



2009/10 has been a year of consolidation for the Hospice with a strong focus on retail and fundraising. The clinical focus has been on ensuring the best use of our eight in-patient beds that has seen us reaching 90% occupancy and an average stay of 11 days. A time of consultation with our supporters and the wider community is to take place on our plans for future service development. After a successful bid for funding, St Clare recently received a Government grant to totally refurbish the In-Patient Unit. The work has begun and will be done in stages to ensure minimum disturbance to our patients and services. It is 10 years since the In-Patient Unit opened so the funding comes at a great time.

The Hospice shops are doing really well and truly benefiting from the community's generosity and donations. The Hospice is also most grateful to everyone in the local community for their ongoing support and help to raise the much-needed funds with the events they have held. With the festive season upon us you may want to support the 'In Celebration Giving' appeal when, instead of presents, a donation may be given by guests when celebrating an anniversary, a birthday, a wedding or another special occasion. Of course, if a donation is Gift Aided then a further 28p in the £ can be claimed from the Government if you are a taxpayer. November Meeting

Members listened intently to Mrs Linda Blunt's talk about 'Nepal – Its Plants and People'. Mrs Blunt explained the topography of the country – from east to west the country is about 700 miles long and at its narrowest point is only about 60 miles wide. It is situated between two major industrial powers - India to the south and China to the north. Running from east to west there are three main zones: (1) closest to China is the Himals region where the very high mountains are; (2) the central zone where there are high hills (but we would call them mountains!) and (3) closest to India, is the Terai/Ganges River Plain where, Mrs Blunt joked, the land resembles Essex as it is very flat. Running from north to south are ranges of hills, and in the valleys and canyons between, completely unique plants, shrubs and trees to that valley grow. Tourism has opened Nepal's doors to the outside world, but life in remote rural areas has hardly changed. The national flower of Nepal is the rhododendron and over 30 species grow in these isolated valleys. For the orchid lover there are over 200 different species growing wild. By using slides taken on walking holidays and during a year's sabbatical, when she worked in a rural school and with the Horticultural College in Kathmandu, members were shown how diverse the country is - its architecture, costumes, flowers, religions. The people have to be selfsufficient and every inch of fertile land is used to grow crops. The weather, height above sea level, temperature (from very, very cold to over 40°C) and localised microclimates enable a wide selection of food to be grown ranging from rice to pineapples, apples to wheat. Terracing the steep hills also enables more land to be cultivated. Mrs Blunt explained that her fee would be given to a Nepalese charity she supports and it would pay for three children to be educated for a year. A lively question and answer session followed her talk.

Other News

The Jumble Sale on 16th was a great success and the money raised will be put into our Speakers' Fund. A big thank you to everyone who gave us jumble, came on the day and supported us, grew plants for the plant stall and helped throughout the morning.

23rd October saw our annual trip to one of the RHS Gardens; this year is was Wisley's turn. At this time of year Mother Nature can be fickle, but we were blessed with a lovely day to wander around the gardens and orchards. The sudden drop in overnight temperatures ensured that the leaves were starting to change colour. Our trip coincided with Wisley's Autumn Festival and members were able to wander around over 30 stalls testing and sampling various locally grown/made produce. Over 700 different varieties of fruit trees grow in Wisley's orchards and members were able see a display of them and also to sample some of the more unusual types. Wisley was also host to 'Europom,' an annual gathering of European apple and fruit enthusiasts. This exhibition, held in a different country each year, enabled members to see a wide range of rare and unusual apples that are not readily available in the UK.

Future Meetings

The meeting on 1st December will be our 'Bring and Share' Christmas Party – times as normal. Please note there will not be a meeting in January, so our first meeting of 2011 will be on 2nd February when we will be welcoming Mrs Olivia Elton-Barrett who will be demonstrating and talking about 'Basketmaking and Willow in the Garden'.

Finally, on behalf of the Mountfitchet Garden Club, I wish all 'Link' readers and editorial staff a very merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous 2011.

MEMORIAL TRIBUTE YAKUB ALIBHAI

(an adapted version of the tribute spoken at the memorial service)

The Y & Z Minimarket is one of the last family-owned and family-run shops in Stansted. The late Yakub Alibhai's shop on Chapel Hill survived because Yakub believed in service and made sure that his shop delivered what people wanted. He was one of, if not the first shop in Stansted to be 'open all hours'. If you came off a late train, Y&Z would be open. Yakub was not just interested in simply taking your money and handing over the goods; he was always interested in all of his customers as people and as families, and what went on in the community.



The most significant good turn that Yakub Alibhai gave to this community was to reopen a Post Office counter service in 2006. Several councillors had spent two years or more trying to help the Post Office to find new premises. Literally at the eleventh hour, when Post Office management threatened to make the closure permanent, Yakub agreed to incorporate it into his mini-market. How grateful we all are that he was willing to put himself through training courses to become a sub-postmaster and to jump through many bureaucratic hoops to ensure Stansted's post office opened again. We didn't win all the battles. Bureaucracy got in the way of installing a ramp for disability vehicle access to the shop. There were many mutterings beneath Yakub's breath about people whose jobs seemed to be to stop the right thing being done, rather than serving fellow citizens in the way that Yakub thought was what life was all about.

Yakub happily shared anecdotes with his customers about having met lots of national politicians being interviewed in their homes whilst still working in the television industry, before he and his family came here to Stansted in November 1979. The flowers and cards that came into the shop in the days following Yakub's sudden and sad death were a measure of the warmth and respect that people in Stansted felt for him. Many fine words have been spoken and written to the family since that fateful evening at the end of September when I drove home from a meeting in Dunmow and wondered why an ambulance was parked at the bottom of Chapel Hill.

I know I am not alone in having appreciated and enjoyed knowing Yakub Alibhai. We will miss his humour; his service with a smile; and his many suggestions about how to make Stansted work better. At the memorial service the community was able to show Yakub's son and daughter, Akhter

and Insiyah, and their mother, Zebbie, that all of us in and around Stansted miss Yakub - their father and our post-master - but are honoured to have known him. We can look forward to Zebbie returning to the mini-market early next year and to the Alibhai family business continuing to serve the community of Stansted for many years to come.

BAA should accept court verdict and sell Stansted

SSE Economics Adviser, Brian Ross, urged BAA to accept the Court of Appeal's decision and relinquish control of Stansted without any more delaying tactics, such as an appeal to the Supreme Court. He commented that it might be in BAA's commercial interests to try to delay the inevitable for as long as possible, but creating further uncertainty would not be in the interests of either the local community or the airport's employees. Mr Ross concluded that a change of ownership at Stansted Airport would at least create the prospect of establishing a meaningful and constructive dialogue between the airport management and the local community – something that BAA were never prepared to engage in. There is, of course, always the risk that the new owner could be worse than the devil we already know but in this particular case we believe that risk is extremely small.

NATS Postpones Airspace Changes Yet Again

SSE has welcomed the announcement by National Air Traffic Services (NATS) of a further postponement of its plans to introduce new flight paths and stacking areas for the Terminal Control North (TCN) area. A revised date has not been given, but it is thought that it will be at least two to three years before any new proposals are tabled. In explaining this latest postponement, NATS pointed to the recent downturn in air travel, as a result of which there is less urgency on capacity grounds to achieve the changes. UK air traffic levels are not expected to return to their (peak) 2007 levels until at least 2013/14.

Latest News

It has been announced that the Government will begin the process of formalising its aviation policy early in 2011, starting with a scoping document that will be used as the basis of a full consultation the following year. The starting point will be 'no new runways in the south east' within the current Parliamentary term. Shortly after the Secretary of State's announcement, SSE had a formal meeting with his Aviation Minister, Theresa Villiers, to discuss the call for a moratorium on additional runways at Stansted and the issue of the continued ownership by BAA of hundreds of homes bought under the threat of compulsory purchase in recent years, most of which are rented out on very short leases. Her stated willingness to look closely at the issues was encouraging and SSE is providing more information to the Minister for this purpose.

NEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL COUNCILS

THE PROPOSED NEW HEALTH CENTRE - A NEW CHAPTER

At a public meeting on 18 October, West Essex PCT made the following statement:

The Trust Board, at a meeting on 23 September, made the decision that its preferred site for the development of a Primary Care Centre in Stansted is the Castle Lotus site (off Lower Street) but at the same time it did not want to take the risk of losing the Foresthall site. The existing business would relocate to Parsonage Farm industrial estate.

Therefore it agreed to run with both sites in parallel and ask Uttlesford District Council to give notice to Taylor Wimpey of its intention to acquire the land at Foresthall under the Section 106 Agreement. It was also agreed that if no appreciable movement to a legally binding commitment on the Castle Lotus site is obtained by the end of the calendar year, The Trust would divert its attentions to Foresthall'.

The Trust's definition of a suitable commitment in this timeframe for the Castle Lotus site would be

- agreement of car parking arrangements
- agreed Heads of Terms subject to planning permission
- agreed design specification
- agreed lease terms

A representative from the developers, who are locally based, was present at the meeting and made the following points:

- The building, which is likely to be of modern design, will be four floors but will be setback and will be no higher than the Social Club.
- Apart from the Health Centre, there will be retail outlets on the ground floor and 2-3 bed apartments (only a small number) on the third and fourth floors.
- The plan is to put NHS dentistry on the ground floor with the Health Centre taking the whole of the second floor. There will be two lifts and direct access from the new car park to the Health Centre.

- A new two-storey car park to the rear will provide 58 spaces while the existing car park will be reorganised to ensure that no spaces are lost.
- The access road will be widened and the junction improved so as to handle the increased number of traffic movements with additional protection for pedestrians around the corner into Church Road.

The timescale to completion, whichever site is chosen, should be similar ie about two years. The practice in St John's Road is happy with either site but, should Foresthall be chosen, the Health Centre will be on three floors rather than two at Lower Street. Facilities on either site would be similar.

The Parish Council hopes that there will be no delay in committing to one or other of the sites as the new Health Centre is needed with urgency. It recognises that the PCT has put in considerable effort to secure a central site and hopes that there is, in this respect, a successful outturn. However, the Council retains an open mind on the outturn given the complexity relating to traffic congestion, access and parking. It is envisaged that traffic movements to the health centre would be up to 400 per day. The plan, along with the views of Essex County Highways, will be eagerly awaited and it is to be welcomed that the developers intend to mount over several days an exhibition of the scheme at which questions may be put (and hopefully answered).

THE PARISH PLAN HAS BEEN ADOPTED BY THE PARISH COUNCIL

At a recent meeting the Parish Council voted unanimously to adopt the Parish Plan together with the proposed programme of action points. The Plan will shortly be submitted to Uttlesford District Council for approval and adoption. Assuming this happens, the view of the Parish and Parish Council will, under the localisation policies of this Government, carry much more weight when planning issues affecting the parish are considered by the District Council. It is to be hoped that this is correct but time will tell.

USING SECTION 106 MONEY TO IMPROVE HIGHWAYS

Under the Section 106 agreement, the developers were required to provide a sum of money to fund highways improvements which would improve the situation surrounding the new estate at Foresthall Park.

Following discussions with Essex County Highways the following projects are under serious consideration:

- A footpath from Palmer Way to the junction with Church Road thus allowing safe access to MMCC and the Leisure Centre
- Improvements to the bridge over the brook (near the Black Bridge) and the footpath up to Millfields thus completing a safe walking route for the new St Mary's School to St John's Church.
- Taking action to improve the surface of Water Lane. It should be noted that this does not imply the adoption of this road by ECC.
- The widening of the footpath along Church Road to create a safer route for all pedestrians but particularly for pupils attending MMCC and parents and children walking to the new St Mary's School on Foresthall Park.
- The provision of a safe pedestrian route from Jordon Close to Walson Way.
- Traffic calming measures for Walson Way and Church Road are under consideration in the light that these roads are bus routes (a complication).

The Parish Council continues to hold discussions with Essex County Highways about a number of other issues affecting the village including speeding, the lights on Grove Hill, traffic volumes and speed on High Lane, pedestrian crossings on Silver Street & Cambridge Road, the Fountain junction as well as a residents' parking scheme covering Lower Street and Grove Hill (see elsewhere for details). The achievement of some, alone all of these objectives, will require money which, in the current climate, is likely to be scarce.

BONFIRE AND FIREWORKS EVENT

What a wonderful village event this was and our grateful thanks to everyone who attended. The

weather was very kind to us staying dry not only for the event itself, but also for the essential setting up and clearing away.

Takings on the gate increased from £2015 in 2009 to £3,583 and profit on the refreshments rose from £130 in 2009 to £275 this year. Unfortunately, the cost of the fireworks has also increased greatly!

We cannot hold this event without the hard work of a band of volunteers - too numerous to name here individually - who give up a considerable amount of their time on both the Saturday and Sunday. If you would like to be involved in future years, please contact the Clerk.

Finally, our thanks to Denise and everyone at Elms Farm for making us so welcome, allowing us to use their land, and assisting with transportation on the site!

STANSTED NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The meeting held on Wednesday 29th September was attended by nine Stansted residents who discussed aspects of the village NhW Scheme. Eight residents gave their apologies.

Diane Roberts gave an update on how the scheme was working regarding co-ordinators and the general running of NhW in the village. Alan Johnson (Chair of UD NhW), Peter Caulfield (Crime Reduction Adviser), Kelly Roberts (PCSO) and P.C. Richard Woolgar (Dunmow Police), were present and each gave reports on their individual work within the community, relating especially to NhW.

It was felt that due to the now up and running website that has been set up by IT Specialist Richard Portway, to whom we are extremely grateful, it was decided to have only one main public meeting per year as all information regarding NhW is continually updated and passed on via the site. It was also decided that the smaller steering group would meet as and when necessary to keep things on track.

NEW BUS SERVICE

From 13th December a new bus service (Service 300) will be operating from Saffron Walden, passing through Newport, Quendon, Ugley, Stansted Mountfitchet, Maitland Road Estate, Foresthall Park, then onto Bishop's Stortford.

The service will run weekdays except Tuesdays (due to operating difficulties) with no weekend or Bank Holiday service. There will be two services in the morning from 'The Feathers' Cambridge Road, at 9.43 and 11.37, returning from B/S at 10.23, 12.25 & 14.25. The Foresthall Park times to the village on the return journey will be 10.37, 12.37 and 14.37.

When timetables become available they will be placed in the Library, Day Centre, Surgery, Council Offices and possibly the Post Office. This is a Commercial Service and therefore not subsidised by the ECC and will be reliant on the support and use of the general public in order to maintain the service and hopefully to extend it. The bus will stop at all the normal pick-up points but will also operate on a 'hail and ride' service throughout the journey.

NEWS FROM UTTLESFORD D.C.

Comprehensive Spending Review

The money Uttlesford spends comes from three main sources- council tax, income from fees and charges and grants from central government. It is this final category that is most affected by this review. The Government has announced cuts to local authority funding on average of 28% spread over four years. The actual reduction for Uttlesford will be confirmed in early December. It has been confirmed that local authorities will be compensated for next year's council tax freeze. This compensation will be paid in each of the next four years.

In order to deliver the savings required the Council has approved a partnership with Harlow District Council for its Revenues and Benefits section. This is responsible for collection of council tax and payment of benefits such as housing and council tax. The shared service which would be based in Harlow is intended to deliver economies of scale.

Although in principle supportive of the partnership I expressed my concerns about the affect of the transfer upon our staff. For some who have childcare responsibilities a move from Saffron Walden to Harlow is not practicable. For those employees who do move there would be no free car parking at Harlow's offices.

I value the opportunity of writing a regular column for The Link. It gives me a chance to inform residents about the District Council and my work as a councillor.

Those of us on Uttlesford's scrutiny committee completed a review of the district's five day centres in November. The council and the volunteers on the day centre management committees have been asked to consider employing someone to support the management committees in their important work.

Stansted already does this and 'The Stansted Model' seems like a good idea for Dunmow, Saffron Walden, Takeley and Thaxted. The question still to be answered is where the money will come from.

The news of yet another potential site, this time in Lower Street, for the new doctor's surgery and health centre (see page 17) has been greeted with enthusiasm by some people and concern by others. I have practical concerns about traffic congestion and safety at the difficult junction with Church Road and Chapel Hill.

My main worry is whether what seems to be a complicated commercial arrangement including shops and homes can really be made to work in such an uncertain financial climate.

The council has provided a new batch of street signs for Foresthall Park that should make finding one's way around a bit easier. I am pleased that a new, though very limited bus service will connect the Walson Way area with Lower Street and Cambridge Road from mid December. This is small but encouraging progress towards improving transport links with Foresthall Park. More will be needed if/when the primary school and health centre are built there.

If your gas and electricity bills are high, then changing to another supplier could be the answer. Log on to www.uswitch.com or phone 0800 404 7908 to find independent price comparisons. Or maybe just changing the tariff with your present supplier would give you a better deal. Phone them and say you are considering switching supplier and ask if they can give you a cheaper rate. Changing the way you pay can also save money (Direct Debit is usually the cheapest). For anyone who is struggling to pay energy bills, there is help available through an organisation called Charis Grants, which can be contacted by email: admin@charisgrants.com or by phone 01733 421060.

Our November meeting concentrated on a form of artwork with which we are all familiar - village signs. John Weston, our speaker, gave a lot of interesting information on the varied forms the subject took, and illustrated his talk with attractive slides that he had taken. The first signs date back to the Prince of Wales, later Edward VII, when he bought the estate of Sandringham in the 19th century, and decided that the several villages it included should have a sign placed on top of their directional finger posts as a form of identification. On his death and the accession of George V, the signs were refurbished, but when the Duke of York, later George VI, suggested in 1920 the provision of village signs generally, the initiative was taken up by a national newspaper and a series of prizes were offered.

The competition was a great success and there were 525 entries, the winner being St Peter's in Thanet. Further signs appeared with the Jubilee of George V in 1935 but all disappeared in 1939 when the War brought fear of invasion. After the War, they were replaced and further new signs were erected with the celebration of the Festival of Britain, the Coronation of Elizabeth II and her Silver and Golden Jubilees and the Millennium. It was noted, however, that the sign-makers were exceedingly busy around the turn of the century so that some villages finished up erecting their signs late! John had many slides taken from all over the country and he showed us the great initiative and artistry involved. Many indicated features of the village, others showed aspects of its past, all in metal or wood and even, in one case, china. Signs commemorated a notable doctor who had served the village, local myths, a 17th century practical joke played on the residents involving a dragon, puns on the name of the village and many other examples. We thoroughly enjoyed John's talk and his slides and will look forward to any more subjects he will be investigating.

Our next meeting on 2nd December will be not only the Christmas but also the members' one. This is the occasion when our members take to the floor and speak about various historical subjects they have been researching. I hope you will be able to attend.



Please note that there will be no meeting in December, as we will be having our Christmas dinner at the Great Hadham Golf and Country club for all members.

At the end of October the Stansted U3A Singers, led by Musical Director Isobel Bradshaw, performed their first ever public concert at St John's Church. The choir have only been together for just over a year, formed at the inaugural meeting of the Stansted U3A and originally consisting of a handful of ladies who agreed to sign up to the fledgling singing group. That small number has grown significantly, and on the night the hall was filled to capacity. The choir performed before a 200 plus audience giving an exceptionally enjoyable and varied performance, ranging from classical to hits from the musicals to swing and pop.



The programme was enhanced by guest performer, Marilyn Cross, who performed excerpts from Roald Dahl's 'Horrible Rhymes' - to resounding applause and appreciation. The concert ended with Cava and Canapés as an after-performance social gathering. Our singers are always looking for new members, and would particularly like some men to join them. As with any activity we run, you have to be a member of the U3A to participate, so if you are interested please come along – you do not have to be a member for your first visit.

The next meeting will be at 1.30pm on Thursday 20th January in St John's Church Hall. At this meeting, our speaker will be Mark Davis whose subject will be 'Parchment to NHS Prescription'. Mark will talk on the history of pharmacy from 4,000 BC to the present day. Originally remedies were obtained from a variety of plants using flowers, leaves, stems or roots. Some well-known ones mentioned were belladonna from the deadly nightshade plant, digitalis from foxgloves and from poppies, opium or morphine. Leeches are still used for some medical treatments. When a tomb was opened, a parchment prescription was found between the knees of an Egyptian Mummy buried about 2,000 BC. At the beginning of the last century, 80% of medicines came from pharmacists' recipes and 20% were proprietary tablets or capsules, including aspirin, which was launched 110 years ago. By the late 1950s the reverse was the case with only 20% or less being recipes for tincture extracts or powders. From 1965, instead of taking medicines by mouth three times a day, injections were given. These lasted much longer and, therefore, saved many nursing hours. There have been many developments in medicines over the years, and this should prove a very interesting informative talk.





In November we held a Communications Course to teach sign language. The course leader, Christine Chester of Hatfield Broad Oak, learned to sign as a child because her grandparents were profoundly deaf. When her daughter, Anderley, was born with special needs, it was completely natural for mother and daughter to communicate in sign language. By starting early, Christine provided a bridge to help Anderley avoid the frustration and temper tantrums that result when children can't make themselves understood. At the end of Sunday's course a delighted mother, Vicky Barnes, said "We learned to sign, sing and read in a completely relaxed way and gained a lot from talking to other parents. I am sure my daughter Freya's life will be enriched because of this experience." The three tutors, Christine, Sara and Dawn, all have years of experience with their own children and we were delighted to see the resources available from the Essex Library Service. Despite the benefits of sign language, until now there was nowhere in the area that taught parents and nursery workers how to communicate using sign language. Grove Cottage initiated these courses to fill that gap. Christine has created a practical, hands-on, interactive course that is full of fun and laughter to give people the confidence to start signing. Christine believes signing is helpful to all babies as a way of speeding up the development of speech.





STANSTED MOUNTFITCHET RAILWAY STATION

Our cover photograph by Tudor Owen illustrates part of the station as it now is. The 'Link' gratefully acknowledges the research and information provided by Ralph Phillips. This article refers to the period up to circa 1990, so there is scope in a future issue for someone to describe developments since electrification. Offers to the Editor, please.

The extension of the railway line north from Bishops Stortford was conceived in 1821 with the intention of linking the navigations of the Rivers Stort and Cam during what was still the canal age. In 1834 the idea was developed for an extension through Stansted to Cambridge and York, to which Parliament gave approval in 1836. Early plans were made by the Northern and Eastern Railway Company, but financial problems led to amalgamation with the Eastern Counties Railway and in 1862 incorporation into the Great Eastern Railway. The existing line from Shoreditch to Bishop's Stortford was to the 5' gauge but in two months in 1844 it was converted without service interruption to standard 4' 8½"

The site intended for Stansted station was land below the present Old Bell Close but in an early exercise of people power (aided it has to be said by William Fuller Maitland) it was changed to its present location. In those days local freight was as important as passengers, so following the opening of the line and completion of the station in 1845, sidings were installed on what is now the lowest part of Elms Farm and either side of the line by Black Bridge (for coal), on the present Riverside Business Park (for malt and grain) and by the Stoney Common Road Bridge (for Rochfords nursery). In 1942 the present car and skate park became the sidings for fuel and bombs for the US 9th Air Force. Older residents remember the laden lorries being driven like "the Devil out of Hell" nose to tail up a blacked-out Church Road. These sidings were later used for construction of the Airport link.



The station gardens were laid out by Station Master Gawthrop in 1926 and latterly tended by Porter Doug Hudgell when its 6500 plants earned a two page article in 'Popular Gardening' and several company awards. The footbridge was at the north end of the platforms until electrification, while near it on the down platform from 1931 to the 70s was W H Smith's newspaper kiosk and a gent's toilet. Happy days! The decorative wind braces supporting the roof are of the Great Eastern period, as are the station building, walls, and waiting room. The 1875 signal box was a major feature until electrification, when it was demolished. However, the greatest change brought about by electrification and an increasing population was the lengthening of the platforms, initially to take eight carriages, and later 12. In the '50s and '60s there was a siding south of the up platform where an empty train waited until it was shunted on to the line to become the 8.28am to Liverpool Street. This, with its first class coaches, was popular with the more affluent of the business and professional community who then formed a significant proportion of Stansted's commuters. The last Stationmaster between 1957 and 1966 was the gentle ex-Arnhem paratrooper George Howell. If space permits, some photographs in the next issue.


