

As in previous years, Christian Aid has produced a 'Make Lent Meaningful' sheet encouraging us all to reflect on the good things in our life, and to give a daily gift for those living in poverty around the world. For example on 18th March we were told that 95% of homes in Britain have central heating, and are invited to give 50p for every degree above 20 on our thermostat. There is a caveat that the daily giving amounts are suggestions only. Last year Christian Aid raised £250,000 from this Lent giving. There are a small number of leaflets available in the churches or from me, or a form can be downloaded from www.christianaid.org.uk/lent. There is also a children's version on line.





#### **IN MEMORIAM**

#### **ROBIN SCARR**

#### 11th August 1926 - 9th February 2011

Robin was actually named Robert Walter Alister, a compilation of family names, but from an early age he was always known as Robin. He was born in Norwood, Croydon, and moved to a new house in Orpington with his parents and younger sister, Daphne, four years later. After primary school he was accepted into the City of London School. During the Blitz the school was evacuated and Robin ended up boarding at Marlborough College. Not an experience he enjoyed, but luckily the Prudential, for whom his father worked, evacuated to Paignton in Devon, so Robin rejoined his family and attended the local grammar school in Torquay. He enjoyed the lovely Devon countryside and beaches, before returning to Orpington, the City of London School - and the odd doodle bug - towards the end of the war.

Up to the age of 15 Robin admitted to struggling academically. Then mathematics suddenly fell into place for him and he left school with good grades. He was awarded the Steggall scholarship, £50 per annum, to study at London University. He was also awarded a Queen Mary College Engineering Exhibition for £30 12s. At 19, Robin joined the RAF to do his national service. On his discharge in 1948 his commanding officer wrote, "This airman has proved a loyal and conscientious worker who has applied himself diligently to his duties in a clerical capacity". When asked what he did in the air force Robin would say, "I delivered the post."

He duly took up his place at Queen Mary College, London and was awarded a first class honours degree in engineering, and a PhD which he completed in 1954. It was while he was working as an electrical engineer at STC in Foots Cray that Robin met his future wife, Brenda. Brenda had recently joined the probation service and was being trained by Robin's sister, Daphne. They were married in 1962 and bought a house in Petts Wood where their first child, Sarah was born in 1963. The following year Robin transferred to the research department of the company and joined STL in Harlow. They bought a new family home in Stansted and in 1966 their second child, Josie was born. Throughout his working life Robin kept up with changes in technology and was an inventor, filing numerous patents whilst at STL. Whilst still young he designed and built a television set for his parents, and was always eager to fix the family's television when it went wrong. He completed the cryptic crossword nearly every day and never needed directing to a place after the first time.

In 1985 he took early retirement, but didn't stop working. He wrote a book with John Horrocks, and joined Ofcom as a consultant. Later on, together with an old colleague from STL, he tried to get funding for research into optical switching, and continued to patent new ideas. Robin was greatly admired and respected for his intellect by those he worked with. He was a kind and caring father, and invented a variety of games to play with his two daughters. Long car journeys were made more bearable by his made up stories about John Brown, a naughty boy who got into all sorts of trouble. Later on he helped Sarah with her university work as she struggled with statistics and phonetics, and Josie with her final university project even typing it up for her. He was also a willing playmate to his three grandchildren who loved playing with him.



Robin was active in the village in his later years. He was both treasurer and chairman of the Day Centre, and for 10 years was treasurer of the local Liberal Democrats. Robin has written a number of books – 'Distributed Amplifiers' was his PhD, followed by 'Transistors in Linear Circuits' and 'Future Trends in Telecommunication' – not exactly light reading! But he also wrote a thriller 'The Laser's Edge' which had been accepted by the Book Guild. Sadly he was never able to complete negotiations with the Guild and the book has not been published. It is hoped that it will be published at some future date. It would be a fitting tribute to an extraordinary man.

Rosemary Thomson from St John's Church kindly came to help with signing everyone in, and helping to make huge amounts of drinks for us all. Many thanks to all of you who have supported us in this new venture. We look forward to greeting you and your children at future play sessions.

#### TV PRESENTER LAUNCHES 'MAKE A WILL MONTH' MAY 2011

On 7th March, we were delighted to welcome BBC TV presenter and top City lawyer, Sue Medder to launch the Hospice's new fundraising initiative, 'Make a Will Month'. Participating lawyers from 14 local firms enjoyed a working. breakfast during which Sue, who co-presented the BBC2 programme 'You Can't Take It With You' with business trouble-shooter Sir Gerry Robinson, gave a fascinating and entertaining insight into the world of television and the business of will-making. Sue revealed the alarming statistic which arose from the programme that 70% of people in this country have not made a will - she even confessed that immediately prior to filming, she was one of this number herself! She went on to explain that, with the prevalence of couples co-habiting, the increase in second or third marriages and the fact that many people are now bringing up stepchildren as their own, people do not realise that their assets almost certainly will not go where they wish after death unless they have written a will. Sue was accompanied by her colleague from City firm, Withers, and legal consultant to the TV programme, Charlie Tee, who has strong local links, being the son of Richard Tee, former senior partner of local firm Tees Law. The aim of the scheme is to encourage as many people as possible to make their wills whilst helping their local Hospice, and we are thrilled to have Sue's support for the project.

Local solicitors have effectively agreed to provide their services for free in return for a direct donation to St Clare Hospice. They will prepare a single simple will for a minimum donation of £100 or a pair of simple wills for £150. 

We had the advantage of home-grown talent at our March meeting when Ted Pretty, one of our own members, gave us a talk on Stansted and other windmills in East Anglia. Ted had first become interested in windmills when in the Scouts and had taken part in a night-hike from Bishop's Stortford to Stansted, becoming just a little lost in the process. They did not arrive at the mill until 3.00am, but he was taken round the building by an expert, Malcolm Treacher, the following morning. Later in his career he worked for English Heritage and came into contact with many windmills in all sorts of conditions. He is now one of the Millers of Stansted Mill.

Ted accompanied his talk with some very good slides and started with the mill we know best, Stansted. He had created a visual record of the recent work that had been carried out and this was explained to us as it progressed, finishing with a fully refurbished mill. As mentioned later in the meeting, some complications have arisen since and these have been referred to the maintenance firm. Together with his wife, Marion, he has travelled widely in East Anglia; among the things which he has photographed are windmills, some of which he showed to us and described their condition and working. The types of mill were explained: the post mills which were moved into the wind bodily by means of a beam which could be moved by the miller and later, by means of a fan-tail as with our own mill; then the smock mill, which appeared larger and had a cap which turned the sails into the wind by means of a fan-tail; this, like the post mill, was made of wood; finally, the tower mill made of brick. This is the style of the Stansted Mill, with its cap that weighs around 31/2 tons. Unfortunately, not all the mills are in the same condition as ours - most are in need of maintenance, have lost their inner works or, like the Cley Mill in Norfolk, have been converted into a holiday let! We were grateful to Ted for a good talk on a very outstanding part of this and other villages.

Next month we delve into the matter of crime, when we hear about 'The £1,000,000 Bank of England Forgery of 1873' from George J Smith. This will be at 8.00pm on Thursday 7th April in The Day Centre. See you then.

#### UGLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Our recent meeting opened with the sad news of the death of Mrs Gladys Dix. A delightful lady, she had been a member of our WI since the early 1960s. She worked tirelessly for our Institute, having been President and latterly our programme planning secretary and a very active member of the Committee. She was a great friend to many and will be sadly missed by us all.

Our speaker was Susan Walker, Blue Badge guide and former Tourist Information Centre manager. Her subject was the history of Saffron Walden and with great enthusiasm and an equally great amount of knowledge she took us on an 'armchair tour' of the delightful town; a town that thankfully still has the air of a market town. The 'tour' was enhanced by a map drawn by her and given to each of us to follow. In the space of 45 minutes, which flew by, we were expertly guided around and through the Iron and Bronze Age periods and then coming to the Norman period, we were introduced to Geoffrey De Mandeville, the first Constable of the Tower of London. His grandson, Geoffrey, followed in his footsteps becoming Constable of the Tower of London and built Walden's first castle in around 1135-1138. Sadly, all that remains of it are the cellars. The ever popular market, she explained, moved from its original site to the Market Square in the 1300s and during this period the town was known as Chipping Walden. The town's wealth was built on wool, with malting and brewing providing a living for many of the inhabitants. The local wool staplers built their own Guild Hall in the Market Place which survived until it was demolished to make way for the 'Italian style' Corn Exchange which was converted into the library in the mid 1970s. By the end of the 1400s Walden became Saffron Walden and



wool was soon overtaken by the saffron industry as the main source of local wealth. It appears that a Crusader brought a corm of saffron back from his travels and it was from this that the saffron industry developed. Saffron was used first and foremost as a dye for wool but was also used for medicinal purposes; 30,000 stamens are required to

make just one pound of dried saffron! Sadly space only allows me to mention just a few facts from a most interesting talk and I for one will certainly return to Saffron Walden in the very near future and, as she urged us to do, 'look-up' at all the historic buildings that this charming market town has to offer.

So ended another very entertaining afternoon for our members. Other treats in store include a talk on pottery in April, a visit from the Canine Partner's Charity in July, a talk on medicinal plants in August, a tour of Grandad's garden in September and a visit from the Nazeing hand bell ringers in December to round off what promises to be another entertaining year for our members. Why not come and join us? You'd be most welcome. We meet on the third Wednesday of the month at 2.30pm in Ugley Village Hall.

The fly that gets the carrots, The wasp that eats the plums, How black the gardener's outlook, Though green may be his thumbs.


But still we gardeners labour, Midst vegetables and flowers, And pray what hits our neighbours' Will somehow bypass ours.

#### MORE MEMORIES OF ST MARY'S PRIMARY

Seeing the picture of the Youth Centre on last month's cover of the 'Link' also, like Keith Eagleton (article in the March 'Link') brought back fond memories of when I was at St Mary's School. I actually started my primary school education at the school on Chapel Hill where the senior school was sited (Peter Kirk School). The headmaster of the senior school was Mr Enoch who was well remembered for his liberal use of the cane. One of the primary school teachers was his wife who was a lovely gentle lady, quite the opposite of her husband. Later we moved down to St Mary's in Lower Street. My memories go back about 60 years. Mr Hare, the headmaster, well described by Keith Eagleton, was a lovely man; a very talented musician as I recall. He was a very heavy smoker and would sometimes say to me; "Dicky, would you go to Eric's (Eric Poole ran the local tobacconist shop on Chapel Hill) and get me 40 Kensitas?" and I would duly trot to Chapel Hill to get the cigarettes. How times have changed! Can you imagine that happening now?

I was at school before Ma Brown, but I well remember Miss Double, whose standard method of punishment was to smack your legs - which she did with great gusto. I recall an episode when the choir was appearing in a very important contest in Saffron Walden. I was one of the star performers but messed about so much that Mr Hare threatened me with removal from the choir. I did not heed the warning so was duly slung out. I remember the ignominy of playing on Saffron Walden Common with the non-singers. I also remember being smacked in the face by a ball and Miss Double clasping my face to her bosom, which was of the ample variety. I recall thinking that being hit in the face by a ball had its plus points! There was also a teacher called John Boddington. We used to sing a ditty "Old Bod is a bunion with a face like a pickled onion, a nose like a squashed tomato and legs like matchsticks". Strange the things you remember! He married whilst still at the school and his wife came to teach there. She was a lovely no-nonsense person.

Looking back it was a very good school of which I have happy memories. This was in the days of the eleven plus exam, and I feel that I was given a good rounded education at St Mary's which stood me in good stead for my future schooling.

I was very interested in the article on St Mary's School. I was appointed to teach at St Mary's School at the start of the autumn term in 1951; exactly six years after the war ended. In September I had 20 five year olds in the class, but in the following term, January 1952, the 'Bulge' reached school age and my class number rose to 40. (Just nine months plus five years since Daddy came home from the war.) As the 'Bulge' moved up the school followed by a steady growth of five year olds, we had to expand. One classroom was opened in the Central Hall, Chapel Hill (now called the Court House) with Miss Player (now Mrs Cowan) in charge. Eventually another classroom opened at Stoney Common in a hut, which was later moved to Water Lane and became the Scout Headquarters. Mr Pennick was the teacher in charge at Stoney Common.

It was extremely hard for one mother who had twins in my class at St Mary's School (now the Youth Centre) in Lower Street, one at the Central Hall in Chapel Hill, and her fourth child at Stoney Common. Miss Player and myself came to her rescue by keeping the twins and one child in our classrooms after school, as she needed to pick up her fourth child from Stoney Common before he went paddling in the nearby brook.

#### CHILDREN'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH Simnel Pinwheels

Simnel Cake is traditionally eaten at Easter - in Medieval times female servants would bake this cake to take home to their mothers on Mothering Sunday. Try these as an easy alternative.

#### Ingredients

200g dried mixed fruits zest and juice 1 small orange 1 x 375g sheet ready-rolled puff pastry (we used Saxby's) 3 tbsp apricot jam 200g marzipan

#### Method

Soak the dried fruit and orange zest in the orange juice. Unroll the pastry onto a baking sheet.

Roll out the marzipan and trim to the same size as the pastry. Brush the pastry with jam, then rest the marzipan on top. Scatter with the fruit and tightly roll up, from the long edge, like a Swiss roll.

Chill, then slice into 1cm thick pieces. Bake at 220C/fan 200C/gas 7 for 10 mins.

# FORESTHALL PARK TO BECOME PART OF STANSTED PARISH

The Electoral Arrangements Working Group of Uttlesford District Council has recommended that the part of the new estate currently within Birchanger parish will be moved into this parish. With this decision now known the Parish Council will discuss with the District Council and the developers the terms on which various responsibilities such as gardening and grasscutting will be assumed. The maintenance of play areas is likely to be the first responsibility assumed.

We welcome all our new parishioners and hope that the Council can meet your needs in building our community together.

# PARISH PLAN - SUBMITTED TO UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

At last the text of the Parish Plan has been sent to Uttlesford District Council where it is hoped that the Development Control Committee will approve the draft. Provided this occurs then the Parish Plan will be printed and distributed to every household and business.

Under the policy of the current government this plan should carry some weight when planning and other policy issues are under discussion. If the action points in the plan, which number around 150, are to be implemented then the Parish Council and parishioners will have to undertake much work and considerable lobbying as well as persuading outside agencies to give us money!

It is intended to review the plan every year and to report hopefully on achievements.

Violence on the streets of Stansted Mountfitchet remains rare and the three recorded incidents were all domestic, serious of course for those involved. Burglaries from dwellings currently pose the biggest problem. After five crimes in December the number rose to eight in January with four (actual & attempted) on one day but, so far in February, the number has shown a fall. It would appear those committing the crimes are professional and come from out of the area. Items stolen are small and easy to carry/sell - laptops and jewellery as well as cash. Burglaries are referred to CID often after a preliminary report by a local officer. Anti-social offences have been low during this period. Out of the four recorded three have been sorted. Whilst many of these incidents are minor, they remain an irritant while, if an individual or family is targeted, this can be more serious so all occurrences should be reported.

Neighbourhood Watch has become much stronger in the parish over the past couple of years but further support would reinforce this trend so, if you like further information, please contact Cllr Valerie Trundle on 813433 or Diane Roberts on 813089. Vigilance remains crucial especially as most of the burglaries have occurred in the daytime. If you see anything which rouses your concern or know of any incident, please call the police either on 999 if time is critical or on 0300 333 4444.

# HEALTH CENTRE UPDATE - MOVING, IF SLOWLY, WE THINK!

At a recent meeting attended by Cllr Geoffrey Sell (Chairman of the Parish Council) and District Cllr Alan Dean, the developers (Pelham Structures) and an officer from Uttlesford District Council, it was confirmed that a planning application should be submitted shortly. Whilst final terms have not yet been agreed between Pelham Structures and the PCT, this appears to be moving closer to completion.

Further discussions have taken place with Essex County Highways and it is now proposed to place rumble strips on Chapel Hill and Church Road as traffic calming measures.

We will bring further news as and when it is available.

#### PARISH NOW OWNS THE DAY CENTRE

Uttlesford District Council (UDC) has decided that Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council (SMPC) owns the Day Centre (previously it was thought that SMPC owned the land and UDC the building).

It is expected that the services provided by the Day Centre will continue as before but discussions will need to take place with UDC over funding and with the Day Centre committee to ensure smooth running.

Whilst the assets of the parish have increased, there will be some increase in the costs of ownership. Some provision for this has been made in the budget for 2011/12.

#### **RECREATION GROUND CLEARANCE**

For far too long it has been the Council's desire to tidy up the bottom end of the Recreation Ground, under the trees where brambles have flourished and weeds encroached! In early March, we were delighted to welcome a team from Community Payback (formerly Community Service Workers).

Under the keen eye of their supervisor, five young men from the Harlow area came with hand tools and cleared a large amount of unwanted growth. We have established a good link now with the area office and hope to be able to use their services elsewhere in the village.

# VILLAGE CLEAN UP - THANK YOU FOR A GOOD JOB

On Saturday and Sunday, the 5th and 6th March, about 35 volunteers cleared many bags of litter from around the village - Church Road, Lime Kiln Lane, Pennington Lane, skatepark, Recreation Ground, Foresthall Park. We were delighted that so many of the youngsters from the Youth Centre came along and helped to boost their "community" hours for their Duke of Edinburgh Award.



Thank you to all who gave their time - the village looks better, although sadly by Monday morning there was evidence of fresh litter on Pennington Lane. If you see fly-tipping on any of our streets, please make a note of the car registration number, if applicable, and let us know. A local person was recently fined by Uttlesford District Council for dumping waste after their personal details were found in one of the rubbish bags.

#### NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD D.C.

The District has frozen its council tax for the coming year, like councils nationwide, after receiving a subsidy from the government. It will also, after April, receive a New Homes Bonus, a coalition initiative to help fund growing communities, based on the number of new homes that are built.

Discussions are continuing about support for elderly persons' day centres around the district, including Stansted's. A study last year showed that a district co-ordinator is needed to modernize their operations and reverse declining community use. Funding arrangements will be considered at a District Council meeting in mid March.

The District Council and residents are being consulted by the County Council over the relocation of St. Mary's School onto a site between Hampton Road and Reeve Road on the Foresthall Park estate in September 2012. Councillors have raised concerns about pedestrian access and parking congestion. Informal proposals have also been floated to improve safety on Church Road such as widening the footpath on the west side and a new pedestrian crossing by Maitland Road.

The recently introduced 300 bus service which runs from Saffron Walden Tesco to Bishop's Stortford Tesco will cease on April 25th. This infrequent service was poorly used, even though it has been the only service which connected Cambridge Road and Chapel Hill with Walson Way and Foresthall Park.

#### NEWS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

A year ago lots of concerns were being raised about the future of Rainbow Nursery after the planned relocation of St Mary's School to Forest Hall were announced, so when the suggestion that the pre school could move to the Peter Kirk Centre was raised it appeared that the problem had been solved. But then disaster struck when the Coalition Government withdrew capital funding for new early years settings and Essex had a number of schemes that were unable to continue because there was no money!

However, recognising that pre-school and early years settings play such an important part in children's development Essex County Council stepped in and funded 20 schemes across the county to a total value of £12 million. Rainbow Nursery was one of these schemes and I am pleased to say that as I write the finishing touches are being put to the interior of the super new facility at the Peter Kirk Centre and works should be completed by the end of March.

There has however been one item that delayed the works when a redundant gas main was found to cross the play area but as soon as that has been removed the Nursery will be ready for occupation so I would urge everyone to support the staff and children in their move into their new home.

At this time of year people always become concerned that their Council Tax Bill is about to fall through the door and this year the media have made much of Councils that have introduced swinging cuts to front line services. Essex is very much the exception to all this because despite the 0% increase in the amount that will be charged the alterations to services have been minimal.

To give you some figures, Essex have been one of the few councils that recognised the need to make savings in the way that they operate and over the last three years ECC has saved £284 million in administration and 'back office' costs; and this year given the reduction in grant from central government, we are saving a further £83 million. This has enabled us to ensure that all of the fixed Libraries across the County are remaining open, 86 SureStart Children's Centres are being maintained and most other services are unaltered. In fact, the cuts to front line services within Essex amount only to £14 million and when set against a budget of £2.1 billion that is fairly minimal.

The media relish in bad news so it's no wonder they have left us alone!

Some parents choose to send their children to mainstream nurseries while others prefer the specialist environment. Our approach offers parents a choice.


#### CYRIL'S GARDENING TIPS







Karen Adams came along and brightened up a dull wet February evening for us, with her talk entitled 'Artistic Inspiration'. Karen spent most of her childhood in Manuden, and is a lover of the local countryside, which originally inspired her method of using different materials in her artwork. She swept into the hall, covered the floor with white dustsheets, erected a couple of easels and covered a large table with very large pots of paint. We were quite expecting her to paint the hall for us before she started! Having done 'A' level art at school she became a student at the Regency Academy of Fine Arts where she took domestic and commercial design. A serious illness changed her life so that she was bedridden for some time and began experimenting in different techniques for producing pictures using scraps of paper, string and fabrics and building up pictures layer upon layer. She demonstrated this technique to us and passed around the various ordinary items she uses to such great effect. Two contrasting pictures were displayed at the end, which were absolutely lovely. Each piece of work takes about five weeks to complete and can be abstract or representational - her first efforts were of old properties in Manuden which sold instantly to their owners. It is, she says, like ceramic on canvas but framed and mounted and she has had her work exhibited quite widely including the Royal Academy.

We hope to take part in the Saffron Walden Festival in July, which has classes for many crafts, cookery, photography and art - though we don't expect to come up to Karen's standard. Our rather special WI tablecloth, which was completed in 1970, will be on display with others from institutes in the area. Several of our local WIs are celebrating their 90th anniversary, which makes our 50 years seem quite young, but I don't think many of them have founder members! We have seven members attending the County AGM in Colchester, when the speaker will be Lady Antonia Fraser who will be telling us of her life with Harold Pinter, which should prove interesting. We are putting in two tables for the St Clare Hospice Quiz Evening, as several of our members are fundraisers for this organisation which does such a great service to so many people in this part of Essex. Looking ahead and hoping for fine weather we will be organising a tea-party on 8th June in St John's Hall and hopefully outside as well, to meet with other members of our Group of Institutes. #### Nature Notes

In the tall trees above the station in Stansted there was a flurry of activity in early March. The rooks were starting to build their nests again, using sticks and soil and lining them with roots, leaves and moss. The materials are brought by the male birds to the females which then construct the nests. By the time you are reading this there may well be 15-20 nests. This local rookery is quite small; the largest ones can consist of several thousand pairs. Rooks belong to the crow or corvidae family which is generally thought to be the most highly developed of all bird families.



They are far more intelligent than most other birds. In Stansted and the surrounding area we have five members of this family: rooks, crows, jays, magpies and jackdaws. Crows and rooks eat grain and the rooks also particularly like leather jackets and other insects. Jays will bury acorns and sometimes beechnuts and berries underground for use in winter. Most of these birds, especially jays, magpies and jackdaws, will take eggs and young birds from nests, and crows too will rob nests. This latter bird is also known as the carrion crow because of its habit of feeding on dead animals such as rabbits. Magpies too are often seen feeding on animals that have been run over. As well as during the nesting season, rooks tend to be socially close throughout the year and fly about in large flocks. During winter they are joined by crows, jackdaws and starlings to form mixed flocks foraging on farmland. Rooks can be distinguished from crows on the ground by the pale grey area around the base of the bill (this area is black in crows) and by their thickly feathered thighs. In flight their wingbeats are faster than those of crows. As a matter of interest, the collective noun for a large group of crows is a murder, for a large number of rooks a parliament, and for a group of magpies a tiding.



#### STANSTED LITERATURE GROUP BOOK REVIEW

#### H G Wells

We have recently been studying the work and life of H G Wells, well known for his novels in the science fiction genre ie 'The War of the Worlds'. He was also a first class writer of comedy, as we found when we read 'The History of Mr Polly'.

#### The History of Mr Polly written in 1910

Alfred Polly is a timid, unambitious man forever on a search for love and happiness. As a young man he works in a draper's shop and spends most of his time reading about gallant knights rescuing 'damsels in distress'. He is eventually sacked for far too much daydreaming. He appears unable to find another job but his father dies and leaves him a large inheritance. At his father's funeral he meets his future wife, cousin Miriam. He somehow, and quite comically, manages to find himself married to Miriam, although he does not love her. He is looking for romance! Mr Polly, at Miriam's nagging insistence, buys a shop, which fails as well as his marriage, and eventually decides that enough is enough. He leaves it all behind and off he goes on his bicycle to freedom, on through the country lanes seeking romance. He ends up eventually at the Potwell Inn situated in the country near the river, where the comfortable landlady, we never learn her name, offers him work. The plot continues with many twists and turns.

Wells put much of himself into this short book and the result is masterly. It is packed full of symbolism, comedy, elements of farce and pathos. It is such a good piece of literature that it has never been out of print, and is well worth reading, or even re-reading.



If you have never bowled before NOW is the time to learn - join Stansted Bowling Club. Bowls truly is the sport for all - all ages, all sexes and all abilities. It's a game that takes a few minutes to learn and the rest of your bowling career to master! Bowls is a relatively cheap game compared to other sports. All you will need to start is a pair of flat-soled shoes, grey trousers/skirt and a white top. The Club has a selection of bowls for you to use unfil you are confident enough to buy a set of your own. The rules of the game are simple and can be played by anyone. It is played on a square of closely cut grass called 'the green', which is divided into playing areas called rinks. Players take turns to deliver their bowls from a mat at one end of the rink towards a small white ball called the jack at the other end. The bowls are shaped so that they take a curved path towards the jack. To be successful, the bowl must be delivered with the correct weight, along the correct line. The object is to get one or more of your bowls closer to the jack than those of your opponents; one point is scored for each counting bowl. It might sound easy, but the fact that the bowls do not travel in a straight line seriously adds to fun and the tactical challenge. In addition to the sheer enjoyment of the game, bowls will help keep you healthy. It is great anaerobic exercise for your joints, muscles, tendons and ligaments. For example, in an average game you will bend 42 times, walk approximately 1380 yards, swing your arm some 40 times to deliver a bowl weight about three pounds.

#### A Journey into Space

Please read your Space Ship Brochure thoroughly. Your vehicle will need to be absolutely airtight and don't forget to take enough air for all of you. In fact, just take oxygen because you will have over five times the amount of oxygen in the air. You will also need filters to absorb the carbon dioxide from your breath. Water and food are also advised. Toilet facilities are basic and suction based, as you will be in a gravity-free environment. Your spacecraft has now been filled with two tanks: one full of liquid oxygen (this is separate from the earlier oxygen) and the other the fuel, a very refined form of paraffin. So now you are almost ready; just a glance to make sure that the weather's good and press the button. The ship starts to vibrate more and continues as the engines take about eight seconds to get to full power. Then you are released and you begin to rise. The capsule is shaking and you can feel the pressure on your body as the rocket accelerates. After just a few minutes you glance out of the window and you see it's getting dark. It isn't night time but you are now higher than the atmosphere.

Suddenly there is a jolt as the largest engines and fuel tanks automatically break off because they are very heavy, empty and of no further use. Though still accelerating, under the power of smaller rockets you gratefully lose some of the pressure on your chest. 15 minutes or so after lift off, it suddenly goes quiet: all engines have stopped and you are coasting at around 17,500 miles an hour. Anything slower and you will return to Earth, anything faster and you will wander off forever. You are allowed to float out of your seats and grab one of the many handles. You float to the windows, but wherever you look, there is no sign of the space station. Have we gone the wrong way? No, but you have to approach the station very slowly; that can take two or three days, then you have to position your ship to dock and that can take several hours and several goes. But once docked and air tight, you will be assured of a warm welcome and a tube of tea or coffee. We hope you enjoy your stay on the International Space Station!!






### 494 (Stansted Airport) Squadron Air Training Corps
