only last August, after All, we were proudly announcing in these pages that with the help of Forest Hall School, our Youth Council was two shy of a full contingent of 6 members. Now just a year on and we are back putting out the call for some new faces to promote the needs and interests of the young people in the community. Uttlesford District Councillor for Stansted North

#### **General Election**

The political landscape has changed. It will have significant implications for all of us not least in local government. We can pride ourselves on a peaceful transition of power achieved through the ballot box. Not everything in the electoral garden is lovely. Turnout at 60% was the lowest since 2001. Many MPs including here in North West Essex were elected on less than 34% of the vote. The summer of discontent with riots in many of our cities reveals a worrying fracture in our society.

Uttlesford is responsible for the conduct of elections. It compiles the electoral register, arranges for nominations, issues postal votes, staffs the polling stations and carries out the count. It was unfortunate that some 2,644 postal votes in the Chelmsford area of the constituency were sent out late. The delay in postal votes arriving could mean some people were unable to vote due to the timing of their summer trips away. The Chief Executive said the delay was due to human error. An independent investigation is under way.

#### **Local Plan**

The District Council has moved towards the next step of a Local Plan. It decided to publish the Regulation 19 draft Local Plan. This will go out to public consultation on 8 August. Residents will be asked to comment on its soundness. Our existing Local Plan is from 2005 and is out of date. The Local Plan will determine where development is to take place up until 2041.

All four of Stansted's District Councillors voted against proceeding to the next stage of the Local Plan. The reality is that the District Council is trying to shut the stable door after the horse has bolted. Because of the failure of successive administrations to deliver an up-to-date Local Plan, Uttlesford has been subject to much speculative development. Over 8.500 houses have been granted planning permission since 2021.

My concerns over the Local Plan were that over a third of the proposed development under Regulation 19 will be in one parish, namely Takeley. This will help to contribute to an urban sprawl between Bishop's Stortford and Great Dunmow along the A120 corridor. I was also unhappy with the decision to reduce the proportion of affordable housing from 40% to 35%.

Undoubtedly, there is a housing crisis. An average of between 40,000 and 50,000 affordable homes a year have been built in the UK in the last two to three decades, roughly one-third of the 145,000 every year that is believed to be needed. There are 1.3m households on local authority waiting lists for social housing, the highest number since 2014 and up by 73,000 on last year, according to government figures.

#### **Manor Road Flats**

Many of these flats in Stansted are affected by mould, which has been unsuccessfully treated. I supported Cllr Ray Gooding's recent unsuccessful motion to the District Council, which urged the local authority to take action.

The flats have reached the end of their useful life and need to be replaced. A feasibility study needs to be carried out with a view to phased redevelopment. We can then offer accommodation fit for everyone rather than sub-standard homes, which are a threat to residents' health. 

#### **BRAIN TRAINING**

#### Nerves, Pain, Osteoporosis and Yoga

Nerves are a big deal. As part of rehabilitation, they need relaxing or unsticking. For good health, nerves need to be long and stretchy. If you get an unexpected nerve tingling in your hands or feet, it usually means a nerve has got a bit stuck, due to a dodgy shoulder or spinal position. Nerves make muscles contract and pass information to and from the brain. They also pull on the outer surface of the bone, called the periosteum. Following a fracture or sprain, their pull promotes bone healing. Nerves also keep a bone healthy by the same process. Long term, if they are not working very well, ie not pulling on the periosteum properly, this leads to a lower bone mineral density and osteoporosis.



Major Nerves of the Body

The job of some of the nerves running up to the spine is to sense changes in the bone, typically from movement stress or small environmental changes. Some of these nerves are nascent pain signallers. If activated, these nerves send pain signals to the brain. After a fracture, all the nerves surrounding the affected area need to be fully rehabilitated to avoid these pain nerves becoming hypersensitive, growing in number and leading to quite unnecessary long-term pain.

So if you are in a yoga class doing a seated forward fold and feel a tingle in your foot, nod your head quickly to stretch that nerve. Vary your foot position – toes up, down, in and out. This will stretch some of the leg nerves. Arm nerve stretches are more varied but do need doing. Stretching your nerves is an important part of keeping your bones strong.





